SIGNING CEREMONY FOR H.R. 3222, 1984 APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE DEPARTMENTS OF COMMERCE, JUSTICE AND STATE AND THE JUDICIARY AND RELATED AGENCIES

I. PURPOSE

To sign into law H.R. 3222, 1984 appropriations for the Departments of Commerce, Justice and State and the Judiciary and related agencies.

II. BACKGROUND

The Conference agreement on H.R. 3222 provides \$10.5 billion for the Departments of Commerce, Justice and State and the Judiciary, related programs in other departments and several independent agencies. This legislation provides \$10.288 billion in budget authority for discretionary programs. This figure is \$731 million over your Fiscal Year 1984 request. Although your request included no funding for either the Legal Services Corporation (LSC) or the Economic Development Administration (EDA), Congress has overwhelmingly supported continuation of these programs, providing funding in FY 1984 roughly comparable to the FY 1983 levels. In addition, the Congress voted to maintain the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) at the 1983 program level of \$171 million. The conference agreement does represent a \$263 million reduction below the level provided by the House Appropriations Committee.

This legislation includes several provisions favored by the Administration concerning the Legal Services Corporation. They include:

- tough restrictions on lobbying activities by LSC grantees;
- restrictions on class action law suits against Federal or state governments;
- limits on LSC funded aid to aliens; and
- changes in rules for denying renewed funding for grantees including shifting the burden of proof from LSC to the grantee.

Although these positive changes are made regarding LSC, the bill also mandates continued funding of existing LSC grantees unless action is taken before January 1, 1984 by an LSC Board of Directors confirmed by the Senate. This provision in H.R. 3222 may conflict with your constitutional authority to make recess appointments. The current LSC board was appointed on a recess basis. Democrats on the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee boycotted a mark-up scheduled to consider the eight LSC nominees pending before the Committee. The full Senate, therefore, did not have an opportunity to act on any of the nominees. A full slate of eleven LSC nominees will be transmitted to the Senate when the Second Session of the 98th Congress convenes. Their confirmation will be a priority item for early in the session.

Finally, this bill prohibits the use of NOAA funds for commercialization of the NOAA remote sensing weather satellites but does not prohibit commercialization of the land remote sensing system.

SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS FOR SIGNING CEREMONY FOR H.R. 3222,
APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE DEPARTMENTS OF COMMERCE, JUSTICE, STATE
AND THE JUDICIARY AND RELATED AGENCIES

- The bill I am signing today provides \$10.5 billion in funding during the current fiscal year for essential Federal domestic and foreign activities.
- Included in this amount are many program increases which I requested, including:
 - a \$191 million increase in funding for the FBI, Immigration Service and Drug Enforcement Agency, to continue our efforts to step up the campaign against drug smuggling and organized crime;
 - an \$82 million increase for the United States Information Agency, which will promote our efforts to carry the message of freedom to the captive nations of the earth;
 - an additional \$60 million for legal activities in the Justice Department, to ensure that the Government is in position to vigorously prosecute cases and defend the financial interests of the taxpayers; and
 - an added \$80 million for State Department activities that will assist us in seeking diplomatic solutions to the many troubles confronting the world.
- Of course, no bill is perfect, and in this case there are a number of program increases included in the bill that we didn't request:

- The funding levels for a number of Commerce Department programs, ranging from the Economic Development Administration to the weather service, are nearly \$470 million more than requested.
- Although I did not request funding for the Legal Services Corporation, I am encouraged that the bill at least provides sensible restrictions that will prevent many of the abuses that have plagued the program in the past. I hasten to add that the Administration agreed to these LSC provisions only with the understanding that the LSC board nominees would be confirmed at an early date. The Corporation has been guided by a recess appointed board for two years. It is my strong hope that the Senate will act expeditiously to confirm an eleven member board as early as possible in the Second Session of the 98th Congress.
- Despite these problems, this bill represents a good-faith effort by the Congress to meet my Administration half-way in fashioning spending legislation that is, in the main, consistent with the need for continued spending restraint.
- The Congressional leaders who fashioned this bill deserve considerable credit for completing this difficult task.

Hello and greetings everyone. I'm sorry I can't be with you today. But I'm delighted to be able to speak to all of you who have come to the "KC 83" conference.

Nancy and I have known about the ministry of Campus Crusade for Christ for many years. And we've long admired its strong, healthy influence with both students and others. In fact, our own pastor, Donn Moomaw, an outstanding athlete and student leader at UCLA in the early 1950's, was one of the first young men to be influenced for Christ through Campus Crusade's work. He's just one of thousands who benefitted from their association with your organization.

I first met Bill Bright while serving as Governor of California, and I've been impressed with his ministry ever since. You get the distinct feeling when you work with him -- as I've been doing on The Year of the Bible -- that our Lord is using Bill in a very special way.

Even here in Washington, Campus Crusade's good work through the Christian Embassy and "Here's Life" is well known among Government leaders of both parties -- not so much in a political way, but in a quiet, constructive, spiritual way.

There has never been a time when our Nation and world were more in need of the word of God, more hungry for the tidings of love, forgiveness, and reconciliation-with-God-and-man brought by Jesus Christ. That was the message I learned from my mother during my growing-up days back in Illinois. I'm convinced it's our only firm rock in this world of constant change and danger.

I want you to know that I'm also a firm believer in intercessory prayer. And I'd like to thank you for your prayers as we in Washington struggle to act with wisdom in the difficult decisions we have to make.

Those decisions are very important, but the ultimate future of the United States of America really will rest on the kind of people we are before God.

You are here in Kansas City to grow in the same areas that count most for all of us. Your lives stretch before you. You

have an unlimited potential to serve the cause of good and make America better.

I am grateful that "KC 83" is being held, and I am grateful that so many of you from throughout the 50 states have chosen to devote several precious days of your vacations to being there.

Make every minute count. America needs you -- we need you very much.

Back then, I spoke to you about the need for less Government and more private sector involvement. I felt, and still do, that if all of us work together, we can restore the greatness of America without turning to Government regulations for answers.

Your National Food Brokers Association exemplifies America's entrepreneurial spirit. By taking risks, putting your welfare on the line every day, and carrying out your responsibilities with integrity and efficiency you are living up to America's best values.

I also want to thank your profession for showing us how individuals and business can work together for a greater good. Cooperation between manufacturers and brokers is essential for success in marketing and distribution. And as partners who provide quality products to consumers at fair prices, you ensure

that America's food distribution system will remain the envy of the world.

I want to assure Charlie Haywood and all your fine staff that you have the full support of the White House. We look forward to working with you in the future.

Let us pool our resources, organize our thoughts, and move forward together to a productive, rewarding 1984.

I urge you to participate in this worthy effort. The Food Bank is a private organization dedicated to serving the needs of the less fortunate. MONDAY, NOVEMBER 28, 1983

Good evening and greetings to all the members of the University of Nebraska football team, Coach Tom Osborne, Athletic Director Tom Devaney (Deh-van-e), and the thousands of Big Red fans celebrating with you in Lincoln this evening.

I wish I could be with you to share this moment of pride and affection you all feel for this magnificent team. The Cornhuskers are not just number one in the country, you're one of the greatest teams in the history of the country. But there I go already, not giving you the credit you deserve. Because I understand when Monster Back Kevin Biggers was asked, how good is Nebraska, he answered in all humility, "We're way beyond good. We're great, the greatest ever."
