## II. BACKGROUND

Congressman Jack Kemp visited Israel June 4-10 principally to discuss supply-side economics with Finance Minister Aridor, who had extended earlier this year an invitation to Kemp.

In addition to meeting with Aridor, Kemp saw Prime Minister Begin on two occasions, Begin's election opponent Shimon Peres, and the Head of Israel Intelligence.

Kemp's initial plans were to stay in Israel four days, but remained an additional two days because of the June 7 Israeli attack on Iraq's nuclear reactor.

Kemp is sympathetic to Begin's recent action toward Iraq. He co-sponsored a draft letter opposing the F-16 aircraft suspension, but the letter received only about 50 signatures.

Kemp publicly opposed the U.S. condemnation of Israel. He feels that it was not balanced by a condemnation of Iraq for failing to make peace with Israel.

Kemp opposes the proposed sale of AWACS to Saudi Arabia. He is among the 225 or so members of the House who sent a letter to you expressing their opposition to AWACS. Kemp will want to know what will be done to neutralize the threat AWACS poses to Israel.

- I recognize your concern over the suspension of the four F-16 aircraft to Israel. This suspension was the minimum action we could take in light of the fact that Israel acted before giving us an opportunity to exhaust diplomatic alternatives. We will decide soon when to lift the suspension.

U.S. Condemnation

- I understand your opposition to our condemnation of Israel's strike against Iraq's nuclear facility. As I pointed out in my press conference, however, Iraq is also at fault for refusing to make peace with Israel.

AWACS

- Your concern about the threat that AWACS may pose to Israel is understandable. I will ensure that nothing is done that will jeopardize Israel's security. However, you must appreciate that it is in the best interests of the U.S. to provide adequate protection for the oil fields in Saudi Arabia. In addition, the AWACS can provide valuable information to U.S. military units in the area.

## I. PURPOSE

To thank Jim Broyhill, the ranking Republican member on the Energy and Commerce Committee, for his efforts and support for the reconciliation package.

## II. BACKGROUND

Jim Broyhill was first elected from his western North Carolina district in 1962. As a forceful opponent of excessive government regulations and spending, he has been very successful in forging Congressional voting alliances with conservative Democrats.

The Energy and Commerce Committee has historically been the most active authorizing committee in the Congress because of its broad jurisdiction. The committee will be a battleground for many of your major policy initiatives including all aspects of oil and gas regulation, the Clean Air Act, railroad issues (Amtrak, Conrail, Railroad Retirement), major health programs, storage of nuclear waste, the Communications Act rewrite. In addition, the committee has jurisdiction over several regulatory agencies: the Securities and Exchange Commission, the Federal Trade Commission, the Consumer Products Safety Commission, the Interstate Commerce Committee and the Federal Communications Commission.

Led by Broyhill, the Energy and Commerce Committee Republicans developed a reconciliation substitute in opposition to the proposal crafted by Committee Chairman John Dingell. They were able to force a 21-21 vote deadlock. That forced the Democrats to allow a separate floor vote on the Energy and Commerce section of the reconciliation bill, which turned out

to be very helpful in the maneuvering prior to the votes. Jim Broyhill served as a lightning rod, diverting a tremendous amount of political heat away from the rest of the Gramm-Latta package.

Throughout the reconciliation battle, Broyhill and his staff said that no one part of the package should be allowed to impede the success of the overall effort. On Friday, following the vote on the Gramm-Latta amendment, there were serious questions whether we had the votes on the separate Broyhill amendment. Rather than risk a defeat, which might have changed the momentum for subsequent votes, Broyhill withdrew his amendment.

Jim Broyhill showed, once again, that he is one of the hardest working and most effective members of Congress. His actions also showed that he is the ultimate team player for the President's program.

## Smith Works For Lower Taxes, Budget Restraint

President Ronald Reagan sent Congress **America's New Beginning: A Program For Economic Recovery** on February 18, and **Budget Revisions For Fiscal Year 1982** on March 10. Together, these two major documents form the President's comprehensive economic package which seeks to boldly face — and begin to solve — our ever-worsening problems of:

- Runaway inflation
- Large and Increasing budget deficits
- Uncontrolled growth of the Federal Budget
- Tax burdens that have diminished incentives to work, produce, save and invest
- Excessive regulation

The President's proposal is relatively simple in concept yet enormously complex in detail. Calling for national economic revitalization, it consists of four basic parts: 1) an immediate, substantial, and sustained reduction in the growth of Federal expenditures; 2) a significant reduction in Federal tax rates over the next three years; 3) elimination of unnecessary Federal regulations; and 4) a slower, steady, and predictable growth of the money supply set by the independent Federal Reserve System.

