Dear Mike,

The ghastly and cowardly atrocity in Beirut has impelled me to write you. Perhaps the views of a person you gave the privilege of service here will be of interest.

King Hassan delivered his views of the dangers for the United States in continued involvement in Lebanon. "A bag of vipers" is what the King said at the luncheon at the Waldorf.

I think, even here, I can pick up the drumbeat of Democrat opponents exploiting the bag of snakes for their own purposes.

Hassan's dim opinion of what can be done by anyone in Lebanon stimulates me to wonder . . .

In our quite appropriate anxiety to help "fix" Lebanon, are we overlooking a greater stake we might have in encouraging the emergence of a stronger North Africa--the Maghreb? With 50 percent of the Arab population in the Middle East (excluding Egypt), it seems to me that there is a potential here for much greater focus of American policy-makers.

Far be it from me to second guess the pros like yourself who are coping with America's global interests. But from the quieter corridors of diplomatic life here in North Africa, I have a sense that someone like you could encourage a look at fine-tuning the engagement of our priorities.

Writhing around with a bag of snakes might not be the best way to enter the re-election year...

There are no words to express the outrage of all decent people everywhere at the cowardly, despicable bombings in Beirut yesterday.

Americans recognize that we must be more determined than ever to meet our responsibilities in the free world. We, and our allies, will not allow the bestial acts of those who attempt to destroy order and reason to succeed.

Let us so dedicate this day that the sacrifices in Beirut yesterday and last spring will inspire us to greater effort for peace in the Middle East and throughout the World.

LE 24 OCTOBRE, LORS DE LA CEREMONIE QUI S'EST DEROULEE A
L'AMBASSADE AMERICAINE, A LA MEMOIRE DES SOLDATS MORTS A BEYROUTH

"Le meurtre de soldats Américains et Français commis de sang froid à Beyrouth, vient de choquer les nations civilisées à travers le monde. Le mépris absolu de la vie humaine que reflète l'attaque contre les casernes américaine et française est d'autant plus abominable lorsque l'on pense que ces jeunes hommes étaient des soldats de la paix participant à une entreprise constructive et non destructive.

"Ces jeunes hommes qui ont perdu leur vie dans cette attaque lâche et barbare, ne se trouvaient pas au Liban par leur propre et libre volonté, ou parce que les intérêts du monde libre étaient directement menacés, ils étaient là, comme leurs camarades s'y trouvent encore, pour tenter d'aider le Gouvernement libanais à mettre de l'ordre chez lui, donnant ainsi à ce pays déchiré par la guerre, une nouvelle chance d'émerger de la spirale de violence apparemment interminable.

"Cette attaque prouve, une fois de plus, qu'il y a ceux qui préfèrent le carnage et les souffrances à la paix et à la tranquillité. Ils ont raison lorsqu'ils proclament que leurs actes de terrorisme mettent en question nos raisons d'être au Liban: mais ils commettent une grave erreur en croyant que notre volonté d'y rester, peut être en aucune manière affectée par des actes aussi méprisables. N'oublions pas que des américains ont tragiquement perdu leur vie en Avril dernier, lors de la honteuse attaque de notre ambassade. Notre défense de l'inviolabilité de la souveraineté et de l'indépendance du Liban, est indispensable à la sécurité de toute autre nation sur terre. nous vivons une époque marquée par la violence, et malheureusement, ceux qui s'y livrent finissent souvent par souffrir davantage encore.

Notre vision, au cours de ces dernières décennies du Vingtième Siècle, est celle qu'ont les astronautes qui s'éloignent dans l'espace : la vision d'une petite planète composée de peuples et de nations interdépendants. Aucun pays n'est plus important aujourd'hui pour cette vision de nations indépendantes, que le Liban, ravagé à notre époque par tant de guerres successives. Là-bas, des soldats américains et français ont donné leur vie hier pour le rêve d'un monde de paix. Ces courageux jeunes hommes sont morts à Beyrouth précisément parce que notre planète est trop petite pour rester indifférente, trop petite pour permettre à la violence de dominer dans ce berceau de la civilisation du monde. Le Général P. X. Kelley, Commandant des Marines américains, qui se trouvait récemment au Maroc, est retourné au Liban. Nous nous joignons à lui pour rendre hommage aux jeunes soldats qui sont morts hier. Leur sacrifice suprême n'aura trouvé sa raison que lorsque le Liban s'épanouira à nouveau, en tant que pays indépendant, en paix chez lui et parmi ses voisins.

DECLARATION DU PRESIDENT RONALD REAGAN

"Il n'y a pas de mots" pour exprimer l'indignation de toutes les personnes décentes de partout dans le monde, devant la lâche et méprisable attaque d'hier à Beyrouth.

Les Américains reconnaissent que nous devons faire preuve de plus de détermination que jamais, pour assumer nos responsabilités dans le monde libre. Nous, et nos alliés, ne permettrons pas aux actes bestiaux de ceux qui tentent de détruire l'ordre et la raison, de réussir.

