A January 5th Wall Street Journal article dealt with your expertise in press relations and mentioned the President's interest in educational excellence.

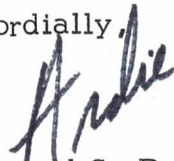

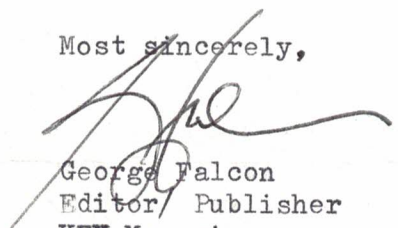

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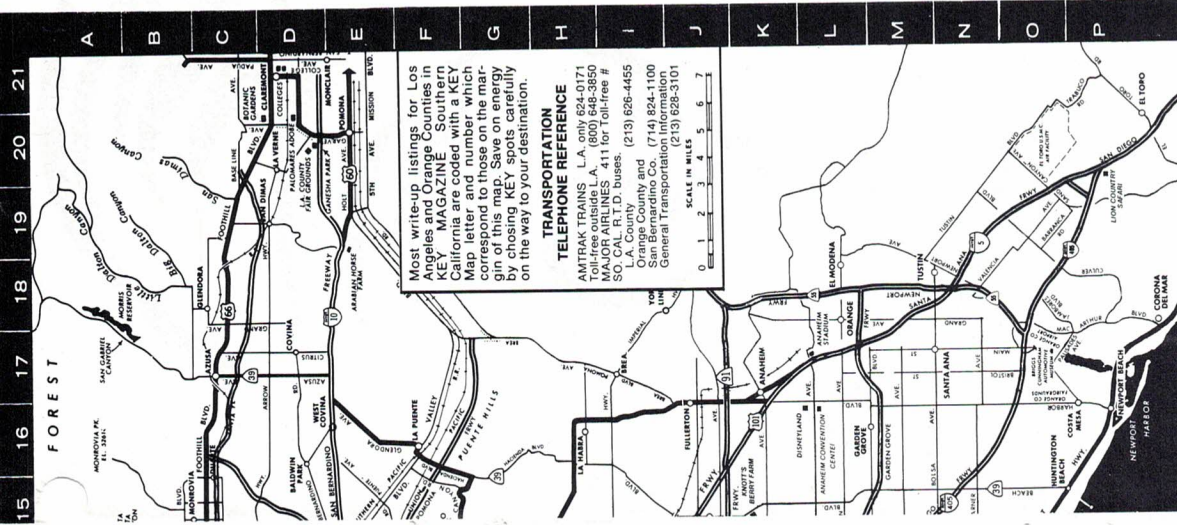

trust between parliamentarians of our countries. Together with you we need more frequent contacts, a frank dialogue on basic problems of the present-day complicated international situation and joint actions aimed at strengthening peace and cooperation. Attempts to interfere in each other's internal affairs would not by any means contribute to this. Both the USA and the USSR have their own orders and laws. We can dislike some of your orders and you can dislike some of our orders but it should not stem from this that we must try to impose on one another our understanding of these or other problems concerning the internal life of the other side.

I would be grateful to you if you wrote me a few words about your impressions of our meetings and talks, your trip to the Soviet Union. I would be also glad to know the opinion of Mr. Bird on the question which we talked about with you in the Kremlin after our lunch in the Catherine Hall. I still believe the more often deputies to the USSR Supreme Soviet will meet with US Senators and Congressmen in order to find approaches to the normalisation of relations between our countries and an end to the arms race which represents the most serious threat to national interests of the USSR and the USA the better it will be.

Dear Senator Pell,

I offer my apologies for answering with such a delay N. Stetson memorandum which you handed over to me. These days my colleague in the Soviet Peace Committee and I have been very busy organising powerful mass actions of Soviet peace supporters for putting an end to a new round of the nuclear arms race which can become inevitable if negotiations in Geneva which are to be resumed on September 6 will not be crowned with success.

All our non-governmental organisations, including trade unions, the Soviet Women's Committee, the Committee of Youth Organisations, the Committee "Soviet Physicians for Peace", the Committee "Soviet Sportsmen for Peace", the Committee for European Security and Cooperation and others take an active part in organising these mass actions.

The organisers of these demonstrations and rallies do not feel any restriction of our activities on the part of authorities. The statement contained in N. Stetson's memorandum that allegedly in the USSR "the peace activists are treated like other political prisoners", that "they have inadequate diets, are subject to harassment, and have to do forced labor" is all the more strange. I was surprised even more by N. Stetson's assertion that fighters for peace in our country are allegedly kept in psychiatric hospitals and there they "are subjected to forced treatment including the use of mind-affecting drugs."

I categorically state that such fabrications are a malicious slander and it is strange, to put it mildly, that a member of the Congress staff permits herself to repeat them.

Nancy Stetson makes references to the "Helsinki Commission's information" obtained from private organisations in the West allegedly "with good contacts in the Soviet Union". Such organisations as "Helsinki Watch", "Baltic American National Committee", "Amnesty International", radio stations "Free Europe" and "Liberty" and a "very reliable emigre dissident in Munich" are mentioned specifically.

Despite all my respect for you I cannot understand why you consider these sources to be "reliable". In my view, when staying in the Soviet Union you had a full possibility of obtaining objective information from really reliable sources -- first hand information from Soviet people, including ordinary citizens.

Now a few words about specific points of Nancy Stetson's memorandum.

1. The "Baltic Nuclear Freeze Group" exists only in the imagination of people who conduct anti-Soviet propaganda in the West. As for Misters Lagle Parek, Ints Calitis, Heiko Ahonen and Arbo Pesti, they have been arrested not for participation in the struggle for peace but for subversive activities. Their cases are being examined by judicial bodies and they will be tried for the offences which they have committed.

By the way you certainly know that US laws just as laws of other countries provide for severe punishment for anti-state activities.

2. As for O.Rädzinsky, he is also under examination for subversive activities but is not kept at the Serbsky Institute for Forensic Psychiatry, as Stetson asserts, and stays in the house of preliminary confinement.

3. Shatravka and Mischenko are serving prison terms according to the sentence of the court not for participation in the struggle for peace with which they had nothing to do but for the offences which they have committed. Incidentally Stetson mentions that Shatravka tried to cross into Finland illegally which according to Soviet laws entails corresponding criminal punishment.

4. As for S.Batovrin, you have a full possibility to meet him because now he lives in the United States and get personally convinced of what kind a person this young man is. In the Soviet Union no one arrested him, no one sent him in a compulsory manner to a psychiatric hospital for treatment. He was only regularly examined by a psychiatrist because for a number of years before it was declared in the West that he is allegedly a fighter for peace he had been registered with a district psychiatric dispensary at his place of residence.

5. The so-called "Group for the Establishment of Mutual Trust Between the USA and the USSR" whose leader, according to the reports of Western newspapers, was S.Batovrin has made no contribution to the struggle for peace in the Soviet Union and to say that it allegedly enjoys some popularity in our country would be unserious.

As we told you during our talks the situation in the world has become now so heated that our common duty is to establish
