SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS FOR MEETING WITH THE PRESIDENT OF THE AMERICAN CATHOLIC BISHOPS

I want to thank you and all the Bishops for the tremendous effort you have exerted in support of the tuition tax credit bill. Much more pressure than Congress anticipated has been exerted on this issue which is so vital to private education in this country.

Let me say that tuition tax credits is an idea whose time has come. This legislation is one of my very highest priorities. I believe that parents have the right and duty to have their children educated in accordance with their own values. The tuition tax credit bill which the Senate took up Wednesday will greatly assist parents to exercise this right by giving more equitable Federal treatment to private as well as public elementary and secondary schools.

— The federal government already gives direct and indirect aid to state-supported local schools amounting to \$593 per student per year.

— My bill for tuition tax credits, with credits eventually rising to \$300 per year, will make Federal policy fair and will recognize the immense contribution made to American education by private schools and the parents who support them. It will provide badly needed relief from the "double taxation" those parents now pay.

— It has been a long fight to get this bill this far. I will keep fighting until both Houses vote on this bill, pass it, and send it to my desk for signature.

— I look forward to working with you and with the National Conference of Catholic Bishops in exploring the ways that we can protect the sanctity of human life.

— The fight is now over the protection of handicapped new borns. We have various regulations under consideration at HHS to help enforce this protection. Also, the Justice Department is filing to get the records on Baby Jane Doe in Long Island. The Vatican statement last week urging treatment for this spina bifida infant was a very positive step and is greatly appreciated. I hope you feel free to coordinate with Surgeon General Koop on this issue.

— I know how concerned you as religious leaders are over the issue of peace and disarmament. I want to assure you that I will do everything within my power to secure a just and lasting peace that will place at the absolute minimum, if not eliminate, the risk of the horror of nuclear war.

— No one knows better than you that the American people are yearning for a spiritual revival and included within this is the revival of the American family.

We are exploring various ways in which to strengthen the family through protection of it from pornography, particularly the noxious evil of child pornography, possible changes in the tax structure to benefit the family and other measures. I hope you feel free to work closely with us on these matters which will benefit from the contribution you have to make.

— We would like to keep you as well informed as we can of this Administration's policies and we also would like to hear from you while these policies are in their formative stage. I have asked Faith Whittlesey and Bob Reilly to insure that the channels of communication are open at all times.

To meet with the Cabinet Council on Human Resources to receive a briefing on the demographic aspects of how social programs and other factors affect families in the Nation.

II. BACKGROUND

Fairness for families has been an organizing theme for this Administration. Eighty-eight percent of Americans live in families, with half that number having children under 18. This briefing is timely as Thanksgiving week is designated as National Family Week.

The briefing will address the following points. First, an explanation of the demographics of what is affecting families. Second, how various social programs, ostensibly designed for the poor, made matters worse. Third, the effect tax and spending policies have had on non-poor families. Finally, a discussion of legislative and administrative proposals designed to meet your goal of defending the American home.

FAIRNESS FOR FAMILIES (Synopsis)

Family stability is the cornerstone of this country. As President Reagan said recently, "Rebuilding America begins with restoring family strength and preserving family values." Both have been eroded by government meddling and shortsightedness. Both must now be reinforced.

Eighty-eight percent of Americans live in families. Fifty percent of these families are engaged in the important task of rearing children. Many of them are having a hard time doing it. And at the root of their problems are the liberal by-words "spend" and "tax."

Single-parent families have mushroomed from nine percent in 1960 to 22 percent of all families with children in 1982. Divorce still terminates one out of every two marriages. Just during the decade of the '70s, out-of-wedlock births rose from six percent to 10 percent among Whites and from 38 percent to 55 percent for Blacks. That rise, undoubtedly was due, at least in part, to the financial and leisure appeal of welfare.

In fact, in field after field, by rewarding poverty until it became competitive with work and a two-parent family, the welfare state undermined family cohesion and institutionalized poverty. Lower income Blacks were particularly hard hit. Unable to compete with government giveaways, Black males at the lower end of the

economic scale began dropping out of the labor force in near-record numbers, and at a time when middle and upper income Blacks had higher participation rates than comparable Whites.