Rendons hommage en ce jour aux sacrifices consentis hier et au printemps dernier à Beyrouth, et qui nous inspirerons de plus grands efforts encore pour parvenir à la paix au Moyen-Orient et à travers le monde.

A note on Monthly Symposia of MPA

Blacks urged to adopt GOP ideals

LeGree S. Daniels, the leading spokeswoman for blacks in the Republican Party, presents the suggestion she is a walking contradiction, a political paradox.

Daniels, chairwoman of the National Black Republican Council, arrived in Portland Tuesday for two days of carrying the message that two parties are better than one.

The traditional allegiance of blacks to the Democratic Party amounted to virtual enslavement, she said. "Our votes are counted before they are cast," she said. "We are a slave at the polls for the Democratic Party."

She spent much of her time Tuesday defending President Reagan against charges he had ignored blacks and already had abandoned them as a potential source of votes in 1984.

"I know the Republican Party has not written off the black vote," she said at a luncheon for the black community sponsored by City Commissioner Charles Jordan. She noted that her own activities on behalf of the party bore this out.

She said the Democratic Party took the black vote for granted and that as a result, it received 90 percent of the black vote and gave back only about 10 percent of what blacks desired. "As long as we believe the Republican Party is our enemy, Democrats will take us for granted," she said.

Daniels became chairwoman of the council, the party's chief organization for blacks, in 1982. It was the culmination of a life in the Republican Party that began at age 15.

A resident of Harrisburg, Pa., she has

served on numerous state boards and committees and has been a tireless Republican activist.

The focus of the council has changed under her leadership, she said in an interview, from an educational role to greater activism in attracting blacks to the party.

Her views mirror the moderate to conservative Republican Party line: a commitment to the free-enterprise system, suspicion of welfare programs, and a conviction that blacks and the poor in general can pull themselves up without federal programs if they

are given the means to do so.

She said the neighborhood in which her mother lived until her recent death had received millions of dollars in federal aid, yet it was unsafe to appear on the streets at night.

"Washington, D.C., and all the programs it has given us does not have the answers," she said.

She blamed Democratic policies for contributing to the deterioration of black families and pushing blacks into dependence and passivity.

She was not specific about programs the Republican Party could support that would create jobs. But she radiated an unshakable conviction that the Reagan administration was proceeding in the right direction.

Daniels is acquainted with the Rev. Jesse Jackson, a possible Democratic presidential contender. She likes him but hasn't much use for his politics.

She believes his attempt to register black voters might eventually bear fruit. "Even if that should go against Republicans, they can't vote unless they are registered," she said, suggesting they might ultimately change parties.

Asked to review the Reagan administration record on behalf of blacks, she described money set aside for small businesses and for black colleges.

The attacks on Reagan irritate her, and exasperation enters her normally even voice as she defends him. "I don't care what the president does that's wrong," she says, her voice rising. "Nobody, but nobody, can be as wrong as he is painted."

Black Republican supports Reagan

After 50 years of Democratic waste in social service programs, President Ronald Reagan is helping people help themselves, the chairman of the National Black Republican Council said Wednesday in Springfield.

"Why is a black American standing before you, speaking for the Republicans?" LaGree Daniels asked while delivering the keynote address to the Oregon Federation of Republican Women at the Red Lion Motor Inn.

"I'm not far from where houses are boarded up, where children are without hope," said Daniels, a resident of Harrisburg, Penn. "I have lived with it, seen tax dollars not put where they should have been. (That money) did not reach out and help those on the bottom.

"The problems of urban development — crime and broken families — have remained the same since the New Deal," the 62-year-old Daniels

said. "We now have a minority enterprise program that lets people help themselves," Daniels said, drawing strong applause from the 100 people gathered to hear her speak.

Daniels said she and other members of the Black Republican Council support Reagan's promises to cut taxes, slow the rate of government spending and increase the pool of business capital.

"Democrats have made promises to every special interest," she said. "As Republicans, we can offer a political

economy that reaches to the heart of all Americans, not any special group, so each of us has a chance for a place in the sun."

Daniels said the political choices may not be as clear in 1984 as in 1980, when the country elected Reagan and a Republican Senate. "But the 1984 elections may well be the most important election America has ever had," Daniels said. "Let's keep the country moving toward the private enterprise direction."

Daniels rejected the idea that Reagan has set back the civil rights movement by firing members of the U.S. Civil Rights Commission.

"As a member of my community's U.S. Civil Rights Commission advisory board, I feel we will enforce the laws of this land," Daniels said. "The president has as much right to choose people to help him with changes as any other president.

"The president is doing something about civil rights but the message has not yet reached Oregon," Daniels said.

A visit with President Reagan

The years have been kind to President Reagan. This is my first observation about our 72-year-old president, after almost an hour alone with him.

The president received me in the Oval Office with his usual courtesy and friendliness. We sat together in two open-arm chairs in front of the fireplace. His great responsibilities, the tragic shooting he endured, do not show in his face or his attitude. He is a fine physical specimen. He was dressed neatly in a blue suit and dark blue tie, white shirt and plain black highly polished shoes. If he dyes his hair I certainly could not tell it.

