To thank the Commission members for continuing to serve and to outline what you expect them to do.

II. BACKGROUND

Since you established the Commission on January 3, 1983, it has held 28 meetings and received views from over 200 widely recognized experts. During this series of meetings the Commission was charged with reviewing our strategic forces, especially the ICBMs. This initial effort was concluded with the Commission's report on April 11, 1983, which proved to be a major bipartisan framework for strategic modernization and arms reduction.

On June 10, 1983, you extended the Commission until January 3, 1984. During this period you have charged the Commission to review on a periodic basis the progress made in implementing the recommendations contained in its report, with special emphasis on the Peacekeeper missile deployment, the small, single-warhead ICBM missile development and deployment, and developments in strategic arms control. Also, you directed that the Commission report to you from time to time as you may request. This is your first meeting with the Commission since the extension.

Opening Remarks

Strategic Modernization

- I am grateful to each of you for agreeing to continue as members of the Commission.
- As a result of the recommendations in your report of April 1983, I have provided the following guidance to the Department of Defense:
 - Improve, as a first priority, command, control, and communications for our strategic forces.
 - Continue modernization of our bomber force.
 - Continue the Trident II (D-5) missile and Trident submarine programs.
 - Expand Research and Development into all forms of defense against ballistic missiles.
 - Deploy 100 missiles in existing Minuteman silos with an Initial Operational Capability in 1986.
 - Initiate immediately the design of a small single-warhead ICBM. Such a missile should be ready for full-scale development in 1986 and potential deployment in the early 1990s.
 - A specific program should be undertaken to resolve uncertainties about silo and shelter hardness, and fratricide effects.
 - Different types of land-based vehicles and launchers, particularly hardened vehicles, will be investigated.
 - Continue R&D on Deep Underground Basing.

Comments to Congress

- In my letters and conversations with the members of Congress, I have made the following points:
 - Our fundamental goal is to seek agreements that would enhance security and stability by reducing overall force levels while permitting modernization of our forces necessary for a credible deterrent.
 - As modifications are made to our START proposal to integrate Commission recommendations, we will continue to seek stability at the lowest possible level of forces.
 - We do not seek a first-strike capability. The number of Peacekeeper missiles that we plan to deploy are, therefore, the minimum to assure effective deterrence and no more.
 - The small, single-warhead ICBM plays a central role. We are undertaking this as a major high-priority effort.
 - To draw out approval of the Peacekeeper missile or other elements of the modernization package only encourages the Soviets to delay negotiations while continuing their weapons modernization program.
 - The principle of a mutual build-down, if formulated and implemented flexibly, and negotiated in the modified START proposal framework, would be a useful means to achieve the desired reductions.
 - Any build-down concept must recognize the importance of modernization and the need to deal with asymmetries in U.S. and Soviet forces.

Modified START

- I now would like to highlight the new flexibility I have directed in the negotiations on START.
 - First, the previous constraint limiting each side to no more than 850 deployed ballistic missiles has been relaxed.
 - Ambassador Rowny has been given the flexibility to explore all appropriate avenues with the Soviet delegation.

- Third, work is nearly complete on our initial examination of how the build-down concept can be applied.
- We have, however, retained as a central element of our START position the 5,000 total ballistic missile warheads.
- I am firm in my commitment to take whatever steps are necessary to move towards an agreement involving significant reductions in the U.S. and Soviet strategic nuclear arsenals.

Direction to Commission

- Although the Strategic Modernization package has several elements, deployment of the Peacekeeper missile, development and deployment of a small, single-warhead intercontinental ballistic missile system including basing options, and developments in strategic arms reductions are the three areas I would like you to concentrate on.
- As you monitor the progress of these elements, I look forward to your continuing counsel.
- You must continue to consider carefully the views of the Congress as well as of leading authorities.
- As you start your next round of meetings, be assured that you have my complete support.

Discussion

- I would appreciate any comments that you have right now on the small missile and arms control. [Brent Scowcroft and other Commission members will make any comments they have at this time.]

Closing Remarks

- This meeting was very helpful. Again, I want you specifically to monitor the progress on Peacekeeper, the small missile and our arms reduction policy. I will meet with you periodically to receive your comments and advice in these three critically important areas. Thank you.
