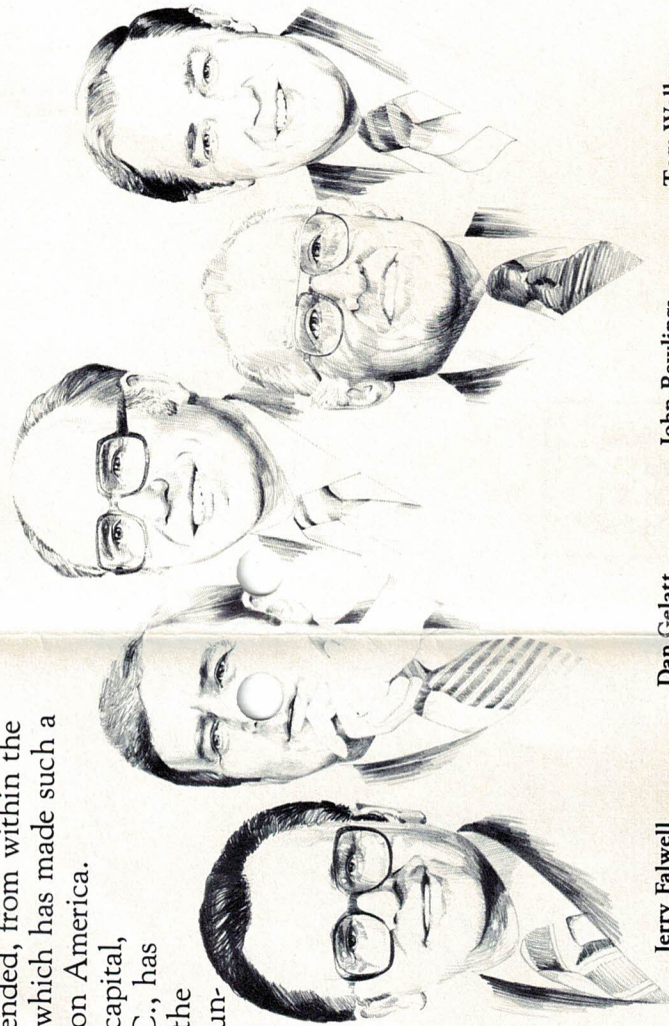

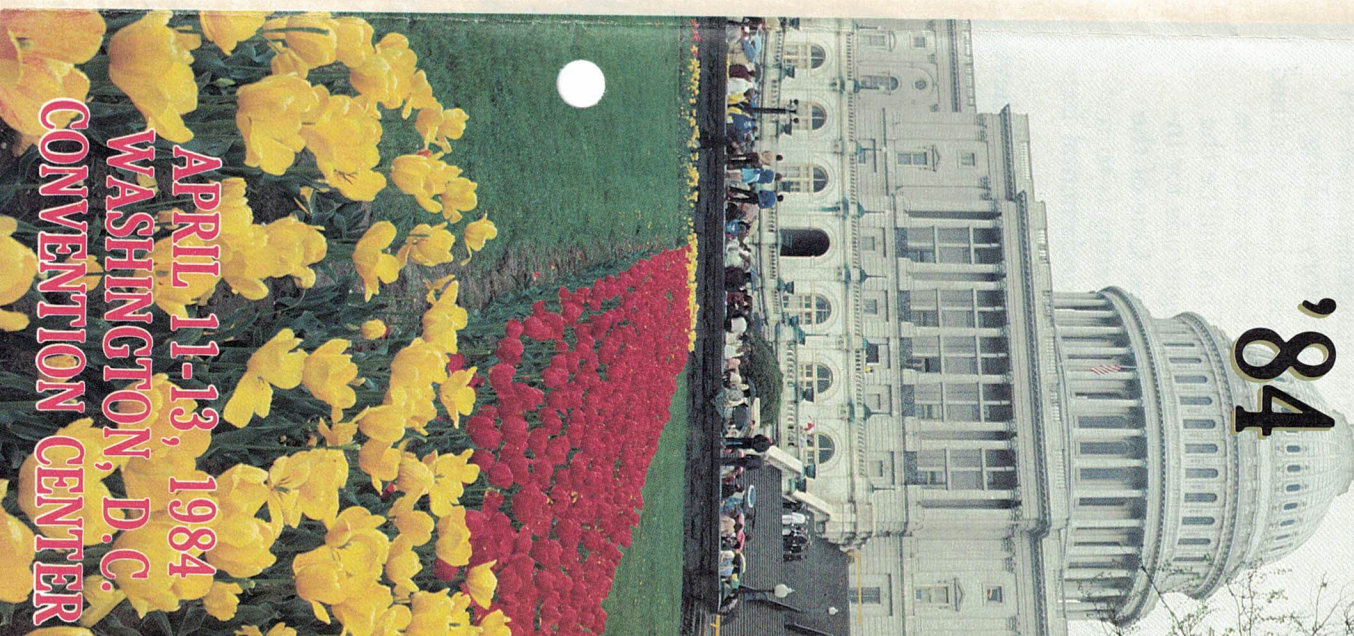

Cherry Blossoms Bloom For BF '84

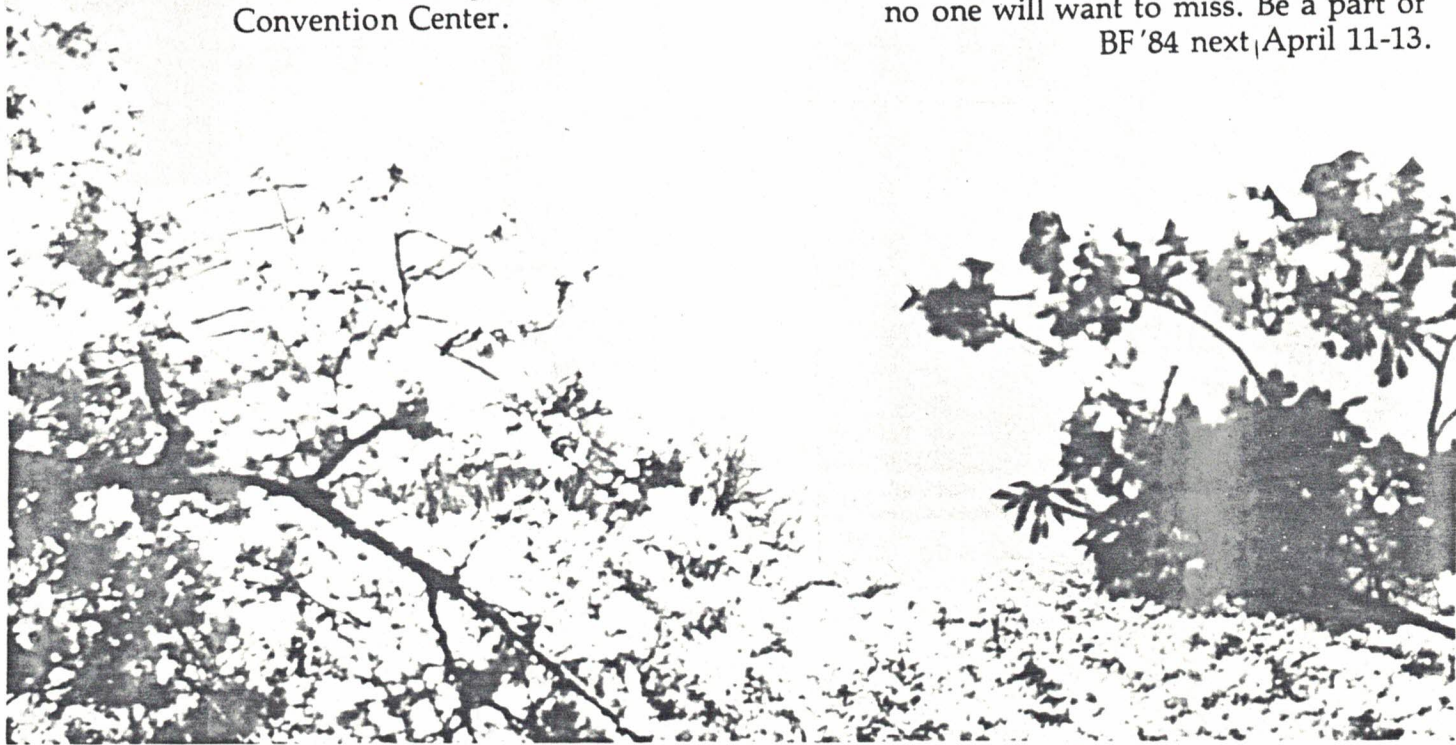

Rev. Marvin Frady is one of many pastors nationwide concerned with what he believes to be a mass exodus away from the fundamental values of the Bible.

