I. PURPOSE

To thank these Congressmen for their efforts in behalf of the Administration's budget policies.

II. BACKGROUND

Congressman Phil Gramm (R-Texas), Congressman Hank Brown (R-Colorado), Congressman Connie Mack (R-Florida), and the House Republican Leadership have been working for a number of weeks to secure 147 signatures (enough to show veto strength) on a letter specifying selected appropriation and authorization spending levels that exceed ceilings which are largely based on the Administration's Fiscal Year 1984 Budget Proposal. The signers of this letter pledge to vote to sustain Presidential vetoes of measures containing these items.

It is felt that a renewed Presidential expression of willingness to veto excessive spending measures is warranted in light of the unsatisfactory outcome of the Congressional debate on the Fiscal Year 1984 Budget Resolution - a Resolution which calls for substantially higher domestic spending, higher taxes, and lower defense spending than proposed by the Administration. The existence of this letter is beneficial from the standpoint of demonstrating to jurisdictional leaders on the Hill -- in advance of the fact -- that selected vetoes can be sustained.

I. PURPOSE

To fulfill a request made by Jack Kemp to Jim Baker, that Mr. Kemp be provided the opportunity to discuss monetary policy with the President.

II. BACKGROUND

Jack Kemp, Chairman of the Republican Conference, is one of the most knowledgeable Members of Congress on the issue of monetary policy. Mr. Kemp has a tendency to be outspoken in stating his belief that many of the nation's economic ills are the result of an inappropriate monetary policy. Specifically, the Congressman believes that the Federal Reserve does not adequately measure the amount of money in the economy, which has resulted in a distorted or too restrictive monetary policy. Mr. Kemp has been more concerned about Fed policy in general than he has been about the chairmanship of the Federal Reserve Board.

Congressman Kemp has called for the development of a methodology to more accurately measure the amount and flow of money in the economy. He feels that the Federal Reserve should concentrate on achieving stable prices and seek to provide the financial markets with some surety in the arena of monetary policy.

Because Mr. Kemp is in a leadership position and his knowledge of economics is well-known, he can be influential with several of his colleagues. Mr. Kemp's position on the Appropriations and Budget Committees also places him in a position to influence Administration legislative initiatives. For example, Mr. Kemp opposes the additional contribution to the International Monetary Fund proposed by the President.

This meeting will provide the President with an opportunity to hear a Congressional perspective on the issue of monetary policy and will allow Mr. Kemp to completely air his views. (Today, July 13, is Jack Kemp's birthday. He is 48 years old.)

SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS FOR MEETING WITH CONGRESSMAN JACK KEMP (REPUBLICAN-NEW YORK)

- Jack, I'm anxious to have the benefit of your views on aggregate monetary policy. We recognize that the financial markets are nervous about monetary policy because of the linkages between money growth, inflation and interest rates as well as general concerns about the projected size of the federal deficit.
- Money growth remains the best variable on which to focus monetary policy.
- The primary goal of monetary policy during coming months is to facilitate recovery without reigniting inflation or inflationary expectations. This is appropriate and is the Fed's stated objective. But, again, it is equally important that the Fed not be overly restrictive so as to abort the recovery.
- We all share the goal of price stability. While we have made substantial progress, we need to work closely with, and in the long run, count on the help of the central bank to maintain price stability.

-- (Following discussion on monetary policy)

Jack, I need your help to secure Congressional approval of of the IMF increase. I know that you have some concerns and I am aware that a number of your colleagues are looking to you for guidance. We must have that increase if we hope to continue the progress we made in Williamsburg and to insure our ability to head off any potential international credit crisis.

The National Teacher of the Year Program, now in its thirty-second year, is designed to focus public attention on excellence in teaching. It is sponsored by the Encyclopedia Britannica, the Council of Chief State School Officers, and Good Housekeeping Magazine.

The States use varying methods in the selection of their nominee, including input from Statewide committees, local superintendents, State educational associations, and the involvement of teachers, parents and civic organizations. The person nominated by each State becomes the State Teacher of the Year.

The National Selection Committee reviews the qualifications of each State Teacher of the Year and a representative from Good Housekeeping then spends two to three days observing and interviewing each finalist. The final selection of the National Teacher of the Year is made by the sponsors and the Committee based on detailed reports of these interviews.

The 1983 National Teacher of the Year is Dr. LeRoy E. Hay. Dr. Hay has taught English, Theater Arts, and Futuristics at Manchester High School in Manchester, Connecticut since 1968. He was honored by the First Lady at a Rose Garden ceremony on April 13, 1983.

PRESIDENTIAL REMARKS: LUNCHEON FOR TEACHERS OF THE YEAR
WEDNESDAY, JULY 13, 1983

Thank you very much, and welcome to the White House. I think Ted will agree when I say there isn't a group who belongs here more than you, America's finest educators. Seeing you here today, I am filled with confidence about the preparation of our children and the future of our Nation. If I may improvise on a line from one of my predecessors: There has not been so much brain power, commitment and dedication concentrated in this one room since Thomas Jefferson dined here alone.

