RE: Achievement of Presidential Scheduling Objectives -
12-Month Cumulative Analysis

Attached is a 12-month cumulative analysis of the President's projected activities versus the number of activities in each category actually achieved. As in previous reports, a (+) or (-) is shown for convenience to indicate where we are ahead or behind. A (+) is awarded to those categories where achievements exactly match projections.

This summary was prepared on the 16th of December, projecting events through the end of the month. It is anticipated that there will be very little activity for the rest of December, other than the meetings with the two Heads of State in Bermuda and Florida.

With regard to the fourth quarter of 1971, although there is not a specific breakdown for this period, Presidential activity has been generally light compared to the first three quarters. This has been due to the heavy emphasis on economic matters, preparation of speeches, and quite a few private meetings with people such as Sec. Connally and Dr. Kissinger regarding financial and international matters.

When the plan for Presidential activities was prepared in February of 1971, quotas were projected for different categories and subcategories at that time. Subsequently, some additional categories such as "Economy Oriented" meetings, and "Head of State" meetings (Trudeau, Pompidou, Heath, Brandt and Sato) were added. Additionally, the President participated in a number of events such as meetings with Governors, off-the-record speeches, and certain political events which were not projected. With regard only to those events that were considered last February, there are 39 categories reflected in this report. Of this number, we achieved or exceeded our goal in 18 categories, and failed to achieve it in 21. The percentages are 46% achievement,

54% under achievement. Were we to add the 8 activities that were not considered in the February plan, we would come out on the positive side with approximately a 55% record of achievement of objectives.

Taking the year as a whole, by major category, there are certain points that stand out. We batted one for twelve on Domestic Council meetings, participating only in the session done for the filming of "A Day In The Life Of The President". The ball was batted out of the park on Economy Oriented meetings, however, since this is an additional category, and we had 38 such sessions. As explained in a previous report, although we may have fallen down in the number of Quadriad meetings within the strict definition of "Quadriad", the four participants were present for many of the Economy Oriented meetings. Therefore, although we show a (-) for Quadriad, the picture is not quite so bleak since we had many meetings that included the four Quadriad members, as well as other people.

In the area of Foreign Affairs, we look fairly good on paper. However, we have had only one-eighth of the number of NSC meetings that were projected. In the area of Foreign Trips, the Azores and Bermuda saved us so that we could break even on projections versus results. There is a new category in this report entitled "Head of State" meetings which reflects the preparatory talks the President is having prior to his visits to Red China (oops - PRC) and the Soviet Union. Most of the Foreign Affairs activity has been in Office Appointments where there have been approximately twice as many as projected (97 achieved - 48 projected).

We are minus all the way down the line in Cabinet activity. The closest we have come to achieving projection is in Cabinet meetings where we are about 87-1/2% (21 for 24). We were right on target up until this fourth quarter where we fell back and had only three of the six Cabinet meetings.

Congressional activity looks good, despite a minus in GOP Leadership meetings. On the bi-partisan side, we are 400% ahead of projections. You are also reminded that the President has many Congressional contacts by telephone which are not reflected in this report. In addition to phone calls of a substantive nature to Congressmen, the President is continuing with his program of birthday telephone calls to Congressmen which further increases contact with them.

In the area of Major TV, we have fallen back a bit. Again, an explanation is necessary. In February, I believe it was anticipated that there would be certain subjects upon which the President would deliver a speech or report to the Nation. In a few cases, these reports have been done in the Press briefing room and have been on the evening news rather than as a special program from the Oval Office. For example, the latest troop reduction announcement was done in this way. In the subcategory of "Head to Head", we show three such events. This is a matter of interpretation, however, since it includes Chancellor and Kuralt interviews where the President did get into some other areas of discussion, particularly in the interview with Chancellor where he discussed the trip to China at some length.

In the area of Press Relations, we are behind in both categories of Press Conferences (televised and in-office). With Individual Appointments, the President has seen better than twice as many as projected, and has made four Radio Speeches that were not projected in the February plan.

Social should generally be considered minus throughout since the principal events which received public coverage (State Dinners, Evenings at the White House, and Worship Services) are below projections. There have been about twice as many Special Receptions as were projected, and this gains points with participants. That is a positive, especially when you consider that Special Receptions are usually for special interest groups which need to be cultivated during a political year.