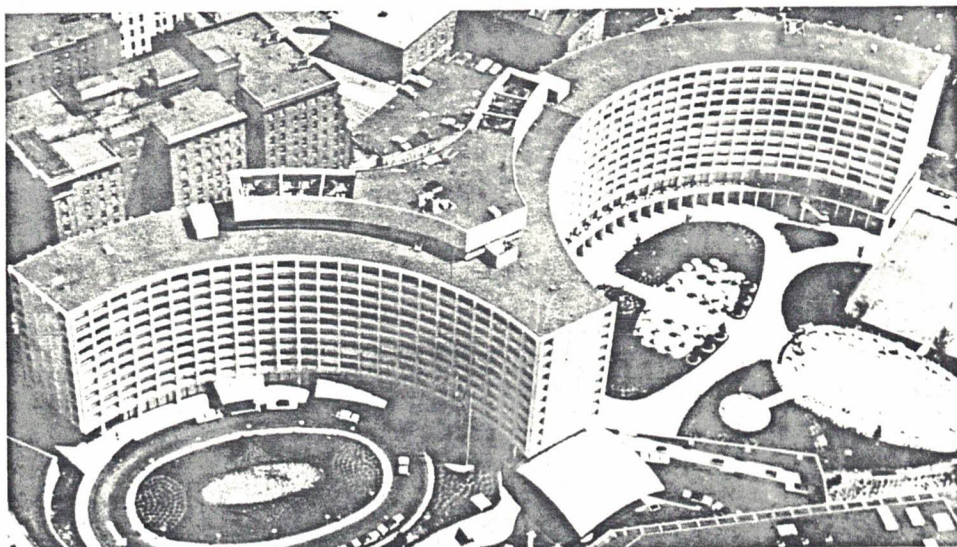

Kelview Baptist Church also has the most people registered from any one church—so far.

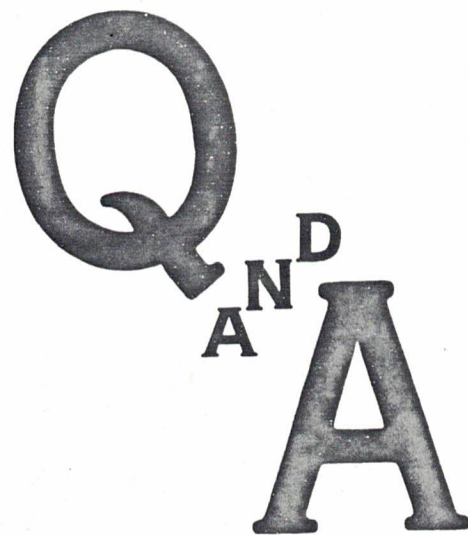
Intricate Shuttle System Devised

On March 29, 1984 at 4:30 p.m. President Reagan has been asked to present the American Cancer Society's Courage Award to Miss Amanda Blake for her struggle to defeat cancer.

Miss Blake has been selected by the American Cancer Society for the award as an excellent example of the courage and determination necessary to defeat the disease. She is now an active volunteer in the Society's fight against cancer.

As you know, Amanda Blake portrayed the role of "Kitty" on the TV series "Gunsmoke". Over a 20 year period she was a 2 pack-a-day cigarette smoker.

Upon discovery of a lump on her tongue, she was diagnosed as having cancer. The subsequent surgery resulted in not only a complete restructuring of her neck, mouth and tongue, but the need to undergo therapy to learn to talk again.

Miss Blake has courageously chosen to speak out about her experience, and to warn people about ignoring the early warning signs of cancer. In the years since her surgery, the actress has become an active volunteer for the American Cancer Society and has testified frequently in Congress against the dangers of cigarette smoking.

For 19 years TV viewers knew her as Miss Kitty, the tough but tender proprietress of Dodge City's Longbranch Saloon. For Amanda Blake, the Gunsmoke cleared in 1974 when she left the popular horse opera and settled into a busy retirement with Frank Gilbert, a former business executive in Phoenix and her fourth husband. Domestic tranquillity proved short-lived. In 1976 Blake developed cancer of the mouth and secretly underwent extensive surgery. Although the experience initially made



her "an emotional basket case," she concedes, Blake has fully recovered. She and her husband now oversee a private menagerie that includes a lion and a leopard and direct a nonprofit corporation that studies the breeding habits of cheetahs in captivity. At 52, Blake has also completed a two-year stint as crusade co-leader of the American Cancer Society. She spoke to PEOPLE's Suzanne Adelson about her experience with a disease whose name she was once afraid to mention in public.

DODGE CITY'S KITTY FACES DOWN A TOUGH CUSTOMER: CANCER

I awoke one morning and felt a sore under my tongue, like a blister, and it hurt. It did not go away the next day, or the next. It was just always there. Eating became uncomfortable, and I worried about it a lot. But I didn't look at it in a mirror because I didn't want to see it. I didn't tell anyone, not even Frank. I knew I had smoked two packs of cigarettes a day for 20 years, and I knew I had a problem. I quit cold turkey right then, but the sore didn't go away.

I was never the kind who went in for a regular checkup, and I put off going to a doctor. That's what most people have a tendency to do when they're afraid to hear the truth, and I was afraid. My fear was that if I went to a doctor, I'd find out I had cancer—even though I knew all along, inside, it was cancer. People say, "I don't want to know if I've got it." Well, that's what kills you. The fear.

