Thank you for your telegram of December 12 concerning construction differential subsidies (CDS) for tanker vessels.

As you know, the Department of Transportation published a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking which would allow any owner or operator of a tanker built with CDS to repay that subsidy. Upon repayment, the owner or operator would be permitted to enter domestic tanker trade. The docket in the Department's rulemaking proceeding closed on May 2, 1983. The Department is now in the process of evaluating options for final action in this rulemaking. However, the Appropriations Act for the Department of Commerce, signed by the President on November 28, 1983, prohibits the enforcement of any final rule on this matter until after June 15, 1984.

Comments and recommendations from maritime interests such as yours are appreciated. Your views concerning CDS certainly will be considered.

Thank you again for expressing your views on this important and complex issues.

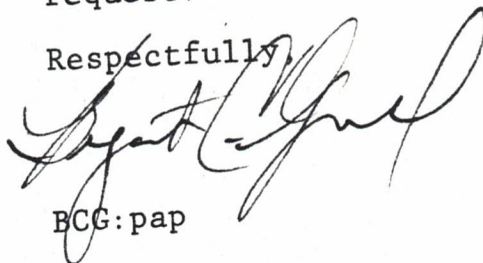

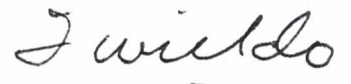

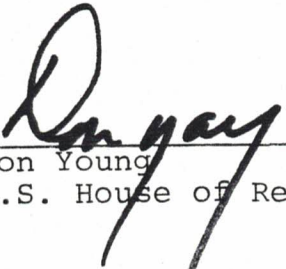
This letter is to inform you of our distress with the White House Office of Security and the White House Office of Presidential Advance in connection with the President's stop over at Elmendorf Air Force Base Alaska.

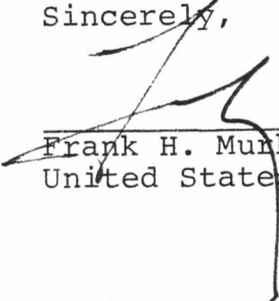
The Alaska Congressional Delegation had invited the President to meet with Alaskans during his refueling stop on his way to Japan. Congressman Don Young, my wife Nancy and I flew from Washington to welcome the President to Alaska and where I introduced the President to the audience at Elmendorf.

Proceeding the President's speech, President and Mrs. Reagan and Governor Sheffield departed for a VIP reception, on the base, to visit with a group of 20-25 distinguished Alaskan visitors which Congressman Young and I had invited to meet with the President. When the three of us went to join the VIP reception, we were informed by White House Security that because of "security reasons" we would not be able to participate in the reception and, in fact, we were escorted from the reception area and taken outside and detained. The temperature outside that day was 25 degrees and Nancy asked to go inside to get her coat. She was escorted back to a holding area where she was detained until after the President left the base.

We would hope that by bringing this matter to your attention similar incidents do not again occur.

SUBJECT: Letter from Senator Murkowski and Representative Young

I have reviewed the circumstances surrounding the incident referred to in the letter you received from Senator Murkowski and Representative Young. Needless to say, I consider it very serious any time we receive such an allegation.

At my direction, all of the agents who were involved in the Elmendorf event have been interviewed. The evidence gathered does not indicate that any Secret Service agent was involved in either restricting the movements of or detaining in any way Senator Murkowski or Representative Young. In fact, all the agents were under the impression that both individuals were permitted access to the secure areas.

Accordingly, I can say with certainty that the Secret Service did not inhibit the movement of these individuals during the President's participation in the Elmendorf visit. As a policy, we always try to be sensitive to and consider the political reality associated with unnecessarily restricting the movements of Members of Congress.

I would like to recommend that an agent assigned to our Liaison Division personally visit both individuals in an attempt to ascertain any additional facts they may possess.

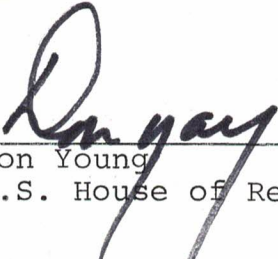
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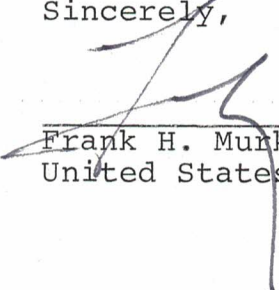

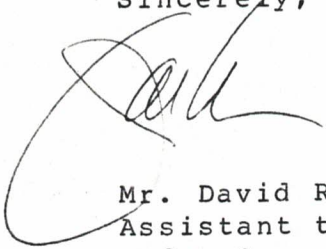
