RE: Telephone Call from
POW Wife

At 7:07 p.m. on Tuesday, March 13th, the President received a telephone call from Mrs. Shirley Odell of Mt. Clemens, Michigan. Her husband, an Air Force Lieutenant Colonel, was to be released by the North Vietnamese and would be returning to the Philippines at approximately 3:15 a.m. EST on the morning of Wednesday, March 14.

The purpose of Mrs. Odell's call was twofold:

1. To thank the President for his efforts in obtaining her husband's release.
2. To request that the President ask the networks to give live coverage of the returning prisoners.

Unlike the first two prisoner releases, the networks were not providing live coverage. Mrs. Odell claimed that she had contacted newspapers, POW organizations, and the networks themselves requesting live coverage. The networks refused. The point Mrs. Odell made was that when the Press needed her for interviews, etc., they felt free to track through her house and interfere in her life. Now that she needed the networks so that she and her children could see her husband after such a long period of absence, they were not concerned with helping her.

I told Mrs. Odell that I doubted that there would be anything we could do but would explore "various avenues available to us". Gen. Chappy James subsequently telephoned Mrs. Odell after approximately one hour and apparently explained that technologically it was too late to set up the satellite relay equipment and that he and the White House sympathized with her desire to see her husband emerging from the plane.

I called Mrs. Odell later and assured her of the White House's continuing interest in the matter, emphasizing that Gen. James would do what he could.

As a footnote, Mrs. Odell was not one who stood by the President during the period prior to the Vietnam settlement.

and the National Citizens' Committee
for Fairness to the Presidency -
Wed., Dec. 19, 1973 - 12:15 p.m.

Rabbi Korff is Chairman of the National Citizens' Committee for Fairness to the Presidency. This organization was conceived by Rabbi Korff and he was the first financial contributor. He related to the President that last summer, after viewing and reading of the outrageous allegations against the President, he decided to forego a vacation this year and use the thousand dollars he had planned to spend on the formation of this Committee. Others soon joined him and there are now similar Committees in every State of the Union.

The group came into the President's office, were individually photographed by Ollie Atkins, and then posed for a group photograph during which the Press were present. During this Press period Rabbi Korff showed the President a sample of the full-page ad which they have been placing in the newspapers. This was Ad #7, and the eighth ad will be appearing in the papers shortly.

After the Press departed, the President again thanked the 11 men for their support and emphasized that the institution of the Presidency, rather than the man who occupies the position, must be protected. The President went on to say that the U. S. Presidency is of paramount importance in maintaining peace in the world at this time, noting that our efforts in the Middle East have contributed significantly to keeping the world out of World War III.

As the guests departed the President gave each of them tieclasps, cuff-links, and pins for their wives. The entire meeting lasted approximately 20 minutes.

RE: President's Meeting with Jaycees
Friday, December 14, 1973

Fifty-One State (and D. C.) Jaycee Presidents had gathered in Washington this week for their annual government affairs seminar. The 51 State Presidents, their National President Rick Clayton (whom the President met in September) and approximately 20 other people including National Jaycee Executive Committee members and staff, were invited to the Oval Office to meet briefly with the President.

This large, unwieldy group, was somehow shoehorned into the President's office and gathered on the Rose Garden side. The President remained in his private office until all were assembled. When he entered he was given a thunderous ovation by this group of approximately 72 people. The President spoke to them for approximately 5 minutes, spending approximately half the time on the energy crisis. He emphasized that Project Independence, a goal to make the U.S. independent of foreign countries for energy resources by 1980, is a realistic program with goals that can be reached perhaps sooner than 1980.

Going off in another vein, the President said that the country is beset with certain problems such as the energy crisis and other ancillary issues, but a group such as the Jaycees, which is a very positive, optimistic group, has the opportunity to use their optimism to the country's greatest advantage. The President warned against allowing a "crisis of the spirit" to develop, obviously alluding to the Watergate issue.

