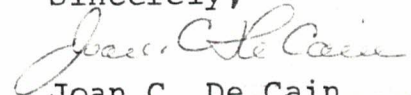
Dear Peter:

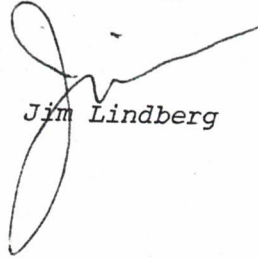

MESSAGE OF HIS EMINENCE, TERENCE CARDINAL COOKE, TO THE IRISH AMERICAN  
COMMUNITY, FROM THE ARCHBISHOPS' RESIDENCE AT SAINT PATRICK'S CATHEDRAL,  
NEW YORK CITY, SEPTEMBER 30TH, 1983

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Dear Brothers and Sisters of the Irish American Community,

At this grace-filled time of my life, I greet you in the name of the Lord Jesus, in the peace which He offers to us, and in the love of freedom and the common heritage which unite us. I offer to each one of you and your families my special love and affection.

In my years as a priest and bishop, God has given me the grace and the strength to serve His people of many beautiful national and ethnic groups. I thank God for this privilege and for the richness of the diversity of our Community of faith and love. I pray for fidelity to His sacred call, even in this time of serious illness.

I thank God especially that I have been able, with His help, to serve the people from which I myself have come. We, who are daughters and sons of Ireland, are descendants of a race which strives for goodness, truth and beauty and which has also known oppression, religious persecution, injustice and denial of human rights.

I am intensely proud of Ireland, our beloved Ireland, the small Nation which, despite centuries of suffering, "has never surrendered her soul." I rejoice in the tradition of faith and love, of learning, culture and freedom which we have received from the generations of her people. I pray that we will always remain faithful to the rich heritage which had been handed on to us.

Like you and so many sons and daughters of Ireland, I am profoundly grateful for the hope and for the freedom and opportunity which our beloved Nation, the United States of America, has offered to us, to our families, to those who have gone before us and to all who will come after us. When repression and starvation had all but crushed the spirits of our ancestors, they found here a welcome, a home, a place to worship God, to work and to be educated and to raise their families in freedom and in peace. May the Lord our God continue to bless our land and preserve it as a haven for the poor and the oppressed.

I offer to you, my brothers and sisters of the Irish American Community, my heartfelt appreciation for all you have been to our Nation and to our Church. Your contributions are ever so many - in education, in government, in public service, in the defense of peace and freedom, in the dedicated service of your sons and daughters who have entered the Priesthood and the Religious Life, in the close-knit and loving families in which moral and spiritual values are lived and handed on. For all this - and for so much more - I thank God with you and for you.

At this time of my life, I make a special plea to you. I make it from the depths of my soul. There have been circumstances which have caused misunderstanding and division among us, and I ask you now to work with all your hearts for healing, for reconciliation and for an end to violence here in our own community and in Ireland.

In a statement which I made last February, The Quest for Peace in the North of Ireland, I recalled the historic words of our Holy Father, Pope John Paul II, at Drogheda in 1979:

" I appeal to you, in the language of passionate pleading ... turn away from the paths of violence and return to the ways of peace ... I too believe in justice and seek justice. But violence only delays the day of justice. Violence destroys the work of justice."

I repeat now the call which I made then. May we work first for peace and reconciliation here in our own communities. Then may we help the situation in Ireland in very practical ways, especially:

- through our prayers for peace;
- through our assistance to families in need;
- through investment by our economic and industrial leaders in areas of vast Catholic unemployment and by substantial governmental assistance to depressed areas;
- and through a positive involvement of our government and public officials in insisting that Great Britain move toward a permanent, peaceful solution.

May I offer one last word to you. It is in a form of a farewell, for my physician has spoken very clearly to me about the nature of my illness.

