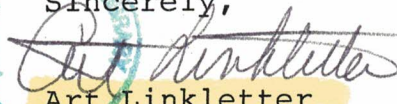

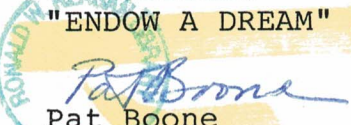

AWARD PURPOSE: To honor an individual who has, through the application of a positive mental attitude (PMA), overcome adversity and gone on to make meaningful contributions to the betterment of humanity.

PMA: Simply stated, the PMA philosophy is: WHAT THE MIND OF MAN CAN CONCEIVE AND BELIEVE THE MIND OF MAN CAN ACHIEVE THROUGH A POSITIVE MENTAL ATTITUDE.

AWARD AMOUNT: \$75,000

SPECIAL FEATURE: Cash amount is given to be disbursed by the winning individual to the public charity or charities of his or her choice --believed to be the largest grant to an individual for philanthropic purposes.

JUDGING: After an initial screening, applications are reviewed each year by a blue-ribbon Awards Committee.

1984 COMMITTEE: (Now being formed) Co-chairmen are Art Linkletter and Pat Boone.

AWARD PRESENTATION: Wednesday, October 10, 1984, at the Fairmont Hotel, 1750 Welton Street, Denver, CO. Reception at 6 P.M., Award Dinner at 7 P.M.

Dear Mr. Deaver:

You were sufficiently occupied last Friday Evening, so I made no attempt to meet with you. However, I hope and trust we will have an opportunity to meet in the future.

Meanwhile, I would greatly appreciate some feedback from the Administration on the following issues:

1. Will the Administration move to transfer public lands to private enterprise applications, where such transfers are in the best interest of the Nation? Ref: Nevada Senate Joint Resolution 17, May 1983, urging Congress, Commerce and Interior to transfer B L M lands to a Nevada Industry and Trade District(See Enclosure).
2. Will the Administration approve and support a major new weapons system collaboration program involving Japan and Korea, with potential involvement of other ASIA-PACIFIC Allies? Such a program would have two and three way transfer of technology. The technologies involved would have both Military and Commercial Applications, with mutual benefit to the participants.

In a more general framework, I as an International Marketer, have seen the position of American Suppliers slide in recent years. May I suggest the Administration act to reduce interest rates; reduce the trade deficit; reduce the budget deficit; and if those measures fail to yield improvement, devalue the dollar.

I feel that continued reduction of interest rates to the range of 7.5 to 8.0 percent would be a step in the right direction. This measure should help reduce the currency imbalance which has been greatly aggravated since 1980.

I look forward to assisting with the REELECTION CAMPAIGN.

Regarding our telephone conversation:

1. Our own people (in at least three departments) managed to scuttle my hopes for some subtle leverage. My objective was (and remains) cooperation from Mexico on border-sewage matters. As you know, the President is concerned about it and broached the matter at La Paz in August. The people of San Diego (among others on our border) are justifiably at the end of their tether.

The dealing with foreign countries by anyone and everyone in our hydra-headed bureaucracy is a major irritant for Embassies. It practically eliminates one's ability to bargain and persuade. I will explain when I come to Washington -- if you can give me five minutes. We could sure use some help from the Boss.

2. Mrs. Borchardt has not sent me a copy of the famous memo. Obviously, she is not going to unless the Boss so instructs her. Why don't you have him sign a wee note to that effect? All it has to say is: "Dear Wendy, please give Jack Gavin a copy of the memorandum he wants".

Bill wants to talk about

3. I will be interested in hearing what you want to do for the next Presidential meeting. The more lead time the better.

4. The Interparliamentary meeting (US/Mexican Congressmen and Senators) will take place from 17 to 20 May this year. It is planned for Williamsburg. The alternate is Kansas City. As you know, the host country President traditionally makes an appearance. Please tell me if you think it will be possible for the President to speak to them this year.
