MEETING WITH SENATOR SAM HAYAKAWA (R-CALIFORNIA)

I. PURPOSE

To respond to concerns expressed by Senator Hayakawa that he has not had an opportunity to meet with the President; to discuss legislative items of interest to the Senator and encourage his continued support for your economic program.

II. BACKGROUND

Senator Hayakawa is getting some heat from the California press because he has not been in for a "one-on-one" with the President, particularly since he is a Republican Senator from California and up for reelection in 1982. He serves on the Agriculture Committee, the Foreign Relations Committee, and the Senate Committee on Small Business.

Hayakawa's primary legislative interest is the illegal alien issue. He has introduced the "Guest Worker Act of 1981" (S. 930) which would allow up to one million workers into the country for six months at a time. He considers his proposal a "pilot project" and limits its application to Mexico. Workers would be required to post a bond, the receipt for which would serve as their official I.D. while in the U.S. Employers could be fined for hiring illegal aliens who do not participate in the program. In the fall of 1980, Hayakawa discussed his proposal -- on an unofficial basis -- with President Lopez Portillo, who described it as "very equitable" and said he would study it further. No action has been scheduled in the Senate.

Other legislative priorities for the Senator are:

- A. S.J. Res 72 -- amends the Constitution to establish English as the official language of the U.S. Hayakawa introduced this measure in late April.

- B. S. 53 -- amends the Voting Rights Act to repeal the requirements for bi-lingual ballots. Action on the Voting Rights Act is anticipated in the 97th Congress, and Hayakawa will push his proposal.
- C. S. 54 -- repeals national 55-miles per hour speed limit, leaving this issue to be decided by the states. Department of Transportation supports the bill.
- D. S. 842 -- sets specific time limitations for designation of wilderness areas under the Second Roadless Area Review and Evaluation program (RARE II). One hearing has been held, with further action expected in June. Department of Agriculture testimony supports bill with some technical amendments.

You should be aware of Hayakawa's interest in your upcoming meeting with President Lopez Portillo. He would like to be involved in these discussions, but understands that this may not be possible.

SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS FOR MEETING WITH
SENATOR SAM HAYAKAWA (R-CALIFORNIA)

- Extend a welcome to a fellow Californian. Mention that you had wanted to get together sooner, and that you are glad this time could be worked out for a visit.
- Hayakawa is a long-time supporter of yours and a strong advocate of your economic program -- both spending and tax cuts. He has been helpful on the Agriculture Committee on the dairy price support issue. Thank him for his efforts and remind him that we still face some difficult votes on appropriations and the tax bill. Express the hope that you can continue to count on his support.
- The Foreign Relations Committee will be tackling some tough issues in the near future. Next week they anticipate action on such matters as nuclear fuel for Pakistan, assistance for Angola, Argentina, and the Special Defense Acquisition fund. The Administration will need strong spokesmen in the foreign relations arena. Seek Hayakawa's cooperation.
- If Hayakawa does not take the initiative on bringing up his legislative interests, you might mention your awareness of his long-standing interest in the illegal alien issue. He may get into the Portillo visit.

- Mention your desire to keep in close contact with members of Congress and express the hope that you can count on his continued support and advice -- particularly on this illegal alien issue.

I. PURPOSE

Special meeting scheduled to review the legislation process as it pertains to the President's economic program.

II. BACKGROUND

With the passage of the President's program in the House, numerous hearings begin on the specific program changes contained in the package. Dave Stockman indicates that, at times over the next few weeks, some 100 subcommittees will be examining the more than 300 individual program changes contained in the President's program.

This Cabinet meeting will be used to provide each Cabinet member with an outline of the actions which will occur during the next several weeks.

It is very important to urge each Cabinet member to keep the momentum going through the difficult legislative battles ahead. Only through a sustained and effective advocacy at the departmental level can we insure the passage of the Economic Recovery Program.

Dave Stockman will be prepared to brief the Cabinet on the steps that need to occur over the next several weeks.

The President should call the meeting to order. The Cabinet should be thanked for their efforts on the Hill in light of the favorable vote in the House. Then the President should stress the importance of the fights which are ahead on the specific budget items and on the tax program.

Following the President's brief remarks, Dave Stockman will make a presentation.

It is understood that the President may leave at noon for a departure to Camp David. The Cabinet can continue to meet on details of the legislative effort.