I have absolute faith in the message of Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. I believe that He has indeed gone to prepare a place for us and that He calls us to eternal light and peace. I have tried to serve Him and His people faithfully and with love. I am confident of His mercy and His saving love. I beseech Him now to receive me, in the company of His Mother and all the angels and saints.

May Saint Patrick protect you. May Blessed Mary, the Queen of all Ireland, ever look upon you. And may Almighty God, the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit bless you forever.

Dear Friends in Christ:

How often we speak of "the gift of life," God's "gift of life" to us, His sons and daughters. What a beautiful phrase! How filled with meaning it is! In the Book of Genesis, we read of the origin of this gift: "So God created man in His own image, in the image of God He created him; male and female He created them."

It is at times when life is threatened -- such as times of serious illness -- that the Lord gives us a special grace to appreciate "the gift of life" more deeply as an irreplaceable blessing which only God can give and which God must guide at every step. From the beginning of human life, from conception until death and at every moment between, it is the Lord Our God Who gives us life, and we, who are His creatures, should cry out with joy and thanksgiving for this precious gift.

We are made in God's image and likeness, and this fact gives a unique dimension to "the gift of life." We have even more reason to be grateful. It is tragic that in our time, concepts which are disastrous to the well-being of God's human family -- abortion, euthanasia and infanticide -- are falsely presented as useful and even respectable solutions to human, family and social problems. Human life is sometimes narrowly viewed in terms of being inconvenient or unwanted, unproductive or lacking arbitrarily imposed human criteria.

From the depths of my being, I urge you to reject this anti-life, anti-child, anti-human view of life and to oppose with all your strength the deadly technologies of life-destruction which daily result in the planned death of the innocent and the helpless. Together we must search for ways to demonstrate this conviction in our daily lives and in our public institutions. In doing so, we must never be discouraged or give up. Too much is at stake -- "the gift of life" itself.

The "gift of life," God's special gift, is no less beautiful when it is accompanied by illness or weakness, hunger or poverty, mental or physical handicaps, loneliness or old age. Indeed, at these times, human life gains extra splendor as it requires our special care, concern and reverence. It is in and through the weakest of human vessels that the Lord continues to reveal the power of His love.

For the last ten years, I have served as Chairman of the Bishops' Committee for Pro-Life Activities in the United States. With God's help, I have tried to encourage and promote a Respect Life attitude throughout our nation. I have pleaded with you to pray and to be active in the many efforts for the enhancement and the protection of human life at every stage of existence.

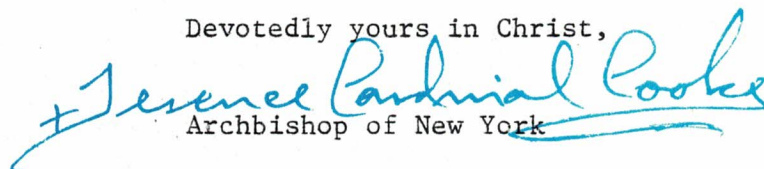
In October, as we observe Respect Life Month, I call on you to rededicate your efforts for the sanctity of all human life and to work to counteract the contemporary threats to life. I urge you to increase and to strengthen the programs in our parishes and communities for the poor, the elderly, the handicapped, the rejected, the homeless, the suffering, the unwanted, the unborn. I ask you to focus attention again on the Pastoral Plan for Pro-Life Activities and on the three elements of education, pastoral care and public policy which are necessary if we are to work for and defend the most defenseless members of society.

At this grace-filled time of my life, as I experience suffering in union with Jesus, Our Lord and Redeemer, I offer gratitude to Almighty God for giving me the opportunity to continue my apostolate on behalf of life. I thank each one of you, my sisters and brothers in the Archdiocese of New York and throughout our nation, for what you have done and will do on behalf of human life. May we never yield to indifference or claim helplessness when innocent human life is threatened or when human rights are denied.

