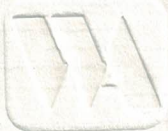

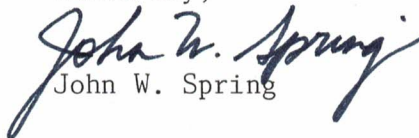
The situation in Southwest Asia continues to worsen. It is very possible that by the time this letter is received that another conflict will involve us. However, this one may take place at the Strait of Hormuz, which is the only sea route from the Persian Gulf to the Oman Gulf and the Arabian Sea.

The situation in the Middle East is mainly the result of Soviet policy, which includes significant military aid and support. However, several events can be attributed to the Administration.

Our inaccurate assessment of Syrian intentions to annex portions of Lebanon and our vulnerable positioning of U.S. Marines on open land at Beirut have led to an attenuating posture for our military strength in that region.

Again, I am willing to offer my services and professional expertise to the Administration. However, if my offer continues to be declined, there will be very little that I could do to assist in any effective manner--at any level. Thank you.

Dear Mr. MacFarlane:

Today, I listened and observed your statements and answers on ABC's This Week with David Brinkley. Although I did not record your exact words, it did seem as if the main question from George Will, who is considered to be a friend of the President and generally favorable and fair with the Administration, placed you prematurely on the defensive. Then, by the time Sam Donaldson had finished asking his follow-up question, your response was only marginal in meaning. I could perceive your stress and frustration from the aforementioned to the conclusion of your appearance on the program.

I was especially concerned because some of your statements were not accurate in their historic content, i.e. "Lebanon has not experienced any democratic government for the past forty years." However, the only valid reason, which you conveyed to the American public, for our recent involvement in Beirut and vicinity, "...to prevent another conflict between Syria and Israel." Unfortunately, the concept of attempting to improve stability for the Lebanese Government in that region was never mentioned.

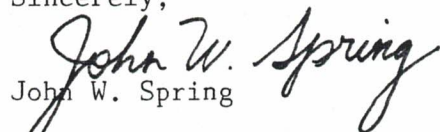
Mr. McFarlane, although William P. Clark was National Security Adviser at the time when the Multinational Force was sent into Beirut, you acted as his Deputy National Security Adviser and, later, you were appointed by the President to the rank of Ambassador as Special Envoy to the Middle East. In those important positions, you did play a major role in developing our foreign policy in that region.

You did mention that we had assumed that the Syrians would eventually be willing to leave Lebanon, but, instead, they are planning to permanently annex a significant portion of that nation into Syria. We have already been misinformed by the news media that Syria has a legitimate claim to that area based on "historic" phenomena, so we would be required to accept their "conditions" for maintaining a stronger sphere of influence in that region.

The Soviets are playing a very significant role in Syrian policy. As a cultural geographer, I can say that the variety of ethnic groups represented in Lebanon leads to a highly-complex situation which the Marxists have tried to exploit.

Regarding the current situation, which does not offer any hope for the Lebanese, I, again, offer my professional services to assist the Reagan Administration on this and other significant matters. Thank you.

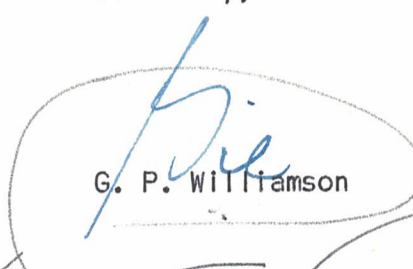

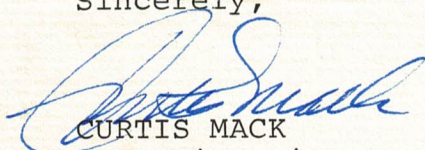

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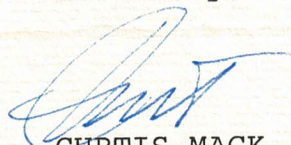
