I. PURPOSE

To brief the Leadership on the status of the crisis in Lebanon, including the possibility of U.S. participation in a multi-national peacekeeping force; and to reemphasize the President's priority commitment to the passage by Congress of his Caribbean Basin Initiative.

II. BACKGROUND

The President last met with the Bipartisan Congressional Leadership on June 15 to discuss his European trip.

In the intervening weeks, the conflict in Lebanon and the volatility of the Middle East situation have dominated congressional concern. Heightened interest was generated last week by the announcement in principle that if the Government of Lebanon formally requests ~~---and other parties agree---~~ the U.S. would participate in a peacekeeping force. Senator Baker, Congressman Zablocki and others have expressed reservations about the specific mission of the U. S. military contingent and our intent to comply fully with the War Powers Act.

Although the Congressional Leadership has been kept informed of events in Lebanon during the past several weeks, consultation with the leaders by the President at this time is most appropriate.

This meeting also provides an opportunity for the President to urge the Leadership to have the Congress act swiftly and favorably on the Caribbean Basin Initiative. With the Congress having just returned from recess, several committees will be scheduling mark-ups and hearings on the various components of the CBI.

SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS ON LEBANON

-- THE OCCASION OF CONSULTATION WITH THE CONGRESSIONAL LEADERSHIP IS A GRAND TRADITION IN AMERICAN FOREIGN POLICY TO WHICH I AM DELIGHTED TO MAKE MY PERSONAL CONTRIBUTION.

-- A KEY STEP IN THE RESOLUTION OF THE CRISIS IS THE SAFE AND ORDERLY DEPARTURE OF PLO FIGHTERS FROM WEST BEIRUT AND OUT OF LEBANON.

-- TO ENSURE A SAFE AND ORDERLY DEPARTURE OF THE PLO, I DECIDED IN PRINCIPLE THAT IF THE GOVERNMENT OF LEBANON FORMALLY REQUESTS, AND THE OTHER PARTIES AGREE, THE U.S. WOULD CONTRIBUTE A MILITARY CONTINGENT TO A PEACEKEEPING FORCE FOR BEIRUT.

-- ANOTHER MISSION OF THE PEACEKEEPING FORCE WOULD BE TO ENHANCE THE PROSPECTS THAT THE GOVERNMENT OF LEBANON WILL REASSERT ITS AUTHORITY IN THE BEIRUT AREA. THE ROLE OF U.S. MARINES IS ESSENTIALLY SYMBOLIC, I.E., THE PRESENCE OF AMERICAN FORCES WILL PROVIDE THE GOVERNMENT OF LEBANON WITH THE CONFIDENCE THAT THE U.S. STANDS BEHIND ITS EFFORTS TO RESTORE ITS AUTHORITY.

-- I REQUESTED THAT STATE INFORM THE CONGRESS OF MY WILLINGNESS IN PRINCIPLE TO PROVIDE U.S. TROOPS TO A MULTINATIONAL FORCE IN BEIRUT. MINDFUL OF THE PROVISIONS OF THE WAR POWERS RESOLUTION, WE WILL CONSULT WITH THE CONGRESS.

[NOTE FYI: CONGRESSMAN ZABLOCKI BELIEVES THAT THE ADMINISTRATION SHOULD REPORT TO THE CONGRESS UNDER A DIFFERENT SECTION OF THE WAR POWERS RESOLUTION THAN STATE PROPOSES TO REPORT. YOU SHOULD AVOID A SPECIFIC DISCUSSION OF THE PARTICULAR SECTION UNDER WHICH REPORTING WILL BE MADE.]

-- WE EXPECT THE U.S. PEACEKEEPING CONTINGENT TO BE IN BEIRUT FOR A BRIEF PERIOD, PERHAPS UP TO 30 DAYS.

-- ALTHOUGH U.S. PERSONNEL WOULD BE ARMED, WE DO NOT ANTICIPATE THAT THEY WOULD BECOME INVOLVED IN HOSTILITIES.