In the General category, we are way down with Minorities and Labor Groups. It is unfortunate that the address to the AFL-CIO Convention cannot be counted more than once since that stirred up such activity and interest in the Press that it was worth about ten small labor meetings. One big plus in the General category is Special Interest where we were 74 versus 48 projected. I believe that our projections were way too low in the first place, and that in 1972 we should double or triple our projections. The types of Special Interest groups, however, are political decisions to be made by Messrs. Haldeman, Colson, et. al.

Miscellaneous is pretty much self-explanatory with the exception of Special Speeches. This category of speeches is similar to Special Interest groups and includes 4-H, Milk Producers, and others. During a political year, the President will be making a number of these addresses to such groups, and I am sure that the record of achievement will be a lot higher than the 22 that we realize for 1971.

The figures for 1971, by themselves, are probably pretty good taken in their aggregate, and contrasted with the events of the year. The principal news issues this year are the economy and foreign affairs, and, in this regard, we did well. The China and USSR trips will be dominating the President's schedule one way or another for the next five months, and I would project from here that the figures for the first two quarters of 1972 will look pretty much like any two quarters of 1971. However, since 1972 is a political year, we will have to place a great deal more attention and work against those groups that can benefit us the most politically -- Special Interest groups and Labor groups. I never have seen a plan for Minorities, but one should be developed if we are to cultivate the ethnics properly. I doubt that we want to place a great deal of emphasis against Blacks since that seems to be a losing cause. I might suggest that those who are doing the political planning for 1972 look at the 1971 achievement figures in the General category, and see where and how we can boost the figures up in a way that is most beneficial to the President. I defer in this matter to Chuck Colson and others who will be actively involved in the campaign planning.

Third Quarter Cumulative Analysis

Attached is a 9-month cumulative analysis of the President's projected activities versus the number of activities in each category actually achieved. A plus or minus is shown for convenience to indicate where we are up or down.

Unfortunately, there are a lot more minus signs than there should be. However, there are certain sub-categories that require explanation, and the results aren't as negative as they readily appear.

According to our records, a Quadriad Meeting has not been held since June 14. However, that is the result of a strict definition of "Quadriad". There have been numerous economy-oriented meetings (total of 25 since January) that have included the four principal Quadriad members.

In the area of Foreign Affairs, there have been numerous office appointments and unofficial visits of a few Heads of State and lesser ranking foreign representatives, and the total of Office Appointments is twice what was projected. There have also been numerous Kissinger or Kissinger/Rogers meetings that have undoubtedly taken the place of the NSC meetings where we were only running about 40% achievement.

In the initial projections for Cabinet Meetings through September, 18 were planned and 18 were actually achieved. This is, incidentally, the only category where we are right on the nose. We are lacking in individual private appointments with Cabinet Members, running at about 33%.

Note: Meetings with Sec. Connally or the Attorney General are not counted as individual Cabinet Member Meetings.

Congress is the area where we have achieved the best results. With the exception of GOP Leadership Meetings (11 for 18) and Congressional Half-Hours (which have been dropped), we have exceeded all projections. Of particular note should be the Congressional Appointments where 27 were projected and 53 achieved. We have also been consistent with the Mansfield and Albert Breakfasts.

In the Major TV category, two of the sub-categories for the individual or multiple interviews are down, but this is a conscious decision of the President and the planning group. However, Reports to the Nation are twice what were projected.

In Press Relations, we are down in the number of Press Conferences, both televised and in office, but considerably ahead with Individual Appointments.

The Social category is in pretty good shape, particularly considering that the President made the decision to reduce the number of Evenings at the White House.

Our greatest shortcoming is reflected in the General category, particularly our meetings with Minorities and Labor Groups. The President has certainly done his bit with the Special Interest groups, however, having seen 63 versus a projected 36. The Veterans groups certainly have had their share of visits to the office.

Miscellaneous carried those sub-categories of events which we did not originally program when Dwight wrote the memorandum last February. A few comments, though, on some of these activities. The President has not had a Medal of Honor Ceremony since June 15. Fifteen Political Meetings are shown since January, but a number of these are those quick hand-shake sessions that we have on trips in the Cabin of Air Force One or in a hotel room adjacent to a Media Reception. The Miscellaneous Ceremonies include the swearing-in ceremonies in the office as well as bill signings.