After speaking to the group who, upon his completion, gave him another enthusiastic ovation, the President invited each to be photographed with him by Ollie Atkins. He also said that as a special Christmas gift he would give them a Presidential tieclasp. With regard to the pictures, he indicated that each man would receive a copy of the photograph, but that a copy would also be sent to the wire services in the individual's respective State.

The entire event consumed approximately 25 minutes of the President's time, and the feedback from the National President and Andre LeTendre, a former President now with the Department of Commerce, was that the event was highly successful.

SUBJECT: President's Meeting with
Sen. M. Harvey Taylor and
Former Pennsylvania Gov. John Fine
Wed., Dec. 12, 1973 - 12:00 p.m.

It has become traditional for the President to receive former State Senator M. Harvey Taylor on an annual basis. Mr. Taylor is now 97-1/2 years old, but physically looks approximately 30 years younger. By personality, he is approximately 50 years younger than his actual age, as evidenced by his comments, conversation and attitude.

Prior to going into the President's office he and his long-time friend, Gov. Fine, parried with one another, with Gov. Fine acting as Mr. Taylor's foil. However, there was a subtle change of attitude once they entered the President's office, and Mr. Taylor took a more subdued approach. During the approximately five minutes they were with the President they expressed words of support that came from their friends, colleagues and, of course, from themselves. They both admonished the President not to quit, and the President said that that is one thing that he would never do.

Ollie Atkins and the Wire Service photographers took photographs, the one that will probably run being Harve Taylor sitting in the President's chair. Mr. Taylor said he would give the photographer "20 bucks if the picture comes out".

In addition to promising copies of the photographs to each of his two guests, the President presented Presidential ashtrays, cufflinks and ladies' pins for "their girlfriends". He also invited Mr. Taylor to come back next year, and every other year that the President is in the White House.

For President and Mrs. Ceausescu

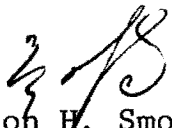

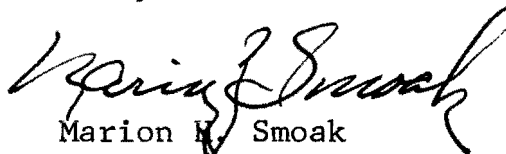

TO: The President

Dr. Moynihan sent the President a memorandum on April 15th which recommended that you make some kind of statement concerning the "military-industrial complex" (Tab A). In this memorandum Dr. Moynihan interprets former President Eisenhower's famous address on this subject, and touches upon numerous complex issues and ramifications of government institutions upon American society.

The President requested Secretary Laird to review Dr. Moynihan's memorandum and offer his comments and recommendations on the subject. Secretary Laird's memorandum (Tab B) advised against issuing any Presidential statement or even entering into a dialogue through "vague statements or inferences" such as those contained in Dr. Moynihan's memo. The issues that were noted by Dr. Moynihan have not only military and economic implications but political, psychological and social connotations as well. Secretary Laird acknowledges that many of the issues and implications warrant further study, but premature judgments and unclear conclusions will only make our task harder.

Comments from other staff members, which you have already reviewed, are contained at Tab C. They also reflect Secretary Laird's opinion that the President should not move precipitously into making such a statement at this time.

Col. Ben Pollard, prisoner for six years, telephoned you and I took the call. He wanted to express his appreciation for the manner in which you "put your career on the line, particularly in December when you made the decision to bomb". He expressed his firm belief that you saved his life, and on behalf of all the prisoners with whom he was incarcerated wants to express his appreciation.

In addition to helping him your actions over the years you have been President have been of great assistance to the families and gave them the strength to carry on.

Col. Pollard said he has been proud to serve his Commander-In-Chief and stands ready to undertake any other assignment, whatsoever, that his Commander (the President) should direct. He described himself as a "proud American" and proud of his President whom he described as "the greatest man in the world".

