A courtesy visit with Senator Jackson (D-Washington)

II. BACKGROUND

Senator Jackson is a very serious proponent of a strong National Defense. He is also very interested in the direction of U.S. Foreign Policy, in particular U.S. Policy toward the Soviet Union and the countries in and around the oil producing areas in the Middle East. The Senate Energy Committee produced a report last year concluding that a strong U.S. foreign policy is crucial to managing a very difficult world energy situation in the coming decade.

SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS FOR MEETING WITH
SENATOR JACKSON

- As part of our effort to restore a strong foreign policy we need to restore spending priorities for national defense. We will exert spending disciplines on Department of Defense but we will also begin to build hardware capabilities back to where they will be adequate.
- Thank the Senator for the work he did in recent years to try to maintain a firm position with respect to the Soviet Union in spite of the previous Administration's tendency to trust the Soviets.
- Tell him we cannot afford another Afghanistan and we must begin to set down some firm intentions at a number of sensitive parts around the world.
- You might ask him for his views on how to deal with the Soviet interest in a summit meeting.
- You might also ask him for his views on Soviet intentions in the Middle East. During the last two years the Energy Committee under Senator Jackson's direction undertook an extensive series of classified briefings on energy and foreign policy.

I. PURPOSE

This is essentially a courtesy visit. Senator Packwood is one of the few Senate Committee Chairmen with whom you have not met on a one-to-one basis.

II. BACKGROUND

Senator Packwood is Chairman of the Senate Commerce Committee, second ranking Republican on the Senate Finance Committee, and Chairman of the National Republican Senatorial Committee. In the Commerce Committee, one of his major legislative interests for the 97th Congress is communications deregulation and he has begun hearings on the radio broadcasting industry.

In any discussion of the tax package, you should be aware that Senator Packwood has not been a strong believer in the theory that revenues can be increased by decreasing taxes. He was the sole vote against the tax rate decrease measure which cleared the Finance Committee in the 96th Congress.

Senator Packwood is very concerned about the proposed budget cuts in the FTC's antitrust enforcement programs (Bureau of Competition) and is anxious to discuss this with you. He says he has discussed this with nineteen Republican Members of Congress and they all agree this is not a wise decision.

You should also be aware that he is recommending strongly the appointment of his Administrative Assistant, Mimi Weyforth, as a Commissioner of the Federal Communications Commission. White House Personnel is aware of this interest and she is being seriously considered.

SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS FOR MEETING WITH
SENATOR ROBERT PACKWOOD

- As Chairman of the Senate Commerce Committee and senior member of the Finance Committee, Senator Packwood will be a major player in your economic recovery program. Stress the need to get early Senate action on these bills and seek his support. This may prompt him to bring up the FTC budget cut issue.
- Senator Packwood has strong reservations about proposed budget cuts in the FTC's Bureau of Competition, which handles the antitrust enforcement activities. Let him go through his concerns and express appreciation for his input.
- Bring up your tax-cut bill. Senator Packwood is pushing for tuition tax credits at all levels of education, and has introduced legislation (S-550) for which he anticipates the "wholehearted support of the Reagan Administration". Acknowledge his long-standing interest in this issue, but encourage his support of your two-bill approach.
- This Wednesday, the Senate Commerce Committee will take action on several nominees for the Department of Transportation. Senator Packwood has been very helpful in expediting these hearings - thank him for his help and assure him that you are moving as quickly as possible to get your full team in place.

SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS FOR
MEETING WITH REPRESENTATIVE SILVIO CONTE
(REPUBLICAN, MASSACHUSETTS)

- Ask Sil about the annual Congressional baseball game for charity. Mention that, as a sports announcer, you often thought the coaches were more interesting to watch than the players.
- Indicate that the economic package is your highest legislative priority and that his leadership support in the Appropriations Committee for your program of spending cuts is crucial.
- Ask Sil how he evaluates support on the Appropriations Committee for your package of spending cuts and impress upon him the importance you place on Republican solidarity in the Committee and the Congress for your economic package.
- Urge him to push for the earliest possible consideration of proposals which are within the jurisdiction of the Appropriations Committee.
- Indicate your sensitivity to the distinctness of the budget and appropriations processes in the House of Representatives. Add that circumstances require linkage between these two legislative functions if your plan is to succeed.

I. PURPOSE

Introductory visit with the ranking Republican member on the Energy and Commerce Committee and to ask Jim Broyhill for his help in the Congress with your economic initiatives.

II. BACKGROUND

Jim Broyhill was first elected from his western North Carolina district in 1962. As a forceful opponent of excessive government regulations and spending, he has been very successful in forging Congressional voting alliances with conservative Democrats.

SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS FOR MEETING WITH
JAMES T. BROYHILL (R-NC)

- Emphasize that tax and spending cuts are integral parts of your total economic package. Ask for his help and leadership in resisting any exceptions to cuts by the Energy and Commerce Committee.

- Ask him for suggestions and help in finding additional places to cut federal expenditures.

- Solicit his ideas regarding the re-authorization of the Clean Air Act - including his suggestions regarding a special bill for the steel industry.

- Acknowledge that he has been a successful opponent of excessive government regulation and ask for his recommendations and help in your efforts to reduce regulatory burdens.

- Recognize that he has always worked well with conservative Democrats in his legislative battles against excessive government. Urge him to continue to do that and ask for his help and advice in developing a successful legislative strategy in his committee.
