I. PURPOSE

To allow an opportunity for Senator McClure and Senator Domenici to discuss their views regarding the award of financial assistance to three synfuels projects.

II. BACKGROUND

The Synfuels Corporation and Synfuels Action in 96th Congress

Senator Domenici first proposed the creation of the Synthetic Fuels Corporation in the 96th Congress to remove the growing and politically uncontrollable role of the Department of Energy in synfuels commercialization efforts. Senator McClure joined that effort after restricting the authority of the Corporation significantly. The sole reason the Corporation became a vehicle for changing the nature of the synfuels program to its current structure is because of the two Senators' efforts. They have an abiding interest in the overall program and have defended this government's role vigorously.

You should also be aware that the synfuels program was not President Carter's idea. He picked up on the idea only after it was clear Senator Domenici had generated sufficient interest and votes to move the proposal. Senators McClure and Domenici saw it then and now as an opportunity to restrict the Federal role in synfuels and make that role more consistent with the Republican principles -- less government spending while yet expediting the start of the synfuels industry. These Senators were aware then of the intrusive character of the financial assistance on the capital markets but they thought, and still do, that there was an overriding national economic and security interest in proceeding.

The Current Situation

While both originally envisioned a quick start for the Corporation, thereby giving all project sponsors a reason to lean away from the Department of Energy towards the Corporation, the delay in finding and confirming a Board for the Corporation has kept the Department of Energy in negotiations much longer than they had expected. As a result, Senator McClure and Senator Domenici would like to see the loan guarantee agreement signed for the ANR project. They think the project will fold if the agreement is not signed.

They would also like to have a decision made quickly on the Tosco and Union shale projects. Senator Domenici would not object if these went over to the Corporation, and Senator McClure would probably go along if the ANR decision came out to his liking. Senator McClure would probably move quickly in getting the Synfuels Board confirmed if this issue could be resolved now.

Congressman Badham requested this presentation in behalf of his constituent, U.S.S. Gambier Bay survivor Norman R. Loats of Balboa, California and other survivors.

The U.S.S. Gambier Bay was the only U.S. aircraft carrier sunk by Japanese gunfire. They took 27 direct hits, sank in 50 minutes, and spent almost three days in the ocean before being rescued. They received the Presidential Unit Citation for this engagement.

The survivors of the U.S.S. Gambier Bay hold regular reunions. The next reunion will be August 13 to 15 in Oklahoma City.

Congressman Bob Badham represents California's 40th district, which includes Newport Beach on the southern Orange County coast. This is his 3rd term and he serves on the Armed Services and House Administration Committees.

ATTACHMENT A

SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS FOR MEETING WITH
SELECTED DEMOCRATIC MEMBERS OF THE
HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

- Point out that the fundamental difference between the two tax proposals is that the bipartisan plan offers real tax reduction, while the Ways and Means plan allows taxes to continue to increase on the working people of this country.
- Stress that the Conable-Hance bipartisan proposal is a permanent tax cut. The Democratic leadership is only offering another make-believe tax cut that dissolves into a huge tax increase.
- Emphasize that the bipartisan effort has developed a bill that is best for the country. It provides the kind of tax relief that is absolutely essential to the economic health of this nation.
- Note that the driving motive behind the Democratic leadership's bill was, "What can we put together to beat Ronald Reagan?". It is merely the same policies of the past which promised working people tax cuts which they never saw.

- The Ways and Means bill is holding the people's tax cut hostage to future economic events. They give big business a long-term tax break, but won't give individuals a three-year tax cut. We have to provide the certainty and incentives that will help all Americans.

- Ask them a simple question...Are they for reducing taxes or increasing them? Stress that you have fought for your economic program because you believe in it -- and you need their help and their vote on the tax bill.

Bill Nelson

Democrat, 9th District of Florida (includes Melbourne and Orlando), 2nd term. Serves on the Budget Committee and the Science and Technology Committee. Chairman, Science and Technology Subcommittee on Space Science and Applications. He is a Member of the Conservative Democratic Forum.