-- I RECOGNIZE THAT A PEACEKEEPING FORCE CANNOT BE IMMUNE FROM THE RISK OF ISOLATED INCIDENTS, WHICH WE HOPE TO MINIMIZE VIA ASSURANCES FROM RELEVANT GOVERNMENTS AND PARTIES CONCERNING THE SAFETY OF U.S. PERSONNEL.

-- THE BENEFIT OF USING AMERICAN FORCES TO ASSIST THE ORDERLY WITHDRAWAL OF THE PLO AND TO IMPROVE THE CHANCES THAT THE LEBANESE GOVERNMENT WILL REASSERT ITS AUTHORITY FAR OUTWEIGHS THE RISKS.

TALKING POINTS ON CARIBBEAN BASIN INITIATIVE

- Want to mention another matter of special significance which I hope the Congress will act upon swiftly and favorably---the Caribbean Basin Initiative.
- The CBI legislation defines the economic portion of our overall strategy toward the Caribbean and complements the political and security dimensions of our policy.
- This effort to promote development in this region will do more to enhance stability on our border than millions of dollars of military assistance, and I want to emphasize that the economic aid we are providing is 7 times the military aid. In the long run, it will save us the much larger amounts of military expense we will ultimately have to spend to defend this area if underdevelopment continues to attract subversion and terrorism.
- Let me also emphasize that for the first time America is not just giving aid. We are tying this aid together in a package with trade and investment incentives.
- Finally, the leaders of the Caribbean countries have all expressed support and have staked political capital on this program. If we let them down, if we fail to support the struggling democracies in this area we will have only ourselves to blame.
- I would be very grateful to each of you for your leadership on getting this legislation passed.

TALKING POINTS ON LEBANON

-- LET'S TURN NOW TO LEBANON, A TOPIC THAT IS FOREMOST IN ALL OUR MINDS.

-- A KEY STEP IN RESOLVING THIS CRISIS IS THE SAFE AND ORDERLY DEPARTURE OF THE PLO LEADERSHIP AND FIGHTERS FROM WEST BEIRUT AND LEBANON.

-- PHIL HABIB IS STILL TRYING TO OBTAIN AN AGREEMENT ON WHERE AND WHEN THE PLO LEADERSHIP AND FIGHTERS WILL GO, AND NO FIRM DECISIONS ABOUT U.S. TROOP PARTICIPATION CAN BE MADE UNTIL THAT PROCESS CONCLUDES.

-- I WANT TO ASSURE YOU OF THREE THINGS, HOWEVER,

- FIRST, I WOULD NOT HAVE EVEN CONSIDERED AGREEING IN PRINCIPLE IF SUCH A COMMITMENT WERE NOT KEY TO GETTING ANY AGREEMENT AT ALL.

- SECOND, ANY ULTIMATE COMMITMENT WILL BE FOR NO MORE THAN THIRTY DAYS.

- FINALLY, WE WILL INSIST ON THE MOST IRONCLAD ASSURANCES FROM ALL THE PARTIES AGAINST FIRING ON AMERICANS.

-- ANOTHER VERY GREAT DANGER TO OUR VITAL INTERESTS AND THOSE OF OUR ALLIES IS THE LIKELIHOOD OF AN IRANIAN INVASION OF IRAQ, PERHAPS AS SOON AS TODAY OR LATER THIS WEEK.

-- IT APPEARS THAT THE IRANIANS HAVE MADE THE DECISION TO INVADE IRAQ WITH THE EVENTUAL GOAL BEING TO BRING ABOUT THE DOWNFALL OF THE CURRENT REGIME IN BAGHADAD AND ITS REPLACEMENT BY A FUNDAMENTALIST ISLAMIC GOVERNMENT THAT WILL ALIGN ITSELF WITH IRAN. SUCH A DEVELOPMENT WOULD BE VERY THREATENING TO OUR FRIENDS IN THE REGION NOTABLY, THE SAUDIS AND JORDAN.

