I. PURPOSE

To raise public awareness of the need for greater enforcement of child support.

II. BACKGROUND

The Administration has developed and submitted to the Congress child support enforcement legislation which has subsequently been introduced in the House (H.R. 3546) and Senate (S. 1691). Eleven other bills dealing with child support have been introduced in the House and five in the Senate.

Subcommittees of the House Ways and Means and Senate Finance Committees have conducted initial hearings on the subject.

The Census Bureau has estimated almost one-half of the men legally obligated to pay child support are in default on all or part of their obligation. It is also estimated that the non-payment of child support deprives the recipients of \$4 billion in support annually. This, in turn, places a greater strain on welfare programs, in particular, Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC).

The issue of child support enforcement has a direct relation to women, who as mothers, provide, in most cases, for the immediate care of the children.

S.J. Res. 56 designates the month of August as "National Child Support Enforcement Month" and thereby calls public attention to this issue.

PRESIDENTIAL REMARKS: NATIONAL CHILD SUPPORT ENFORCEMENT MONTH
FRIDAY, AUGUST 5, 1983

It is a shocking fact that over half of all women who've received child support orders receive less than what they're due. In fact, 28 percent of these women and their children receive no payments at all.

There are children in this country who are owed \$4 billion from delinquent parents. This is an absolutely unacceptable situation. Secretary Heckler has called it a growing national disgrace and I agree completely. A parent's obligation to a child is one which must not be abrogated. This is not only a financial debt, it is a moral one.

Unfortunately, this is not a new program. As Governor of California, I made sure our State had tough child support enforcement laws. I even came before the Congress to lobby for an effective national system to protect the welfare of our Nation's children.

Today, in proclaiming August as Child Support Enforcement Month, I hope to focus the Nation's attention on these children who are at the mercy of their thoughtless parents. Let us make it our national goal to achieve 100 percent collection from the absent, neglectful parents. August will kick off this drive, but let me say slack enforcement of child support payments will never be tolerated.

The Federal child support enforcement program itself can stand improvement, and I want to thank Secretary Heckler and the

cosponsors of our proposal for their diligent and compassionate work. We must reform the Federal child support enforcement system so that it can effectively serve the cheated children of America. I urge the Congress to pass the legislation we've introduced. We want those deadbeat parents to pay up and deliver on their responsibilities. I hope signing this resolution will draw attention not only to the problem but to the solution.

PRESIDENTIAL REMARKS: LUNCHEON WITH HISPANIC LEADERS
FRIDAY, AUGUST 5, 1983

Buenas tardes and welcome to the White House. It is a pleasure for me to have old friends here. And as I look out, I see so many of you who have been with me in campaigns over the years . . . well, let me just say to each of you, for all you've done, muchas gracias.

For you, who played such an important role in getting me here, it is even more accurate when I add, "Mi casa es su casa."

I remember when I first understood the depth of meaning behind that expression. I was Governor of California and we had experienced one of those natural disasters which happens when too much rain comes all at one time. I was visiting an area that had been hard hit with mudslides and there, in one house, standing in the wreckage of what had been his living room, was an older gentleman of Mexican descent.

He looked at me and even in the midst of his adversity his dignity and courage remained firm and he greeted me with that most Hispanic of welcomes, "Mi casa es su casa."

As a people, we are just now emerging from a time of great economic adversity and national uncertainty. Unlike the old gentleman I just mentioned, what we suffered was not a result of a natural catastrophe or something beyond our control. And it wasn't even a result of bad people or malice. No, our economic woes were a predictable result of years, perhaps decades, of irresponsible Government spending and taxing policies. With your

support we've changed those taxing and spending patterns and I am proud to tell you today, it's working.

When we got here, inflation was running at double-digit levels and had been doing so for 2 straight years, the first time in 60 years. We've brought it down to 2.6 percent, the lowest 12 month rate in nearly 16 years.

When we got here, the prime interest rate had hit 21½ percent. Carefully and slowly we've brought that down to 10½ percent.

After years of almost no growth and declining real wages, last quarter the annual growth rate hit 8.7 percent and real wages are on the rise.

Productivity is up. Factory orders up. Retail sales up. Housing starts and auto sales have turned around.

Now let me just say that this is not happening, as some would have us believe, by happenstance. We're restoring opportunity to hardworking people like yourselves to get America moving again. There's one way you can tell our program is beginning to work: They don't call it Reaganomics anymore.

We've managed to give the people a tax rate reduction and to start -- because this is a continuing struggle -- to get spending under control. But this is no time to let up. There are those who are constantly pushing to return to the disastrous taxing and spending patterns of the past. I hope I can count on you to stand with me to make sure that doesn't happen.

We can't let the people forget what it was like just 3 years ago. You can remember. Our people seemed to have

lost that optimism that is so characteristic of Americans. Some people were saying America's best days were behind us. Well, together we've turned the situation around and given the American people hope for the first time in years.