ED JONES (D-TENNESSEE)

- Thank Ed for his support of the Gramm-Latta I bipartisan Budget amendment--the first major vote on the economic recovery package.
- Acknowledge your awareness that Ed has been under considerable pressure to support the Rostenkowski-O'Neill tax plan. State your conviction that the Conable-Hance bipartisan bill is best for the nation and has the support of the American people.
- Stress that the Conable-Hance bipartisan proposal is a permanent tax cut. The Rostenkowski-O'Neill plan is another make-believe tax cut that dissolves into a huge tax increase after two years--a continuation of the policies of the past which promised working people tax relief they never saw.
- Characterize the third year "trigger" in the Rostenkowski-O'Neill plan as a gimmick that will not work by its own design. Point out that the "trigger" is based on meeting the Administration's economic goals for the Federal deficit, interest rates and inflation, but abandons the tax policies on which these goals are premised. Note, for example, that the Rostenkowski-O'Neill plan will increase the deficit \$6.5 billion more in 1983 than its own "trigger" would permit.
- Point out that the Conable-Hance proposal is also targeted to help small businesses (e.g., those which pay business tax at

personal rates, etc.), and will provide special help to farmers (e.g., the gift and estate tax provisions, etc.).

- Acknowledge your awareness that Ed has been unable to support the bipartisan coalition in the House on the key Reconciliation votes. Stress that his vote in favor of the Conable-Hance bipartisan tax bill is vitally important to the nation's economic recovery; and ask him if you can count on his support.

I. PURPOSE

To request Kika's support for the Conable-Hance bipartisan proposal.

II. BACKGROUND

Kika de la Garza represents the 15th District of Texas (southern tip of state, including Mission). Now serving in his 9th term, he is Chairman of the House Agriculture Committee. Kika attended the President's meeting with selected Members of the House and Senate on the Grain Embargo issue, which was held on February 17, 1981 in the Treaty Room.

Kika has not supported the Administration on any budget or reconciliation vote this year. He is reported to be undecided on the tax bill, but under intense pressure by the House Democratic Leadership to support the Rostenkowski-O'Neill proposal. He has indicated to White House staff that he will "favor" the tax bill which yields the smallest deficit.

Earlier this year, at the prompting of Speaker O'Neill, Kika expedited House Agriculture Committee consideration of legislation to forego the scheduled April 1 dairy price support increase; although he did not support the Administration's position on the the issue. The President signed this bill while he was hospitalized on March 31, 1981.

Kika has a special interest in U.S.-Mexican relations; and he attended the President's White House luncheon for President Portillo on June 9, 1981. He has expressed strong interest in attending the President's scheduled Summit Meeting with President Portillo in October which will be held in Cancun.

Legislatively, Kika has been most active this year on the farm bill in his capacity as Chairman of the House Agriculture Committee; and he has expressed serious concern about Administration cutbacks in a number of areas: food stamps, Farmers Home Administration and commodity programs. Kika chaired the Reconciliation Subcommittee on Agriculture.

State your conviction that the Conable-Hance bipartisan bill is best for the nation and has the support of the American people. Stress that the Conable-Hance bipartisan proposal is a permanent tax cut. The Rostenkowski-O'Neill plan is another make-believe tax cut that dissolves into a huge tax increase after two years.
- Characterize the third year "trigger" in the Rostenkowski-O'Neill plan as a gimmick that will not work by its own design. - Point out that the bipartisan package incorporates many of the ideas that Jones has previously proposed and sponsored, i.e., the 22% depletion allowance and the basic 10-5-3 Accelerated Cost Recovery System (Jones-Conable).
- Recognize that Jones supported the Ways and Means bill in Committee but point out that you believe that Conable-Hance II is a better bill, particularly for Oklahoma.
- Again, express your appreciation for his work as Budget Committee Chairman, emphasize the importance of concluding the reconciliation conference this week and look forward to working closely with him in the future.
