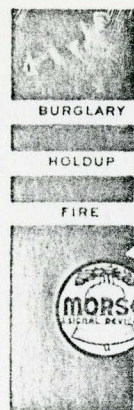

Dear Mr. Clawson:

I received your fact sheet on drug law enforcement reorganization. For some time there has been a question on my mind for which I would appreciate an answer. I like to keep up with law enforcement at the federal level and am frequently called upon for answers to various questions, some of which I have the answer for.

I am aware that President Johnson merged the Bureau of Narcotics of the Treasury Department with the drug abuse control activities of the Food and Drug Administration and formed the Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs of the Department of Justice. My question is concerning the Office of Drug Abuse Law Enforcement. What is this agency and what Department of the government is it under? What are its present duties and how does it differ from the Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs? Was this agency created under Mr. Nixon's Administration?

Frequently I am an instructor in various police schools as well as law enforcement classes at colleges and universities. I also present programs for various service clubs and other organizations. I like to have the facts when I make a statement, therefore I would appreciate your assistance in supplying this information.