-- THE OBJECTIVE OF OUR POLICY IN THIS SITUATION IS TO HELP BRING AN END TO THE WAR BEFORE IRAN CAN ASSUME HEGEMONY IN THE REGION AND FURTHER UNDERMINE OUR VITAL INTERESTS. COMMERCIAL CREDIT BINDERY

You will arrive by motorcade at the Park Circle Industrial Park, where the Commercial Credit Bindery is located. You will be accompanied by Mayor Schaefer. Park Circle Industrial Park is located in the Park Heights section of northwest Baltimore. Park Heights contains approximately 1,300 acres. Roughly 44,000 people reside in this section of Baltimore and the majority are poor and black. Presently, Park Circle Industrial Park is Baltimore's number one priority for urban redevelopment and designation as an enterprise zone.

The Mayor hopes that Park Circle Industrial Park will be designated as an Enterprise Zone. The partners in this undertaking for redevelopment have been the City, the Community, the City Venture Corporation, and the private sector. Unemployment in the area is approximately 18% overall and 50% for youths. The Park Circle Industrial Park is designed to create 1,750 new jobs targeted for neighborhood residents.

Both Control Data Corporation and Commercial Credit Company have made commitments to locations in the Industrial Park. Control Data will begin construction of a 100,000 square foot Business and Technology Center which will provide both space and services for new and small businesses. The Business and Technology Center will ultimately employ 300 people.

You will be escorted by the Mayor to the Commercial Credit book bindery. Once you are inside the bindery, you will tour the youth training program with Mayor Schaefer and Malcomb Leggitt, who is the manager of the Bindery.

Most of the employees at the bindery are CETA eligible workers. It will ultimately employ 200 people who primarily reside in the Park Heights area.

The area appears to be the type that could be selected as an Enterprise Zone. Park Circle has already been attracting development with Federal grants and Federal and State loans or loan guarantees. However, the area is still losing industry to non-metropolitan Frederick.

Mayor William Donald Schaefer was elected Mayor of Baltimore in 1971 by a landslide vote. Prior to being elected as Mayor, he served on the city council for 16 years. Under the Carter Administration, the Mayor was extremely successful in receiving Urban Development Action Grants (UDAGs). He was known as Carter's favorite Mayor. The Mayor has been noticeably quiet in his criticism of this Administration.

NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF COUNTIES

The National Association of Counties (NACo) represents 2011 of the 3094 counties nationwide. NACo is in Baltimore for its 47th Annual Conference on July 10-14th. NACo has been supportive of the Administration. They supported the Administration's budget and tax bills last year and are generally supportive of your Federalism Initiative. In February, 1982, you met with the Board of Directors of NACo in the Old Executive Office Building. At that time, NACo adopted a resolution which supported the Federalism concept but raised some concerns about the specifics of the proposal. Since that time, the NACo leadership and staff have worked closely with us to hammer out the details of the proposal. They have provided us with constructive and thoughtful input, much of which has been incorporated into the new package.

Upon arrival at the Convention Center, you will briefly meet the Officers of NACo in the holding room. (See attached background on individuals.) You will then be escorted to the dais by Richard Conder, NACo President, who will also introduce you.

Richard Conder (D) - Chairman of the Board of Commissioners of Richmond County, North Carolina. Conder has served as President of NACo during the past year and will be stepping down as President at the end of the NACo meeting. Conder's theme during his Presidency has been the ABC Program -- Alliance with Business and Counties -- an effort to develop public-private partnerships. Conder has been cautious about fully embracing your Federalism Initiative. This is mainly due to his close reelection campaign this fall.

Bill Murphy (R) - County Executive of Rensselaer County, New York. Murphy is First Vice President of NACo and will become President at the end of the meeting in Baltimore. Murphy has been very supportive of the Administration, particularly with regard to the Federalism Initiative.

