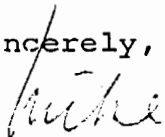

Dear Mike:

Several of your fellow Californians are working on a project that we feel is just and also could be of assistance to President Reagan should he seek re-election.

The prime objective is to have the records made by the American Indian, Jim Thorpe, re-instated in the record book.

These records, established in the 1912 Olympics, and the events surrounding their removal from the record books are set forth in the enclosed letter.

I am advised that a letter from President Reagan to Mr. Juan Antonio Samaranch, President of the International Olympic Committee, would go a long way toward achieving this goal.

I presume the President will participate in the opening ceremonies of the Los Angeles Olympic Games or do a broadcast from the White House.

I see the President announcing the restoration of Olympic honors to Jim Thorpe on such an occasion. Not only would the President indicate his devotion to fairness, but it also would please our American Indians to have their President play a major role in the elimination of this travesty that unfairly tarnished the image of one of their own.

Should you see the merit of this endeavor, I would be most pleased and honored to work with whoever has the assignment in handling the details to accomplish the project.

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Dear President Samaranch:

Thank you for accepting our phone call and relaying the decision of the International Olympic Committee to list Jim Thorpe as a co-champion for the decathlon and pentathlon for the 1912 Olympics.

As we have expressed in our previous letters, The Jim Thorpe Foundation and all of its board members are deeply appreciative of your leadership role in the reinstatement of Jim Thorpe. However, since Jim Thorpe was illegally stripped of his awards in 1912, we believe full reinstatement as the champion for the events he won so decisively is warranted.

We are grateful for your suggestion that a letter informing you of our position would be considered in your July meeting. We believe there are four separate reasons why Jim Thorpe should be fully reinstated.

(1) The illegality of the 1913 decision to strip Jim Thorpe of his awards is the strongest argument against a partial reinstatement. The Programme, Rules and General Regulations for the Fifth Olympiad stated:

13. Objections to the qualification of a competitor must be made in writing, and be forwarded without delay to the Swedish Olympic Committee.

No such objection shall be entertained unless accompanied by a deposit of 20 Swedish Kronor and received by the Swedish Olympic Committee before the lapse of 30 days from the distribution of the prizes.

(See enclosed copy of the rules). It was over six months after the close of the Games that Jim was stripped of his awards. If he had a lawyer (which he should have been provided since he was a ward of the government at the time), he would never have been deprived of his awards.

(2) Perhaps a case could be made for listing Jim Thorpe as a co-champion if there were strong opposition from the runners-up. All evidence, however, contradicts this position. Mr. Bie and Mr. Wieslander were reluctant to take the awards in 1913 and were insistent that if Jim Thorpe were exonerated they would be pleased to return them to him. Their families have carried on with their wishes. We have been contacted by a prominent Olympic historian, Mr. Bill Mallon, who has been working with Ture Widlund, the Olympic expert and statistician. Mr. Widlund has called the surviving relatives of Mr. Wieslander. He found the family members unanimously supported Jim's full reinstatement. Mr. Wieslander's son's Ake and Yngue; his widow, Lena; and his brother-in-law, Arne Rendahl, all believe that Jim Thorpe should be listed as the champion for the decathlon. Even Mr. Gosta Holmer, now ninety-one years of age, who would be moved to a fourth place winner has insisted that Jim Thorpe should be listed as the champion. Their attitude evidences the outstanding character of the Olympic competitors. No true athlete wants to win by default, especially when they were beaten so decisively.

(3) The Jim Thorpe case is not only a legal question, but also an ethical one. The strong grass roots support that has been shown for his reinstatement evidences the genuine concern for the injustice of the 1913 decision. The Foundation has over 300,000 signatures on our petition and numerous letters arrive daily supporting our efforts for full reinstatement. Enclosed is a small sample of recent correspondence offering assistance. The United States Government is issuing a commemorative stamp in 1984 showing how much Jim is honored in this country. As one Fort Worth, Texas reporter stated: "There is no statute of limitations on injustice, and a wrong committed almost 70 years ago is just as wrong today as it was in 1913."