The Great Society and the welfare mentality it produced not only failed to end dependency, they promoted it. And in the process, they deprived children of an optimal home environment and contributed to a whole array of social problems. Too often the results of poverty, divorce and out-of-wedlock births are reflected in higher rates of crime, drug and alcohol addiction, suicide, child abuse and even child prostitution and murder. Even liberal sociologists admit to that.

Moreover, when government wasn't offering handouts as father substitutes, it was taxing productive, working families for the privilege of having children. Hardest hit in this case are families in which only one parent is a breadwinner.

The dependency exemption, for example, which was \$600 in 1948, is now \$1,000. Had it been indexed for income growth, it would have equalled \$4,400 in 1981 and would reach \$5,600 in 1984. The ZBA or zero tax bracket is also insensitive to family size. Small wonder, then, that today a majority of women who have children under age six, whether married or divorced, are working outside the home. Small wonder that their labor force participation rate almost equals that of all adult women, 53 percent. Meeting the challenge

of a career may be one motivating force in this, but making ends meet is certainly another.

In fact, between 1948, when the government valued childrearing, and 1984, if present laws and trends continue, the tax burdens of single persons and married couples without children will rise at a rate of just under five percent of income. But unless changes are made, increases in the tax burden of households with children will range from 8.3 to 10.1 percent.

In the rural past, children were hands to work as well as mouths to feed. Having children was a form of social security and medicare, both of which the government now assures. Today, however, the family that rears a number of children is not investing in its own future, it's investing in society's future.

Generally speaking, parents invest \$100,000 in each child from birth to college graduation. Society, on the other hand, as a result of 12 years of "free" education and dependent exemptions, invests approximately \$28,500. In return, the family, aside from the love and sense of continuity a child provides, receives virtually nothing. Meanwhile, society receives, among other things, an estimated \$350,000 in taxes.

Maybe that's why the birth rate in this country has been below the 2.1 replacement level for a dozen years. Maybe that's why the Baby Boom generation, media hype to the contrary, has produced a Baby Bust. Plainly, the only children whose births the liberal

policies of the Great Society encouraged were those born out of wedlock and into welfare. Yet society has an enormous stake in the willingness of parents to raise the next generation and raise it well. Where else will this nation find the necessary manpower for business, for industry, for the military? Where else will it find taxpayers to meet the next century's social security and medicare bills?

President Reagan has made a good beginning in calling attention to the importance of the family and the current plight of the family. Moreover, his Administration has made a good beginning in addressing the needs of the family. By reducing inflation and direct taxation, by enforcing court-ordered child support, by increasing tax credits for child care and by attacking drug addiction and crime, it has begun the task of shoring up the family for all families. It must continue to expand its efforts, because the well-being of families is the key social issue in the United States.

The Baby Boom generation that has been, and will continue to be, the driving force in American demographic change is getting older. Seventy-four million strong, most are now in the center of their household forming and parenting years. The decisions they make now will profoundly influence the size and the quality of the next generation of Americans. The decisions they make now will, in fact, determine this nation's future.

Elements for a Family Program

- o Taxation: Raise the income tax dependency exemption and the earned income tax credit.
- o Housing: First-time home purchase tax credit (with a sunset clause).
- o Welfare Reform: Increase enforcement of child support; workfare (as already proposed).
- o Adoption: Require adoption to be considered as an option in government-financed counselling centers.
- o Alternatives to early motherhood for teenage girls in poor neighborhoods: schooling, counselling (to postpone premature sex), adoption, work experience.
- o Education: Tuition tax credits; education savings accounts.

Good morning. As an alumnus of the Council of State Governments, I am delighted to join you in celebrating the golden anniversary of your organization.

I wish I could be with you personally because I know I could see many old friends -- both from my time in State government, and since I've been here in the White House. And I'm glad that my Assistant for Intergovernmental Affairs, Lee Verstandig, will be at your meeting to talk with you about Federal-State relations.

But it was as Governor of California that I learned first hand of the good work of the Council. Your mission has been steady and firm: to strengthen the operations of the States individually, and the role of State government in the American Federal system.

Indeed, CSG remains unique in addressing the needs of all three branches of State government -- executive, legislative, and judicial. It was the first vehicle to allow these branches to communicate with those in their sister States.