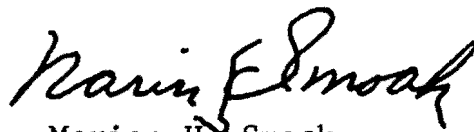

President's Meeting with
Rick Clayton, Jr. (President
of U.S. Jaycees 1973)
Thursday, September 20, 1973

The President was originally scheduled to meet with Rick Clayton and the International President of the U.S. Jaycees in August. However, due to circumstances relating to schedule, the Watergate situation, and other matters, that meeting had to be postponed until September. The U.S. Jaycees President, Rick Clayton, came in on Thursday, September 20, for his meeting with the President. This was the standard meeting during which the President and the Jaycees President were photographed and then chatted briefly together. Stephen Bull sat in place of Dick Howard who was out of the city.

In the course of the discussion that followed the photograph, the President alluded to Mr. Clayton that the principal program was of the Jaycees. Mr. Clayton indicated that it was a three-year VD program and that he had spoken with Secretary Weinberger this morning with regard to the funding. Apparently there are approximately 150 projects being operated throughout the country under Federal grants, and that the U.S. Jaycees want to become involved. The Jaycees are looking for approximately one million dollars in grants.

In response to this indication of the latest project in which the Jaycees are involved, the President expressed enthusiasm because it is a sound program, represents volunteerism, and basically one million dollars is a small sum of money compared to the amount that HEW wastes on some of the grander schemes. The President asked that I, as the staff member, advise Secretary Weinberger that the President wishes the Secretary to give "sympathetic consideration" to the request for the one million dollar grant.

On a different subject Mr. Clayton indicated that, when he had come to the White House in August to see the President, and had the appointment cancelled at the last minute as a result of the circumstances indicated above, Mrs. Nixon saw him and the International Jaycees President and admonished

the two of them not to be "turned off by politics" as had been suggested by Gordon Strachan in the Watergate hearings. The President responded by noting that politics is certainly no worse than any other profession, and probably more worthy.

In a discussion of politics in which Rick Clayton indicated that eventually he would like to run for Congress in Kansas for the seat presently held by Congressman Burleson (D-Abilene), the President indicated that Burleson is probably unbeatable but that Clayton should hang in there. As an extension of this discussion Clayton, who lived in Texas prior to assuming the Presidency of the Jaycees, indicated that he would resign from his post immediately in order to work for John Connally, who has recently become a Republican. The President asked that I informally advise Connally of this expression of support.

Finally, Jaycee President Clayton invited the President to attend the 1974 Jaycee Convention in San Diego which will take place during the third week of June in 1974. The President asked Clayton to keep in touch with Stephen Bull.

The entire meeting took approximately 15 minutes.

RE: Grant Request from U.S. Jaycee President

The President met yesterday with Rick Clayton, the 1973 President of the U.S. Junior Chamber of Commerce. In the course of the discussion the President was told that the Jaycees are initiating a three-year VD project. According to Mr. Clayton, he met with Secretary Weinberger earlier in the morning and discussed the possibility of an HEW grant of approximately one million dollars.

In discussing this matter, the President asked that I advise Secretary Weinberger that the President wishes the Secretary to give "sympathetic consideration" to the request for this grant. Among the reasons is that this is a voluntary program and the track record for the Jaycees has been pretty good.

One matter of which you should be aware is that the U.S. Jaycees are apparently being sued for "discriminatory" practices because they do not admit women to their ranks. If this concept is upheld, the Jaycees would be ineligible for a Federal grant because of a law that prohibits Federal funds being granted to discriminatory organizations.

I want to emphasize that the President is only requesting "sympathetic consideration" for the request, and this is not a direct order from the President for the Secretary necessarily to approve the grant.

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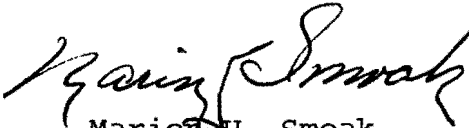

Ambassador Zahedi of Iran is aware that you gave Ambassador Dobrynin a gold Pulsar watch and band following the recent Soviet Visit.

