# RN AND SCIENCE

In RN's campaign he said the US was "shortchanging its scientific community" and risking "a research gap" with Russia. Today scientists feel the gov't is neglecting their interests more than ever and a serious gap is developing between the Admin. and scientific community. One adviser close to the WH observed "RN just doesn't see any political mileage in science." Political standards have been used to screen federal

- Some thoughts on the President's Science Advisory Committee (PSAC) and Presidential Science Advisor - (i.e. the office) :-
  - PSAC came into being in President Truman's administration. Its mission and charter, then as now, was to make available to the President in an emerging technological age the best possible scientific and technical advice, given by the best scientific and technical brains in the country. It was intended that this advice would be objective - i.e. that it would not be colored or influenced by the political beliefs or inclinations of the scientists on the Committee. Unfortunately over the years (and because scientists are also human beings) this has not been true. The scientific counsel the President receives in certain areas is colored, in greater or lesser degree, by the political leanings of many PSAC members - current and ex-officio. This is particularly true in those areas relating to the research and development of military systems - i.e. any major system which is (believed by them to be) provocative and/or destabilizing

or which will upset the parity balance, vis-a-vis the Soviets, is considered bad. It should not be allowed to surface.

- The structure and orientation of PSAC, essentially from its inception, has been liberal. The conservative element of the scientific community has had little voice or influence in the inner councils of the Committee, inner councils which have been (and are) dominated by a powerful clique of former PSAC members, including three former Presidential Science Advisors (i.e. Kilham, Wiesner, Kistiakowsky). The C/g of this group is Boston, with major offshoots at Cornell ('Bethe'), Columbia ('Rabi'), Univ. of Calif - La Jolla (York) Stanford (Panofsky) -- to name a few. All of these individuals have been very much in the news in recent months in their opposition to the ABM and MIRV (which they oppose ostensibly on technical grounds but which they really are against because the systems are provocative and destabilizing - i.e. to disarmament talks, the arms race, and parity).
- These scientists are very bright, very

self-assured (i.e. arrogant), articulate, and dedicated -- dedicated to science and to (their newly found) Politics and leverage of science -- and to the proposition that there should be a liberal Democrat-ic President in the White House in 1972. It's a fair guess they are moving hard right now to achieve this end in '72 -- each in his own way.

- With the full emergence of PSAC as a meaningful entity following the electrifying Soviet space achievement of Sputnik I in Fall 1957, the members began tasting the heady wine of Power and leverage at the Summit. They liked what they tasted. No longer was the quiet serenity of the lab. and classroom sufficient for fulfillment. Having a Ph.D. (and therefore a proper expertise) in one discipline (i.e. physics, chemistry, math, electronics) they assumed an across-the-board omnipotence in areas far afield, including the shaping of military strategy and foreign policy. They worked openly whenever the opportunity presented itself, being convinced and unabashed (i.e. This came to full flower during the Kennedy years (1960-1968) and has

continued since - i.e. TV, Congress on ABM, MIRV, Disarmament), and behind the scenes when it didn't.

- In the '40's and during the middle 50's many of these same scientists contributed mightily to the national defense posture of the United States - i.e. Kistiakowsky on the atom bomb project at Los Alamos, Wessner, Zacharias, Kistly, on the Von Neumann Committee and Kilham (through the Kilham Report to President Eisenhower) in the accelerated development of the ICBM (i.e. 1954-1957). But in recent years, particularly since 1960, their attitudes have changed. Many of them -- many of the most powerful members of PSAC, past and present -- have inhaled deeply of "Peace gas" (at Pugwash and elsewhere) and now seek peace and accommodation with the Soviets at almost any cost. Military r. and d. and national defense research on campus have become nasty words, those who practice it in the community untouchables. Indeed it has even been suggested that those scientists who work on national defense research projects should be excluded from the scientific community. This "logic" and this thinking carries great weight in

the deliberations of PSAC which, in a certain sense, has become a vehicle for these themes and maneuverings.

- The DuBridge appointment was a gross mistake, going in. It played right into the hands of the Boston Group noted above, and into their present Philosophy, also noted above.

DuBridge is their long time friend and colleague and long time fellow member on PSAC. He (and PSAC) will do little of substance that goes against the wishes of Kelham, Kistly, Weisner, York, Bethe, and Rabi (there are others). This includes support for the President on MIRV and the ABM -- I mean real support, not lip service.

- DuBridge's academic and administrative credits are of the very best - i.e. Ph.D. Chemistry, Radiation Lab at M.I.T. during World War II, President of Cal Tech for many years. At heart a gentle, scholarly man, he is no match for the aggressive Power that can come out of Boston.

- There should be a change in the structure and orientation of PSAC so that there will be more of a balance (where now there is imbalance) between the liberal and

conservative elements of the U.S. Scientific Community. This is no easy task. It will require sensitive, Patient handling, perhaps over a long period, if an upheaval in the Community is to be avoided (i.e. the Franklin Lang thing). The idea is to bring the Community closer together, not divide it further.

- The key move now is to get the right individual as Du Bridge's replacement, someone who is his own man and not a tool of the Boston crowd. The right person will be hard to find but he is around. Wigner (i.e. Dr. Eugene Wigner, Princeton, Nobel Prize - Physics) is a possible - a "like who." A super-star in his own right he is one of the group of Hungarian scientists who came to the U.S. in the late 30's - i.e. Von Neumann, Von Karman, also Ulam (Poland), Fermi (Italy).

