# Marines in Downtown Washington Tackle, Hold Alleged Bank Robber

Two marines, one named Outlaw and the other Banks, teamed with several others yesterday in tackling an alleged bank robber in a tactical "sandwich" maneuver in which they recovered \$900 and held the suspect for police.

Inside the suspect's shoulder bag, police said, the men found two pistols and a homemade bomb that D.C. police later detonated.

"Response first and think later," was the word from Marine recruiting Sgt. Kenneth Outlaw, minutes after he tackled William M. Stoner, 41, of Dallas, who was charged with bank robbery in connection with the robbery of the Madison National Bank at 615 12th St. NW. "We probably would have done the same thing all over again."

The incident started about 10:20 a.m., police said, when a man entered the bank, handed a teller a note asking for large bills, and showed the teller a shoulder bag he was holding with a gun inside it.

The teller handed him \$900, and the man left. The teller activated an alarm, but in the meantime a young woman customer who saw the transaction followed the man outside. She ran up to four men, three of them Marine and Navy recruiters in uniform, standing outside the armed forces recruiting office next door to the bank, and told them a bank robber was escaping.

Navy Chief Petty Officer Richard James, 24, was talking with Outlaw and Marine Sgt. Rodney Banks, 31, both of whom were trying to persuade ex-Marine Venson Prescott to reenlist.

"The bank has just been held up and there goes the

guy who did it, the one with the hat on," the woman told the group, according to interviews.

The four ran around the corner after a man in a hat and grabbed him near 11th and G streets NW. The woman, whose name is being withheld by police, realized she had pointed out the wrong man, and then spotted another man walking hurriedly down F Street whom she believed to be the robber.

The man, who was trying to remove his shirt underneath a shoulder bag he had hanging from his neck, was at 10th and F streets when the marines arrived.

"It was kind of like a sandwich," Banks said. Prescott ran in front of the man and grabbed him low, Banks said, while Outlaw tackled him from behind. The operation was performed without words, Banks said. "We didn't need to talk about it," he said. "The marines are a team. We're trained to act together."