In view of his awareness of your generosity in this instance and of his own generosity (He sent you a solid gold box with your initials in diamonds as a celebration gift on your re-election. Additionally the gold gifts (excluding the ivory miniature itself) which were just given to you and Mrs. Nixon by the Shah and Empress were ones which Zahedi bought personally for use as gifts while he was Foreign Minister and later gave to the Shah for use as State Gifts), I would like to recommend that you send him a Tiffany double penstand decorated with the motif Zahedi designed and had arranged in flowers for your visit to Iran last year and for the Shah's dinner in your honor at the Embassy here -- a pair of clasped hands (the former AID symbol) in front of the Iranian and US flags, along with the inscription, "To Ardeshir Zahedi, Who Always Remembers and Who is Always Remembered, From His Friend, Richard Nixon".

I think that such a gift from you would be a continual reminder to Zahedi, who is admittedly a friend of the US, that his friendship is valued and appreciated.

Tuesday, July 31, 1973 - 12:30 p.m.
The Oval Office

During a meeting with the President in early July, Sec. Brennan noted that he had a young paraplegic friend from Long Island who wanted very much to meet the President. The President told him to bring the individual in and the appointment was arranged for Tuesday, July 31.

George Lang appeared to be between 25 and 30-years-old and is a paraplegic. Apparently he was wounded in Vietnam although it was never made clear when and under what circumstances. His wife appeared to be slightly older than him, but not much. The curious thing was George Lang's youth and the age of their daughter who accompanied them, Angela, who was 17-years-old.

The meeting itself was a rather perfunctory one with an exchange of greetings and the transmittal of a message of good luck by Mr. Lang from his mother-in-law. When this short meeting concluded and while George Lang was being wheeled out, he admonished the President to fight back and reassured him of his continuing support. In response to the admonition to "fight back", the President asked whether he should give them a right or a left--"like Jack Dempsey - both his right and left punches were effective".

The final note of the meeting was a statement to the Langs of what a great job that Peter Brennan was doing as Secretary of Labor and how we need more people like him.

The purpose of this call was a farewell session for former Secretary of the Army Bob Froehke. Froehke had been replaced last month by Bo Callaway as Secretary of the Army. Froehke had been invited in to the office to bid farewell but, due to another commitment, he was unable to do so.

Originally General Haig would have accompanied Mr. Froehke in, but other commitments prohibited his participation. Therefore, I accompanied Mr. Froehke.

The session was purely courtesy, with the normal photographs being taken in front of the Service Flags by Ollie Atkins. Mr. Froehke thanked the President for the privilege of having served him for 4-1/2 years as Secretary of the Army, expressed confidence in the ability of Bo Callaway to perform as his successor, and admonished the President not to forget the conventional use of ground forces in the Army.

The event lasted approximately five minutes, at the conclusion of which, Tom Hart came in with a Fostoria ashtray as the departure gift for Mr. Froehke.

The swearing-in ceremony for Mr. Schlesinger was originally scheduled for the Western White House office but, because the weather was so nice, it was moved to the knoll out on the grass behind the office. Judge Spencer Williams of the Federal District Court of Northern California was invited to officiate at the swearing-in ceremony.

The guests at the swearing-in were members of the Schlesinger family, including 5 of his 8 children, two or three staff members, and Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff Admiral Thomas Moorer.

The group was assembled behind the office and the Press was in the appropriate position. The President came outside and immediately asked the Judge to administer the Oath of Office. At the conclusion of the Oath there were no remarks by either the President or Secretary Schlesinger. Rather, the President asked members of Secretary Schlesinger's family to move in front for a family photograph. The President immediately led the Schlesinger family into his office where he congratulated them, led them out the front door, and invited them to use his golf cart for a tour of the grounds.

The entire swearing-in ceremony and what in the office took five minutes. There were no public remarks and, quite frankly, there was considerable grumbling on the part of the Press that the event was a waste of time.

RE: Meeting with Mr. John Calvin Slomp
Friday, May 11, 1973 - 12:15 p.m.

At the time that the President successfully concluded the war in South Vietnam, John Calvin Slomp composed a sonnet which he sent to the President. He also asked for the opportunity to present it personally at some later date, and in accordance with that request this meeting was set up.

