I. PURPOSE

To enlist the support of Congressmen having prior state and/or local governmental experience for the President's Federalism Initiative.

II. BACKGROUND

Congressional reaction to the President's Federalism Initiative often includes a question: "What do the Governors and Mayors think?" It is widely held that the support of current state and local officials is vital to the success of this effort in Congress.

The President has had several meetings recently with selected state and local officials. The first meeting--which was held in the Cabinet Room and followed by a luncheon in the Blue Room on Thursday, January 21, 1982--brought together a number of mayors, businessmen and Members of the House and Senate; and it focused on the enterprise zone concept. This gathering took the place of the President's scheduled trip to Baltimore which was canceled due to inclement weather. The second meeting--which was held in the Roosevelt Room on Thursday, January 28, 1982 with members of the Executive Committee of the National Conference of Republican Mayors and municipal officials--was devoted to a discussion of the Federalism Initiative. The most recent meeting--February 1, 1982 in the Cabinet Room with governors, state legislators and Members of Congress--involved a similar discussion of the federalism program.

Members of Congress who have served as state or local officials frequently place special emphasis on the perceived problems and concerns of local governmental units. In addition, their experience with Federal red tape often makes them more receptive to the concept of strengthening the role of grass roots government.

II. BACKGROUND (Continued)

A briefing of a cross section of Congressmen who have state/local governmental experience will help develop understanding of and potential support for the Federalism Initiative on Capitol Hill. The Congressmen who have been invited to this meeting have met with the President and attended White House events on various occasions but, with the exception of Representative Willis Gradison (R-Ohio), not in connection with the Federalism Initiative.

SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS FOR MEETING
WITH BIPARTISAN GROUP OF SENATORS ON FEDERALISM INITIATIVES

- In my State of the Union message, I outlined to you my Federalism Initiative. We are now in the process of designing the legislation to accomplish these goals, and I am anxious to have your input as we proceed in the planning process.
- Since I first announced the Federalism Initiative, we have been meeting here in the White House with a number of governors, mayors, and other local government officials to brief them on the details of our program and to solicit their advice and support. These meetings have been very useful, and we will continue this kind of consultation throughout the next few weeks.
- I am also meeting with members of the Congress to seek their guidance and assistance. In this respect, your thoughts and comments can be particularly helpful. As members of the Senate, you will play a direct role in the Congressional debate and action on our proposals. As former state or local government officials, you also have a firsthand knowledge of the needs and the problems of state and local government and the impact our initiatives will have.

Congressional reaction to the President's Federalism Initiative often includes a question: "What do the Governors and Mayors think?" It is widely held that the support of current state and local officials is vital to the success of this effort in Congress.

The President has had several meetings recently with selected state and local officials. The first meeting--which was held in the Cabinet Room and followed by a luncheon in the Blue Room on Thursday, January 21, 1982--brought together a number of mayors, businessmen and Members of the House and Senate; and it focused on the enterprise zone concept. This gathering took the place of the President's scheduled trip to Baltimore which was canceled due to inclement weather. The second meeting--which was held in the Roosevelt Room on Thursday, January 28, 1982 with members of the Executive Committee of the National Conference of Republican Mayors and municipal officials--was devoted to a discussion of the Federalism Initiative. The most recent meeting--February 1, 1982 in the Cabinet Room with governors, state legislators and Members of Congress--involved a similar discussion of the federalism program.

Members of Congress who have served as state or local officials frequently place special emphasis on the perceived problems and concerns of local governmental units. In addition, their experience with Federal red tape often makes them more receptive to the concept of strengthening the role of grass roots government.

SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS FOR MEETING
WITH MEMBERS OF HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES
WHO ARE FORMER STATE/LOCAL OFFICIALS

- In my State of the Union message, I outlined to you my Federalism Initiative. We are now in the process of designing the legislation to accomplish these goals, and I am anxious to have your input as we proceed in the planning process.
- Since I first announced the Federalism Initiative, we have been meeting here in the White House with a number of governors, mayors, and other local government officials to brief them on the details of our program and to solicit their advice and support. These meetings have been very useful, and we will continue this kind of consultation throughout the next few weeks.

Meeting to Announce Sending of the First Post-Cancun Agricultural Task Force to Peru

- At the Cancun Summit, we had a particularly spirited discussion of poverty and problems of food and agricultural production in the developing countries, and I offered to send American agricultural experts to Third World nations.
- I am pleased that President Belaunde of Peru has invited us to send a Presidential Task Force.
- Peter McPherson, AID Administrator, is responsible for implementing this effort, and the Task Force will depart for Peru in late March.
- I am pleased that the US is taking the lead in the effort to improve the economic and social conditions of developing countries.
