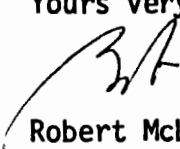
Dear Mike:

We have asked our mutual friend, Chris Stewart to hand deliver this letter to you as he leaves in about an hour for Washington.

You will note from the signature that as a Vice Chairman of the Los Angeles Area Chamber of Commerce, we have been asked to be Chairman of its 96th Annual Ball which is scheduled for Friday, January 20, 1984.

The event is the Chamber's main fund raiser of the year, with approximately 1,200 people in attendance at the Century Plaza Hotel.

In years past, the motion picture, the automobile, the airframe, and the sports industries have been recipients of the Chamber's special awards. Earlier this year, Roone Arledge, Muhammad Ali, John Wooden and Peter O'Malley were honored.

Next year's Ball will have three special features:

Dear Mr. President:

I want to congratulate you for your address to the American people on September 5th, in which you demonstrated the proper balance between toughness and moderation in the wake of the deplorable Soviet attack on Korean Air Lines Flight Seven.

I believe you have shown excellent judgement in portraying this tragedy not in terms of an East-West struggle, but rather as a serious breach of civilized conduct which all nations should condemn.

The next few weeks will demonstrate the Soviets' sensitivity or lack of concern regarding world opinion by the degree to which they own up to their responsibilities for this outrageous act.

During this period, as you develop appropriate United States responses, I suggest that you consider, in concert with our allies, preventing the Soviet Union from participating in the Olympic games by asking the international Olympic Committee to withdraw its invitation for the U.S.S.R. to participate, or, if necessary, by withholding U.S. visas from their athletes. Renewal of the invitation could be made conditional upon receipt of an appropriate response, including an apology and the payment of damages to the families.

Steps must be taken to ensure that atrocities of this nature are not repeated. That is the sentiment which gives substance to our prayers as we contemplate the sorrow felt by the families of the victims.

USTR and ITA have been negotiating with MITI for nine months in the High Technology Working Group on ways to reduce trade barriers in Japan and increase U.S. exports of semiconductors. Initial reaction to current Japanese proposals is positive. We will know the U.S. industry reaction shortly. If this is favorable, the President should consider visiting Silicon Valley for the following reasons:

1. Japanese Trade Negotiations

- Would convey to the Japanese President Reagan's personal interest and commitment to High Tech. A press release in advance of the trip would ensure that the Japanese consider this issue a top priority, and aid USTR in any final negotiations.

2. Domestic Concerns

- The President could take credit for a good agreement with MITI. If industry reaction remains favorable, then the President will have a unique opportunity to benefit from the work done by USTR and ITA.
- Silicon Valley has greatly benefitted from the economic recovery and employment is expanding rapidly. The President could effectively point to the positive results of his economic policies.
- High Tech has become and will remain a political issue. A visit could put the President out in front of this issue when combined with the announcement that the President has supported antitrust exemptions for research and development.

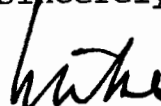

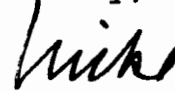

Dear Mike:

The Energy and Commerce Committee has been examining the issue of acid rain for the past two and a half years. Inasmuch as the Cabinet Council on Natural Resources and the Environment is currently reviewing the Administration's position on acid rain, we thought it might be useful to share with you our perspective on this important and controversial issue.

As a constructive, immediate measure, we would urge the Cabinet Council to recommend that EPA initiate a lake liming and fish restocking program to ameliorate the environmental damage caused by acid deposition. It is imperative that the Federal Government act now to restore our country's lakes to their proper environmental balance. In our view, lake liming will have positive, direct results. Furthermore, we are convinced EPA has the authority under current law to undertake such a program.

It is our understanding that the Cabinet Council is considering whether to submit an acid rain control proposal to Congress. Our hope is that the "politics of the moment" will not lead the Administration to rush to judgment on any such proposal. From a political, scientific, and economic standpoint, we do not believe that the timing is ripe for an acid rain control bill endorsed by the Administration. Having said that, we think that any "solution" to be derived through an emissions control strategy must be based on solid scientific evidence with some certainty that environmental benefits will be attained and will be commensurate with the economic cost.

In this regard, we must say that we do not believe that the ten-or-twelve state phased reduction programs being considered by the Cabinet Council fit this criteria. These programs are not supported by current scientific understanding of the acid rain phenomena. Nor can they assure that environmental benefits will occur and that those benefits will justify the multi-billion dollar cost involved to achieve the desired reductions. Finally, they could severely retard economic growth in the eastern half of the country at a time when growth is vitally needed. Accordingly, we could not lend our support to either of these control strategies.

Because of these concerns and others, we have submitted a list of alternatives to Bill Ruckelshaus for consideration. A copy of this list is attached. We believe these alternatives are superior to the options currently under consideration. We have asked Bill to have his staff analyze them so that the Cabinet Council can have the benefit of that analysis prior to the finalization of any new Administration position.

We hope this perspective will be of value to you. Our interest is to help ensure that the Cabinet Council is aware of all the available options and their implications. Please feel free to call either of us if you wish to talk about this issue further.

I have been asked by St. Vincent's to inquire whether or not a visit to the school by The President and/or Mrs. Reagan is possible.

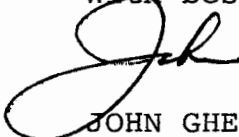
Ground breaking for the new school buildings is tentatively set for January of 1984. I recall that The President in his second term as Governor spoke to Bishop Diego Catholic High School here in Santa Barbara. The helicopter landed on the football field. St. Vincent's School is about a block and a half away. Perhaps a visit to both schools could be arranged.

Education appears to transcend both political and religious affiliation. More parents are trying to enroll their children in private schools, but it is costing more. My six year old is enrolled in the first grade at Marymount Catholic School here in Santa Barbara. The school is run by the parents, and the tuition for first grade is \$2,500.00 per year.

On another subject, I would hope you can persuade The President to cancel his Philippine Islands trip. It is fraught with danger. In listening to the news accounts of the "pros" and "cons", the reasons advanced for the visit are more theoretical than practical. The safety of The President under no circumstances should be compromised. The Philippine Government obviously cannot guarantee his safety. A Presidential visit at this time would not only stir ill feelings, but probably be the cause for more rioting with innocent people being hurt or killed. Our Government's relationship with the Philippine people is historical. The cancellation of the visit would not in any way jeopardize this historical allegiance.

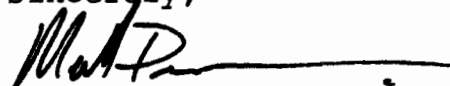