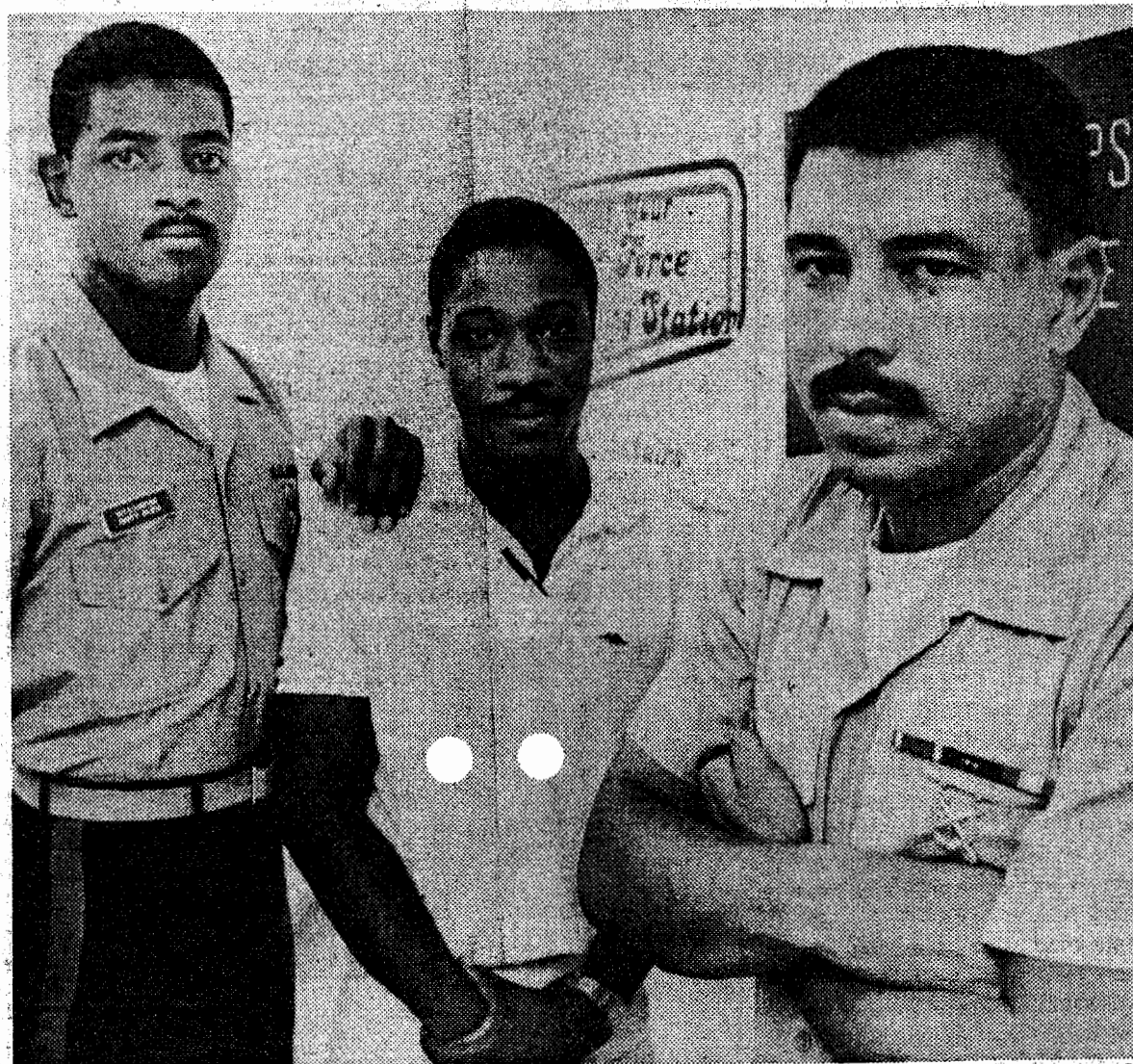
Stoner was held on the ground by Outlaw, a six-year veteran who lives at Bolling Field; Banks, a 12-year veteran of Bolling Field; James, of Southeast Washington; and Prescott, of 16th Street SE.

Inside the bag, police found two pistols, a homemade explosive device and \$900, police said. The D.C. police bomb squad later detonated the device, police said.

Stoner, who police said told them he had arrived in town only a day before the robbery, was ordered held on \$15,000 bond by a D.C. Superior Court magistrate. Stoner's lawyer could not be reached for comment.

For the recruiters, yesterday was a break from their humdrum daily work. "It's not a job," said Banks, quoting the Navy recruiting slogan. "It's an adventure."

Prescott apparently agreed. But he reenlisted as a Marine instead.

However, there are no pressing foreign policy reasons why the President should meet him. Such a meeting would not be given a high priority by NSC given the full schedule the President has this fall. My suggestion would be that if a social meeting would be appropriate, it should be considered in that context.

SUBJECT PROPOSED MEETING WITH THE PRESIDENT AND  
THE AGA KHAN

Through a personal friend of mine, Sheila McLean, Director of the Aga Khan Foundation, The Aga Khan, the spiritual leader of the Shia Muslims, has requested a dinner meeting with the President.

From my own knowledge of the Aga Khan and his social welfare programs in developing countries, I know he is an ardent proponent of private initiative and a "non-communal" approach to solving pressing problems in the third world. I think this would be the subject of his discussion with the President and on this I think they would find much agreement.

The <sup>A</sup>aga Khan is also apparently very urbane, well educated and well travelled. He would, in all probability, make an interesting guest. His request is for a social meeting with the President and Mrs. Reagan.

