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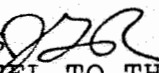

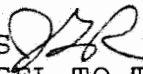

PRESIDENTIAL TAPING: HEISMAN TROPHY SHOW
MONDAY, NOVEMBER 11, 1984

Good evening. It's an honor to join you in celebrating this 50th Anniversary.

Back in the 1930's, Jay Berwanger of the University of Chicago was a powerful running back and a hero to millions of football-loving Americans, including a certain sportscaster named Ronald Reagan. In my mind's eye, I can still see Berwanger, those powerful legs propelling him down the field. In 1934, Jay Berwanger won a new award called the Heisman Trophy, and a great tradition was born.

The list of Trophy winners in the years since reads like an honor roll of American college football. There was Nile Kinnick of Iowa, a brilliant quarterback and a true patriot who gave his life during World War II. There were the young men of Notre Dame, players like Angello Bertelli, Leon Hart, and John Lujack -- men who, year after year, kept on going out there to win one for the Gipper. In more recent years, there have been players that would have made John Heisman proud, by showing the new heights of excellence that college football has reached -- young men like Herschel Walker and last year's Trophy winner, Mike Rozier.

You know, the history of the Heisman Trophy is wrapped up in the history of America itself. Back in 1934, you might have listened to Jay Berwanger's football exploits on a crystal radio set. Today, Americans can find out football scores on home

computers. But there are certain fundamentals about football -- and indeed about our country -- that have remained unchanged: loyalty, courage, team work, and a ceaseless striving for excellence that brings out the very best in each of us.

On this 50th anniversary of the Heisman Trophy, I join all Americans in honoring the 49 outstanding players to whom it has already been awarded -- and in eagerly awaiting this year's winner. Whoever he is, in receiving the Heisman Trophy, he will be taking up a place of honor in a great American tradition.

THURSDAY, DECEMBER 6, 1984

Fifty years ago, Jay Berwanger of the University of Chicago was a powerful halfback and a hero to millions of football-loving Americans, including a certain sportscaster named Ronald Reagan. In 1935, he won a new award -- the Heisman Trophy -- and a great American tradition was born.

The list of Heisman Trophy winners reads like an honor roll. There was Nile Kinnick of Iowa, a brilliant running back and a true patriot who gave his life during World War II. There were the great young men of Notre Dame -- Angelo Bertelli, John Lujack, and others who kept on going out there for the Gipper. In recent years, we've seen players set new standards of excellence -- champions like Earl Campbell, Herschel Walker, and last year's Trophy Winner, Mike Rozier.

And this year -- well, this year there's a young man who stands in a class by himself: Doug Flutie.

When Doug Flutie arrived on the Boston College campus in 1981, he was just a fourth-string quarterback. Since that time, Doug has put together the most prolific passing career any college quarterback has ever had. He's given us fans a host of moments to remember -- including a play, that will go down in football history, during the final seconds of this year's Boston College - Miami game.

With the score of Miami 45, B.C. 41 and just 6 seconds left on the clock, Doug took the snap. He dropped back, and with the

clock at zero he fired -- a sky-high 64-yard pass that arched into the end zone, and right into the hands of Boston College receiver, Gerard Phelan. B.C. won the game. Doug Flutie won our eternal admiration.

For 50 years, the Heisman Trophy has stood for loyalty, courage, team work, and a ceaseless striving for excellence. Doug Flutie, it's an award that you richly deserve.

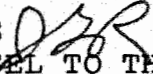

PRESIDENTIAL TAPING: TEXAS SESQUICENTENNIAL CELEBRATION
THURSDAY, MARCH 14, 1985

Hello, everyone -- or should I say "howdy, y'all"?

Ladies and gentlemen of Texas, it's an honor for me to speak to you as you celebrate the sesquicentennary of your proud State.

In 1821, the government of Spain granted Moses Austin of Missouri a permit to settle 300 families in Texas. Moses died soon after, but his son Stephen persuaded the newly-independent Mexican government to continue the policy, and in the autumn of 1821 the settlers began to arrive. They were hardy folk, and as they spread the word about the beauty and abundance of the Texas land, others travelled from throughout the United States, Mexico, and Europe to join them.

Soon, the self-reliant settlers began to object to Mexican rule -- especially to abridgements of the Mexican constitution by the military dictator, Antonio Santa Anna. In October 1835, armed conflict broke out. Santa Anna amassed an army and marched north.

