Thank you for your help regarding our fund-raising luncheon for Senators Stevens, Domenici, Boschwitz and Cohen.

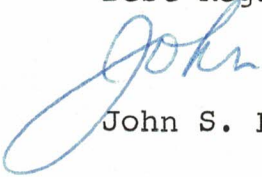

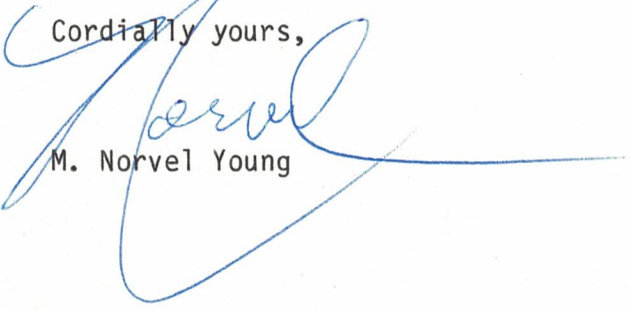

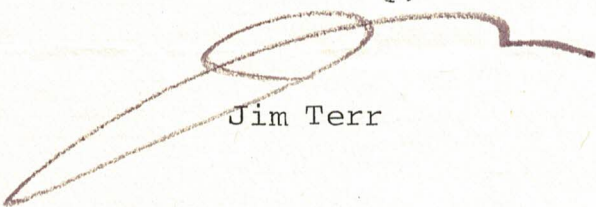

SUBJECT: RECENTLY CREATED MARYLANDERS FOR A BALANCED
BUDGET AMENDMENT COMMITTEE

As an up-date of the Balanced Budget situation, I thought you might be interested in the attached press release by a newly constituted group in Maryland who are fighting the rescission efforts there.

As you may recall, I went to Annapolis several weeks ago and met with a Republican caucus of the Senate and House members to encourage them in their fight to prevent rescission of Maryland's support for a constitutional amendment for a balanced budget. Just this past week this very impressive committee headed by Dr. Milton Eisenhower was formed. They are putting tremendous community pressure on the legislature to make sure that the rescission is not successful. I thought that you might want to share this information with the President since it is a fine example of state initiative on an issue of growing importance.

In 1975, the Maryland General Assembly recognized that fiscal irresponsibility at the Federal level was the greatest threat which faced our Nation. In 1975, that threat was represented by a national debt in the amount of \$544 billion. In less than 10 years, that figure has nearly tripled to 1.4 trillion dollars (\$1,400,000,000,000), placing the United States government perilously close to financial collapse.

The Maryland General Assembly saw the need in 1975 to reverse this trend by supporting constitutional restraints to balance the Federal budget. SJR 4 was passed which requested Congress to either (1) propose a Balanced Budget Amendment to the states for ratification or (2) to call a constitutional convention for the "specific and exclusive" purpose of drafting

such an amendment to be presented to the states for ratification. An undisciplined and irresponsible Congress has still failed to act but 32 of the required 34 states have petitioned Congress to call a constitutional convention for the "specific and exclusive" purpose of proposing a Balanced Budget Amendment.

While several legislatures are now deliberating the passage of a Balanced Budget resolution, Maryland legislators are debating the repeal of our previously enacted Balanced Budget Resolution. Many find the prospect of repealing Maryland's Balanced Budget Resolution a most cavalier and irresponsible action.

Today we are formally announcing the creation of Marylanders for a Balanced Budget Amendment -- a Committee made up of public officials and former public officials, the chief executive officers of many major Maryland corporations and other professional associations. We all share a common goal to which we are committed -- preservation of the fiscal integrity and economic viability of this Nation. We can no longer tolerate a Congress who would allow our country to literally drown in a sea of red ink . . . and we will not sit back and allow the Maryland General Assembly to condone the bad habits of a Congress run amuck.

Marylanders for a Balanced Budget Amendment want to bring this issue to the attention of our fellow taxpayers and urge them to join us in contacting their Senators and Delegates to indicate support for a Balanced Budget Amendment. The message must be clear -- VOTE NO on SJR 6 and HJR 12, the repeal measures. LET MARYLAND'S SUPPORT OF A BALANCED BUDGET AMENDMENT STAND!

Those who wish to repeal the Balanced Budget Resolution would have us believe that they are in favor of a "balanced budget" but fear the ramifications of a "runaway" constitutional convention. They fail to tell you, however, that any amendment to the Constitution (whether proposed by the Federal Congress or by a Constitutional Convention) must be ratified by 38 states before it becomes effective. Thus, even if a balanced budget amendment is proposed, it must undergo the ratification procedure.

Indeed, the direct election of the United States Senators only became a reality when one less than the requisite number of states petitioned Congress to call a constitutional convention for that purpose. Faced with the prospect of a constitutional convention, Congress reacted by proposing the 17th Amendment of the United States Constitution (direct election of United States Senators), an Amendment which was subsequently ratified. It is likely that Congress will do the same hereby proposing a "balanced budget amendment" rather than calling the constitutional convention.

Marylanders For a Balanced Budget Amendment ask all of our fellow citizens to join with us to insure that the repeal measures pending in the Maryland General Assembly are not adopted. Let us continue the process which will finally require fiscal sanity for our Nation!

SHU is Reagan country: poll

Fifty percent of the members of the Seton Hall community would vote for President Reagan in November, and 70 percent said they felt he has done a good job as president, according to a poll conducted for the Setonian. In addition, three quarters of those polled feel they are in some ways better off now than they were three years ago.