The President initially thought it might be appropriate for him to conduct a Worship Service but, because the man was 78 years old, it was decided that an office visit would be better.

The President was running a bit late on the morning of May 11th, so I had to care for the gentleman for approximately 25 minutes. During that time I learned that he had been a theological writer for approximately 50 years and had travelled throughout the world.

During the brief meeting with the President, Mr. Slomp indicated that he had travelled in many of the countries the President had visited during his incumbency, and reiterated the point he had made in his sonnet that the President had done much to bring peace to the world.

As a personal favor to Mr. Slomp, the President autographed a copy of the sonnet which Mr. Slomp had composed for the President.

The meeting lasted approximately five minutes and there was no Press coverage.

Friday, May 25, 1973 - 10:40 a.m.

Lt. Col. John Drammest, a POW who had been held for approximately six years in a North Vietnamese POW camp, was the individual who made the small 6" x 9" American Flag by hand while a prisoner. He had taken pieces of red and blue cloth from uniforms and other garments, and somehow manufactured this little American Flag by hand. Because the North Vietnamese captors would not permit the display of the American Flag, while in prison the man only displayed it at night and it was of great symbolic significance to them. This was the flag that was formally displayed and presented at the POW dinner on May 24th.

Lt. Col. Drammest (U.S. Air Force) wanted to present this flag to the President as a token of his, and the rest of the POW's, respect for the President's courage. John Drammest, a man of approximately 40 years of age, was accompanied by his mother to the dinner since he is a bachelor. Since there was no opportunity at the dinner to arrange for the presentation to the President, an Oval Office appointment was set up for the following day.

Lt. Col. Drammest was accompanied by his mother, Mrs. Andriana Drammest. They were escorted into the Oval Office, and after an initial exchange of pleasantries, the Press came in and photographed John Drammest presenting the flag. It was during the idle conversation that the President made the observation that John Drammest looked considerably younger than his 40 years of age and noted how he would be in demand in the Washington banquet circuit. It was at this point when the President, in full earshot of the Press, admonished John Drammest to "look out for those Washington socialites, they'll sit you next to a dog every time".

Following the standard practice of the media during these times when only the negative aspects of the President or the Administration are printable, the story in the newspapers and on radio and TV that evening was that President Nixon refers to Washington women as "dogs". To my knowledge there was no further reference to the poignancy of the flag presentation or the symbolism or significance of this flag.

Although the comment by the President was unfortunate, the emphasis on this minor point just further disgraced the Press, although it might take them a few years before they realize how disgraceful their conduct has been.

MEMORANDUM FOR LEONARD GARMENT

FROM THE PRESIDENT

Please arrange with Acting Director William D. Ruckelshaus to have all of the Presidential papers in the files of H. R. Haldeman, John D. Ehrlichman and John W. Dean, III, forthwith placed under the protection of the FBI. "Presidential papers" include not only memoranda between the President and his staff and writings relating to national security, but all correspondence, memoranda, notes, etc. produced or received in connection with official duties and exclude only documents of a personal nature. Such protective arrangements must not involve removal of the papers from the White House, and procedures shall be promptly formulated to permit access to the papers as necessary to carry on government business.

The above action shall not affect in any way the personnel who are to have access to the files. All existing security procedures will remain in effect, and neither the FBI, nor any other successor custodian, shall have any access to, or examine into, any of these files without written Presidential consent.

SUBJECT: White House Files

1. Elliot Richardson and I have discussed the question of White House files. It is the joint recommendation of Richardson and William Rusher, with which I concur, that all Presidential papers in the files of John Ehrlichman, Bob Haldeman and John Dean should be placed immediately under the protection of the FBI. This would not involve the physical removal of files from the White House but would require one or more FBI personnel to come over here and take charge of them.

2. Presidential papers include not only memoranda between the President and his staff and writings relating to national security, but all correspondence, memoranda, notes, etc. produced or received in connection with official duties, as opposed to personal papers of individuals. After the FBI arrangements have been made, procedures will be worked out which will permit access to the papers which is necessary to carry on government business.