I had not seen the president to talk to at length for almost three years, just before he was elected.

He is the first president in whom I have noticed so little change over a similar period of time. Even his views and objectives remain the same.

President Reagan believes his main accomplishment in office has been to get people to do more for themselves and for the federal government to do less. For him, private initiatives are important.

President Reagan seems comfortable with his job and with himself. He is difficult to categorize, because he does not think in extreme ways. He is not an ideologue, he does not get mad and he is a generalist who leaves the details of executions to others. He is practical and realistic.

The Oval Office looks pretty much the same as it did when occupied by previous presidents,

except for some outstanding small bronzes of cowboys by famous Western artists. A friend has given Reagan a collection of small bronze replicas of various kinds of Western saddles.

Although our talk was off the record for quotations on specific issues, Reagan's private opinions about people and issues do not differ greatly from what we see in newspapers and on television. Although everyone assumes Reagan will run for re-election in 1984, he obviously would like to hold off a specific announcement as long as possible because if he announces he will run, everything he does will then be regarded as political. If he announces he will not run, no one will pay any attention to a "lame duck" president.

In domestic affairs he feels that a large deficit is something to worry about and that more spending cuts are necessary, along with a new look at the automatic increases in the entitlement programs.

In foreign affairs, as with every president, the big question is the Soviet Union. I got the impression that Reagan's thinking is not unlike the thinking of former President Nixon as regards the Russians. This would indicate a continuing buildup of the U.S. military capability plus the placing of the missiles in Europe to create a strong bargaining position. If this kind of resolve and military strength gets the Russians' attention, negotiations for meaningful arms reductions could then proceed.

On other issues worldwide, the president is very sensitive to the economic problems and huge

debts of some major South American countries.

Reagan does not have strong opinions about world leaders he has met, although philosophically and personally he particularly likes Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher of Great Britain, and philosophically disagrees with the socialism of President Francois Mitterrand. As for historical figures, he particularly admires the late Winston Churchill.

Other things worth noting about Reagan up-close: In spite of his age, he seldom wears glasses. He is an optimist, a devoted optimist. His soft voice and easy manner, and the fact that he once was an actor, makes some people think he is not overly bright. I disagree with this view.

The president has a mind that sees the broad principles, the essence of the matter, what really is at stake. He has common sense and balance. He is not a hater. He has a good sense of humor. He is enjoying life and he finds satisfaction in being President of the United States.

Our 40th president is a remarkable human specimen, calm and competent, able to separate what is important and what is not important. With Ronald Reagan, what you see and hear is what you get. If he runs for re-election in 1984, as most people think he will, voters will have a Republican candidate to vote for who looks, acts and thinks the same as the fellow they voted for in 1980.

Dear Senator Murkowski:

I appreciated the opportunity to see you last Wednesday on the President's visit to Japan and Korea. As you are aware, the purpose of the President's visit is to forge a stronger economic and security partnership with these vital allies and the role of Alaska could not be more central in that process.

Energy, as you pointed out, is one of the key pillars of our future trading relationship with Pacific nations. We are striving hard in our discussions with the Japanese and Koreans to urge them to help develop part of our enormous energy base for export, particularly from Alaska. Increased energy trade can help reduce the trade deficit, bring in new capital investment from abroad and help put Americans to work. An important process was begun when the President and Prime Minister Nakasone began the US-Japan Energy Working Group and we plan to continue to give it high priority, both on this trip and in the future.

Thank you for bringing to my attention the need to have the President present the Senate Resolution expressing our gratitude for the Japanese role in the Korean airline incident. We greatly appreciate your effort in securing this important resolution which the President will formally present to the Prime Minister during his visit.



Dear Mr. Deaver:

This morning's Washington Post carries a front page article with the headline, "Grenada No Invasion To Reagan, He Calls It a Rescue Mission". I agree with the President and would like to share with you, my October 27, 1983 letter (attached) to A.I.D.

Since 1975, I have been informally working with grass roots citizens from several Caribbean governments. Our objectives have been to develop and subsequently implement strategies that are designed to enable the Caribbean to become a stable showcase for democracy. I was recently in telephonic contact with one of my associates residing in the Caribbean who will undoubtedly head a Caribbean government in the future. He shares my opinion that the President's actions in Grenada represented a "liberation" or "rescue". Like myself, however, he has concerns about future directions. For the Caribbean -- particularly the Eastern Caribbean, to remain free and become a showcase for democracy, greater emphasis must be placed on the opinions of grass roots individuals - their desires and aspirations. An effort like the recent Kissinger Task Force can only be effective if there is a parallel effort among grass roots.

I would appreciate any opportunity made available to help formulate a long-range plan for the area. There are potentials for "other Grenadas" within other Caribbean governments including Dominica, Antigua, St. Lucia and Jamaica. There are even greater potentials for building long-term stable democracies. We'd like to help accomplish this.

For your information, I am a member of the Republican Central Committee for Prince George's County, Maryland. I was originally referred to you by Nettie Douglass Washington. I am the godfather of her granddaughter, a descendant of Frederick Douglass and Booker T. Washington.
