Rostenkowski Sees No Chance For Tax Cuts

The Reagan administration's proposed three-year, 30 percent individual tax rate cut has virtually no chance of passage, and the president should be more flexible in working with Congress for an alternative tax cut, the chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee said today.

Rep. Dan Rostenkowski, D-Ill., said a group of about 40 conservative Democrats who have endorsed Reagan's budget cutting efforts notified

the president yesterday that they will not go along with his proposed Kemp-Roth tax plan, giving it virtually no chance of passage in the Democratic-controlled House.

"If he hasn't got that conservative coalition, that should be a signal," Rostenkowski said. "One thing Ronald Reagan should learn is that he should be more flexible."

At the same time, 20 senators — led by one of the sponsors of the Kemp-Roth plan — urged Reagan to veto any tax bill that does not include a three-year, 10-percent-a-year cut for middle income Americans.

At a news conference today, Sen. William Roth, R-Del., and 19 other

senators signed a letter to Reagan expressing concern that the individual tax cuts "are becoming overlooked in favor of the tax reductions benefiting business and industry."

"We will not support business tax cuts unless they are coupled with additional provisions identical or very similar to your proposals providing for a three-year, 30 percent reduction in tax rates," the letter said.

"We urge you to promise now to veto any tax bill which does not reflect your individual tax rate reduction plan."

Rostenkowski said he believes there is little enthusiasm in the House for the Kemp-Roth tax proposal even among Republicans.

He said he will work in committee to produce a compromise that might avoid any vote on Kemp-Roth, but acknowledged that if it does come to a vote, most Republicans would feel obligated to support Reagan.

Rostenkowski said his aim is to put together a package that both Republicans and Democrats can live with.

He said he is willing to go along with any reasonable compromise. "We will do it any way they want to do it so we can work out a bill where every member can contribute and feel proud." But he said Reagan must be willing to compromise.

"If they don't recognize this in the next five or six weeks, I think they are making a big mistake. It is important to get the administration to realize that the process in Congress is not one that will respond immediately to any request by the president," he said.

The Ways and Means chairman said the size of the tax cut will have to be "in balance" with the deficit.

"Either the deficit goes up or we are going to have to lower the tax cut. I am not going to accept the Republicans getting credit for the tax cut while the Democrats get credit for a deficit — and a scenario like that could develop," he said.

One positive note for the Democrats, Rostenkowski said, is that Americans are beginning to realize that they will be hurt by the pro-

posed budget cuts.

"The salt is now in the wound and it doesn't feel good," he said. "We are starting to see people say, hey, is this what we really want?"

He said he expects Democratic changes in both the budget cuts and the tax cuts.

"I think it is one thing to cut increases in benefits to people, but it's another to just take them away. I just don't see us saying to someone that the hot meal won't be on your table anymore."

Rostenkowski added he is very concerned about what budget cuts will mean in the nation's cities this summer, particularly the loss of funding for youth job programs and cuts in public assistance.

"It was always comforting to know you could put kids to work, give them something to do in the summer... I just hope there won't be any trouble," he said.

On the tax cut, Rostenkowski said there is no chance that the committee would go along with Reagan's request for a full three year cut. "I just don't think we could do it for three years. If the rosy economic assumptions of this administration do not come to fruition next year, at least this way we'd still be in the ballgame."

SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS FOR MEETING WITH
REPUBLICAN MEMBERS OF WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

- Indicate your awareness of Danny Rostenkowski's statement that he believes there is no chance of passing the President's tax program. (See Attachment 2)
- Stress your intention to pursue the three-year tax cut and urge Representatives Duncan, Archer and Frenzel to support your tax cut proposals.
- Emphasize that the tax cuts are an integral part of your total economic package. Budget reductions alone will not turn the economy around. We have to offset the crushing tax burden now imposed on the American people.
- Characterize Rostenkowski as being obstructionist by not allowing the full House of Representatives to consider a tax proposal that won the overwhelming mandate of the American people last November.
- Express your concern that Republicans may give up before the battle is joined, and emphasize your determination to go to the Nation if Ways and Means seeks to destroy your Economic Recovery Program.
- Enlist the three Congressmen's support, and solicit their advice on how to counter attack the Democrats, and strengthen the resolve of Republicans.
