I. PURPOSE:

To continue our outreach effort to regional press and particularly to highlight the fact that July 1 is the effective date for the second installment on the tax cut as well as the 7.4% increase in the cost of living adjustment for social security recipients.

II. BACKGROUND:

You have hosted three luncheons in the White House State Dining Room for editors and broadcasters from the Northeast, Southeast and Midwest. Now, for western media, it was decided to have you host a luncheon out in California where the distance traveled would not be so great. As in the past, other Administration members will be briefing the group in addition to hearing your presentation. Ed Rollins will talk about the upcoming Congressional campaigns and Dave Gergen will discuss communication policy.

POSSIBLE AREAS OF QUESTIONING AT LUNCHEON FOR WESTERN EDITORS
AND BROADCASTERS:

Equal Time/Fairness Doctrine for Broadcasters

You are on record in a letter to the National Association of Broadcasters giving general support to the idea that broadcasters should have the same first amendment rights as the print media. (To them this means repeal of the Fairness Doctrine and Equal Time Provisions). But two weeks ago, in a briefing with Board Members of the N.A.B., when asked about repeal of these "regulations" you indicated that George Bush's task force on de-regulation was looking into many regulations. The broadcasters were somewhat confused as the Bush task force in fact has not addressed this issue and broadcasters will be looking to you for renewed support for repeal of these provisions.

(Note: Your Chairman of the F.C.C., Mark Fowler, has been working hard to repeal these provisions - saying it's a question of the "fair flow of information to the people vs. a free flow - and that the government has to get involved to assure a 'fair' flow whereas broadcasters, like newspaper owners, should be trusted to be fair in reporting, even if editorials take a specific view. He also states that the marketplace offers many views and many choices.)

CALIFORNIA ISSUES

Politics:

The June 8 primary set the stage for two hotly contested statewide races:

- (1) U.S. Senate (to replace retiring S.I. Hayakawa), Republican San Diego Mayor Pete Wilson faces Democrat Governor Jerry Brown. (latest Field Poll shows Wilson with 52% to 40% lead over Brown.)
- (2) Governor - Democrat L.A. Mayor Tom Bradley, a black, will face Republican state Attorney General George Deukmejian. (latest polls show Bradley leading).

Reapportionment is a big issue. Democrat Congressman Phillip Burton masterminded a plan favoring Democrats, but in the primary voters rejected the "gerrymandered" plan by 64% to 36%. However, the State Supreme Court ruled that regardless of that initiative, the "Democrat" plan would remain in effect for the 1982 elections.

Issues:

- (1) Taxes - Californians passed two propositions to further cut taxes (abolished state's gift tax and the state inheritance tax)
- (2) Crime - voters passed a very tough anti-crime measure on victims rights and Deukmejian is running as a strong law and order candidate.
- (3) Water - They voted down (64% to 36%) the Peripheral Canal project which would have built a system of aqueducts to divert water from northern California to parched South.
- (4) Guns - The San Francisco Board of Supervisors just passed an anti-gun law that says everyone has to turn in his guns (but the District Attorney says he won't enforce the law until it's been tested in court). S.F. Mayor Diane Feinstein is a liberal Democrat.
- (5) Nuclear Energy - Many activist groups still demonstrate against nuclear power
- (6) Nuclear Freeze - Jerry Brown has declared that this will be a main issue in his Senatorial campaign.
- (7) Illegal Aliens and Refugees - big influx, especially in Southern California, is causing problems for employment, schools and housing.

CALIFORNIA CONTINUED

- (8) Navy Contracts -Navy contracts in the San Francisco Bay Area have declined (many say it's because liberal Democrats like Congressmen John Burton, Fortney Stark and Ronald Dellums have all voted against DOD expenditures). Many San Franciscans would like to see more contracts given to their depressed area there.
- (9) ERA - California was the "seed bed" of the ERA movement - many may ask about what happens now.
- (10) Off-shore drilling - some concerns about what Jim Watt may do next off their shores.

NEVADA ISSUES

Politics:

- (1) Senate - Incumbent Democrat U.S. Senator Howard Cannon is seeking his 5th term and is being challenged for Democratic nomination by Congressman Jim Santini (who supported major components of your budget and tax-cutting proposals). Republican candidates are Rick Fore, Finance Chairman of the Nevada State Republican Party and Jack Kinney, a millionaire businessman (Fore is favored to win).
- (2) Governor - Republican Governor Robert List is seeking a second term. He is expected to face Democrat state Attorney General Richard Bryan. List has had a difficult first term marked by prison riots, the MX missile debate and an increase in state sales taxes.

(Note: In 1980, the Reagan-Bush ticket carried every county in Nevada - attributable, in part, to Nevada's leading figure, Senator Paul Laxalt).

Issues:

- (1) MX Missiles - There is still confusion over the basing mode
- (2) Nuclear Waste Disposal - People are both angry and worried that their state will be a target for nuclear waste disposal.
- (3) Public Land Sales - There is wide divergence of opinion over the sale of public lands, particularly in Clark County (Las Vegas).

OREGON ISSUES

Politics:

- (1) Governor - Republican Governor Victor Atiyeh was renominated in last month's primary without serious opposition. But now the timber industry slump is the base for the state's economy and Atiyeh is expecting a tough race from Democrat Ted Kulongoski. (Note: Atiyeh conducted a public exchange of letters in recent months with the President and David Stockman where he criticized large deficits in the 1983 budget and its adverse effects he sees on interest rates.)
- (2) Oregon's two Republican Senators, Hatfield and Packwood are not up for re-election this year.

Issues:

- (1) Housing - a BIG issue since a large share of the people are employed in the timber industry. Unemployment in Oregon is now running between 12% in some places to as high as 60% in others. Many were critical of the veto of the Lugar bill to "bail out" the housing industry - instead of a "bail out", they used the term "loan" and are still seeking relief.
- (2) Mount St. Helen's - There is some discussion about the establishment of a National Volcanic Park

WASHINGTON ISSUES

Politics:

Democrat U.S. Senator Henry Jackson is seeking his sixth term. He routinely wins by large margins (72% in 1976). Neither of the declared Republican candidates is seen as having much of a chance to defeat Jackson (their primary is not until Sept. 14). (Note: The Reagan-Bush ticket carried Washington State by 50% to 37%).

Issues:

- (1) Housing - Weyerhaeuser Co. and others in the forest products industry are lobbying for a variety of housing aid programs.
- (2) Nuclear Waste - Hanford, in Eastern Washington, already houses 60% of the high-level nuclear wastes from weapons programs and about half of nation's total nuclear waste. Along with sites in Mississippi, Texas, Louisiana, Utah and Nevada, it is also being considered for nation's first repository for wastes from commercial nuclear power plants.
