Attached is a revised schedule for the subject program that was given to the President tonight. This revised schedule reflects the following changes that you gave me verbally on the telephone today:

1. Scheduling (privately) meeting with Rogers, Connally, Laird, Moorer, Helms and Kissinger in the EOB at 1:30 p.m. The meeting will be precipitated by discussions with Henry during his morning staff meeting from 9:00 a.m. to 9:10 a.m. You indicated that the President will call Rogers during this meeting and alert him to the session. I saw Henry Kissinger today, and he already knew about this meeting, having discussed it with the President today. He indicated that the cameras would be present for the first ten minutes, afterwards, Henry would signal the crew to depart.
2. The 2:45 p.m. meeting with Secretary Rogers will be cancelled.
3. The dog will not come in in the morning, rather he will come in at night when Manolo normally picks up the President's briefcase, and the cameras will be permitted to photograph the President as he returns to the Residence with the dog via the South Grounds.

To confirm our conversation of Sunday afternoon, during your ten-minute session with the President at 9:00 Monday morning when the cameras are present, the President will indicate that he would like to meet with the subject group at 1:30 p.m. in the EOB office. At that point the President will telephone Secretary Rogers to alert him to this meeting.

This meeting will not appear on the regular daily schedule, but rather will, be added during the course of the day. You indicated to me that in your discussions with the President that there is to be film coverage of the first ten minutes, afterwards, you will signal the cameras to depart and you and the group will proceed with the private portion of your meeting. The President's briefing paper for "A Day in the Life of the President" indicates that you will give this signal.

This 1:30 p.m. meeting replaces the previously scheduled 2:45 p.m. meeting with the President, Secretary Rogers, and you. Your office indicated to me that they would make arrangements for cancelling the 2:45 p.m. meeting and setting up the 1:30 p.m. meeting. I also understand that the standard briefing paper for this meeting will be prepared and submitted to the Staff Secretary in the usual manner.

4. Rose Woods has been advised that John Chancellor should be invited to the Dinner (he has already been contacted), and the Social Office will officially and formally invite Chancellor tomorrow. When Rose comes in for her session with the President at 12:25 p.m., she will bring some correspondence of a warm and human nature that might precipitate an immediate telephone call to the author of the letter. Ray Price is being asked to crash on the project of coming up with some good correspondence as well as preparing talking points for the President. These will be submitted tomorrow morning.

Rose has been alerted to the President's desire to meet, spontaneously with an old friend. She will try to find one tomorrow morning. The President's schedule reflects this event on a tentative basis.

No reference was made in the schedule to substituting a meeting with Mrs. Nixon for the meeting currently scheduled with Julie Eisenhower. You indicated that this is something we will have to work out tomorrow.

I spoke with Ed Harper today, who had been contacted by the Vice President's office. Consideration is being given by John Ehrlichman to bring the Vice President into the meeting a little bit earlier than 9:57 a.m. so that the Vice President could be present for John's discussion of some substantive issues. Apparently the Vice President's office feels that just bringing the Vice President in for the last three minutes would make him look like an errand boy and would be generally demeaning to his public stature. A recommendation will come in to you first thing in the morning after Harper has received an answer from John Ehrlichman.

The type of situation we are looking for is perhaps a young man who has performed some act of heroism or a senior citizen who is performing some significant and productive function in his old age, etc. Ray should prepare talking points.

The President also indicated that on a spontaneous basis, he would like to have an old friend drop in for a brief hand shake and photograph. I have written this drop-by into his schedule of the day on a tentative basis, contingent upon the availability of an old friend in town. However, perhaps Marge Acker could search around for an old friend early Monday morning.

Whatever you can come up with on both of these matters will be sincerely appreciated.

As we have discussed on the telephone, NBC will be filming a TV special on Monday, December 6, covering the President's activities from morning until night. Part of the filming will involve the Vice President, as we discussed in our telephone conversation. That involvement is as follows:

At 10:00 a.m. the Vice President is scheduled to chair the Domestic Council Meeting in the Cabinet Room. The President will open the meeting, spend about 10 minutes with the Council, and then depart. At that point the Vice President will take over.

At 9:45 a.m. John Ehrlichman will be in the President's office discussing the Domestic Council Agenda. The discussion will center about the Vice President's role in chairing the meeting as well as his role in maintaining liaison with city and State governments. At approximately 9:55 the President will ask for the Vice President to step in for a moment.

