Dear Jim:

This is in further reply to your recommendations and comments on the drug abuse problem in the United States.

Through the efforts of Mr. Charles "Bud" Wilkinson, Special Consultant to the President, agreement was reached on May 2, 1969 between the Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs, the National Institute of Mental Health and the Department of Defense to contract with the National Advertising Council for a comprehensive campaign on drug misuse and abuse. This is to be a three year continuing program whereby each governmental agency is to contribute \$50,000 each per year and represents just a start in a comprehensive attempt to encourage the radio and T. V. media to assume its proper role in the fight against drug abuse.

Contemporaneously with this program, the National Association of Broadcasters has committed itself to an active program with the Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs to enlist the aid of the nation's disc jockeys. Although embryonic, this program is already showing enthusiastic reception by the networks around the country.

It is the President's firm belief that Government alone cannot bear the full burden in the many problems that affect our country, particularly in the area of drug abuse. It is the policy of the Administration to encourage private enterprise to work side by side with Government in alleviating the ills of the nation.

In short, Jim, your recommendations closely parallel programs which have now been initiated by the President.

Dear Mr. Commissioner:

As you know, the scheduled airline industry, by letter of December 30, 1969, to Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Rossides, offered its assistance in the President's drive against narcotics. We have discussed this matter on several occasions since that time with members of the White House staff, Assistant Secretary Rossides, Deputy Director Finlator of the Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs and his staff, and you and your staff.

As you know, the presidents of the scheduled airlines of this country, and Mr. Tipton, President of our Association, are anxious to lend all possible cooperation to this vital effort of the Administration. It is our hope that the eyes and ears of the U. S. airline industry around the world can make an important contribution to stopping the flow of dangerous drugs.

It seems to us that the most efficient way to handle this program is to have a single coordinated training program, rather than duplicative programs undertaken by the various experts involved. To establish just such a program on a firm basis, we have, as you know, proposed a joint Government/industry meeting on May 6 here in Washington. For the industry, that meeting would be attended by selected airline experts on training, security and facilitation. For the Government, it would hopefully include the Directors of Training of the Bureau of Customs and the Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs, as well as a representative from the Department of Transportation.

Dear Mr. Slusser:

Your letter of July 26, 1972, to President Richard M. Nixon has been referred to this office for reply.

This fiscal year, the Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs plans to conduct three ten-week Police Training School and 50 two-week Law Enforcement Training Schools. The ten-week schools, as well as ten of the two-week schools, are conducted in Washington, D. C. The remaining two-week schools are conducted at numerous locations throughout the United States, three of which will be conducted in Pennsylvania.

Enrollment in the ten-week school is limited to full-time narcotic and dangerous drug investigators who are current or potential drug unit supervisors. Candidates for this school are nominated by the heads of their respective agencies. We offer you the opportunity to enroll officers from your area in the ten-week school. These officers, upon completion of their training, will return to their communities as potential trainers of other officers. This school provides the candidate with the opportunity to gain expertise in the most advanced-known techniques in drug enforcement, enables him to conduct in-depth drug investigations, and aids him in establishing training programs in the field of drug enforcement.

In view of the nature of our scheduling of the two-week programs and the demand for this type of training throughout the United States, we will not be able to conduct this school in Western Pennsylvania on such a frequent basis as every month or every two months.