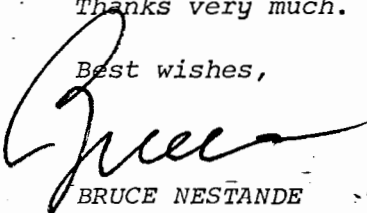
I'd appreciate your assistance, if possible.

# Key Reagan aide asks feminist to air views

**SANTA BARBARA, Calif.** — A top White House aide who is trying to improve President Reagan's standing among women wants to confer with Barbara Honegger, the latest symbol of Reagan's "gender gap" problems, a presidential spokesman said Wednesday.

Michael Deaver, White House deputy chief of staff, "wants to talk to her about her views," said Reagan spokesman Anson Franklin. He said Deaver would telephone the former Justice Department official after Labor Day.



Honegger

Honegger resigned from the department last week in a flurry of criticism about White House insensitivity to women's issues that put Reagan and his aides on the political defensive. Administration officials first played down her importance by calling her a "low-level munchkin" and saying — mistakenly — that she once had played the Easter bunny at the White House.

Reagan asked for the overture to Honegger in response to a note she wrote to the president while he was in San Diego last week.

"Ms. Honegger, in her note to the president, asked for an opportunity to express her views at the staff level," White House spokesman Larry Speakes said Wednesday, "and that is what Mike (Deaver) will do."

But aides stressed there are no plans to offer Honegger either her old job — a \$37,000 position

reviewing federal statutes to detect sex discrimination — or a new one.

Deaver, a trusted Reagan aide, informally has taken control of the White House program for outreach to women, a responsibility previously held by Faith Ryan Whittlesey, head of the White House Office of Public Liaison.

Deaver has met regularly with GOP congresswomen to discuss legislative issues and has sought the advice of Reagan's two female Cabinet secretaries — Transportation Secretary Elizabeth Dole and Health and Human Services Secretary Margaret Heckler.

Honegger spoke by phone Tuesday with an assistant to Deaver, aide Mike McManus, Franklin said.

Neither Deaver nor Honegger could be reached for comment.

Franklin also said a summary of administration activities in regard to women, as well as some recommendations, would be on the president's desk on Tuesday. Reagan, who will be back in Washington on Monday evening, will preside at a meeting next Thursday of his Cabinet Council on Legal Policy to discuss the recommendations.

Honegger was quoted Wednesday by the national newspaper *USA Today* as saying she had been asked to work with Deaver's panel. She said she had written Reagan two letters, one delivered to the Secret Service on Friday and another to Reagan's daughter, Maureen, on Saturday.

Dear Frank:

As a Republican Eagle and, in fact, the founder of the Eagle Program, I am concerned about what I understand is not being done by the Republican National Committee, while at the same time concerned about how RNC money is apparently being spent.

My principal concern is what appears to be the total lack of any evidence of a program for national "TV spots" at a time when recent experience has proven that they can be most effective. In Bill Brock's administration as chairman, testing of "TV spots" was conducted in the Fall of 1979, greatly assisting fundraising activities in which I personally participated. A national program of "TV spots" was conducted starting early in 1980 and, of course, continuing into the elections that year. Not only did the program help raise substantial money for the Republican National Committee, but it also, far more importantly, proved to be highly successful in helping to elect a Republican President, a Republican-controlled Senate, and many other Republican candidates at various levels, state as well as national.

At this point, in my opinion, the RNC should be doing everything possible through the medium of TV to emphasize the accomplishment of the Reagan Administration with the help of a Republican-controlled Senate.

Instead of spending money to do this, I understand serious consideration is being given to the purchase of an additional \$6 million office building and that money is being spent by an "International Division" apparently to help democratize the world.

I firmly believe the RNC is in business for one purpose and one purpose alone -- to help elect Republican candidates. A new office building -- to house other committees that raise their own money -- is not needed and will not help elect Republican candidates.