Sandy Smoley (R) - Second Vice President and Supervisor of Sacramento County, California. Smoley has been very supportive of the Administration.

Phil Elfstrom (R) - Third Vice President and Commissioner of Kane County, Illinois. Elfstrom has also been supportive of the Administration.

Bob Aldemeyer (D) - Fourth Vice President and Commissioner of Kenton County, Kentucky. Aldemeyer is a moderate Democrat who has not been very critical of the Administration.

Roy Orr (D) - Past President and Commissioner of Dallas County, Texas. Orr has been very supportive of the Administration. He could be considered the Phil Gramm of county officials.

WORLD TRADE CENTER

I. TOUR OF THE 27th FLOOR

Accompanied by Mayor Schaefer, you will tour the 27th floor of the World Trade Center, where you will view Baltimore's famous Inner Harbor.

The Inner Harbor is a 240-acre project surrounding Baltimore's harbor basin where the city originated. The project was started in 1967 and is now more than half complete. Through its partnership with the private sector, the City has turned this once unsightly, unvisited harbor into Baltimore's most famous masterpiece. The Inner Harbor project is adding residential, social and cultural facilities, as well as major hotel, retail and office buildings (such as the World Trade Center) to the center city.

The Inner Harbor is part of Baltimore's downtown renewal efforts. Since the late 1950's, a unique partnership between the private and public sectors has been established to revitalize downtown Baltimore. Federal, State and local government funds have been carefully invested to stimulate privately financed development. While expenditures to date have been almost equally public and private, 95 percent of planned expenditures for the future will be from the private sector.

Mayor schaefer will give you a tour of the 27th floor. You will see various models and displays of activities in the Inner Harbor such as cargo being loaded on a ship. The majority of the time will be spent at the Southernmost window where you can see the Inner Harbor, the Aquarium, a revitalized neighborhood and the Industrial section of Baltimore. Press pool coverage.

This is an opportunity for you to learn first-hand about some of Baltimore's successful projects with respect to the public-private sector partnership. In addition, other successful efforts by Mayors and private developers from across the country will be related.

ENTERPRISE ZONES

NOTE: This year, on March 23rd, President Reagan sent to the Hill the "Enterprise Zone Tax Act," which embodies the major plank of his campaign platform on urban policy.

- o Enterprise Zones represent a new, experimental approach to providing jobs and solving economic problems in distressed urban areas.
- o President Reagan is anxious to have Congress consider -- and enact -- this legislation; welcomes the support it has received in Congress and from many local leaders.
- o Zones are designed to stimulate creation of new businesses and therefore, new jobs -- especially jobs for disadvantaged workers.
- o Recognize that money is often needed to solve city problems but policies of past which just threw dollars at cities didn't work.
- o Enterprise Zones will lessen regulation and taxation by federal and state and local governments for a zone area. Will see if this experiment in less government can solve problems that more government failed to solve in the past.
- o True to our commitment to federalism, the proposal requires that states and localities approve of -- and support -- a zone application. (This means chances of federal approval of a zone applicant are enhanced if states and localities also reduce their own tax and regulatory obstacles in the zone.)

NOTE: Important for President Reagan to stress sincerity of his commitment to Enterprise Zones and strong desire for Congressional action yet this year if possible. (In wake of urban policy controversy at Mayor's meeting last week in Minneapolis -- and relative inaction on bill in Congress -- strong reiteration of President Reagan's support very important.)

Baltimore Zone on Upswing

BALTIMORE—A decade ago, Democratic Rep. Parren J. Mitchell said he made a commitment to the once up, but now down-and-out Park Heights section of his district, that he would help bring back to life the dying neighborhood of high crime and low employment.

Since then Mayor William Donald Schaefer and local business people have helped lure new business, infusing with new morale this community of modest red brick rowhouses and mom-and-pop stores.