With you, I entrust our efforts to the care of Our Lady who, from the moment of her Immaculate Conception to the present, has been the refuge for the poorest and most forgotten among God's people. I assure you of a special share in the prayerful offerings of my sufferings to the Father, in union with Jesus and through the Spirit of Love Who is ours in abundance.

May God bless you always and give you His peace.

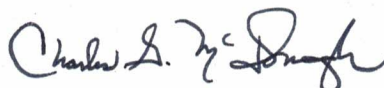
On September 30th, His Eminence Terence Cardinal Cooke gave a very beautiful message to his brothers and sisters of the Irish-American community.

At this grace-filled time of my life, I greet you in the name of the Lord Jesus, in the peace which He offers to us, and in the love of freedom and the common heritage which unites us. I offer to each one of you and your families my special love and affection.

In my years as a priest and bishop, God has given me the grace and the strength to serve His people of many beautiful national and ethnic groups. I thank God for this privilege and for the richness of the diversity of our Community of faith and love. I pray for fidelity to His sacred call, even in this time of serious illness.

I thank God especially that I have been able, with His help, to serve the people from which I myself have come. We, who are daughters and sons of Ireland, are descendants of a race which strives for goodness, truth and beauty and which has also known oppression, religious persecution, injustice and denial of human rights.

I am intensely proud of Ireland, our beloved Ireland, the small Nation which, despite centuries of suffering, "has never surrendered her soul." I rejoice in the tradition of faith and love, of learning, culture and freedom which we have received from the generations of her people. I pray that we will always remain faithful to the rich heritage which had been handed on to us.

Like you and so many sons and daughters of Ireland, I am profoundly grateful for the hope and for the freedom and opportunity which our beloved Nation, the United States of America, has offered to us, to our families, to those who have gone before us and to all who will come after us. When repression and starvation had all but crushed the spirits of our ancestors, they found here a welcome, a home, a place to worship God, to work and to be educated and to raise their families in freedom and in peace. May the Lord our God continue to bless our land and preserve it as a haven for the poor and the oppressed.

I offer to you, my brothers and sisters of the Irish American Community, my heartfelt appreciation for all you have been to our nation and to our Church. Your contributions are ever so many - in education, in government, in public service, in the defense of peace and freedom, in the dedicated service of your sons and daughters who have entered the Priesthood and the Religious Life, in the close-knit and loving families in which moral and spiritual values are lived and handed on. For all this - and for so much more - I thank God with you and for you.

At this time of my life, I make a special plea to you. I make it from the depths of my soul. There have been circumstances which have caused misunderstanding and division among us, and I ask you now to work with all your hearts for healing, for reconciliation and for an end to violence here in our own community and in Ireland.

In a statement which I made last February, The Quest for Peace in the North of Ireland, I recalled the historic words of our Holy Father, Pope John Paul II, at Drogheda in 1979:

"I appeal to you, in the language of passionate pleading ... turn away from the paths of violence and return to the ways of peace ... I too believe in justice and seek justice. But violence only delays the day of justice. Violence destroys the work of justice."

I repeat now the call which I made then. May we work first for peace and reconciliation here in our own communities. Then may we help the situation in Ireland in very practical ways, especially:

- . through our prayers for peace;
- . through our assistance to families in need;
- . through investment by our economic and industrial leaders in areas of vast Catholic unemployment and by substantial governmental assistance to depressed areas;
- . and through a positive involvement of our government and public officials in insisting that Great Britain move toward a permanent, peaceful solution.

May I offer one last word to you. It is in a form of a farewell, for my physician has spoken very clearly to me about the nature of my illness.

I have absolute faith in the message of Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. I believe that He has indeed gone to prepare a place for us and that He calls us to eternal light and peace. I have tried to serve Him and His people faithfully and with love. I am confident of His mercy and His saving love. I beseech Him now to receive me, in the company of His Mother and all the angels and saints.

May Saint Patrick protect you. May Blessed Mary, the Queen of all Ireland, ever look upon you. And may Almighty God, the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit bless you forever.