Before we have a dialogue, instead of just having me get up here and give a speech, I'd like to mention one other area which is vital to all of us as Americans. You, as Hispanic Americans, know well that our country had ignored Central and South America for too long. If we are to prevent the people of this important area from falling under the heel of Marxist dictators and spreading instability to our own borders, it will take a determined commitment. It will require economic and military aid, and national resolve. Let there be no question in your minds; we are dealing with an issue that affects our national interests. Moreover, alien philosophies are being forced on countries that are ill equipped to reject them.

And, so we're standing by our friends. We're using American economic and security assistance in the best tradition of President Truman: to protect the forces for democracy, economic opportunity, and peace against the expansion of communism. The difference is, President Truman was helping countries thousands of miles away. We're trying to assist neighbors only a few hundred miles away. If we run away from our responsibilities so close to home, it won't be our grandchildren, but our children who will pay the price. So I just hope that I have your support in what we're trying to do. It affects us all.

You, as leaders in the Hispanic community, can serve as a bridge to our understanding our neighbors to the South. I hope to work closely with you on this and other challenges we face. My representative, Cathi Villalpando, a young woman from Texas, will be keeping me up-to-date on your ideas and areas of concern.

We have many fine Hispanic Americans, like Cathi, who are playing major roles in this Administration. The number of Hispanics stands at 125 right now. But don't let anyone tell you these people are not being brought on board because of their ethnic background. They are hardworking and competent people, first and foremost professionals. So, we may like to point out that Hispanics are playing a significant role -- Hispanics like Joe Salgado, who comes from California, and has been brought to the White House to make personnel decisions -- we're glad to have them. They are fine individuals.

Dear Mr. President:

As you well know, last week we lost an important vote in the House concerning covert aid to Nicaraguan freedom fighters. In the vote of 228 to 195, eighteen Republicans voted against the Administration and fifty Democrats voted with us.

The controversy surrounding this vote will remain, not only because of the confusion surrounding the reasons for dispatching naval task forces to patrol both coasts of Central America and for increasing the size and duration of joint military exercises with Honduras, but in the context of partisan Presidential politics, which, unfortunately seems to permeate the atmosphere.

Please permit the undersigned, who support your policy in Central America, a few comments on the events of last week:

Timing: A military move of this magnitude, just before such a crucial vote in the House -- regardless of its justification -- provided endless debating points for Democrats intent on discrediting your Administration as "trigger happy" and likely to get us into a shooting war in Central America.

Justification: It is just now developing -- in confused and incoherent fashion -- that, indeed, there was justification for a show of force in the area, because of an ominous increase in Soviet bloc shipping of war material to Nicaragua! This was not the message conveyed in your press conference of July 26, 1983 which, in our estimation, sought to indicate this was a routine exercise in the region.

A lack of coordination seems to exist when, on the date of your press conference, Ambassador Jeane Kirkpatrick was asserting that our new military operations in Central America were in response to "a very clear and substantial escalation in the importation of heavy arms into Nicaragua this year."

On July 27, 1983, other Administration officials are quoted as saying the increase in our activities was determined after we learned in May that 1,200 Cuban military advisors and "six shiploads" of Soviet bloc arms had arrived over the past few weeks. Other reports indicate more shipments are on the way, and despite claims that their cargo is only grain and agricultural equipment, we know that weaponry is included.

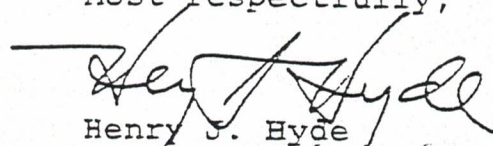
We realize that much of this information is classified and that a difference of opinion exists on how much of this information should be revealed. Our position, Mr. President, is that public and increased Congressional support for your policies could be developed, IF the American people are adequately informed as to what is going on in and around Nicaragua.

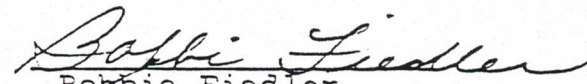
It would have been immensely helpful to all of us had you told of the Soviet buildup now going on in Nicaragua. Of course, we do not want you to compromise intelligence sources and we understand your dilemma. But if we fail to obtain the support of the people, then your policy of firmness and resistance to aggression will fail. The battle for popular support must be won if we are to prevail. It is

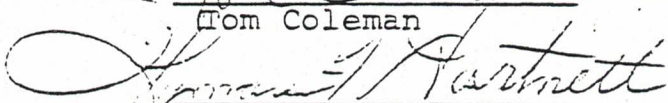
vitally important, Mr. President, that, in addition to Ambassador Kirkpatrick, you take the lead in educating Americans to the nature and extent of the threat now mounting in our hemisphere. The media won't tell our story -- only when you are on national television have we a chance of being fairly heard. It is therefore our hope that in the future, as much useful information as possible can be declassified and that you use this information in press conferences, as only you can.

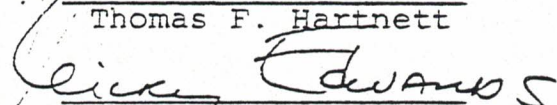