On Thursday, President Reagan is expected to travel here as part of the pitch for his proposed enterprise zone program to entice businesses to locate in depressed areas to create jobs. Park Heights

is viewed as a politically logical destination for Reagan because the neighborhood and the city already are on the upswing.

"If the president comes to say this is what has come without the enterprise zone, and more can be accomplished with the enterprise zones, that's fine," said Mitchell, who said he was not invited by the White House to tour his district with the president.

"But if he's going to try to get something political out of this, he's wrong."

White House officials said Reagan plans to mention his enterprise zone program during the State of the Union address next Tuesday and that aides wanted him to visit a place where revitalization has begun, before the speech. Baltimore was selected because it's a short trip, the officials said.

But a source close to the issue said Park Heights would be "a very logical place" for Reagan to visit. "It would be a near cliché for Reagan to go to the South Bronx."

In addition, Baltimore has been characterized in national publications as a showplace for urban development, yet it has a pocket of despair and unemployment, the source said.

It is seen by city officials as an area with "a high degree of likelihood of succeeding" in the new "city that works," a city that has turned itself around without the aid of enterprise zones.

Park Heights has been a top priority in economic development in Baltimore and would be a "primary choice for designation" as an

enterprise zone, according to Dave Paulson, project director for the Baltimore Economic Development Corp.

The president is reported to have approved in principle a plan to create up to 75 enterprise zones in run-down urban areas as an incentive to businesses to locate there and to create jobs for the residents.

The objective is to establish as many as 25 zones a year for the next three years, eliminate some taxes for businesses in the zones and to provide special tax credits to employers for hiring low-income workers or for buying equipment for the zone.

The city wants Park Heights to be designated an enterprise zone and eligible for federal assistance, although Baltimore officials aren't sitting back and waiting for a federal program to move through Congress.

"I think an enterprise zone will help because they will provide tax incentives for business," Paulson said. "In the meantime, we will use the approach we've been using."

City leaders are building an industrial park that they hope will receive the enterprise zone designation on a 40-acre parcel bordered by Reisters-town Road, Druid Park Drive, Liberty Heights Avenue and Wabash Avenue.

Already, Control Data Corp. and its subsidiary Commercial Credit Corp. have located on the site and Chesapeake and Potomac Telephone Co. has built a new facility on the edge of the industrial park. Cindarn Plastics and United Sounds of America, a stereo manufacturer, are there.

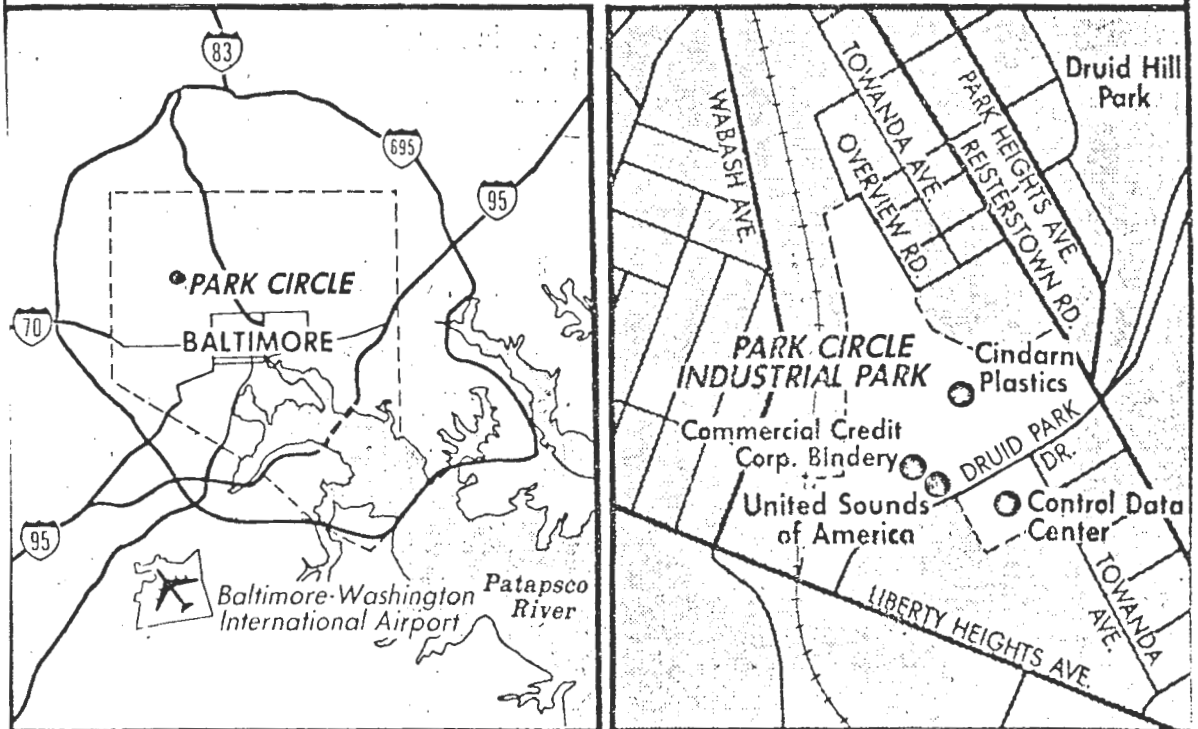
The city's goal is to create 1,750 jobs on the site. So far they have about 100, Paulson said.