Dear Mr. Gotoh:

Thank you for your letter of September 19 regarding the United States' concerns about Japan's import restrictions on certain agricultural products.

The US and Japanese governments have been discussing these restrictions for several years. We believe that a number of the restrictions, especially the quotas, are inconsistent with Japan's GATT obligations. We appreciate that Japan is a major market for US agricultural products and understand that Japanese agriculture faces certain difficulties concerning expanded imports of particular products. However, it is our continuing belief that further expansion of this trade is in the long-term interests of both countries and that import restrictions of the type your government maintains -- such as those on certain citrus fruits -- are no longer appropriate.

As I have noted, the US and Japanese governments have been discussing these matters with a view toward developing mutually acceptable solutions to the issues involved. I would like to assure you that we will continue to pursue such discussions with this objective in mind.

Request for the Withdrawal of Demand  
for Import Liberalization of Agricultural Products

Japanese agriculture and farmers are encountering great difficulty at present, as U. S. Government is presenting to Japan the request to open the market for your agricultural products including oranges and citrus juice. We, people in industries of agriculture, forestry and fisheries, are as much embarrassed as indignant at this attitude towards us, as you are not aware that Japan is the biggest customer for your agricultural products, and also your government is pressing us for the liberalization of the market, shutting eyes to the fact that U. S. Government holds 16 unliberalized items and restricts the import of beef and sugar.

We also face the difficult situation in Japan with the overproduction of milk, pork, broiler chicken, chicken egg, apple and mandarin orange. For example growers are being forced to carry out the thinning to reduce 400,000 tons of oranges from this year's crop. Under these domestic circumstances if the import liberalization or the extension of quota of oranges and citrus juice may forcibly be realized all mandarin orange growers shall sustain serious damage and growers who may abandon their family-own land shall rush in succession.

We strongly hope your government will withdraw the request for the liberalization or extension of quota for agricultural products which is giving us all farmers excessive torment and uneasiness. In case this wish of us all farmers may be tramped by your government, the present friendly trade relationship in the agricultural field shall deadly be hurt. We sincerely hope to have your support to maintain the goodwill relationship between U. S. and Japan.

The news today is that you will sign a bill designating Martin Luther King's birthday as a national holiday.

As I see it, you would do such a thing for only one of two reasons. Either you think it is politically wise, or, you believe that the commemoration is merited by King's record.

You thumb your nose at the people who support you, while grovelling at the feet of those who did not vote for you, and never will. Surely you must know that in order to win re-election you must concentrate on the people who voted for you in 1980. In doing otherwise, you will only weaken your support. You cannot capture any more of the black vote in 1984 than you did in 1980.

Just four years ago, Jimmy Carter did everything he could to placate the liberals. However, they deserted him quickly once a more liberal candidate (Kennedy) became available. Do you really think, if politics is your motive, that a single black voter will choose you over Mondale or Glenn because of this. Far more likely is it that your 1980 supporters, while perhaps again voting for you, will be less enthusiastic in working the phone banks, stuffing envelopes, etc. If any of your advisers are telling you that this move is politically astute, you had better clean house before it is too late.

If we get this new holiday, we will have four national holidays within a seven week span. Federal employees, in my opinion, are not noted for their productivity even when they are on the job. Most of them act like the public is their servant, instead of vice versa. Another holiday is in no way needed.

While no purpose would be served in reciting a

litany of great people who are not similarly honored, suffice it to point out that only King, with the possible exception of Jesus Christ, will have a holiday devoted exclusively to him.

As I see it, there is only one way out. Tell Congress that you will authorize the holiday only if they vote to substitute it for an existing holiday. Tell them that they must first do away with Labor Day, or Memorial Day, or the Fourth of July, etc.

Admittedly, that would be quite a sacrifice. But, surely a man as great as Jesus deserves nothing less.

