Ladies and Gentlemen:

Welcome to the first national conference since 1967 of the National Defense Executive Reserve. And thank you for being there.

As you go about your busy day-to-day activities, it may be difficult to appreciate how important your membership in NDER will be to the future of America in case of a National emergency.

In a crisis, government ultimately depends on citizens who step forward and accept responsibility, serving their fellow countrymen and making sure the job gets done even in the most trying circumstances. The most fundamental task of government is the protection of its people. You are the skilled and knowledgeable persons on whom we are counting to meet that need in case of emergency.

NDER is part of a spectrum of civil mobilization programs that we pray will never be used, yet good judgement demands that we keep prepared. As you will learn, these programs are receiving new attention and support from my Administration after years of neglect. The Emergency Mobilization Preparedness Board, is the mechanism which I created in December 1981 to coordinate mobilization efforts and focus interagency attention on this national need.

FEMA is working to establish new units, and breathe life into this vital yet long neglected area. Their effort has my complete support.

Sometimes it's thought that Americans are too blase, about a problem until a crisis erupts. Your presence -- and your investment of time and energy -- is evidence that concerned citizens can make the commitments necessary for our country's safety.

I congratulate you on your decision to help America become a stronger and safer nation. And I wish you a rewarding and stimulating experience during your orientation over the next few days. Thanks again for your good citizenship.

PRESIDENTIAL TAPING: CONVENTION OF NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF
TELEVISION PROGRAM EXECUTIVES
FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 25, 1983

First, let me say how delighted I am to have this chance to speak to all of you in the National Association of TV Program Executives and wish you an enjoyable and productive convention in Las Vegas. And I want to salute Chuck Larsen, the outgoing president of NATPE, for the excellent job he has done and Stan Marinoff of WISN-TV, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, your incoming president.

Now I think all of you know I'm somewhat partial to your business, or should I say our business, since television still plays a pretty important role in life here at the White House. But I'd like to be the first to admit the shows we put on here in Washington -- no matter what our political opposition might say -- aren't nearly as creative or humorous as those that you produce.

But you know, the old cliché is true: television is great entertainment, but it can also be a great art form, a chance to ennoble and enlighten those who watch it. And it's also that rarest of all things: a new art form, one unique to our age, brought about by a telecommunications revolution every bit as important as the American industrial revolution at the end of the last century. So, in a sense, you're right on the cutting edge of social history and of innovation in the arts. This is a heady place to be, and I don't have to tell you that it carries with it responsibilities and obligations to the public you serve.

That's also true of those of us in Government, of course. I think most of you know I subscribe to a political philosophy that sees in the creative impulses of the people that real source of our economic and social progress as a Nation. I've been saying for a long time that too much Government carries with it the danger of stifling the enterprise, initiative and the striving for excellence that are trademarks of a free people. Because this is the political principle that has motivated this Administration, we've tried in our policies abroad to alleviate the wrongs of oppressive state power and at home to free the pent-up energies and creative talents of the people.

This is nowhere more evident than in our efforts to bring about deregulation in your own business. I think all of you are familiar with some of the steps that the Federal Communications Commission has been taking in this area. We've had pretty good success in the radio industry and now, in a reasonable and prudent manner, we're cutting back on all those unnecessary regulations on television that have grown up over the years. Licensing terms and procedures, which can be very costly for radio and TV stations, have been relaxed. The FCC committed itself to allowing broadcasters full participation in the marketplace technology of the future, including cable TV. And, of course, the commitment of the FCC and this Administration to first amendment rights for broadcasters remains firm and enduring. Our goal is to make sure that the decisions in the television industry are where they belong -- in your hands, not those of the bureaucrats or special interests.

The fact that we believe great social and economic progress results from individual Americans working through associations like yours is just one more reason why I want to wish you the best at this convention. Good luck in the projects you undertake to bring what is new, artful and entertaining to the American public.

PRESIDENTIAL TAPING: MESSAGE FOR AWARDS CEREMONY BY
INTERNATIONAL RADIO AND TV SOCIETY

My heartiest congratulations to you, Roone, for a well-deserved honor. Roone is legendary for total concentration on his job and attention to every imaginable detail. Maybe you know what I mean. I was going to call him today to congratulate him in person, but I was afraid he wouldn't return my call . . .

Some of you in the audience may not know that Roone and I are both recipients of the International Radio and Television Society Gold Medal. There's just one small difference -- Roone got his for staying in the business, and I got mine for getting out . . .

You know, when I was asked to say a few words tonight, I wondered whether it was such a good idea for Roone. Think about it. If I say good things about him, the Democrats will want equal time to say it isn't so . . .

So, Roone, before Tip O'Neill comes in for rebuttal, let me congratulate you on this award, which recognizes your creativity, your ingenuity, your versatility -- and your sheer stamina.

As everyone there knows, your contributions to broadcasting have been great. In sports, you and your team at ABC have been responsible for so many innovations that we've come to take for granted -- from the evolution of the Olympics as we know them today to mastery of the technology that makes week-to-week coverage of sports so much more exciting. In news, you've been equally creative with technology, but the substance of some of

your new programs should also be noted. Both "Nightline" and "This Week With David Brinkley" have certainly broken new ground in the news arena, and you deserve to be commended. Roone, your contributions have been so significant that I want you to know I consider even Sam Donaldson a small price to pay . . .

Seriously, Roone, let me say that this award has special meaning, because to be honored by one's peers is the highest form of recognition. You have my most sincere congratulations as I present this medal through Ave Butensky, President of the IRTS.

Roone, if you will step forward, Ave Butensky will make the presentation on my behalf. Let me read the citation:

The International Radio and Television Society, Inc. is pleased to award its highest honor, the Gold Medal, to Roone Arledge, a man who has excelled in two seemingly diverse fields -- news and sports -- by his enthusiasm, creativity, and daring. Sports programming as it exists today is heavily indebted to Roone Arledge's innovations, and he has enlivened and expanded news coverage to an extent not seen in many years.
