
Dear Mike:

SUBJECT: Yokota Air Force Base Veteran's Day Event

I believe that we should reconsider the decision to eliminate the Yokota Air Force Base Veteran's Day ceremony from the President's schedule in Japan on 11 November 1983. US Forces, Japan includes a total of 53,260 military personnel, nearly 14,000 more American military than in Korea. The strategic importance of those forces was dramatically highlighted in September during the Korean Airlines incident. Further, the mission of US Forces, Japan is inextricably linked to the defense of the Korean Peninsula. A visit by the President to both would clearly emphasize that linkage to the world.

In addition to the strategic benefits outlined above, a Presidential visit to Yokota would boost the morale of the American military population substantially. Conversely, its cancellation would adversely effect morale. Finally, a visit by the President to an American military reservation on Veteran's Day is plainly appropriate. It could be accomplished with the addition of only thirty minutes to the President's schedule by streamlining the event to about twenty-five minutes. Since Yokota is directly along the proposed flight path from Hinode-cho to Akasaka Palace, the additional flight time if the President stops at the Yokota event would only be five minutes.







Mr. President:

This letter is written to express my strong hope that when you meet with Prime Minister Nakasone of Japan in November, you will give serious consideration to the role of Alaska exports in U.S. trade policy. Specifically, I respectfully request that you discuss with the Prime Minister the possible export to Japan of Alaskan oil, natural gas, and coal.

Toward this end, I would be willing to offer a portion of the State's royalty oil for export to Japan, as well as natural gas and coal, if to do so would enhance national trade policy. Thus, I envision a cooperative relationship between the State of Alaska and the Federal government as we pursue our mutual goals, including increased revenues, enhanced national security, and accelerated exploration and development of Alaska's energy potential. Some of the benefits which we believe would accrue if Alaska hydrocarbons are exported to the Pacific Rim are described in greater detail in the accompanying position paper.

We have reason to believe from our discussions that certain Japanese government officials and representatives of the private sector may well be interested in the export of Alaska oil. I will soon be traveling to Japan and Korea and, among other things, will be pursuing these discussions. If our present assessment of Japan's interest in State royalty oil proves correct, I would be willing to undertake serious negotiations concerning the sale of such oil. In return, I ask only that the Federal government assist us in seeking contracts relating to the sale of Alaska natural gas and coal.

We would be willing to consider the export of up to 50,000 b/d of State royalty oil. While this is a relatively small amount in comparison to Japanese imports, we believe that an export contract would establish an important principle which would have a beneficial impact on other elements of American trade policy. Of course, any contract relating to the export of Alaska oil must necessarily be contingent upon a change in Section 7(d) of the Export Administration Act, which as presently written is tantamount to a ban on oil exports.

Thank you for your recent letter outlining your thoughts on physician assignment under the Medicare program. As you know, the Medicare program does not require participating physicians to accept assignment for incurred expenses. However, patients are free to select their attending physicians, and ascertain the method of reimbursement prior to treatment.

The President shares your concern about the potentially embarrassing or awkward situations faced by the elderly in choosing a physician, and the Administration is concerned with improving information available to beneficiaries about physicians who accept assignment. For this reason, the Health Care Financing Administration, the Federal agency responsible for administering the Medicare program, is directing all Medicare carriers to compile information that indicates assignment rates for physicians submitting at least 100 claims. That information will be made available to the public at the Social Security District Offices, carrier beneficiary service points, and beneficiary organizations, when compiled.

I appreciate your interest in the Medicare program and trust this information adequately addresses your concerns.

Dear Mr. Deaver:

I listened with great attention to Sec. Heckler, a most articulate and very competent lady, on George Herman's Sunday telecast.

Since your name was mentioned in connection with studies now being made to save the Medicare system from ultimate bankruptcy, I hope, that thru you, I can get an answer to a sincere question.

Most elderly, sick people are intimidated by physicians. Fees, needless tests, lack of follow-up on procedures needed to determine therapeutic value or side effects of new Rx drugs, and many other wasteful and expensive charges are too frequently inflicted on both patient and the system.

Why cannot the people who are dependent upon Medicare be given a choice of physicians who will or will not accept assignment. The Government could quickly implement, by statute or regulation, an official list of such doctors.

The AMA and others in the diagnostic and treatment segment of health care will probably scream to high heaven, but this plan would reduce this portion of medicare costs by millions of dollars.

The patient should be entitled to a choice without embarrassment or conflict with the doctor. A sign on the office wall stating, "I (or We) Accept Assignment", would solve many current problems and be an act of political courage which would resound throughout the nation.