An "International Division" may have a lofty purpose, but again I fail to see how money spent in this fashion is going to help elect Republican candidates -- particularly, inasmuch as I understand the International Division has nothing to do with the work done by "Republicans

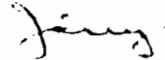

abroad" to get absentee ballots.

A well-tested, well-organized national "TV spot" program clearly did bring the desired results for Republican candidates at all levels in 1980 and it could and, I believe, would do the same again in 1984.

I hope you will accept this letter in the constructive spirit it is offered. I have worked too long for the Republican Party not to try to do everything in my power to be helpful.

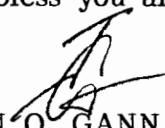

Friend -

I write to ask you personally to join with me in working for the passage of my "Peace Package," seven resolutions supporting innovative peacemaking efforts, which I introduced into the California Legislature on July 15, 1983.

I trust you already agree with me - that peace-making has become an urgent matter of life or death for each-and all-of us and is the most urgent human work of our times. Each of us Californians must increasingly invest ourselves in peace-making efforts, and encourage every effort to make peace a reality soon.

Only by our taking personal responsibility and participating in peace-making efforts, can we hope to secure a peaceful environment healthy for all human beings. This "Peace Package" provides occasion and, I hope, challenge, for our Legislature and for all Californians to take a leading role in efforts to secure peace.

The passage of these seven resolutions depends greatly upon your willingness and shrewdness in effectively developing public awareness and bringing it to bear upon your elected representatives here in Sacramento. Toward that end, I have included in this packet suggestions for mobilizing support for this Peace Package in your community. In addition, if you are part of a group or network, pass the word on to all of your associates. If your group or network has a publication, publish this invitation letter in it. If it is convenient, let me know of your efforts, and especially what progress you are making. I especially need to know of the positions you find your legislators taking on this "peace package".

I invite and urge you to join with me now in these faithful and practical efforts toward peace. Let us mobilize all Californians,

to enlist all their representatives, in a strong and deliberate series of statements for peace. The time is now. A difference must, and can, be made. We can, and we must, make this difference, right away!

I wish you well. Let me know if/when/how ever I can be of help.

Friend-

Let others know what YOU think and how you feel about peace. In my meetings with persons around California, I am often asked how an individual can make an impact on his/her government. The following are ways in which you can meaningfully participate in the democratic process. I urge you to undertake some of these actions to help ensure passage of the Peace Package.

A. WORKING IN THE COMMUNITY

1. Invest Yourself in this Effort.

It is important to you, and you are important to it.

2. Enlist All.

Your family, friends, neighbors, colleagues, students, clients, patients, customers, and other persons you have influence with in this crucial effort.

3. Mobilizing Organizations.

Have your group or organization support the Peace Package by endorsing/ratifying/adopting a resolution urging the California Legislature to vote in favor of it. Send that resolution to your representatives, and a copy to me.

4. Reach Out to Others...

Talk with others in any group that you belong to...talk to your neighbors...tack up a description of the Peace Package on your bulletin board at work...be inventive about getting the word out!!!

B. USING THE MEDIA.

The media is an important vehicle in communicating your message. In order for the Peace Package to gain maximum public exposure and passage in the legislature, it must receive high visibility in the media. There are some very basic, yet important tasks to be accomplished for the Peace Package to gain public attention.

1. Letters to the Editor

Newspapers print many of the letters they receive. Letters to the editor from groups or individuals show others in your community that there are community members concerned about the nuclear arms race and global peace. State the issue clearly and briefly, share your feelings and your reasons regarding the issue, including why it is crucial, and what people can do toward changing our public policy toward peace-making.

## 2. Press Releases

"Who, what, where, why, when and how" are the essential components of an effective press release. You can use a press release to announce a particular effort (such as the introduction of the Peace Package), the formation of an organization, a campaign, a rally or a press conference.

This packet includes a description of each of the seven resolutions in the Peace Package. Use the material as you wish. You could write an introductory paragraph to your press release--with a local angle--and then simply use these materials to describe the Peace Package.

