After being here for ten weeks I find that Jeane and her staff are superb. What is concerning me more and more is the implementation of our State Department types. I feel succinctly the dream of my generation has turned into a semi-nightmare. We have the ability, we have the tools, and we certainly have the backing of the American public and our President, fostered by Jeane's strong leadership to let this place finally know what our ground rules are. You must be made aware, Mike, that this is an evil place for our country and we can do something about it but must address our own players first.

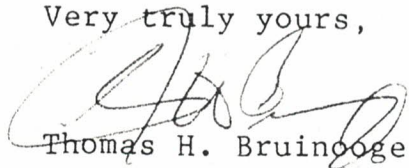

SUBJECT: CHRISTMAS ACTIVITIES

The Republican National Committee, through Working Partners, will be helping to promote a national food collection and distribution program. 200 county organizations will participate locally.

Sheraton Hotels in New York City is an example of what hotels will be doing across the country. They plan to feed 2,000 at Christmas, including homeless.

Food, Clothing and Toy Drive - White House and GSA employees are working with the United Way to help the poor and the hungry.

Hunger Huts - Across the country shoppers are encouraged to buy an extra food item to drop in a basket to help feed the poor and hungry.

The Department of Health and Human Services has signed a memorandum with the Defense Department permitting unmarketable items from military commissaries to be transferred to food banks. Foods are safe but have torn labels or dented cans. 129 food banks will be picking up food at 192 military commissaries.

The National Citizens Committee for Food and Shelter looks at public and private sector ways to help the hungry and homeless. They work closely with the White House Office of Private Sector Initiatives. Mrs. James A. Baker, III is a member.

Long Island Cares is a not-for-profit, anti-hunger agency in West Brentwood, New York founded by Harry Chapin, popular singer and composer, and now headed by his widow, Sandy. 500,000 pound of donated and USDA surplus commodities were distributed in one year to the needy. They serve 225,000 Long Island people in need with food through nutrition sites for senior citizens, soup kitchens, and day care centers.

Operation Christmas All Year provides low-income and needy families in Gordon County, Georgia with a Christmas dinner basket filled with food and toys for their children.

Sedgwick County Cares and Shares - In one day Republican volunteers in Sedgwick County, Kansas, collected enough food and cash to help feed hundreds of families in need for weeks. The food drive gathered more than six and one-half tons of food and \$1,000 in cash for the Wichita Community Food Bank.

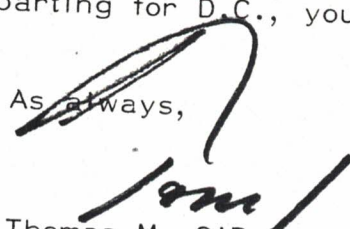