(4) Finally, the incomplete reinstatement of Jim Thorpe is an insult to Native American Indians. As a ward of the government in 1913, Jim should have been represented by legal counsel when he faced the charges brought by the Amateur Athletic Union. No such assistance was provided and Jim faced the charges alone.

No group was more pleased by the reinstatement of Jim Thorpe than American Indians. And no group feels more slighted that he is not being completely exonerated. Jim is the number one role model for young Indian children and it is a travesty that his image should be unfairly tarnished.

The partial reinstatement is a slap in the face to a proud people who are especially sensitive to injustices. As a column in The CERT Report (Council of Energy Resource Tribes) put it, "We have been had again."

For these four reasons, we strongly urge the International Olympic Committee to fully reinstate Jim Thorpe and to let the record books reflect the events as they actually occurred in the 1912 Olympics.

Thank you Mr. President for presenting our case at your July meeting. Your courteousness and assistance are deeply appreciated.

Dear Mike:

Through you, I have been asked to extend the following invitation to President Reagan.

I believe I have been asked to assist with this request by Bud Meredith, President of the American Apparel Manufacturers Association, for this reason: in 1981 I joined Congressman Guy Vander Jagt and spoke in behalf of the President at the Association's annual meeting.

The AAMA's annual meeting in 1984 will be its Golden Jubilee taking place on Thursday, May 3 and Friday, May 4 at Opryland in Nashville, Tennessee. Naturally, he will be welcomed on either day. A luncheon address on Friday, May 4 would be ideal. It is my understanding that Governor Lamar Alexander and Senator Baker will attend.

I presume the President will be seeking re-election and I suggest that this would be a most important platform for him to restate his policies and goals.

Here are some facts that I hope will persuade you to schedule the President for this event:

"The apparel/textile/fiber complex is the largest employer of manufacturing labor in the United States, with one in eight such workers employed in that complex. The apparel industry is the largest employer of women in manufacturing in the United States. Also, the industry is the largest employer of manufacturing labor in the Old Confederacy and vital to the Southern vote.

"In Tennessee the industry is the largest employer of manufacturing labor. Practically every town and village in the state has one of the AAMA membership's factories."

Mike, should you need additional statistical material for Tennessee and other states, such as Alabama and Georgia, where the Association's members are the largest employers I can obtain such material for you.

The President's audience would be for the most part pro-Reagan. Not only would the top leaders of the industry be present, but also the leadership of the textile and fiber industries.

Among those who have addressed the group in the past have been Presidents Ford, Nixon and Eisenhower and in 1982 the keynote speaker was Vice President Bush.

Further evidence of the Association's support of the President is the enclosed ad which they had prepared and ran in the Wall Street Journal at Association expense.

Finally, I am sending also a brochure addressing the AAMA's Golden Jubilee - 50 years of service to the United States apparel industry.

This is an important group and I hope you will give serious consideration to having the President address them when you are preparing his May, 1984 calendar.

Please count on me as a resource and available to help in every way possible toward making this request a reality.

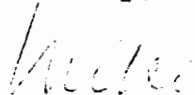

Information on the October 16 world premiere of THE RIGHT STUFF, the Ladd Company film adaptation of Tom Wolfe's story about America's entry into the space era, was sent to the White House some time ago. I am enclosing another set of information on the film and the exciting events surrounding its premiere in the nation's capital. 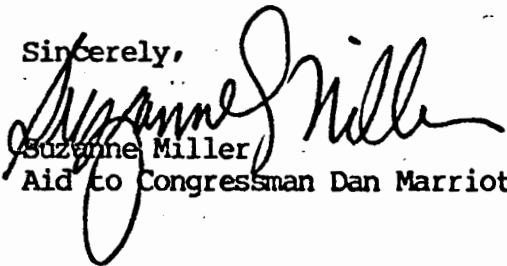
I am most interested in a position with the Reagan Administration, and in discussing this with several of my Republican colleagues, it was suggested that I might contact your office.

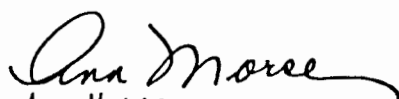