Press releases should be structured in such a way to elicit interest from the media and its readers and viewers. Remember: radio stations, television stations, and newspapers receive dozens of press releases daily. You need to grab the reader quickly without sacrificing your organization's or your own integrity.

Make sure that the facts in your press release are correct. Include a name and phone number of a contact person.

Your press release will more likely be used if you follow it with a phone call, several days later, to find out when it will run.

## 3. Press Conferences

A press conference is a valuable way to build community support urging the California Legislature to pass the Peace Package.

Be organized, efficient and clear. The media is swamped, with insufficient time to cover the many events occurring. The press conference must be conducted in an orderly and efficient manner.

There must be preselected speakers who should identify themselves and who must be informed and able to field questions from the media.

## 4. Guest Editorials

Media outlets are licensed and must, under federal regulations, provide time for the public to speak out. Call the Public Affairs Director of your local station and ask how you go about it.

## 5. Opinion/Editorial (Op-Ed) Pieces

Many newspapers feature a section opposite the editorial page for citizen opinion. If you write well, prepare an inviting commentary on the Peace Package.

## 6. Radio Call-In Shows

Call in to programs discussing peace issues. Consider requesting an appearance on the show - if you are well-versed on the issue and can handle calls.

## 7. Public Service Announcements (PSA's)

PSA's on radio and television stations can communicate or advocate a particular position, idea or upcoming planned event. They carry your message through the media and they are free! The station has the right to refuse your message, so compose your message carefully. Messages with broader appeal (such as an announcement about a community event surrounding the Peace Package) is more likely to air.

## C. UNDERSTANDING THE LEGISLATIVE PROCESS

The Peace Package was introduced in the Assembly on July 15, 1983. It was assigned to the Assembly Rules Committee, which will hear it soon after August 15, 1983. When it passes out of that committee, the resolutions will be sent to the Assembly floor for a vote by all members.

After the Peace Package passes the full Assembly, it goes to the State Senate which follows a similar procedure. If it passes the Senate in the identical form approved by the Assembly, the California Legislature will be officially on record in support of each resolution.

To make an impact it is crucial that you immediately write, phone and visit your State Assemblyperson and State Senator, urging them personally and publicly to support the Peace Package. Through August 14, your legislators are out of session and may be contacted at his/her local district office. Beginning August 15, the legislators will be back in the Capitol. The first vote on the Peace Package will likely be the week of August 15.

The time to act/mobilize/coordinate is now. If you have any questions regarding our Peace Package, contact our office at (916)-445-4253 or (408)-288-7515. If you wish to obtain copies of the resolutions, call or write the Legislative Bill Room, phone (916) 445-2323, Room B-32, State Capitol; Sacramento, CA. 95814 and request AJR's 70-76.

## D. MAKING THE LEGISLATIVE PROCESS WORK - FOR YOU.

Your local legislator is elected to serve you and your community. If s/he is well acquainted with your position, s/he is more likely to make more pleasing decisions when voting on legislation which affects you.

### 1. Writing to Your Representative

Writing your legislator can be an effective means of informing her/him how you feel and how you think s/he should vote. Your letter about an issue will be noted, and could make a difference.

Be brief, keep your letter to one page. Be specific. Be personal. Use your own words. Identify the resolutions (AJR 70 thru AJR 76), your position, why you believe our Peace Package must be passed now. State something about yourself and the action you want the representative to take.

2. Calling Your Representative

It is more effective to phone your legislator and explain your feelings. Follow the procedures used in writing your legislator, talking with a staff person can be valuable, but talking directly with your legislator is much more valuable, and it is your right.

3. Visiting Your Representative

A personal visit with your legislator is the most effective: call your legislator's district office to make an appointment to meet with them. They are usually in their district office on Thursday afternoon and Friday and Saturday mornings. The Legislature is in recess now through August 14. Many of them may be in their district office during this period.

