MEETING WITH THE BIPARTISAN LEADERSHIP

DATE: Wednesday, January 25, 1984
LOCATION: Cabinet Room

I. PURPOSE

To welcome the leadership back to Washington for their second session of the 98th Congress, taking the opportunity to discuss Lebanon and Central America.

II. BACKGROUND

The Congress convened its second session of the 98th Congress on Monday, January 23, 1984. The session will be a short one, with less than 100 legislative days expected because this is a Presidential election year involving two conventions and several primaries.

The work of the Congress will likely focus on budget/deficit, major appropriations bills, foreign policy, and several outstanding legislative items -- including bills that we strongly oppose that are protectionist, budget-busters, or otherwise incompatible with your policies.

Today discussion will be concentrated on foreign policy, specifically Lebanon and Central America. Domestic issues will be forthcoming in the next few days, covered appropriately in your State of the Union, budget, and economic messages.

Lebanon: Republicans and Democrats are basically saying the same thing -- if we don't show progress, the Congress will back away from its support for the deployment of Marines in Lebanon.

Central America: Leadership Republicans urged that you wholeheartedly support a package to implement the recommendations of the Kissinger Commission. Key Democrats point out that such a package will be difficult to accomplish and will require a strong Administration push. Republicans and Democrats have expressed the hope that we will not allow conditionality (certification) to destroy the bipartisanship that is essential to legislative success of the package. While a new bill on this issue was to have been scheduled

this week, it was not and it is likely that the wording of the original bill, H.R. 4042, which you pocket-vetoed on November 30, 1983, will be revised to reflect elements of the Kissinger report. Speaker O'Neill and several key Democrats have expressed reservations about the military portion of the report.

BIPARTISAN LEADERSHIP MEETING

- It's good to have all of you back after what I hope was a good break from Washington for you.
- I know that the second session will be a short one in this even-numbered year with two conventions coming up.
- But even so, we have plenty of work to do and I hope that we can continue to work together in a bipartisan fashion on the big problems as we have done in the past.
- There are a couple of areas in which bipartisan action will be extremely important -- the situation in Lebanon and as we move to implement the Kissinger Report on Central America.
- George Shultz is with us today, and I'll ask him to give you an update on both of these.
- But before we go on, let me say that I look forward to this year. I believe we can work together to solve major problems and where we have honest differences, you can count on me to be a willing listener and willing to work with you to see if we can resolve those differences.

- Now, I know you are very concerned about the situation in Lebanon and I'd like to ask George (Shultz) to bring you up to date.

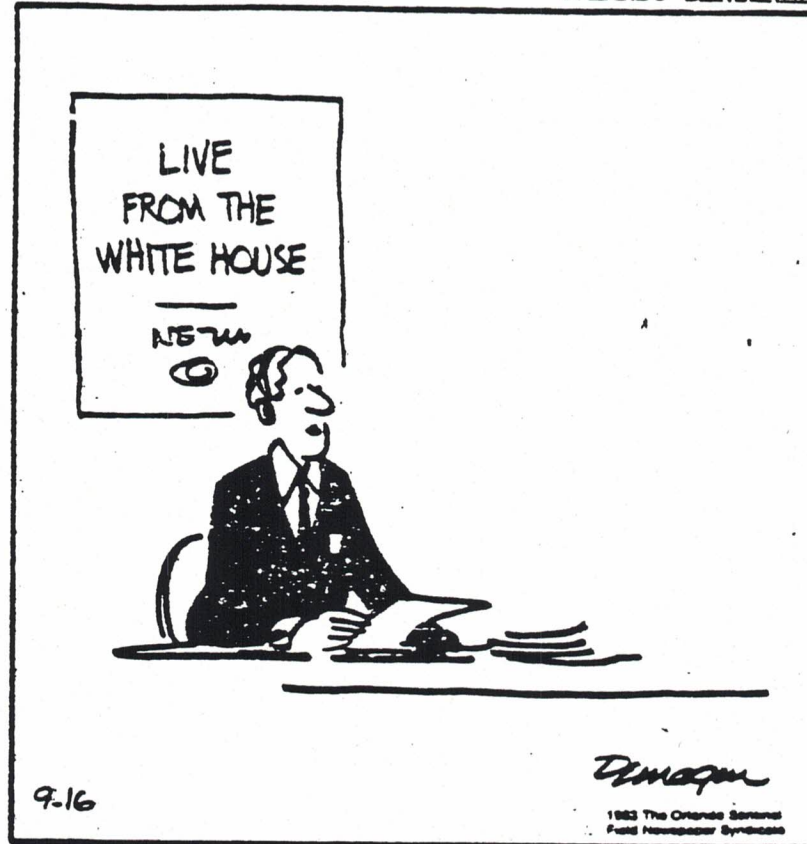