You know, I've given toasts to kings and queens in this room, as well as to prime ministers and presidents, but you're the only group for whom I've felt obliged to diagram my sentences.

I would like to congratulate all of you for being recognized as Teachers of the Year in your own States, and I know you will join me in a special salute to the 1983 National Teacher of the Year: Dr. Lee Hay. Behind each of your awards are countless individual children, whose lives you've touched, whose minds you've broadened and whose character you've helped shape. The knowledge, judgement and love you've shared will follow them through their lives, enriching all of us. On behalf of a grateful Nation, I thank you.

I also want to thank the Council of Chief State School Officers, the Encyclopedia Britannica Companies and Good Housekeeping magazine. Together, they've sponsored the National

Teacher of the Year competition for more than three decades, promoting and rewarding excellence in our classrooms. That's just the kind of cooperation and initiative we need more of if we are to get our education system and our country back on track.

Someone once said that a school is a building that has four walls and tomorrow inside. Our history has been a testament to that fact, our education system the key that unlocked the golden door of opportunity for our people. When our forebearers were throwing up makeshift towns across our wilderness continent, among the first structures they built were the churches, and then came the school houses.

But today the sparkle seems to have left the brightest jewel in America's crown. The recent report of our Commission on Excellence in Education exposed what it labeled "a rising tide of mediocrity" in education. According to that report, about 13 percent of our 17-year-olds are functional illiterates, and, among minority youths, the rate is closer to 40 percent. More than two-thirds of our high schoolers can't write a decent essay. The study indicates the quality of learning in our classrooms has been declining for the last quarter century -- a fact that I'm sure won't surprise many of you.

There's nothing the matter with our children, and I'd like to make plain once and for all -- there's nothing the matter with America's teachers. You are people who savor the sound of a well-turned phrase, and delight in introducing youth to Shakespeare, knowing that it was youth Shakespeare loved. You best understand how a mastery of math can help master life, how

science opens endless worlds to the imagination and how history teaches judgement and perspective. No one knows better than you the dangers of substituting those subjects with courses in drivers education and bachelor life. Many of you have been waving a red flag for years now, calling for more stress on basics and pointing out how society has discouraged some of our most capable people from choosing teaching careers. But your pleas were falling on deaf ears. It's time America listened to you again, respected you again, and rewarded your effort and excellence with salaries that will encourage our best young people to follow in your footsteps.

That's why Secretary Bell and I have been pushing hard for a national agenda for excellence in education, and one of the first items on it is the concept of merit pay for teachers. If we want to achieve excellence, we must reward it. It's a simple American philosophy that dominates many other professions -- so why not this one? There are plenty of outstanding teachers outside of this room. They are teaching in classrooms across America. What we must do is find them, promote them, and hold them up as role models -- not just for other teachers, but for our children.

There are many important jobs in American life, but I can't think of any more important than teaching. As I told a group of journalists recently, I remember the high school teacher who changed my life: B.J. Fraser. He taught me English and drama, but, most important, he channeled my boyish imagination in ways that set it free. I will never forget Mr. Fraser. I owe him a great deal. William Ellery Channing, an early American

clergyman, once said that it is a greater work to educate a child than to rule a State. What he said was right then as America set her first priorities, and it is still true today as we return to them. America's parents, administrators and officeholders must join with you in a new campaign for educational excellence. With your continued help and dedication and our renewed commitment, we can and will restore America's ability to educate all our children to the highest standards we know.

Thank you very much, not only for coming here today, but for dedicating your lives to our children and our future. Let me know how I can be of help to you. Good luck, and God bless you.

I. PURPOSE

To acknowledge and participate briefly in ongoing discussions/consultations with Republican women Members of Congress who met with you on March 24 to voice their concerns about and some solutions to the "gender gap."

II. BACKGROUND

On March 24 the Members made recommendations to you on several issues of importance to them. The issues covered were:

- o pay equity
- o jobs legislation and women
- o child care
- o pension reform
- o displaced homemaker
- o FY84 budget and women
- o child support enforcement
- o Equal Rights Amendment

Many of these items are addressed in omnibus women's economic equity bills, pending in both the Senate and House. After hours of internal deliberations, a presentation of many of these issues was made to you on May 24. No decisions were requested that day. You did, however, approve a child support enforcement reform package on June 14.

During a follow-up meeting that I had with the Members at their request on June 28, they asked for an opportunity to hear and discuss our views on their recommendations before you make final decisions. This meeting is to discuss two elements of the comprehensive women's economic equity bill -- pension reform legislation, which you said you would forward in the State of the Union speech, and child support enforcement reform. Future meetings will deal with other issues/concerns.

Even though you have approved (and Margaret Heckler has forwarded) child support enforcement reform legislation the Members have some reservations about our legislation and are requesting that we consider modification of our proposal. These modifications will be discussed (see attached brief) and a recommendation will be made to you by Mrs. Heckler at the meeting. We anticipate that you will make a decision on her recommendation in the presence of the Members.

Your acknowledgement of this process will reiterate your concern about perceived and real problems facing women and indicate your awareness of heightened discussion of the "gender gap."