If after persisting you are given no other choice the opportunity to talk with a staff member can be extremely helpful. Good staff persons communicate your interests to your representatives.

Be fully informed on the issue; let your feelings show, and think and speak clearly and briefly. Keep the conversation focused. And feel free to ask the representative or his/her staff person what position s/he will take on the issue. Respect any differences, do not insult the legislator, send a thank you note as soon as possible after your visit.

## SUMMARY - "THE PEACE PACKAGE"

**AJR 73** urges the President and Congress to establish a National Peace Academy--dedicated to facilitating research, developing curricula, and training government leaders, military officials, educators and other public leaders from all over the world in the concepts and practices of conflict resolution and peace-making. We have employed our best minds and many billions of dollars in developing the science of war and destruction, bringing us to the brink of global catastrophe. We must now begin to invest our heads and our hearts, our talents and our dollars in positively developing the science and art of peace and survival. (This proposal is already introduced in Congress in both the Senate and House of Representatives.)

**AJR 75** urges the United States Senate and House of Representatives to support current legislation (introduced in the House of Representatives) establishing a United States-Soviet Union Student Exchange for Peace Program, involving 2,000 students from each country living in the other nation for one year in order to establish a positive force for peace.

**AJR 72** urges the President and Congress to establish a massive peace-making program called "Soldiers for Peace". Each year the United States would invite 100,000 Russian citizens from all walks of life into American homes for a year's stay; conversely, the Soviet Union would invite 100,000 Americans into Russian homes. The resulting personal exposure would inevitably break down barriers of distrust, promote mutual understanding of each other and the other's culture and further the establishment of a more peaceful coexistence. Ultimately, building trust is the only basis for feeling true security and believing in peace, and actually making peace.

**AJR 74** urges the President and Congress to establish a United States-Soviet Union Joint Crisis Management Center dedicated to improving the communication and the decisionmaking ability within each country during a crisis when nuclear war is threatened. The Center's responsibilities would include: (1) identifying the root causes of war, (2) developing methods to reduce the risk of accidental war, (3) developing accurate detection devices for nuclear detonation, (4) developing standard operating procedures, standard messages and specific procedures to be used in a crisis, and (5) designing realistic steps in conflict reduction and management. We are growing more aware that the greatest threat to peace lies not in the U.S.-Soviet military capabilities, but in our respective incapacity for crisis management and decision-making.

AJR 76 urges the United States Senate to approve a resolution calling for an immediate halt to the implementation and deployment of nuclear weapons, to develop a plan for a verifiable nuclear weapons freeze, and a reduction in all nuclear weapons possessed by the United States and the Soviet Union. This proposal has been introduced in Congress, and was passed by the House of Representatives in May on a vote of 287 to 149. Californians last November approved Proposition 12, calling for a verifiable bilateral nuclear freeze. This resolution furthers California's commitment and adds us again to the several states, many cities and thousands of persons already actively supporting the growing international effort for a verifiable bilateral nuclear freeze.

AJR 70 urges the President and Congress to halt the research, development, deployment, and funding for the MX missile - a first strike weapon system which after eight years, \$4.5 billion and 30 different basing modes, still has no viable plan for its implementation.

AJR 71 urges the President and the Congress to halt plans for the installation in West Germany of the Pershing II missile - a terrifying destructive, accurate "nuclear war-fighting weapon" which will have a flight time of only several minutes; it is perceived as a first strike weapon, and the Soviet Union has responded that deployment of the Pershing II will result in their adopting a "launch on warning system", subjecting the world to an even greater possibility of nuclear war occurring by a false alarm.

Dear Mr. Deaver,

If the President's properly harsh criticism of the Soviet Union is unaccompanied by substantive action, he will seem to be following the pattern of impotence that made Jimmy Carter a weak President -- and the United States a weak nation.