Park Heights' economy began sinking during the late 1950s and early 1960s when middle-income residents were replaced by low- to middle-income persons, Paulson said.

Many of the businesses changed hands several times, although the area has begun to stabilize. A building on Park Circle once was ABC Discount Furniture and Appliance Co., but it was also Hannah's Food Mart and a sandwich shop according to signs still pasted on and above the windows.

Another shop, Randy's Religious Store, is vacant next to a door with a sign with multishaded clasped hands that reads, "Overturn the Reagan program of outback, red m and

DESCRIPTION OF BALTIMORE

In 1980, Baltimore with a population estimate of 786,775, was the ninth largest city in the United States. It has declined in population since 1970 when it was ranked as the seventh largest city. Baltimore is unique in that it is a totally independent local jurisdiction and not part of any county. Baltimore covers 79 square miles.

Demographics

Non-whites constitute approximately 56 percent of the total population of the city. Women head 23 percent of all households. Approximately 10.6 percent of the population is over 65 years.

Income

Median family income in the city is \$15,830.

Budget

Approximately 39 percent or \$676 million of the city's 1980 budget of \$1.7 billion is dependent upon Federal grants and revenue sharing. Another 24 percent of the city's budget depends on Maryland State grants.

Industry and Commerce

Traditionally, the economic base of the city has been the production and distribution of manufactured goods. While there has been a steady shift toward service industries (as is the case with many large cities), manufacturing remains a vital component.

Important employment sources are Bethlehem Steel, Westinghouse Electric, General Motors, Lever Brothers, and the Federal government.

Industrial specialties are Londontown Manufacturing Company, which produces 23 percent of the country's raincoat and waterproof garments ("London Fog"); Maryland Shipbuilding and Drydock (which accounts for 13 percent of all shipbuilding and repair in the country; and McCormick Spices.

The Port of Baltimore is the fourth largest foreign trade port in the United States. It accounts for \$2.5 billion in yearly wages and salaries and generates one-tenth of Maryland's jobs.

The Federal government accounts for approximately three percent of the City's total employment. The main headquarters of the Office of Social Security are in Baltimore.

Recreation

Approximately 12 percent of the land area is devoted to parks and recreation.

Education

There are seven institutions of higher learning in the city including John Hopkins University and Medical School, the University of Maryland at Baltimore, and Peabody Institute of Music.

Approximately 144,000 students attend the 200 public schools in the city. An estimated 76 percent are non-white.

