I. PURPOSE:

The American Medical Association is a strong force component of the nation's health care constituency. The meeting has been scheduled to show the AMA representatives that this Administration will listen to their concerns and is willing to work with them to ensure that any health care reform plan enacted by Congress is proper, fair and balanced.

We want to encourage AMA's continued input and consultations with HHS Secretary Heckler and Under Secretary Svahn in fine-tuning the Health Incentives Reform proposal to meet the shared objectives of reducing rising health care costs, preserving high quality health care, and minimum government intrusion. We, of course, want the AMA's active support in ensuring passage of the plan on the Hill.

II. BACKGROUND

The AMA requested this meeting in order to have an opportunity to voice their concerns about certain aspects of the proposed Health Incentives Reform package. Briefly, the AMA favors:

--Limit on tax free health insurance.

--Increase in Medicare Part B premium and deductible (which pays the doctors).

--The concept of coupling Medicare catastrophic coverage with patient co-payments in the early days of hospitalization, but has concerns about whether costs in such a program could get out of hand.

The AMA has reservations, with varying degrees of severity, about:

- Medicare prospective payment for hospitals, which would mean hospitals be reimbursed with set charges for various illnesses, rather than being paid on a cost-plus basis. AMA is concerned about the implications on physicians' diagnostic and treatment flexibility on an individual basis.
- Medicare physician fee freeze
- Medicare voucher provision on the grounds that such a system might result in patient defection to other practitioners, but recognizes freedom-of-choice implications of issue.

-- I know, from reading about the AMA's official reaction to my proposals, that there are a number of concerns you have about the various aspects of the proposals:

- We've proposed that hospitals be reimbursed with set charges for various illnesses, rather than being paid on a cost-plus basis. Naturally, you're concerned about what that might imply for government interference in individual courses of treatment.
- We've also proposed that so-called catastrophic coverage be provided to people with heavy hospital bills. Yet concerns have been raised about whether costs in such a program could get out of hand.
- We've also proposed increased cost consciousness on the part of the patient, a position which I understand that you have favored in the past.
- Finally, we've proposed that individuals be given the choice to either stay on their present government insurance coverage under Medicare, or else receive a voucher with which they can purchase comparable private coverage. Concerns have naturally been raised as to whether such a system might favor one sort of health care practitioner over another.

-- Well, I want to assure you that any proposal from the Federal government -- even from my Administration -- can always be improved by consulting with outside experts. And I've long known that the American Medical Association is the leading

- I appreciate the opportunity to meet with you today.
1983 may prove to be a landmark year in the development of Federal health policy. I'm glad we have an opportunity to meet with you at an early stage of the debate to receive your views on important health issues.
- This will be a watershed year for two reasons:
 - The American people are becoming increasingly concerned about rising health care costs, particularly so since cost increases in other areas have moderated substantially.
 - Our present budgetary situation naturally focuses attention on rapidly rising costs for health care programs.
 - The challenge we face is to meet these problems without diminishing the quality of care available to the American people -- and without doing damage to our Nation's private health care delivery system, which I've long believed is by far the best in the world.

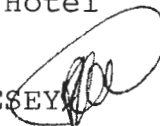