One battle in particular will never be forgotten. In February 1836, the Mexican army attacked San Antonio. Texan forces, vastly outnumbered, withdrew into a Spanish mission -- the Alamo. Santa Anna trained upon that tiny mission the full force of his infantry and artillery. On the second day of the seige, Colonel William Barrett Travis managed to get a message through Mexican lines. It read in part:

To the people of Texas and all Americans in the world . . . I have sustained a continual bombardment

and cannonade for 24 hours and have not lost a man. The enemy has demanded a surrender at discretion, otherwise, the garrison are to be put to the sword . . . I have answered the demand with a cannon shot, and our flag still waves proudly from the walls. I shall never surrender or retreat.

A week and a half later, the Mexicans stormed the walls. Colonel Travis and his men were killed, but they had inspired all Texas -- and all America -- with their courage. On March 2, 1836, Texas issued its declaration of independence. On April 21, Texan forces, under Sam Houston, delivered to Santa Anna a decisive defeat. At last, Texas had won its liberty.

In the century-and-a-half since, Texas has grown vigorously and enriched our entire Nation. You've given us longhorns and cowboys, our country's richest oil fields, great centers of learning, breakthroughs in high technology, and a unique blending of American and Hispanic culture. Perhaps most important, you've set all of us an example of endless optimism and rugged self-reliance.

Recently, author James Michener interviewed a group of Texas real estate brokers for his forthcoming novel about the State. He told them he wanted one of his characters to move from Detroit to Houston, then become successful in real estate. He asked when he should have his character arrive.

One broker suggested a time in the seventies when real estate prices had risen. Someone else suggested still another date on which real estate prices, again, had gone up. Both those dates would have been sure things. But there's something about a sure thing that Texans find a little dull, and, after a silence,

a third broker spoke up. "I have it! Next Tuesday!" The room erupted into rebel yells and cries of delight.

"Next Tuesday" -- the phrase says it all. From those first settlers who came with Stephen Austin, to all of you today, Texans have always looked to the future with boundless confidence and worked hard to make that future good. Texans understand the importance of incentives to work, save, and invest. And Texans understand the importance of freedom.

So, ladies and gentlemen, give your State a Texas-sized birthday party. After 150 years of accomplishment, she deserves it.

SUBJECT: Taping: Marvin Stone's Retirement

Counsel's Office has reviewed the above-referenced proposed Presidential remarks. At several points in the remarks the President focuses his laudatory comments not so much on Mr. Stone as on U.S. News & World Report, raising the possibility that the remarks might be used to promote that magazine. Once the President makes a public statement such as "the unique combination of news and service articles in U.S. News makes it a must for people who want not only to read about -- but to understand -- the world around them" or "I read the magazine faithfully every Monday morning" there is little that this office can do to prevent those statements from being commercially exploited by the publication in question. Such commercial exploitation not only raises serious fairness questions (on the part, for example, of Time and Newsweek) but using the President in such huckstering is ultimately demeaning to the Office. The danger is not illusory, as evidenced by difficulties we have had with National Review promotions quoting similar Presidential statements. Although there is of course only a thin line between praising Mr. Stone and praising U.S. News & World Report, we recommend that the remarks be framed to do the former rather than the latter to whatever extent possible. Some specific suggestions along these lines follow:

1. Page 1, lines 3-4: change "your magazine has" to "you have;" delete "its" in line 4.
2. Delete the last sentence in the first paragraph.
3. Delete the last sentence in the third paragraph.

THURSDAY, MARCH 14, 1985

I wish I could be there tonight to join you on this special occasion. Has it really been 25 years, Marvin, that you've been at U.S. News and World Report? During that time, your magazine has earned quite a reputation for its straightforward, issues-oriented approach to covering national and international news. Every week, the unique combination of news and service articles in U.S. News makes it a must for people who want not only to read about -- but to understand -- the world around them.

As the editor since 1976, Marvin Stone has been central to U.S. News' special approach to reporting and analyzing the news. After starting his career on the police beat in Huntington, West Virginia, Marvin went on to cover four wars, interview scores of international leaders, and file stories from 35 different countries. The recipient of several distinguished journalism awards, Marvin Stone was also one of the four panelists for the 1980 presidential debate, and I must say, he asked some tough questions of both President Carter and myself.

The magazine just won't be the same without Marvin Stone, but I'm sure its next 50 years will make as positive a contribution to American life as the first 50.

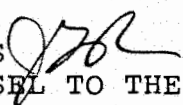