At the heart of our weakness -- our inability to match words and deeds -- is the grain deal. I offer this suggestion: (1) Cancel the deal. (2) Buy up the American farmers' grain, paying the same price. (3) Then distribute the grain, free, to needy Third World countries. At one stroke you will have punished the Soviet Union, erased a weakness in our relations with our allies, and made a bold and humanitarian gesture.

Second, let me suggest that you use the Soviet murder of airline passengers to rebuild support for U.S. rearmament and to expose the folly of a nuclear freeze and/or any hastily-sought arms agreements. Document, as you can, the historic Soviet contempt for human life in the purges, pogroms, and conflicts of the 20th century. I also would call upon the Scowcroft Commission to state clearly its opposition to a freeze and to undue haste in seeking arms agreements until our bargaining power is improved. A takeoff point for this statement would be use of the Soviet brutality as an example of what the commission meant when it warned us not to measure Soviet values and reactions by our own.

Third, where Central America is concerned, I offer the observation that the President, despite his reputation, is not communicating effectively. Many Americans would become supportive of administration policies if he said, plainly and bluntly, that -- while we will do everything we can to improve the quality of life in that region -- we cannot and will not permit the installation of Soviet bases that can be used to attack the U.S. This, at bottom, must be our policy. Now that we know, once again, what kind of a system we are dealing with, that knowledge must guide our actions to protect our citizens.

Finally, in your shoes I would oblige Congress to become a partner with me in future actions in Lebanon. We are, in a sense, trapped in a no-win situation that exposes our people to attack as Israel pulls back, physically and psychologically, from the consequences of its foolhardy invasion. Put the monkey on Congress' back in this election year as we seek means to extricate ourselves.

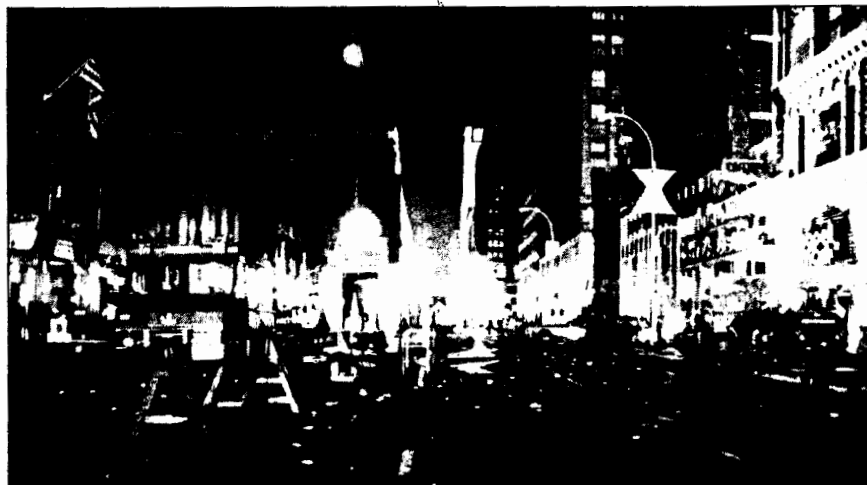

### The imagemakers' image

Madison Avenue's huckster image has been a target for critics for so long that admen have apparently become indifferent to the whole thing. Peterson Blyth Cato Associates, a marketing and package-design firm, surveyed more than 100 senior executives at packaged-goods firms with at least \$50 million in sales. Almost two-thirds (62%) rated their image problem as "negligible" and 48% said that "a negative public image is something that the advertising industry will simply have to live with."

### Diamonds by the numbers

A New York diamond firm has come up with a new protection gimmick for its wares—laser-cut identification numbers. Lazare Kaplan & Sons, founded in 1903, has developed a laser device that inscribes logo and an identifying number on its stones. The first devices have been leased to the Gemological Institute of America, and an international registry for the diamonds is being set up. By providing fast recognition of stolen stones, says Earl Simson, Kaplan's new scientific director, police, insurance companies and banks will all benefit. (There is another protection system, which involves photographing diamonds, but Simson says it is not as practical.) The laser-based system, which can also be

used on gemstones like rubies and emeralds, was developed by George Kaplan, son of the firm's founder (who is still around, at age 100). It will be sold to jewel registry services and jewelers, but the identification service is limited to stones of 20 points (a fifth of a carat) or more.

