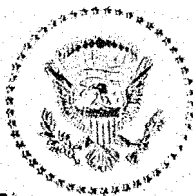

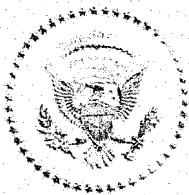

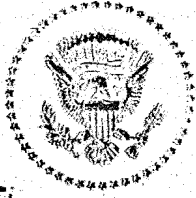

To have ceremonial swearing-in of Kenneth Adelman as the new Director of the Arms Control and Disarmament Agency (ACDA) and to highlight the Administration's seriousness about arms control.

II. BACKGROUND

Adelman, who has been serving at Ambassadorial rank as deputy to Jeane Kirkpatrick at the United Nations, was confirmed by the Senate last week after a long and contentious debate. While relatively young, at 36, he is an outstanding scholar on arms control, defense, and foreign policy issues with a strong Administrative record in his UN post. His swearing-in at the White House will give new emphasis to the Administration's far-reaching arms control agenda and to the new vigor and imagination with which the ACDA will be led.

DRAFT PRESIDENTIAL REMARKS ON THE OCCASION OF THE SWEARING-IN
OF AMBASSADOR KENNETH ADELMAN AS THE DIRECTOR OF ACDA

Ken, it's wonderful to see a smile on your face after so many trying weeks and to be able to congratulate you on this happy occasion. I want you to know how proud we are of you. And I know that your family is even more proud. You're a man of vision, courage, and honor.

Now, of course, your work is just beginning. This position you are assuming is unique within the governments of the world. No other country has an Arms Control Agency with such prominence as ours. In a sense, this is highly symbolic, for ACDA and its mission embody America's highest aspirations. Our country's record on arms control in the post-war era is a proud record. It began with the Baruch Plan; and it is being carried on today in our far-reaching negotiating proposals, and our other efforts to reduce the risks and arsenals of war. Our goal is peace with justice. We search for a means to resolve differences without resort to war, without resort to violence and with assurance of compliance with agreements made. I know you will be an important voice, a true advocate, and a source of energy for our efforts to achieve these great goals, through the equitable and effectively verifiable agreements we are seeking.

I see, Ken, that you've brought a few friends and colleagues with you. In addition to your lovely family up here, you now join a larger family whose entire professional commitment is to be an important resource for me and for you in the search for genuine peace. While the Arms Control and Disarmament Agency

is small compared to other federal agencies, its importance far exceeds its size. Since its founding in 1961, ACDA has played a key role in some of this country's most important policy decisions. During your tenure, ACDA will often be front and center in that process. One thing your confirmation process clearly did was to highlight this Agency's critical role.

Last week, following your confirmation by the Senate, I said that I foresaw a reinvigorated Arms Control and Disarmament Agency under your leadership. I want to assure the dedicated personnel of ACDA that you and they have my full confidence. They should know that I will look to you and to them for counsel in these important days ahead. I know that I can depend on strong support.

Ken, welcome aboard and, again, our warmest congratulations.

PRESIDENTIAL REMARKS: SMALL BUSINESS NATIONAL ADVISORY COUNCIL
FRIDAY, APRIL 22, 1983

Thank you and welcome to the White House. SBA sure runs a tough conference -- still going after 5:30 Friday afternoon. Why do I have this feeling there are packed bags all over town just waiting for me to finish? But I am glad you could squeeze me into the tail end of your conference.

First, I want to say what an excellent job Jim Sanders is doing as Administrator of the Small Business Administration. Jim has swiftly redirected SBA toward the future and I'm sure he will keep it moving that way.

I also want to thank you members of the National Advisory Council for your contributions. You've done such a good job advising SBA; how'd you like to go up on the Hill and give a little advice?

But let me say I have only the warmest words of thanks and admiration for the entire small business community. I have the highest respect for your creativity and flexibility, and I never tire of reminding folks how you create most of our new jobs. And, in spite of publicity to the contrary, statistics also show that small businesses were less affected by the recession than large firms. There were tens of thousands more small businesses opening up last year than closing down.