The experience of the past decade has taught us all that frequent government tinkering with economic policy leads to increased uncertainty, unpredictable interest rates, rapid price increases, steep increases in Federal budget outlays, and uncertain real returns on savings and investment. This adversely affects everyone — poor, middle-class and well to do.

In contrast, the President's economic plan moves toward dependable stability.

During the past two years, Federal spending has increased by nearly \$100 billion. For 1981 alone, spending increased by \$47 billion over the previous year's budget.

This excessive spending by past administrations has brought our economy to a standstill. As a result, more than three-fourths of the Federal budget is used to pay bills rather than to invest in future growth.

President Reagan's economic proposal seeks to reverse this situation.

---

*According to one analysis, New Jersey will realize a substantial benefit from the new economic plan. New Jerseyans will save more than \$2.3 billion in the next eighteen months alone because of the tax cuts.*

---

President Reagan's plan will save over \$40 billion in spending in 1982, and \$97 billion in 1983. Over the next four years, Federal spending will continue to grow but at only 5.5% per year, rather than the average 16% growth rate we have witnessed in the past two years.

By spending less, we will generate growth and investment, in the private sector rather than continuing to add to our debt.

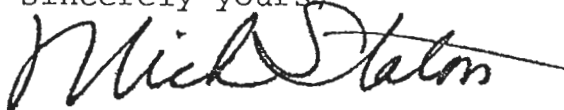

Today Buffy steps down as Chairman of the Performing Arts Council, one of the support groups she founded to fund programs staged in the three theaters of the Music Center.

And she takes over as Chairman of the Music Center Foundation as it launches its new campaign to raise the permanent endowment to \$25 million.

This is a very special day, and Nancy and I want to say, "Congratulations!" to this great lady.

Buffy, your work is a stunning testimony to what a community can accomplish.

In these times, we must look more and more to the private sector for inspiration and enterprise. We need people who are not afraid to dream those big dreams. We need leadership that can make those dreams come true.

AUDIO TAPING OF 4TH OF JULY MESSAGE

Today, all over America, families and friends are reuniting to renew ties, enjoy each other's company, and celebrate our Nation's birthday. It is a day when liberty and laughter go hand-in-hand . . . when we can acknowledge that, oh yes, we have our faults, and lots of problems too, but we're happy and proud because we're free, and we know the best of America is yet to be.

If you close your eyes and try to picture our country, chances are the first thing you'll see is your own hometown. I always see mine, Dixon and Tampico in Illinois. Today it is the hometowns of America, both big and small, that remind us what a diverse yet united country we are. Each in its own special way will carry out a wish expressed by one of the Founding Fathers 205 years ago.

Back in 1776, John Adams wrote his wife Abigail that the anniversary of our independence should be observed with great fanfare: with pomp and parades . . . shows and games . . . and sports and guns and bells . . . with bonfires and illuminations, from one end of this continent to the other, and from this time forevermore.

Well, Mr. Adams, rest assured that what you wanted is being done. Your traditions are now ours and we guard them like national treasures. And you know why. When we unfurl our flags, strike up the bands and light up the skies each July 4, we celebrate the most exciting, ongoing adventure in human freedom the world has ever known.

It began in 1620 when a group of courageous families braved a mighty ocean to build a new future in a new world. They came not for material gain, but to secure liberty for their souls within a community bound by laws.

A century-and-a-half later, their descendants pledged their lives, their fortunes and their sacred honor to found this Nation. Some would forfeit their fortunes and their lives, but none sacrificed honor.

Thomas Jefferson wrote that on that day of America's birth, in the little hall in Philadelphia, debate raged for hours, but the issue remained in doubt. These were honorable men; still, to sign a Declaration of Independence seemed such an irretrievable act that the walls resounded with cries of "treason" and "the headsman's axe."

Then, it is said, one unknown man rose to speak. He was neither young, nor strong in voice; yet, he spoke with such conviction that he mesmerized the hall. He cited the grievances that had brought them to this moment. Then, his voice failing, he said: "They may turn every tree into a gallows, every hole into a grave, and yet the words of that parchment can never die. To the mechanic in the workshop, they will speak hope, to the slave in the mines, freedom. Sign that parchment. Sign if the next moment the noose is around your neck, for that parchment will be the textbook of freedom, the Bible of the rights of man forever." And sign they did.

What makes our revolution unique and so exciting then, is that it changed the very concept of Government. Here was a new Nation telling the world that it was conceived in liberty; that all men are created equal with God-given rights, and that power ultimately resides in "we the people."

