Dear Mr. Scott,

I am writing with reference to the recent executive decision to cut back on the personnel and field offices of the Community Relations Service of the Department of Justice.

As a representative of an organization which has seen and felt the impact of the CRS, I feel that it's reduction in staff and funding is a decision which lacks foresight and integrity.

The 70's, as an era of progress on many fronts, will no doubt create an equal amount of social and cultural unrest. The CRS was designed to combat the outward thrusts and underlying reasons for such social and cultural problems. To "strangle- with intent to kill" a program and service as CRS is in effect allowing the inevitable social and cultural clashes to have serious implications and inroads to the lifestyle and life-progress of America. That is, of course, unless the Administration has plans to eliminate the causes of all possible social and cultural problem areas.

In short, I would like to express my extreme objection to the cutback of CRS, and feel that in your official capacity you should be aware of some of the implications of such a decision.

Dear Mr. Green:

John Ehrlichman has asked me to thank you for and to respond to your letter in which you express concern over the continued existence of the Fair Housing Program at the Department of Housing and Urban Development and the Community Relations Service at the Department of Justice.

Let me assure you that there are no plans to "dismantle" either program. Both are included in the President's proposed fiscal year 1974 budget -- the Fair Housing Program at a higher figure than this year and the Community Relations Service at a reduced figure. In fact, these programs continue to have the full support of the Administration. Moreover, there are no plans to eliminate the position of Assistant Secretary for Equal Opportunity at HUD.

You expressed interest in the equal opportunity mandates of the "human rights agencies" in connection with revenue sharing. The Treasury Department has recently issued regulations for General Revenue Sharing which are designed to, among other things, establish an effective system for detecting and preventing discrimination. I have enclosed a copy for your review.

In addition, the four special revenue sharing proposals of the President also would provide protection for minorities to assure that funds would not be used for purposes that would violate the civil rights of any person.

Thank you for your note of the 22nd.

Brad has talked with Don Jones (Ben Holman is away for a few weeks) about both of the cases to which you refer. Both of them result from the budget change which the President proposed for CRS for FY 1974 (a change, incidentally not at all directed at CRS's very proper crisis control function but rather at what was felt to be its improper role of offering grant advice to local governments).

Mr. Jones tells us that every effort is being made to place the many employees affected by the reduction in force, and that neither Mr. *JESSE B.* Littlejohn nor Dr. Walker have been in any way singled out; they simply were in the category of personnel to which the RIF has had to apply.
