TALKING POINTS FOR PRESIDENTIAL PHOTO

OPPORTUNITY WITH JOSEPH SHERICK

APRIL 7, 1983

- o Cap Weinberger and Joe Sherick are here as a demonstration of my commitment to a strong and independent Inspector General office within the Department of Defense.
- o There are no sacred cows. When I pledged to the American people that we would conduct a vigorous and thorough campaign to ferret out waste, fraud and abuse, I did not grant the Department of Defense an exemption.
- o And you took me at my word, gentlemen! In April, 1981, you created a coordinated oversight and review office. In 1982 alone, potential savings totaled almost \$2.4 billion; costs questioned and sustained totaled \$7 billion, and 15,000 investigations were opened. In 1982 you established the Defense Criminal Investigative Service as a separate investigative unit concentrating on white-collar crime.
- o In December, when I last saw Joe at the White House, I congratulated him on the fine job he's doing, and told him about the visit I had from the Army's IG when I was discharged right after the war. It seems he had some questions about the financial management systems I was responsible for. I wanted Joe to know that I understand the nature of his work. Joe's response was, "Yes, sir, we still have that case open." You're not just as mean as a junkyard dog. Joe, you're tenacious!
- o My instructions to you are to continue to pursue detection and prevention of fraud, waste and abuse throughout DOD with the same vigor the Department has displayed in shoring up this nation's defensive systems. The IG's are my first line of defense in attacking fraud, waste, and abuse.

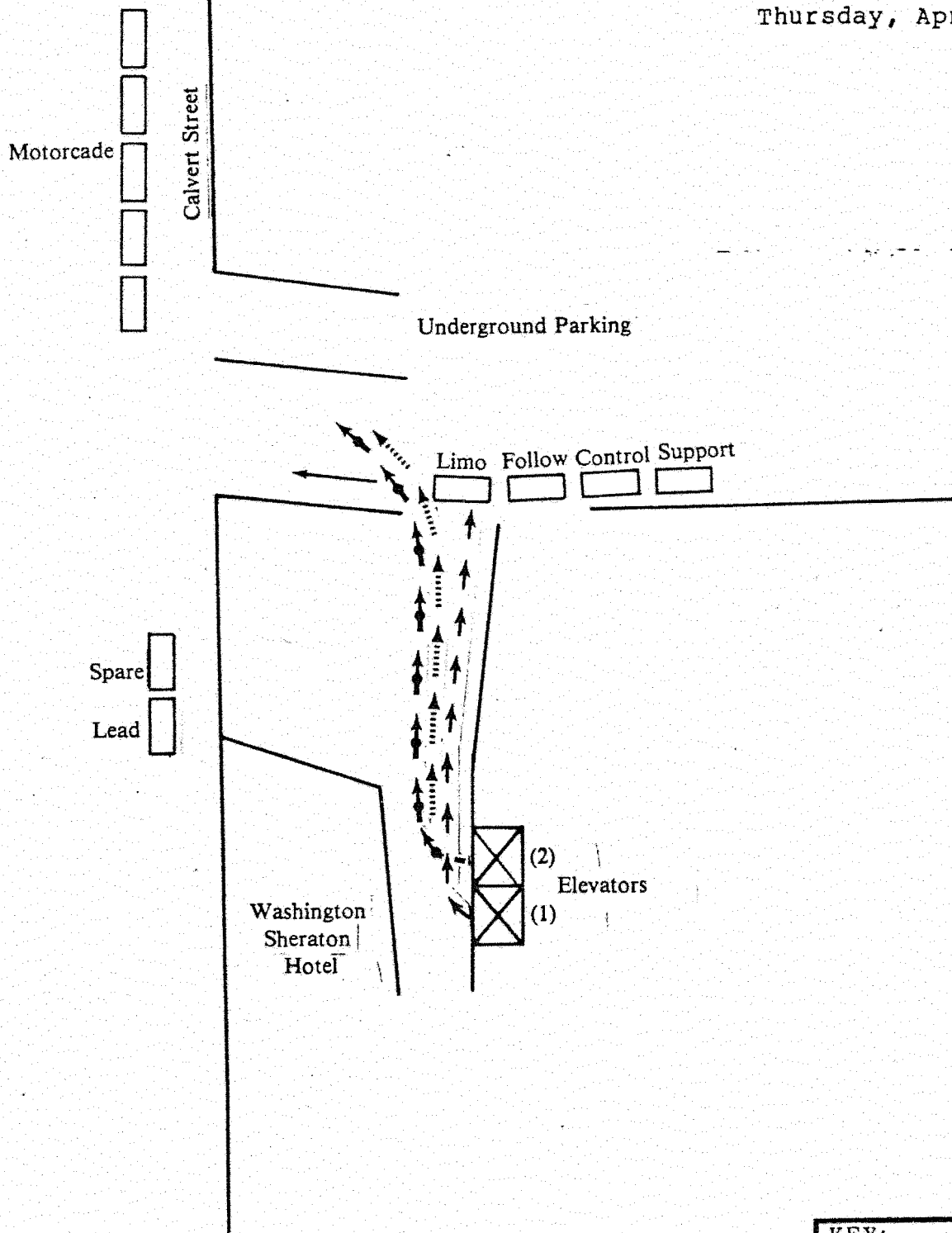
