Dear Senator:

I have a big favor to ask on behalf of Ford's Theatre. As you may know, each year since 1979, the Sun Company has given us the funds necessary to mount "A Christmas Carol". To date, the company's contributions to Ford's have totaled more than \$600,000.

Clyde Wheeler, who represents Sun in Washington, has been the individual most responsible for this very significant help. Clyde is retiring next Spring and he is concerned that we do something now to solidify Sun's continued support after he is gone.

Since Theodore Burtis, Sun's Chairman and CEO, has not yet seen "A Christmas Carol", we are making a major effort to get him down for an evening in early December. His calendar is clear on Tuesday, December 6 and Wednesday, December 7. What are the chances of talking you into taking Mr. Burtis over to the oval office for five or ten minutes with President Reagan on one of those days?

If you would undertake such a mission, we could program the President to compliment Mr. Burtis on Sun's private support of this historic theatre.

I know this is quite a favor to ask. However, on Tuesday I had lunch with three top Sun executives at their headquarters in Radnor, Pennsylvania and I went away with the distinct impression that we may be able to appeal to them for even more significant help in the future if we can pull this off. Specifically, we talked about the need for a five million dollar endowment fund for Ford's and about who is going to give that first million. Sun is a prime candidate.

If you can help, I will be eternally grateful. Please let me know as soon as you can whether or not such a meeting is possible.

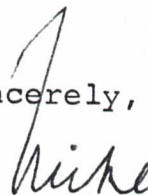

Dear Mike:

I want to bring to your attention a cause and an organization that are just now seeking the President's ear and that I think should be supported all the way. One of my partners here, George Doty, (to whom I am indebted for the enclosed materials), is a member of the Board of Directors of the American Federation for Aging Research (AFAR) and has shown me some of their work and national plans.

A basic tenet of AFAR is that much of the socio-economic pressure on our older Americans (and consequently on governmental budgets) derives from physical and mental ailments that could be prevented if we had an adequate research effort. Their objective is to stimulate and mobilize privately-funded research directed towards that end. The Federation is clearly our strongest champion of bio-medical research for the prevention and alleviation of the diseases and disabilities of the elderly.

AFAR has the backing of the most eminent physician/scientists and health-minded public leaders, as well as the 15,000,000 members of the American Association of Retired Persons. What they need now is a big move to broaden the funding support from the corporate sector. Since President Reagan has wanted to show his concern for our older Americans (28 million, of which more than half are women) and at the same time is encouraging social initiatives in the private sector, this AFAR program would seem timely.

A number of corporate executives on the Board of Directors of the Federation have expressed their conviction that leaders of American business and industry will respond to AFAR's needs if the appeal comes from the President of the United States. This, I see, is the view of William Kieschnick of Atlantic Richfield, Robert Beck of the Bank of America, Robert Roosa of Brown Brothers Harriman, Jack Valenti of the Motion Picture Association of America, and John Loeb, Sr. of Shearson/American Express, for example.

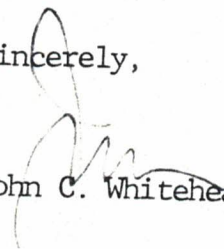

The AFAR request is for a Presidential corporate dinner where President Reagan's endorsement would energize corporate funding and responsibility. John Loeb, Sr. is serving as Chairman of this project for AFAR. It sounds like a good idea that would benefit the image of the President and of the corporate community while doing real service for the nation's most pressing health problem.

I understand that Congressman Bill Green is a strong supporter of this plan and accompanied AFAR representatives to a preliminary meeting with a Special Assistant to the President in September, and they are in touch with James Coyne's office to press the matter in detail. Their presentations have met with the warmest approval so far, but the magnitude of the research they need to fund requires the vision and help of The White House.

I recommend these people to you and to the President.

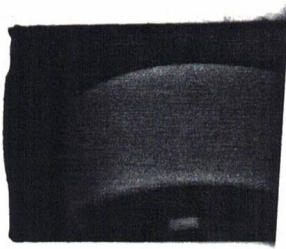
Ed Davis, the man I am recommending, would make an excellent director.

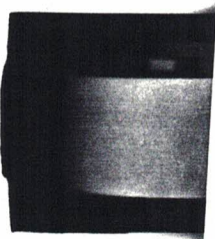

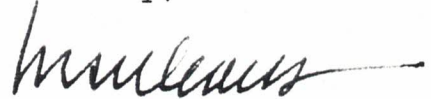