We sometimes forget this great truth and we never should. Because putting people first has always been America's secret weapon. It's the way we've kept the spirit of our revolution alive -- a spirit that drives us to dream and dare, and take great risks for a greater good. It's the spirit of Fulton and Ford, the Wright Brothers and Lindbergh, and of all our astronauts. It's the spirit of Joe Lewis, Babe Ruth and a million others who may have been born poor, but who would not be denied their day in the sun.

Well, I'm convinced that we're getting that spirit back. The Nation is pulling together . . . we're looking to the future with new hope and confidence . . . and we know we can make America great again by putting the destiny of this Nation back in the hands of the people. And why shouldn't we? Because, after all, we are Americans.

As Dwight Eisenhower once said: "There is nothing wrong with America that the faith, love of freedom, intelligence and energy of her citizens cannot cure."

He was right. If we just stick together, and remain true to our ideals, we can be sure that America's greatest days lie ahead.

- 7:00 p.m. Dinner guests arrive at the Diplomatic Reception Room. Those with special cards are led through the West Garden Room and into the Rose Garden. These will be the alternate dinner guests.
- 7:10 p.m. The regular dinner guests begin to be escorted by Social Aides to the East Room where they are announced. (A Social Aide will also announce each guest to the press pool in the ground floor Cross Hall.)

(Harpist is in the Diplomatic Reception Room.)

- 7:15 p.m. Official party departs Blair House.
- Official party arrives White House at the North Portico and proceeds to the Red Room to wait for Mrs. Annenberg to escort them to the Yellow Oval Room.

Those who proceed to Yellow Oval Room:

Secretary of State and Mrs. Haig  
Ambassador Annenberg  
Ambassador and Mrs. Nesen  
Foreign Ambassador and Lady Parkinson  
Foreign Minister and Mrs. Street

The remainder of the Official Party waits in the Red Room where a Social Aide, with the help of a Protocol Officer, will give out seating cards. Three additional Social Aides will then escort the Party one by one into the East Room.

- 7:28 p.m. The Prime Minister departs Blair House with Mrs. Fraser and Mr. Annenberg. (Military Cordon will line the driveway.)

7:29 p.m. THE PRESIDENT AND MRS. REAGAN depart the living quarters by elevator and proceed to the North Portico.

(U.S.M.C. Orchestra in Main Foyer)

The Chief of Protocol will serve as hostess pro-tem for THE PRESIDENT AND MRS. REAGAN as they greet the Prime Minister at the North Portico.

7:31 p.m. The Prime Minister and his wife are greeted by THE PRESIDENT AND MRS. REAGAN; pause for press photo. Proceed to Yellow Oval Room via the elevator.

7:35 p.m. The remainder of the Official Party in the Red Room is escorted to the East Room and announced.

Color Team proceeds up Grand Staircase to Hallway outside Yellow Oval Room.

7:40 p.m. Guests (save PRINCIPALS) depart Yellow Oval Room via elevator for East Room and are announced.

OIC requests permission to secure the Colors. THE PRESIDENT responds, "Permission granted". Color Team proceeds to secure the Colors and proceeds out of Yellow Oval Room down the Grand Staircase, led by OIC.

At foot of staircase, Color Team divides.

7:45 p.m. The PRINCIPALS arrive on the State Floor via the Grand Staircase; pause at the foot of the Stairs for press photo session; and proceed directly to the East Room to full Honors. The Color Team remains at the stairs.

After the announcement of the PRINCIPALS, the PRINCIPALS, led by THE PRESIDENT, enter the East Room and form a receiving line which faces south and will be between two trees. The order of the line is as follows: THE PRESIDENT, THE PRIME MINISTER, MRS. REAGAN, MRS. FRASER.

The Chief of Protocol stands to THE PRESIDENT'S left with a Social Aide on her left to make introductions to THE PRESIDENT.

The Official Party will be taken to the Red Room to wait for approximately four minutes while other guests have a chance to enter the State Dining Room. Those in the Red Room will then be led into the State Dining Room.

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7:45 p.m. At the termination of the Receiving Line, PRINCIPALS  
(cont'd.) should hold in the East Room until all guests are in  
the State Dining Room, then proceed down Cross  
Hall to the State Dining Room.

(Appropriate music should be played.)

8:10 p.m. Guests in the Rose Garden should be led into the  
West Garden Room to be seated for dinner.

8:15 p.m. Dinner is served in the State Dining Room and  
the West Garden Room.

(The Staff Mess will be used for dinner for  
attending Aides who will not be seated in the  
State Dining Room.)
