SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS FOR MEETING WITH THE PRESIDENT AND C. WILLIAM VERITY

- I have asked Bill Verity to join us today to bring us up to date on the work of the Task Force on Private Sector Initiatives.
- Before Bill starts, I want all of you to know how hard he has had me working this year. I have met with seven separate groups of national organization leaders in the White House, held meetings with the fifty Governors and you all last February to promote Private Sector Initiatives, visited four cities to highlight major private initiative activity, made numerous phone calls, wrote hundreds of letters, and I even cut a television videotape and radio spot.
- I mention all of this to you because Bill says we have to get on the ball and really make some things happen before the end of the year (that's when he retires). I told him that we will continue to carry the ball every way we can.
- One of the most important efforts of the Task Force this year was encouraging your participation. When Bill was here last February I asked all of you to submit to the Task Force a report on Private Initiative Activity in your departments. Bill and his staff have reviewed the reports which you

submitted, and I understand they were impressive.

-- Finally, before I turn over the floor to Bill, I would just like to say that I hope all of you in your departments continue to make this a top priority next year. You will be hearing more from me on this in the next few months.

I. PURPOSE

Photo opportunity with Pele' and Steve Moyers in the Oval Office, and brief introduction of them to two children's soccer teams (Mike Deaver's son, Blair plays on one of the teams.)

It is Pele's hope that your acknowledgement of the importance of soccer will help in his pursuit to promote soccer as an international sporting event with the U.S. included.

This will hopefully lead our nation to participate in the World Cup matches in 1986.

II. BACKGROUND

Pele' - No man in the history of soccer has received higher international acclaim than "Pele'".

- . he has scored over one thousand goals,
- . made his professional debut for Santos at age 16 and for Brazil a year later
- . received World Cup triumphs in Sweden and Mexico
- . came to America to play with the New York Cosmos and overnight made soccer a major sport of the U.S.

Pele' has visited nearly every country in the world. He has met with 88 heads of state, including two Popes, as well as with Presidents Nixon, Ford and Carter.

Soccer is an international pastime, as witnessed by 1.5 billion people who watched the final game of the 1982 World Cup between the Italians and West Germans.

The World Cup Championship, a quadrennial event, is the largest, richest, and most grandiose athletic contest in history.

Soccer has emerged as a truly universal sport, yet for the most part the U.S. has not participated. This is changing in our schools, in communities throughout the country, and in the number of amateur soccer leagues over the last ten years.

Pele's dedication and enthusiasm in developing soccer clinics for children, his ability to draw large crowds, his personal magnetism, and his determination to make the U.S. part of the international soccer community has resulted in making soccer more and more popular with all segments of our population.

Steve Moyers - Mr. Moyers is 25 years old. He is acclaimed as the greatest American born scorer in the North American Soccer League. He currently plays with the New York Cosmos.

PRESIDENTIAL REMARKS: RNC TELECONFERENCE
THURSDAY, OCTOBER 14, 1982

Good evening to all you friendly, enthusiastic Republicans. Say, isn't this great? Since I couldn't personally get to each district and show my support for the Republican candidates, the RNC came up with this means of beaming me out to gatherings all over the country. So, I'm being bounced off a satellite and then down to your individual gathering. It's a long way from my days at WHO in Des Moines. And I'll admit I'm a little worried. The way I'm beaming all over the place I was afraid you'd mistake me for Jerry Brown.

But no matter what the modern election techniques, politics still depends on people, people at the grass roots like all of you out there tonight. You are the ones who make the difference in every election, and you're going to make the difference in this election as well.

I'm upbeat about November 2nd because I believe our candidates are good -- like the ones we're supporting tonight. And in spite of what you sometimes hear on the news, I believe the issues are on our side.

For example, the economy. Rather than running away from the economic issue, I think the real economic record is in our favor if we can just get the truth out. We Republicans are doing a good job cleaning up a mess that built up for decades, and I am genuinely convinced the American people understand that, and will show it on election day. The economic issue that the opposition

is trying to bully us with is like the bully himself. Once you stand up to him, he slinks away.

Five economic problems were beating this country over the head when we came to Washington 20 months ago -- runaway spending, double digit inflation, the worst interest rates in a hundred years, the highest peacetime tax burden, and high unemployment. Well, we've made dramatic gains on 4 of those 5 problems. The inflation rate that reached a peak of 18 percent in January 1980 has been cut to 5.1 percent for the first eight months of this year. Now that is good news Republicans can run on. The prime rate reached 21.5 percent before we came to office. Well, we've knocked it down to 12 percent and we're not by any means finished with it yet. That is more good news Republicans can run on. We've cut the growth in Government spending by nearly two-thirds; and we will have cut tax rates by 25 percent by next July. What is more, the average American's purchasing power is up. That's all good news. And if you want more good news just look at what the stock and bond markets are doing as confidence returns to Wall Street and Main Street investors from coast to coast.

Yes, there are still tough problems, especially that tragic unemployment rate. Sadly, unemployment is always the last to feel a recovery. But let me tell you we are going to beat unemployment just as we're beating the rest of our economic problems. And when we get it licked it's going to stay licked because the recovery will be a real one, not an artificial quick fix trumped by Washington's big spenders.

We can make even more progress with the new Republicans we'll elect this fall. And that's what we're all gathering for tonight. So before I turn this over to questions, I just want to say thank you for working for these fine Republican candidates. They are the kind of conscientious and principled public leaders America needs and I look forward to working with them in the next Congress. Now to the questions . . .

Concluding remarks:

In closing I just want to say how essential all of you are to our cause. It's an old truth, but every vote does count. And the results of this election will hinge -- perhaps more than anything else -- on voter turnout. The basic job of identifying supporters and getting them to the polls is still one of the most important in politics. Technology like we're enjoying tonight can't replace the hard work of getting out the vote.

As I've said, I believe we're going to do well. We've got fine candidates, a wide base of contributors, an efficient party organization, and we've got good issues -- issues the people of this Nation truly care about.

It's up to you Republicans at the grass roots to make sure that the voters understand how important the choice is this year. The choice between going back to old policies that didn't work, or going ahead in the new direction we've set.

We're on a new road now -- a road that is leading America to better times. Unless we have the courage to stay on course and defeat our economic problems now, we'll never have lasting recovery and our problems will grow worse than before. Well, I intend to stay the course. And we're going to succeed -- but we need your support. So please, promise me that you'll mobilize and get out the vote for a great Republican victory on November 2.

As I said last night, it isn't an easy job, this challenge to rebuild America and renew the American dream. But we can do it. Throughout our history, we Americans have proven again and again that no challenge is too big for a free united people. Together we can do it again. And we can start making those dreams come true by electing Republican candidates to office.