Reagan, who visited the campus eight months to deliver the commencement address, has a reputation for being unpopular among young Americans. Nevertheless, he received a favorable rating from Seton Hall students.

Comments favorable to the president echoed those of Junior Computer Science major Jeffrey Stavash, who said, "I feel Reagan has given America more pride as far as the other nations are concerned. He's helped to restore its greatness through strong leadership."

Other students, such as Senior Economics major Grace Bombaci, praised the president's economic policy saying, "If he's president again, I feel there is definite potential for future economic growth."

Many of the 33 percent who com-

mented unfavorably about the president expressed concern for his policy on education. Shade Daodu, a senior Economics major, said, "I don't like his policies, especially with education, cutting off financial aid and all."

Others, such as David Sternberg, Ph.D., professor of physics, said, "I think he is a very bad president and that he is making a greater division in this country."

Of the just under 20 percent who were undecided as to who they would vote for in November, most reflected the sentiments of junior English major Linda Franke, who said, "I'll have to see who's running against Reagan and also what his record as president is this year."

Poll participants were also asked who among the democratic hopefuls has a chance to unseat Reagan. About half said Walter Mondale; a third said "no one," or that they were not sure. The rest said John Glenn, Jesse Jackson or Ted Kennedy, who is not an announced candidate for the office.

Finally, the respondents were asked a similar question to the one that Reagan used rhetorically in his televised debate

with Jimmy Carter in 1980: "Are you better off now than you were three years ago?" More than three quarters of the respondents said yes or "yes in some ways, no in others," with over two-thirds answering a flat-out "yes."

Several said that they were better off, but not because of Reagan.

Judith Stark, Ph.D., professor of philosophy, said, "No we are not better off at all. There is high unemployment and a disastrous foreign policy, especially in the Mid-East and Central America."

This comment is sharply contrasted by Sophomore Ian Cooper, who, when asked if the United States is better off now, said "Definitely, without a doubt."

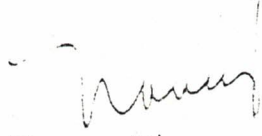

Selling Savimbi down the river

In the long retreat of the West before an advancing Soviet empire, a natural advantage lay with the communists. Again and again, Marxism aligned itself with nationalism, with armed movements of liberation seeking to sever colonial ties to the capitals of Europe.

Mao Tse-tung exploited the desire of millions of Chinese to be rid of the hated foreigners, all of them. Ho Chi Minh rode to power on a wave of anti-French patriotism. Fidel Castro, with his theft of billions in Yankee property, appealed to hemispheric resentment and envy of the Colossus of the North. Gamal Abdel Nasser became a legendary figure in Egyptian history and the Third World with his nationalization of the Suez Canal.

By the middle '70s, however, the last of the major West European

colonies in Africa had been given up. Meanwhile, the Soviet Union was erecting the most barbarous and exploitative empire in modern history. So, today, the Soviet empire — Nicaragua, Mozambique, Ethiopia, Afghanistan, Cambodia, Laos, even Vietnam — plays host to guerrilla wars of liberation. Nationalism has become the West's ally.

In Angola, an authentic revolutionary hero has emerged in the person of Jonas Savimbi. For years, he fought the Portuguese; then, when the Portuguese departed and the MPLA double-crossed Mr. Savimbi and sold the revolution out to the Cubans and Soviets, he took his UNITA forces into the bush. There, he has carried on the fight for nine years, maintaining control of almost half the country.

back in again. He doesn't quite qualify as a neo-conservative, but he distrusts the so-called conventional wisdom, and the good news is that Harper's — one of the few remaining "old" magazines in the country — will no longer be conventionally liberal.

In the latest Harper's issue, for March, there is a remarkable article on Grenada, "An Island Betrayed," written by V.S. Naipaul, a native of Trinidad, which is about a hundred miles from Grenada. Mr. Naipaul offers a West Indian view of the collapse of the Grenadian revolution — "de revo" in Grenadian English — and the subsequent American invasion.

He finds there were two stories. One of them was purely Grenadian. It was the story of a retarded island community "hijacked by people slightly more educated into the forms of a grandiose revolution." Imposed on this was the story of the American military in Grenada. Mr. Naipaul doesn't deny that the military's attitude toward the American correspondents — it was an "adversary relationship" on both their parts — was both distrustful and abrasive. He doesn't blame the correspondents for objecting to the treatment they received when they were finally admitted to the island. But he does condemn the American press — or most of it — for its lack of curiosity about what had led up to the American invasion.

The press, in concentrating on its own quarrel with the Pentagon, simply missed the more important details of what happens when ideologues, trained in imported doctrines, seek to impose an abstraction known as socialism on a primitive community that cannot possibly relate sophisticated slogans and texts to commonplace peasant agriculture.

Grenada, in Mr. Naipaul's description, is not a land of big estates. When British rule ceased, Eric Gairy, a black of simple origins, took over as a "redeemer of the black poor." Mr. Gairy affected white suits and the trappings of elegance. His followers in the little houses of Grenada accepted this as a black man's triumph, much as Harlem in New York once gloried in the affluent pretensions of Rep. Adam Clayton Powell. But in time Mr. Gairy developed into "a feared and somewhat eccentric Negro shepherd-king." He became an embarrassment to the children of those who had put him in power.
