TALKING POINTS

- Just want to make a few comments to lead off today's meeting.
- I understand the conference on the Jobs bill finished late yesterday. While we haven't had time to review the specific details, I hope the agreement is consistent with my guidelines and within the framework I proposed a few weeks ago.

Dear Mr. De Ux:

Every summer, several million young Americans enter the job market, looking for temporary employment. This summer, many will find it difficult to get work.

You and your company can help meet this important need by reserving some of your part-time summer positions for needy youth, or by contributing corporate funds for the creation of jobs locally. In doing so, you will demonstrate your commitment to corporate voluntarism and will help many earn income that will permit them to return to school in September.

If your company requires assistance in recruiting youth, you should contact your local Private Industry Council, school system, or community organizations active in developing summer job programs. I might add that this year a company hiring needy youngsters may qualify for a tax credit of up to 85% of the wages paid to each eligible individual certified by the Job Service. This incentive is provided by the Targeted Jobs Tax Credit to encourage employers to hire young people this summer.

I have asked David M. Roderick, Chairman of U.S. Steel and the National Alliance of Business, to assist you and local Private Industry Councils to generate business support for this year's summer jobs program. I hope you will respond positively to this urgent need by extending a helping hand to America's youth.

Dear Mr. Kilpatrick:

I am writing to let you know about the unprecedented opportunity that we, in American business, face today -- to help shape the workforce of tomorrow and assure the availability of skilled workers for emerging private sector jobs.

This new business leadership role is the centerpiece of the Job Training Partnership Act, signed into law by President Reagan last October 13. This legislation establishes an expanded private industry council system, giving local business leaders an equal voice with local chief elected officials in planning and managing their community's job training programs. It also requires that at least 70% of the funds be spent on actual training rather than income support and administrative costs for operating programs.

Business -- represented by The Business Roundtable, the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, the Committee for Economic Development, the National Alliance of Business, and the National Association of Manufacturers -- worked together to encourage Congress and the Administration to give local employers a strong decision-making role in the operation of private industry councils. The private sector must be directly involved in developing local training/retraining programs since business knows best what skills are needed in the private sector job market.

You can help guarantee them a strong and effective job training system by personally supporting this program in your state and community and by urging your board members and executives to serve on local private industry councils and the state job training coordinating council.

I also ask you to convey your personal commitment for this unique public/private partnership effort to your company's managers, many of whom can play important roles in their communities. Once in place, I am sure you will find these programs can be effective and cost-saving resources to your company.

This summer, the Alliance again is asking private employers to hire and train needy youth through the Summer Jobs for Needy Youth Program. To encourage this campaign, the Congress and the Administration recently revised the Targeted Jobs Tax Credit. Now, businesses who employ needy youth in summer jobs can qualify for a tax credit on up to 85% of the wages paid to each eligible youngster, as outlined in the enclosed brochure.

MEETING WITH SELECTED HOUSE REPUBLICANS TO
DISCUSS THE FEDERAL BUDGET

I. PURPOSE

To solicit Republican views on the Fiscal Year 1984 Budget, and the overall economic recovery effort, and to urge them to oppose the Democrat Budget proposal which is expected to be considered on the House Floor Wednesday, March 23.

II. BACKGROUND

This is the fourth in a series of meetings with selected House Republicans to discuss the Federal Budget.

On March 15, House Budget Committee Democrats agreed to a Fiscal Year 1984 Budget proposal that now is tentatively scheduled for House Floor consideration on Wednesday, March 23.

A press release by Democrat Budget Committee Members characterizes the proposal as one which "addresses the needs of all Americans with fairness and compassion." In reality, however, it is a political document which refutes the Administration's economic recovery effort by returning to the failed "tax and tax, spend and spend" policies of the past.

Among other things, this Budget proposal assumes 1) repeal of the third year tax rate reduction, 2) repeal of the tax indexing provision, 3) a drastic slash in the level of defense spending proposed under the Administration Budget proposal, and 4) a major increase in domestic spending compared to the Administration plan. Taxes would go up about \$30 billion in Fiscal Year 1984 alone if this plan was implemented (over \$300 billion in the next five years).

BACKGROUND (CONT'D)

House Republicans have not been able to fashion an acceptable Budget alternative which could win on the Floor, given the substantial increase in Democrat votes in the 98th Congress. However, it is felt that enough Democrats are skeptical of their Party's Budget plan, that a coalition may be possible to at least defeat that proposal on the Floor. That, in turn, would increase our ability to achieve a compromise later in the legislative process.

TALKING POINTS ON HOUSE DEMOCRAT BUDGET

- Signs of Spring usually remind us that it will soon be time to move our watches forward. I've called you here today because the House Democrats have apparently seen the signs of economic recovery and growing success for our program and have embarked on a desperate, last-ditch effort to turn the clock the other way--backward to 1980...or maybe 1970...or 1960...1950...
- I'm referring to the House Democrat Budget plan for 1984 which finally proves why I don't like five-year budget projections: Their trend-line goes right straight backwards to the Carter policies which created the mess we have struggled so hard to correct.
- I recognize that our budget deficit problem is so large, severe and threatening that it can only be solved through a process of "give and take" with the Congress.
- But how can you compromise with a proposal that throws out the window all of the hard-won progress we made these last two years on each of the fundamental elements of national policy.

-- Just for the immediate future--1983-84--the House Democrat plan calls for:

- o A \$27 billion increase in taxes.
- o A \$10 billion cut in defense.
- o An \$8 billion increase in the two year deficit.
- o And all this--so they can have a staggering \$45 billion increase in domestic spending compared to what we have proposed.

-- Unfortunately, that's just the short-run proposal. Dave Stockman will give you more details on their total five-year plan, but let me give you the message in no uncertain terms. I'm not going to sit still for a proposal which:

- o Raises taxes by \$316 billion over five years --thereby cancelling in one fell swoop 42% of the net tax cut we have given the American people.
- o Guts our defense rebuilding program by slashing \$206 billion from my 1984-88 request.
- o Repeals many of the overdue welfare reforms we have already enacted--throwing away billions in savings.
- o And in the name of fairness, adds an incredible \$181 billion in domestic spending to the high levels we have already proposed.

-- The truth is, this so-called Democrat "fairness budget" is really about cruelty--to taxpayers who would face huge new burdens; to consumers who would face renewed threats of soaring inflation; to the jobless who would have no hope of economic recovery; and to every peace-loving American citizen who could no longer have confidence that our defenses are strong and our nation secure.

-- So if you haven't guessed, I'm ready to go to the mat on this one. And I hope I can count on your strong support.

-- There will come a time for give-and-take down the road. But not until they take this entire plan off the table--either voluntarily, or with our efforts, your votes and the strong insistence of the American people.
