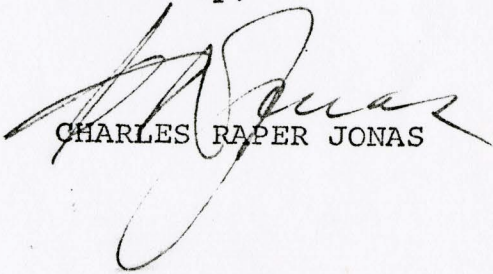
Dear Clark:

I would like to urge you to use your influence in asking President Nixon to appoint a replacement for the Comptroller of Currency William B. Camp, whose term of office expires either on November 15, 1971 or February 1, 1972. I understand that he will have served five years as of November 15, 1971, however, the term that he was appointed for expires February 1, 1972.

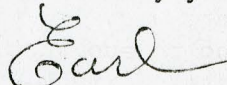
Our companies have had considerable dealings with Mr. Camp within the past two to three years and at present one of our companies has two suits pending against him in Federal District Court. He has been very partisan in overruling every member of his staff and denying applications solely because of requests from Democratic members of Congress.

As a part of the Federal Court suits mentioned above, the Comptroller's records were made available to the Court reflecting his complete disregard of facts and total recommendations of his staff, to favor a request from Democratic members of Congress. A copy of the information referred to above, that has been submitted by his office to the Federal Court, would be available for you, if needed.

There are certainly many qualified Republicans to serve as Comptroller, including Ken Roberts from Tennessee, whom all of you know.

I would appreciate your interest and assistance in seeking the replacement of Comptroller Camp.

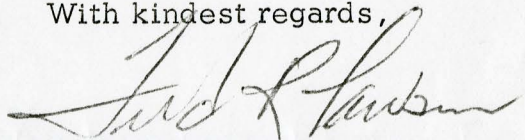
