PRESIDENTIAL REMARKS: MEETING WITH DIRECTORS OF INDEPENDENT
RESEARCH LIBRARIES
WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 8, 1982

I've just had a chance to meet with Bill Bennett and the representatives of 13 exceptional research libraries, and I wanted to drop by and say a few words to all of you about the significance of the humanities in American life -- and this Administration's recognition of their importance. Well, there isn't a more appropriate place in all of the White House to do that than right here in the Roosevelt Room. People tend to forget it but, besides being a soldier, an outdoorsman and a statesman, Teddy Roosevelt was a humanist in the best sense -- a gifted scholar and author who was as much at home in the realm of ideas as in the world of action. As such, I'm sure he'd approve of the grants that were announced today -- especially since they will be matched at least 3 to 1 by private contributions.

Back in 1933 Alfred North Whitehead listed the five most important qualities of a civilized society as truth, beauty, adventure, art and peace. I don't think anyone has improved on that simple but profound formula. We must never forget that it is the humanities -- their study, their preservation and their growth -- that provide the intellectual underpinnings for our values as a civilization and deepen our understanding and appreciation of truth, beauty, adventure, art and, yes, peace.

Now you and I know -- and Bill Bennett is certainly aware -- that it is often the arts, especially the performing arts, that seem to receive the lion's share of public attention.

As a former actor myself, I guess I can't really complain about that. But I do feel it is important for us all to remember that the cultural foundation for so much of the great art we all enjoy -- and our ability to appreciate it -- draw their inspiration from the humanities.

So, I want to take this occasion to express my personal commitment to the humanities and to reaffirm this Administration's support of the National Endowment for the Humanities.

While the Federal Government does not have the resources to be a major source of funds for the humanities, our Administration has shown that it can use its limited resources to support the basic disciplines and essential activities of the humanities. It also has shown that, through example and encouragement, the Federal Government can attempt to stimulate increased private sector support for the humanities. We believe that such Federal activity is appropriate, for the humanities are crucial to the vitality of our Nation's educational and cultural life and the maintenance of our civilization.

That also applies to the 13 outstanding independent research libraries represented here today. So thank you all for coming -- and for the vital contribution each of you is helping to make to our life as a free, creative people.

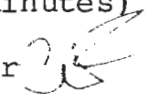

MEMBERS OF THE HOUSE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

- Before we get started, I want to thank Danny, Barber Conable and the Committee for their help and support with the highway package. I really appreciated your hard work and congratulate you on the results.
- I know that Chairman Rostenkowski and other members of your Committee, at our request, visited the Caribbean last month.
- Just as my recent trip to Latin America further convinced me of the imperative need for the Caribbean Basin Initiative, I believe that those of you who were with Danny also understand the need for action on CBI before you go home this year.
- The Presidents of Colombia, Costa Rica and Honduras all personally underscored to me the importance of CBI, not only for them but for the region as a whole. America's credibility is on the line.