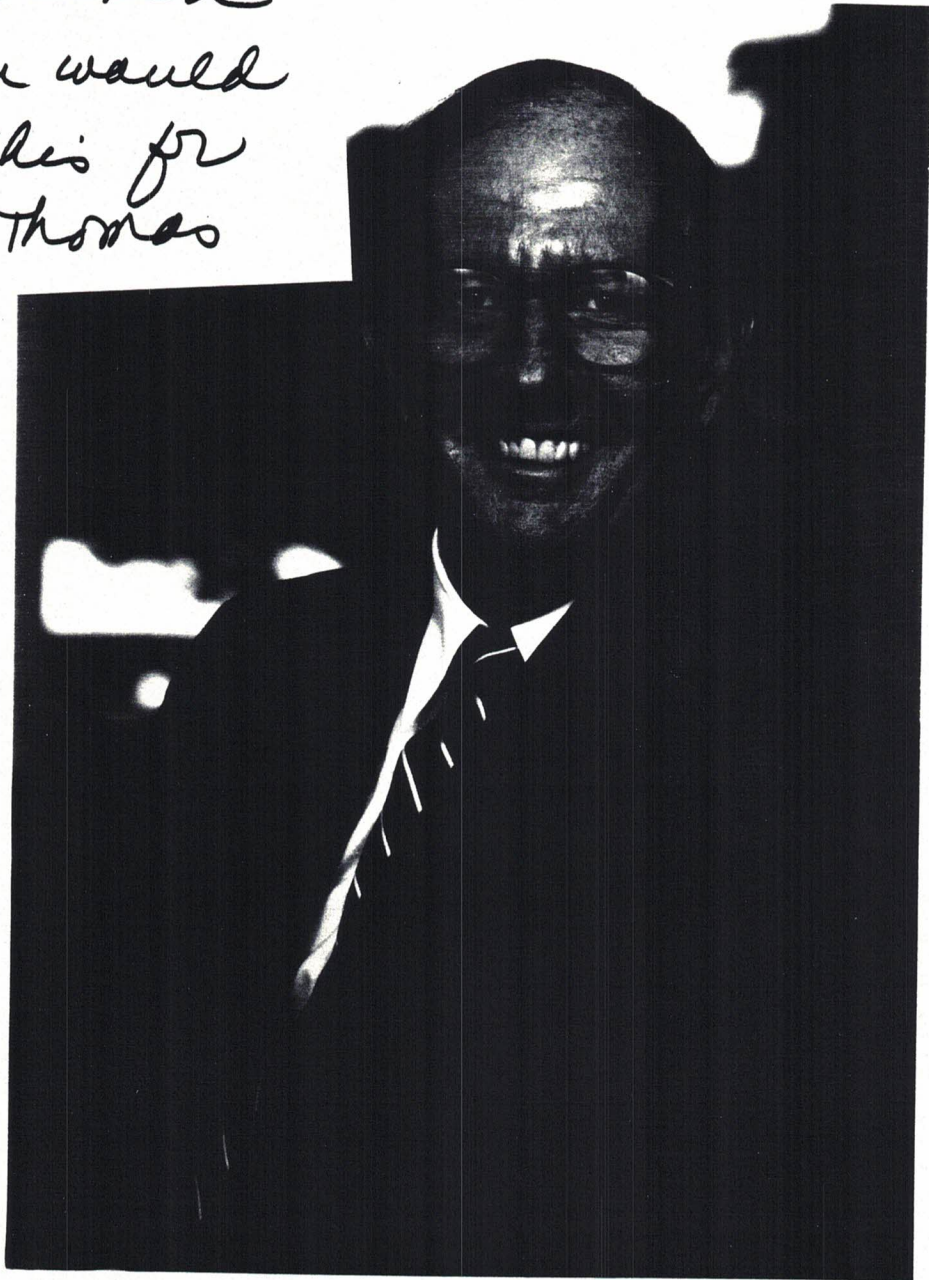