I would appreciate it if the Vice President could be in the Cabinet Room by about 9:50 a.m. so that he can go in directly. We anticipate that his discussions with the President will last about three minutes, after which the President and Vice President will walk into the Cabinet Room together.

Attached is the President's schedule for Monday, December 6, the day on which "A Day In The Life Of The President" will be filmed. A copy of this schedule will be given to the producers of the show on Friday, December 3, when they come to the White House to make arrangements for the production. (Schedule at Tab A.)

Yesterday on the airplane, Ron Ziegler and Dick Moore commented that the day looked too heavy, or "loaded", and that we would be subject to criticism for contriving a "typical" day when, in reality, it is atypical.

I am not sure that I agree but, should you wish to reduce the number of public events (the private staff events are normal and should not be changed) I might suggest the following:

1. 10:30 a.m. Eliminate Diplomatic Credentials Presentation.
There are other ceremonial events during the day including the afternoon arrival of Prime Minister Trudeau and the evening arrival for the stag dinner.
2. Eliminate the meeting on drugs and substitute for it a staff meeting with Henry Kissinger at about 3:45 p.m. during which the President and Henry would position themselves for the 4:00 p.m. Trudeau meeting.

The other staff appointments throughout the day would remain as outlined in the detailed schedule which you and the President approved on Tuesday, November 30.

Throughout the day on Monday, December 6, NBC will be filming a TV special entitled "A Day In The Life Of The President". A film crew will be in attendance for at least part of a number of meetings being held in the White House.

The President will meet with the Quadriad to receive a report from Donald Rumsfeld on Phase II on the Cost of Living Council at 11:00 a.m. in the Roosevelt Room. It is expected that this meeting will last approximately one hour.

Upon the conclusion of this meeting, the President will return, alone, to his office. The film cameras will be in the President's office at this time. On a purely spontaneous basis, the President will ask that I see if you could step in for a moment, if you have not departed. Please do not depart. You would then come into the President's office and meet with him for about 15 minutes, discussing the G 10 meeting from which you just returned. Part, if not all, of this discussion will be filmed with live sound by the NBC crew. However, be assured that we have reserved all editing rights, and can delete any material of a sensitive or otherwise confidential nature.

This will be a rather free and unstructured session that you will have with the President at 12:00 p.m., with no agenda being prepared. However, should you have some specific thoughts or other items that you feel it would be important that the President mention, or not mention, it might be well to submit a note to the President in advance so that he can be aware of these issues. Unless they are of a nature of such sensitivity that I should not be aware of them, I might suggest that you send the memorandum to me, should you feel it advisable to write one, and I will insure that the President sees it prior to your "spontaneous" meeting with him at Noon on Monday.

You will be positioned inside the Downstairs Family Dining Room and, upon exchange of signals between the Military Aide and the Chief of Protocol, you and the arriving Ambassador will meet in front of the fireplace in the State Dining Room for the exchange of credentials. The Ambassador's family will be standing off to the side and, after the credentials presentation, you invite them over to be photographed.

After the photographs, you escort the arriving Ambassador and his family out the main door of the State Dining Room and walk with them to the North Portico for their departure. Technical Questions

They would be attached with clamps and can be installed during the weekend preceding the filming.

Clark MacGregor fully approves of a Congressional breakfast meeting, but rather than merely meeting with Senators Mansfield and Scott, he would suggest that the President meet with the "Big Five" (Scott, Mansfield, Ford, Boggs, Albert). Such a meeting would dramatize the President's good relations with both houses of Congress, and show his concern for matters that emanate from the House and the Senate. Clark noted that he has been requested to do a wrap-up on the President's relations with Congress after Congress adjourns this session and feels that this televised meeting with the Big Five would tie in very well with whatever it is that Clark does later on in December.

With regard to an agenda, Clark would recommend the following subjects to come under discussion:

1. The Supreme Court nominations.
2. The tax bill.
3. The extension of the Economic Stabilization Act.

Clark would do a briefing paper for this meeting but feels it would not be necessary for him to sit in.

His parents are divorced (his mother who earned a degree at a college in Montana is a secretary for a Farm Cooperative in Denver; it is not known where his father now is but at one time attended Howard University as a pre-med student) and Gary is not close to them but is with an uncle whom he sees on his infrequent visits to Denver.

Gary is an outstanding football player. Has made 37 touchdowns in the 8 games his school has played thusfar this year and has a record of 14.4 yards gained each time he has carried the ball.

Gary also is a fine basketball player with a record of 18 1/2 points per game and 22 rebounds per game.