But your contributions are more than economic. You symbolize the American dream of what an individual can accomplish with hard work and freedom. America has become what she is because of your dreams. I came to this office in this historic

house carrying within me the same hopes and values you hold. And I am committed to defending what all of us here cherish -- economic freedom and prosperity.

Our economic recovery package was designed to serve these goals, and we are succeeding.

We reduced the outrageous double-digit inflation of 1980 to less than one half of one percent for the entire last 6 months -- the lowest 6-month rate in nearly 22 years. And what's more, we're going to keep inflation down. The prime interest rate, which was a staggering $21\frac{1}{2}$ percent when we took office, is down to $10\frac{1}{2}$ percent and we're not finished with it yet. Leading economic indicators are up; consumer confidence is up; production is up; retail sales are up; real wages are up; and I'm up as well. This recovery is like a new-born colt. Its legs are a little spindly and wobbly at first but, if we all do our part, in no time at all it will be frisky and kicking. As I said a few weeks ago, when they thought our program wasn't working they called it Reaganomics. What are they going to call it now that it is?

We're stimulating savings and investment by reducing tax rates. All personal tax rates are being reduced another 10 percent this July for a total of 25 percent -- and that's the first real reduction in nearly 20 years. This is especially important to small businesses because 85 percent of businesses file their taxes as individuals. And, of course, indexing will protect Americans from being pushed into higher and higher tax brackets in the future.

Now that things are going well with the recovery, it's no surprise that some of the big spenders in the Congress are thinking about legislation to mess it all up. You've heard the talk about repealing the third year of the tax cut and indexing. Well, the Congress can pass such legislation till the cows come home and I still won't sign it. I've told people I'm carrying my veto pen in my pocket and sleeping with it under my pillow. Let me get out my megaphone and make it a little clearer in case the message hasn't reached the appropriate ears. I will veto such tax increases and send them back to the Congress before the ink is even dry.

You know, there is one man here who especially appreciates the economic freedom and opportunity I've been talking about today. He's a member of your Minority Small Business Committee -- Carlos Perez. He and his family fled Cuba about 20 years ago, arriving in the United States with nothing except hope, determination, and \$27. Today he has a successful importing business in Coral Gables, Florida. Carlos understands freedom; he understands opportunity. And, he understands the great hope America offers.

I am proud Carlos Perez is now an American and I am proud he is standing among us today, because he represents the very best spirit of American small business. And, I pledge to Carlos, and to you, and to small business people all over our Nation, that we will keep America free and we will keep her prosperous. Thank you and God bless you.

I. PURPOSE

This meeting has been scheduled to allow a special working group, chaired by Ed Harper, to brief you concerning actions the government may take in the Houdaille Machine Tool Case.

II. BACKGROUND

Houdaille Industries is a U.S. manufacturer of numerically controlled machine tools. The company has filed a petition with USTR which alleges that the Government of Japan provides assistance to the Japanese numerically controlled machine tool industry in a manner which works to the unfair disadvantage of the U.S. industry.

The special working group has concluded that the U.S. numerically controlled machine tool industry is damaged by various Japanese practices designed to support their numerically controlled machine tool industry at the expense of ours.

There are reportedly two types of actions you can take:

--Section 103 of the 1971 Revenue Act would allow you to deny the investment tax credit to purchasers of numerically controlled machine tools manufactured in Japan.

It is the unanimous view of the working group that this action should not be taken, rather they believe USTR should discuss the objectionable trade practices with the Japanese in an effort to seek some modifications.

--Section 301 of the Trade Act of 1974 allows you to determine that an act, policy or practice of a foreign nation denies benefits to the U.S. under the General Agreements on Tariffs and Trade (GATT), or is unreasonable and has an adverse impact on U.S. commercial interests. If you make such a finding under Section 301, you can take whatever action you deem appropriate to obtain the elimination of the offensive policy, practice or act.

Currently the special working group is divided on whether a Section 301 finding should be made and then whether action should be taken as a result. This issue will be discussed during the briefing.

This matter is being handled as quietly as possible since the case is being watched with a great deal of interest and is considered by some a test of whether the Administration is prepared to enforce U.S. laws regarding unfair trade practices.