### What alien landlords?

If well-heeled foreigners are buying up choice U.S. farmland—a constant fear that no one ever seems to prove—what kind of profit harvest have they reaped? Not much, according to the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago, in the heart of the heartland. Farm prices peaked in 1981 and, by the first quarter of this year, had dropped 14%. Things did improve in 1983, when a small rise in the first quarter was followed by another 1.6% increase in the second, according to the bank's canvass of close to 600 agricultural bankers in its five-state district. Despite that, however, farmland values were still 5% below that of a year earlier. (As for the foreign-buyer myth, the Commerce Department says that only about 1% of American farmland is held by overseas owners.)

### Uncle Sam, housekeeper

One split trash bag can give a householder apoplexy, so how about a million at a time? That's what happened to Uncle Sam, and the Justice Department is suing Western Addition Manpower Services of San Francisco and its president. The government charges they faked 35 quality reports on \$3,189,789 worth of garbage bags.

**Bad enough one, but millions?**

(The company pleaded guilty to two false-reporting counts last fall.) More than 50% of the bags shipped to 1,000 government facilities, it's charged, were below minimum specifications and kept splitting. SUBJECT: PROPOSED EVENT FOR NETWORK HEADS

As you know, we have been developing Video Dataline - a collection of video tapes of PSI types of reports that have been shown on television (e.g.: The Kake tape or Charles Osgood's piece on the "Clean Team").

You may remember that the President was particularly interested in the potential for these tapes to be shown around the country to stimulate community action and to be used as models for replication.

I propose that we bring together the heads of the Networks, CNN, INN, Group W, Biz-Net, PBS, etc. at a White House ceremony in September. The schedule proposal is attached. At the event, we would:

- (1) Show a new 1/2 hour film of PSI clips received from local television stations that we are producing with Biz-Net. Biz-Net has donated approximately \$15,000 of studio time, editing facilities and talent, and they plan to air this film to their audience of standard TV stations, cable systems, and special subscribers which include chambers of commerce, associations, and companies. Group W has volunteered to reproduce 700 copies of the film which the National Association of Broadcasters, through Steve Stockmeyer, will distribute to their 700 member stations;
- (2) Announce establishment of Video Dataline, part of Data/Net, a computerized information network. Examples in the film, plus more than 100 more, will be available to potential users upon request;
- (3) Ask networks to continue to supply tapes to Video Dataline and also to share among themselves and their affiliates PSI-types of news coverage for the transfer of ideas among communities; and
- (4) Advise the group of the newly-formed President's Advisory Council on Private Sector Initiatives.

BACKGROUND: On May 5, 1982, the President met with broadcasters  
and told them that the power of the media in  
promoting community service and encouraging the  
formation of public/private partnerships to  
address local needs is immeasurable. He shared  
with them a community service news series produced  
by KAKE-TV, Wichita. The media has taken the  
President's lead and been very supportive. Local  
TV stations have directed much effort to  
participating in and publicizing successful  
community efforts. Many stations have made  
video tapes available for inclusion in the newly-  
established Video Dateline of their TV coverage  
of private initiative solutions to social and  
economic problems. The White House Office of PSI  
plans to make these successful examples available  
as models to other TV stations, associations,  
schools and corporations.

Video Dateline will be a part of Data/Net, a  
computerized information network which will  
handle requests from potential users. Attribution  
will always be given to stations and others who  
have supplied tapes. This will be a way of  
publicizing and sharing successful initiatives  
and recognizing the efforts of the TV industry.