Last summer, six key leaders of Baltimore's business community, along with Baltimore Mayor William Donald Schaefer, launched Blue Chip-in, a new venture that has meant the difference between survival and extinction for a number of the City's programs and jobs lost to federal budget cuts.

The Blue Chip-in project emerged from a series of meetings between the Mayor and these business leaders in response to the Mayor's search for ways the private sector could help offset Baltimore's loss of millions of dollars.

Through Blue Chip-in, private companies "invest" in projects that have been lost to federal budget cuts, but are important to the quality of life in Baltimore. These projects are designed to create new jobs, train the unemployed, and provide important--and in many instances, emergency--services that go above and beyond the City's basic responsibilities. The result: Blue Chip-in investments yield triple returns for Baltimore citizens and businesses alike.

To date, fifty local companies have invested nearly \$400,000, enough to underwrite twenty important projects and create 92 new jobs for the unemployed. For example, Baltimore Gas & Electric Company bought a weatherization project that hires nine former Public Service Employees who are insulating 100 homes of low-income City residents each month.

United States Fidelity and Guaranty, Inc. purchased a Fire Safety Awareness Program which employs five formerly unemployed instructors to teach fire safety to more than 25,000 fourth-, fifth-, and sixth-grade students.

And eight former CETA youth workers are renovating a neighborhood building as a Shelter for Homeless Women, thanks to a commitment from the Whiting-Turner Contracting Company.

Other investments support such important projects as a radio reading service for the blind, literacy tutoring in public libraries, and needed care for the home-bound elderly.

Armed with a portfolio and a concept, the Blue Chip-in Committee has sold these and other projects to Baltimore businesses. The six charter members of the Blue Chip-in Committee are: Bernard Manekin, Chairman, Manekin Corporation; Henry Butta, Vice President, C & P Telephone Company of Maryland; Jack Mosely, President and Chairman, United States Fidelity and Guaranty, Inc.; Bernard Trueschler, Chairman, Baltimore Gas & Electric Company; Owen Cole, Chairman, First National Bank; and Leslie Disharoon, Chairman, Monumental Corporation.

The key selling points? All donations for Blue Chip-in go to a private, non-profit corporation, Baltimore City Foundation, Inc., enabling donors to take full advantage of tax deductions. In addition, the portfolio is packaged in a crisp style to show businesses exactly what they get for their investment: total costs, how many jobs are created and the project impact. As an added plus, companies can contribute in several ways: by sponsoring a specific project compatible with a particular corporate goal, by buying shares in a project, or by contributing to the general Foundation fund to support "unadopted" projects.

According to Mayor Schaefer, "Although we cannot hope to recoup all of our federal funding losses, the business community is taking an encouraging first step. I think there's an entirely new, very fine aggressive attitude in the business community. We need their support."

In the words of Henry Butta of C & P Telephone Company, "Business programs must now make social sense, just as social programs must make business sense."

REVENUE SHARING AND BALTIMORE, MARYLAND

Revenue Sharing payments are authorized by the State and Local Fiscal Assistance Act of 1972, as amended. Nearly 40,000 general purpose units of local government--counties, cities, and townships--are entitled to payments in 1982. Within each State, the allocation of payments is determined by each jurisdiction's population, per capita income, and adjusted taxes (taxes net of school expenditures).