3. The above action is not based on any evidence or belief that any of the individuals concerned would improperly remove material from the files. However, it is necessary in order to assure the public that every possible step has been taken to preserve the files for such use as might be required in connection with pending investigations. Similarly, use of the FBI does not suggest any lack of confidence in the Executive Protection Service, but is recommended, in the first instance, as the agency most familiar to the public and which will command the greatest public respect.

9:15 A.M.**

Mayor Lerin Grisct, of the Santa Ana Council, had been trying for three years to present a Resolution to the President proclaiming him "Orange County's First Citizen of the Century". For one reason or another, we had procrastinated in scheduling this appointment, mainly because it was felt there would always be a more convenient time to do it. It was necessary to schedule this during the California trip ending April 8th because Mayor Grisct went out of office April 6th.

The Mayor (actually the former Mayor), his wife, the seven City Council Members, and the calligrapher were lined up next to the ramp to S. '76 by 9:00 a.m. When the President and Mrs. Nixon arrived aboard Army One, they were escorted over to the group where Mayor Grisct was introduced and subsequently introduced the other guests. In the course of the presentation, Mayor Grisct made a statement that could not have been written better by the White House Research and Writing Staff regarding the responsibilities of local government. The Mayor emphasized the desire for local governments to have autonomy and responsibility in conducting their affairs, and that the President's efforts, particularly revenue sharing and other programs, went a long ways towards achieving these ends.

The actual Resolution that was presented to him was in the form of a specially calligraphed Proclamation that had been done on Himalayan goat skin. It was done with special ink and was multicolored. The decorations included heraldic devices designating cities in the Southern California area. The capital "R" was in the form of a serpentine scroll that resembled a legal brief. This symbolized the President's profession as a lawyer.

The President responded warmly to the presentation, thanked each individual, and then he and Mrs. Nixon boarded S. '76 for the flight to Andrews. The entire event took approximately 10 minutes and was covered by the wire service reporters and photographers.

Herb Klein's daughter, Patty, has been photographed with the President when he was Congressman, Senator, and Vice President. She and her husband Thomas, and their four-year-old child Tommy, were visiting the Kleins this week and Herb requested an opportunity to have the family's picture taken with the President.

The group came in at approximately 12:40 and the President immediately made friends with young Tommy. He invited him to sit at the President's desk and be photographed by Ollie Atkins. After that photograph was taken, the rest of the family gathered around for a group photo.

The entire event lasted about three minutes.

RE: Telephone Call from
POW Wife

At 7:07 p.m. on Tuesday, March 13th, the President received a telephone call from Mrs. Shirley Odell of Mt. Clemens, Michigan. Her husband, an Air Force Lieutenant Colonel, was to be released by the North Vietnamese and would be returning to the Philippines at approximately 3:15 a.m. EST on the morning of Wednesday, March 14.

The purpose of Mrs. Odell's call was twofold:

1. To thank the President for his efforts in obtaining her husband's release.
2. To request that the President ask the networks to give live coverage of the returning prisoners.

Unlike the first two prisoner releases, the networks were not providing live coverage. Mrs. Odell claimed that she had contacted newspapers, POW organizations, and the networks themselves requesting live coverage. The networks refused. The point Mrs. Odell made was that when the Press needed her for interviews, etc., they felt free to track through her house and interfere in her life. Now that she needed the networks so that she and her children could see her husband after such a long period of absence, they were not concerned with helping her.

I told Mrs. Odell that I doubted that there would be anything we could do but would explore "various avenues available to us". Gen. Chappy James subsequently telephoned Mrs. Odell after approximately one hour and apparently explained that technologically it was too late to set up the satellite relay equipment and that he and the White House sympathized with her desire to see her husband emerging from the plane.

I called Mrs. Odell later and assured her of the White House's continuing interest in the matter, emphasizing that Gen. James would do what he could.

As a footnote, Mrs. Odell was not one who stood by the President during the period prior to the Vietnam settlement.