- The replacement should be a conservative (for a change!) but one who will command the respect of the Community. This is a matter which needs careful thought and planning.

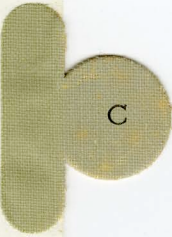

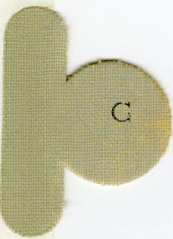

SUBJECT: Disaster Area Surveys by Cabinet Members

In response to the President's request, and your memorandum to me of August 5th, I have set up with General Lincoln a procedure which will ensure his notifying me (with as much lead time as possible) each time a disaster occurs which might appropriately be surveyed by a member of the President's Cabinet who has some special official interest. Moreover, the point was made to General Lincoln that we would rather be notified too often than not often enough.

The Secretaries of the Departments of Defense; Housing and Urban Development; Health, Education and Welfare; Agriculture ... and to some extent Transportation will be considered prime candidates for these survey trips in that they are more responsible than other executive department heads for bringing various forms of relief to disaster victims. The Office of Economic Opportunity is not as involved as one might think; however, Director Rumsfeld will be listed as an alternate to those mentioned above.

Relative to this emergency relief business, the dispatching to the scene of a senior administration official, and the operation of the OEP, it was interesting for me -- especially after having read your note -- to hear Abe Lincoln's comments:

-- The Stans<sup>+</sup> show may have looked pretty good on the surface, but it threw a wrench in our operation. We had already briefed the Vice President on the disaster and he was prepared to go to Texas a day or two later.

-- The Vice President does a good job and makes a point of saying the right things. But after reading the account of Secretary Stans' press conference I doubt that he (Stans) knows that we exist. He definitely does not know anything about our disaster program. If we had known about his being in Texas just a little in advance, we could have briefed him via telephone. It wouldn't have taken more than 15 or 20 minutes.

I list these comments merely for the purpose of giving you something of the "other view." However, there is no problem. It is clearly understood between Abe and me that Cabinet Members will be considered along with the Vice President whenever he (Lincoln) feels there might be the slightest requirement to send a senior administration official to the scene of an emergency. It is understood also that whoever is designated will be thoroughly briefed prior to his appearing in public in the disaster area.

(Darrell Trent, too, has been made aware of these understandings).

Don Hughes will soon be eligible for promotion to permanent Brigadier General, and although the promotion board will not convene until January 11, Air Force regulations require that an efficiency report covering the past 18-month period be placed in his selection folder prior to August 31st.

I know that in the past you have rendered such reports on Don in letter form ... addressed to the Chief of Staff. Having coordinated this matter with Air Force headquarters, I recommend your using the same method in this case. A suggested letter, approved by Jim Keogh, is attached hereto.

Dear General Ryan:

I was just this week informed by my staff that General Don Hughes will be eligible soon for promotion to permanent Brigadier General and I realized that I have not reported on his efficiency since he was first assigned as my military assistant in November of 1968 -- only days after the national election.

My personal selection of General Hughes (a Colonel at that time) was based on my close association with him for more than 13 years. He has always performed in flawless fashion and clearly rates as one of the top military officers in all three services today, regardless of grade or military experience.

While here at the White House he has made on his own initiative a number of innovations in his office which enable it to function more effectively. Part of this effort has resulted in his assumption of command of all Presidential support units -- comprising I believe some 1100 men. In the normal course of his duties he has dealt with the most

senior officials of our own government and unnumerable  
foreign governments with uncommon skill and tact, and  
handled with exceptional competence several delicate  
and potentially dangerous situations. Additionally, and  
I consider this to be of paramount importance, he has  
ensured the safe and efficient movement of my party  
back and forth across the country, to Europe and the  
Pacific, and once around the world.

It goes without saying that I place the highest value in  
General Hughes' trust and loyalty, and believe that his  
early promotion to permanent Brigadier General and to  
temporary Major General will be in the best interests of  
the Air Force and the Nation.

RE: California Clarets

Dan London, the Bohemian Club's wine committee, Russ Green, and Dr. Emil Mrak (who, according to Bob Finch, is the all-time great connoisseur of California wines) all agree that the best Bordeaux-type California wine is Cabernet Sauvignon... from the Louis Martini winery.

Mrak said that Cabernet Sauvignon wine will not quite compare with the best French Bordeaux wines, i.e. the '59 and '62 Chateau Lafite Rothschild and Chateau Margaux that we have been using here at the White House. But he went on to say that it does compare very favorably with the French reds at the "next level down", and that it would be most appropriate to serve it at any White House social functions -- including State Dinners. Russ Green believes that this particular California wine is comparable to France's best.

Zinfandel, a 100% California red wine, was Mrak's second choice. He said it should come from either the Louis Martini or B.V. winery.

None of the connoisseurs would quote a particular year as being the best for Cabernet Sauvignon. Mrak indicated that it would be "unquestionably superb" if at least 4-5 years old. He said the Martini winery people would be only too glad to recommend, and select, a good year.

I am geared to place an order, through Rex Scouten, so that several cases of any selection(s) will be on hand at San Clemente when the President arrives.

(You didn't ask for information on dessert reds, but Russ Green urged us to try Louis Martini's Muscato Amabile. It is very rich in flavor -- the best he has ever tasted.)
