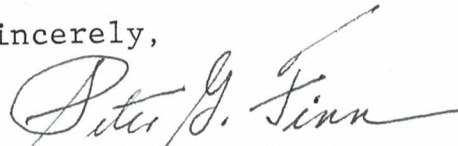

On January 6, Mr. Alfred Raffo of the above organization requested your assistance to resolve a problem he was having with food shipments from the Food and Nutrition Service (FNS) of the Department of Agriculture. Mr. Raffo claims he was told that his organization could expect monthly shipments of food (cheese, butter, corn meal, dry milk and honey) for redistribution to the poor in the Brooklyn area. These shipments, according to Mr. Raffo, have not been forthcoming.

The FNS indicates that it is only responsible for shipping food to the General Services Department of the State of New York. Thereafter, it is the State's responsibility to transfer that food to the local municipalities. The FNS has learned that New York City has a policy of holding its receipts of food until it has enough to ship to all local food distribution outlets. Since it takes over 45 days to accumulate enough food for all outlets, the regular, monthly shipments which Mr. Raffo desires are not possible.

The FNS also indicates that Mr. Raffo had been misinformed by State officials as to the amount of butter, corn meal, dry milk, and honey his organization would receive. Since, the FNS only ships cheese on a routine basis and has so little of the other food products in its inventories, it only ships the latter when they are available.

The FNS has checked the inventory of food in New York City and has learned that a shipment to 7th Avenue Center will be made in late January. George Braley, Deputy Administrator of the FNS, explained these matters to Mr. Raffo. According to Braley, Mr. Raffo seemed pleased with the clarification and with the prospects for a January shipment of cheese.

A thought regarding the State of the Union:

So much attention has been lavished on Goodman that it seems everyone has forgotten Mark Lange, the other American airman who lost his life. And yet Lange's father was interviewed almost immediately after the incident and, under a tough emotional circumstance, made a strong, impassioned defense of the President and the decision to make air strikes.

Suggestion: Why not invite Mr. and Mrs. Lange to sit in the box at the State of the Union? It would be: A) a symbolic gesture to show our forces they won't be forgotten. It would also serve as a symbol to all the families of Marines killed there -- and indeed all families who have lost sons in the service -- that the President hasn't forgotten, that he is a man of compassion who truly cares. B) Remind the American people there was another hero in this saga besides Goodman -- and that his family is completely supportive. C) And would be a nice gesture toward the Langes, whom I would think might feel a bit lost in the shuffle amidst all the Goodman publicity.

FRASER, Mich. (AP) - When Navy Lt. Mark A. Lange was growing up, his father said he tried to show the boy "all of the open doors" available for a career.

Mark Lange chose a door that led to his death Dec. 4 when his Navy A-6E bomber was shot down by Syrian gunfire.

"I don't know how he got the bug for flying, really," Lange's father, Walter, said in an interview last week. "However, as each of the boys came up through high school, I tried to show them all of the open doors that were available to them.

"We've always wanted our children to achieve a maximum according to their ability. We wanted them to take advantage of their abilities in the community and in the country," said Lange, 56.

This past week, the family welcomed the return of their son's crewmate with the same dignity with which they accepted the death.

Lt. Robert O. Goodman Jr., the bombardier-navigator who was captured by Syrian forces, was released following an appeal by the Rev. Jesse Jackson.

"We're very, very pleased, of course, that Bobby got released," Lange said. "I hope it means the Syrians are ready to talk peace."

Mark Lange, 2, was the third son and fourth child of Walter and Arlene "Crickett" Lange, who live on a colonial-style home on a half-acre lot in the Detroit suburb of Fraser.

At the time of his death, he was in the process of getting a divorce and left behind a 1-year-old daughter, Jamie, who is in the custody of his parents.

The elder Lange is a scientist at the General Motors Corp. Technical Center in Warren and last November completed his eighth year on the Fraser City Council before deciding not to seek re-election.

Mrs. Lange has served on the city's Recreation Commission and is a member of a committee examining the implications for Fraser schools of a national task force's recommendations on education.

Lange remembers his late son's real joy in school was singing. Mark was a tenor in his high school choir and in the glee club at the U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis, Md., from which he graduated in 199.

"He was a real ham, he really entertained," Lange said.

Mrs. Lange, 54, remembered Mark, like her other children, as "forthright and honest."

"When everybody else put their initials in the cement in front of the library, (Mark) put his whole name, so they knew who to call," she said.

The elder Lange accepted news of his son's death stoically. "We were pretty well ready for it," he said on Dec. 6. "He (Mark) was typical of the right stuff. He had it. It's just a shame that he's just reached his peak and he's done."

At the time, Lange called for support of U.S. involvement in Lebanon, a position that brought a thank-you call from President Reagan.

"I've had calls from coast to coast from people thanking me for what I said," Lange said at the time. "I guess that makes me feel a little better, knowing there are still some patriotic people out there."

About 300 friends, relatives, servicemen and mourners crowded into St. John's Lutheran Church for Mark's funeral Dec. 11. The family still has some bad times over it, but is trying to

Re: President Reagan's phone call to Superbowl coach

It is becoming increasingly clear to me that more attention must be paid to the president's phone call to the winning Superbowl coach. In recent years, the coach has had trouble hearing, and the surrounding locker room hullabaloo has turned what should be an exciting moment into a chaotic event.

In order to prevent such confusion this year, I'd like to propose the following. CBS will set up a camera wherever the president chooses. Mr. Reagan will be given an ear piece through which he will hear our program audio. The winning coach will place an "ear muff" through which he will hear the president without having to strain to hear above the din. The coach will also have his own microphone to facilitate his end of the conversation.

The audience will see Mr. Reagan and the winning coach on a split screen, allowing them to both see and hear the congratulatory conversation.

CBS will have a telephone in the losing locker room, as well, but we will not cover the president's conversation with that team's coach.

I think this will allow all of us to look our best in a heretofore haphazard situation. The conversation will be handled and seen in a dignified manner befitting the president of the United States.
