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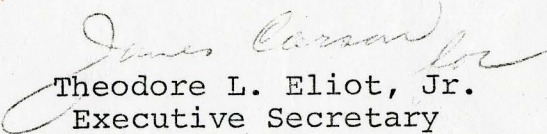

SUBJECT: Schedule Odds and Ends

The following are several odds and ends involving the schedule which we should incorporate:

1. The President wants to do the Detroit Economic Club on September 22. This would be an evening event in Cobalt Hall -- business suit -- probably open to live Television. As I have said before, the President would open with some brief remarks and then move to a Q and A. The main question, and we must get this staffed out quickly, is whether or not Shultz and McCracken feel it is a good idea for the President to do this on the twenty-second. We need Connally's opinion also but he won't be back until Tuesday. You should check Shultz and McCracken today and let me have a preliminary report tomorrow in Washington as to what their thinking is on this.

If the President does do the Q and A on the 22nd, then we must make sure that the 21st is kept completely clear. We must also keep the 20th light. This may affect the visit of the King of Norway. We should see immediately whether or not he can come at some other time.

2. We are to keep the fifteenth and sixteenth of September clear. This does not mean the astronaut dinner on the evening of the sixteenth.

SUBJECT: Your Meeting With King Olav of Norway, Tuesday
at 11 a.m.

The King has been in the US in a private capacity since September 6, visiting the Seawanhaka Corinthian Yacht Club regatta in which he participated.

In light of His Majesty's non-political role, he will not conduct business nor is he expected to raise any bilateral questions. Thus, in the context of his participation in the regatta, you may wish to turn the conversation to sports:

-- note that the Norwegians have traditionally been interested in sports, especially sailing and skiing (NOTE: in the last Winter Olympic Games at Grenoble, Norway won more medals and points than any other country);

-- refer to His Majesty's excellence in sports (in his youth he participated in the famous Holmenkollen ski jumping competitions and the sailing races at Cowes, England, and was a member of the winning crew at the Olympic Games at Amsterdam in 1928).

If the occasion presents itself, you may wish to express to His Majesty your appreciation for Norway's cooperation within NATO to maintain a strong and free West. You might also ask his judgment regarding the possibilities for Norway's membership in the Common Market (the Norwegian Government appears to seek full membership.)

If you wish, the King would certainly appreciate your personal views on the American domestic scene. He is well-read and keenly interested in the United States. He has visited here frequently: every year during World War II (he was a personal friend of President Roosevelt), and most recently on a State visit in 1968.

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Additional background materials are attached at Tab A, and a biographic sketch of the King is at Tab B. There will be a photo opportunity at the beginning of the meeting.

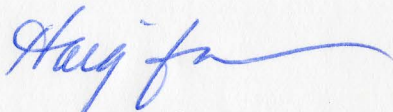

SUBJECT: Visit of King Olav of Norway

King Olav of Norway will be visiting the Seawanhaka Corinthian Yacht Club in a private capacity next month. He has asked if he could pay a courtesy call on you on September 21 or 22. Ambassador Mosbacher relayed this request, from a mutual friend, and Ambassador Crowe has now received it from the King himself.

The King is an old and valued friend of the US and for you to receive him would be a kind gesture which would be welcomed in Norway. On the other hand, the UN General Assembly will be convening at about the same time, and to receive the King here, on a private visit, would make it more difficult to turn down other requests from other visiting dignitaries. If you wish to receive the King, however, his capacity as Head of State would make his call on you distinguishable from most of the other expected requests.

On balance there are no strong foreign policy reasons for or against your seeing him.

RECOMMENDATION

That you decide, on personal and schedule grounds, whether to invite the King to pay a call.

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TO THE SENATE OF THE UNITED STATES

With a view to receiving the advice and consent of the Senate to ratification, I transmit herewith the convention between the United States of America and the Kingdom of Norway for the avoidance of double taxation and the prevention of fiscal evasion with respect to taxes on income and property, signed at Oslo on December 3, 1971.

For the information of the Senate, I transmit also the report of the Secretary of State with respect to the convention and copies of two notes signed and exchanged on the same date as the convention and relating to understandings concerning certain provisions of the convention, as explained in the Secretary's report.

The existing income-tax convention with Norway of June 13, 1949, as modified and supplemented by a supplementary convention of July 10, 1958, would be terminated and replaced by the new convention when the latter comes into force.

The new convention follows the general pattern of bilateral income-tax conventions now in force between the United States and a number of other countries. It takes into account changes in United States and Norwegian tax laws and developments reflected in recent tax treaties concluded by the two countries with other countries. So far as policy and technical considerations permit, the convention follows the model draft convention of the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development published in 1963.

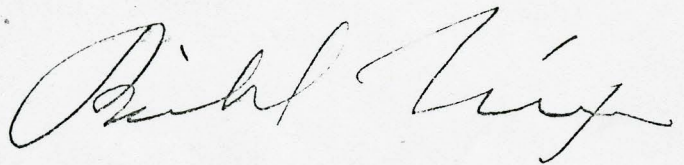

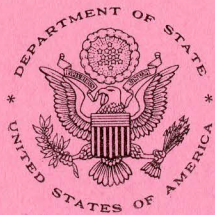

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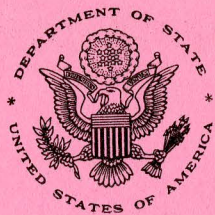

SUBJECT: Ratification of Income Tax Convention with Norway

Attached at Tab A for your signature, in duplicate, is the instrument of ratification of the Convention between the United States and Norway for the avoidance of double taxation and prevention of fiscal evasion with respect to taxes on income and property.

The Convention was signed at Oslo on December, 1971. On August 11, 1972, the Senate gave its advice and consent to ratification by vote of 79-0. The Norwegian Storting has also unanimously approved the Convention which will be brought into force two months after the exchange of ratifications. The Convention will replace an existing bilateral convention, will take into account changes in US and Norwegian tax laws and will follow the pattern of our income tax conventions with several other countries including France, Belgium and Japan.

That you sign the instrument of ratification at Tab A.