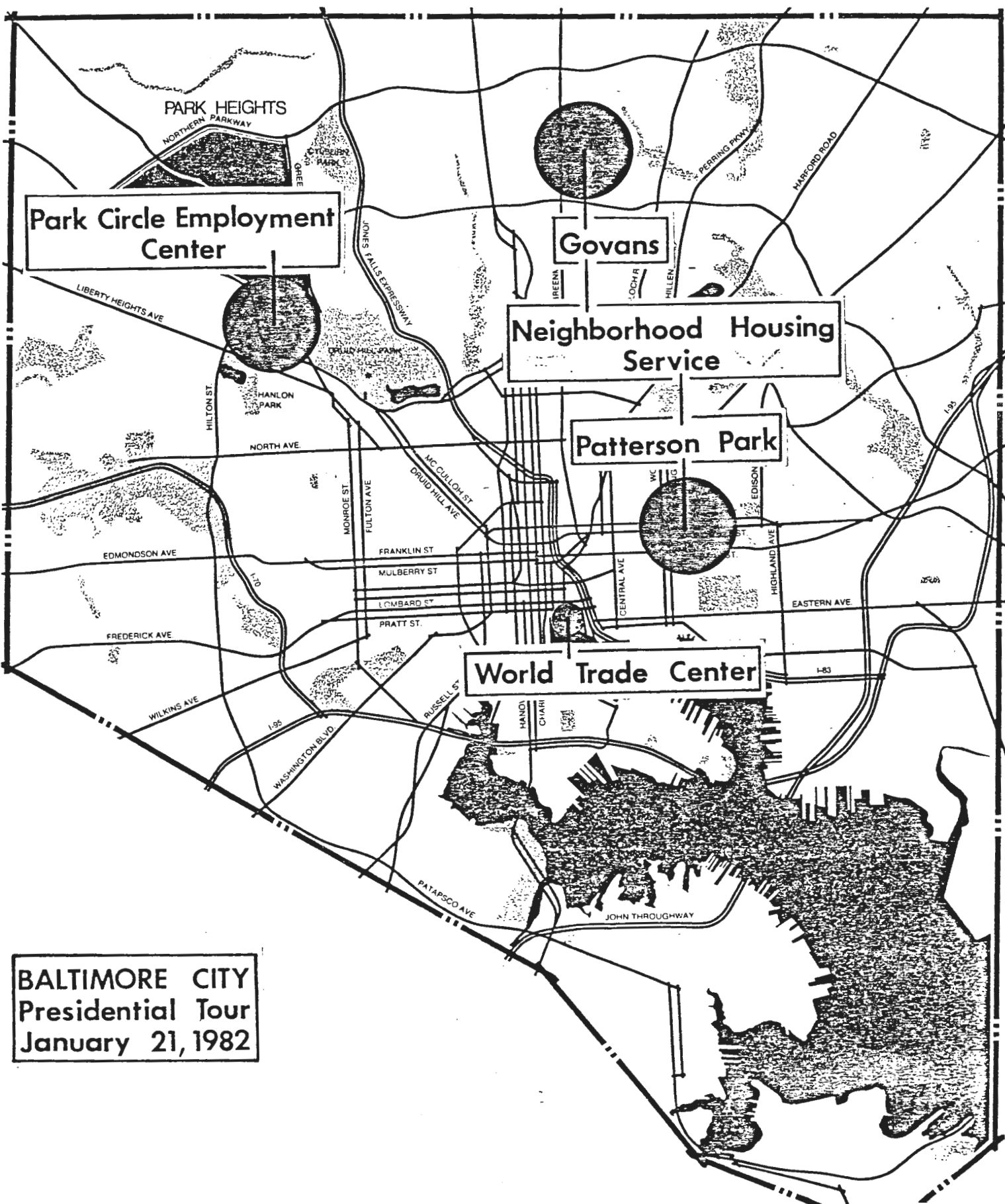
Payments to Baltimore, Maryland have been decreasing in recent years, largely because the City's population has been declining rapidly (2.2% per year, 1975-80):

-- 1978:	\$27,276,548
-- 1979:	26,428,369
-- 1980:	24,916,144
-- 1981:	24,028,380
-- 1982:	23,605,624

→ To the best of our knowledge, Revenue Sharing is treated by Baltimore as a general fund receipt, with the fiscal impact spread throughout the city's budget. The 1982 payment amounts to 10.5 percent of Baltimore's adjusted taxes.

The City is in full compliance with the audit and public participation requirements of the Revenue Sharing Act. Four civil rights cases are pending, but none is of major potential magnitude; they are all regarded by the Office of Revenue Sharing as routine.