Although there has been lack of achievement in certain areas, the President has certainly been busy and has just been forced to rearrange priorities according to current situations. The aggregate figure for projected activities through September 30 is 598. For those activities that were projected, the President achieved 570. This is a misleading comparison, though, if you take it on face value, because the achievement figure doesn't necessarily relate precisely to the projected figure. It is significant though in the

number of activities in which the President has participated, particularly when you consider that there are 70 additional "Miscellaneous" events that are not included in the figure of 570 achievement.

I am not certain what this analysis shows us other than that we are relatively on track with achieving certain scheduling objectives, but that the turn of events obviously requires rearranging of priorities. Perhaps it is time to go back and take a look at where the President may have been spending too much unnecessary time (perhaps Miscellaneous Ceremonies might fall into this group) and now analyze where more work needs to be done (e.g., Minorities). Also, our quotas for Special Interest groups may have been way too low since, in a campaign year, this category is of great importance to the President.

Attached is the report for the month of April, 1971. In the projected column, a hyphen indicates that either an event was not projected or the event in question is projected over a longer period of time and a monthly projection would be fractional. (E.G., a head-to-head interview is scheduled once per quarter.)

Good results were achieved in Press Relations and General. Your attention is drawn to meetings with students, the three events being eight college students on the 8th, Rio Grande City High School on the 16th, and the 4-H group on the 21st.

In the Miscellaneous category, the President gave three special speeches that received fairly good coverage: Administration Wives Briefing, Remarks to the DAR Convention, and Remarks to the U.S. Chamber of Commerce.

The category where we can truthfully say that all objectives were met was Cabinet. The individual appointments during the month of April were with the following Cabinet members: Ambassador Kennedy, Secretary Stans, Secretary Hardin, Secretary Richardson, Secretary Volpe, Secretary Romney, Secretary Morton and PMG Blount. Additionally, although it is not reflected, the President did on two occasions meet briefly with Ambassador Bush in a group situation.

Domestic activity requires some attention, particularly the Domestic Council meetings. The President has not attended one of these meetings since last December.

Overall, we seem to be relatively on track and have achieved a good balance. A report for a single month, of course, can distort things slightly since so many projections are fractional when broken down to the one month.

RE: Schedule Objectives - Quarterly Report (Jan.-Mar. 1971)

Attached is a quarterly report showing the schedule objectives and the figures on the achievement of the individual objectives. There are nine major categories within which sub-categories have been tallied. In the original "schedule goals" memorandum, certain events were not listed or provided for. However, the President did engage in certain activities during the first three months of 1971 for which credit should be given. These events have been lumped into the "MISCELLANEOUS" category which appears as the last category on page 2. Included in MISCELLANEOUS are such things as Remarks at the Dedication of the Woodrow Wilson Center, and the Off-The-Record Remarks to the Governors who were assembled at the Washington Hilton Hotel.

For purposes of classification of any Presidential activity, where the event could be classified in more than one way, it was. For example, the President's trip to Des Moines, Iowa, was a one day special event, and it was also a government-to-the-people trip.

In some of the categories it is obvious that we have failed to achieve our objectives in some important areas. For example, we have not had a Domestic Council Meeting since last December. We are also only at 50% of our objectives with GOP Leadership Meetings.

Areas of strength are definitely FOREIGN AFFAIRS and the number "13 +" for Office Appointments is an understated figure. There were a number of Ambassadors seen during Open Door Hours, and occasionally quick handshakes and Ollie Atkins photos that could also be interpreted as FOREIGN AFFAIRS Office Appointments.

We have come closest to achieving our objectives in the categories of MAJOR TV, PRESS RELATIONS, and SOCIAL.

Under GENERAL, we are only at about 40% on Open Door Hours, but this is a bit misleading. We had planned to have two 30-minute Open Door Hours per week but ended up having an average of one 60-minute Open Door Hour per week so that really we did better than we show on paper.

Still in the same category of GENERAL, you will note that we are lacking in labor groups but are really not doing too badly with students. Minorities is supposed to be based on "the Colson Plan", but I have not yet received this and am not correlating the results of the first three months with anything but a rather nebulous requirement of achieving 12 minority events per quarter.

The main weakness in this report is that there was a good deal of catching up to do between January and today. From now on we will tally the week's activities, and submit a weekly report. Should it prove that a weekly report is just too frequent, we may back off to bi-weekly or even monthly. However, this is something we'll just experiment with and continue to find the best way in which this report can keep us on track, which is obviously the purpose of all this record keeping.