After about two months I finally realized I had to do something. I'd spent too many sleepless nights. I called Frank's doctor, unknown to Frank. He sent me to a throat man in Phoenix, and they did a biopsy right there in the office and made an appointment for me to come back in a few days. When I went back and they said, "Yes, it's positive, you've got cancer," I said, "I knew you were going to tell me that," and I started crying right then, and I didn't stop crying until after I

had surgery. I couldn't stop crying. I was afraid of surgery. I was afraid of disfigurement. I was afraid of dying.

But then Frank and I heard about the University of Texas M.D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute in Houston, and I found this perfectly marvelous man there—Dr. Alando J. Ballantyne. When I got to Houston, he was in the hospital himself with a bleeding ulcer. They just brought all his in-

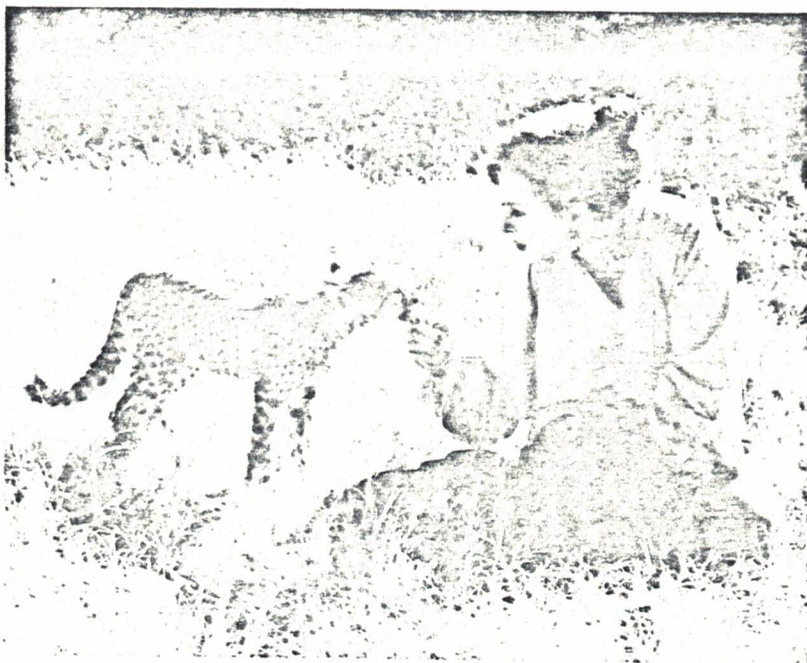
struments into his hospital room, and he examined me there. Apparently I had a very slow-growing malignancy, thank God. It never became a big lump or anything like that. It just stayed like an open blister.

While I was waiting to hear what would be best for me, I ate everything in sight. I went to Mexican restaurants and wolfed down so much Mexican food, all that stuff that I really love but don't normally indulge in. I just went on a total eating binge. I went nuts.

I had an option of radiation therapy or surgery. The radiation would have meant problems with my jaw-

bone—it would have deteriorated and I would have lost a lot of teeth—and I would have needed surgical reconstruction work afterwards. So I opted for surgery.

Before the operation, I worried about everything. About dying. About having my whole head chopped off—how did I know what they'd find? Well, I had the operation in

February of 1977, about a month after I'd first heard the verdict. It was eight-hour surgery, and I've since learned that some of them can go on for 12 or 16 hours or more. What they did was remove the floor of my mouth and the underneath part of my tongue. They also had to do a tracheotomy. They did a neck dissection and took out all those lymph nodes in the neck. Then they took tissue off my thigh and reconstructed my neck and gave me a new floor of my mouth and a new bottom half of my tongue.

The first thing I remember is waking up in intensive care, very briefly, but long enough to hear myself moaning. And I remember thinking, "I can still make a sound. I must still have my voice box." Then when I was recovering they came to me and said, "We've got it all." I said, "I don't believe it. Bring me the pathology report." And they did.

After the surgery my tongue was so swollen I couldn't swallow anything but liquids and things like ice cream. I was the mashed potatoes kid. But I was so elated to be alive and free of cancer that I used to run up and down the corridors of the hospital like a crazy person.

For me, surgery was the answer. For someone else, it might not be. That's why I don't give advice. Cancer is unique. It's like fingerprints. It's always different, and treatments vary from case to case. You have to make your own decisions. And anyone can get cancer, whether they've had it once or twice or six times and been cured all those times. It's a damned insidious disease, and a very democratic one.

It took me a whole year before I felt normal again. I tired very easily, and I was very cranky. My biggest problem was that my

tongue remained swollen for so long. When the swelling went down, I was able to talk without therapy; all I had to do was learn how to manipulate this new tissue I had. What the devil does a thigh know about a mouth? It was a matter of retraining all of that tissue.

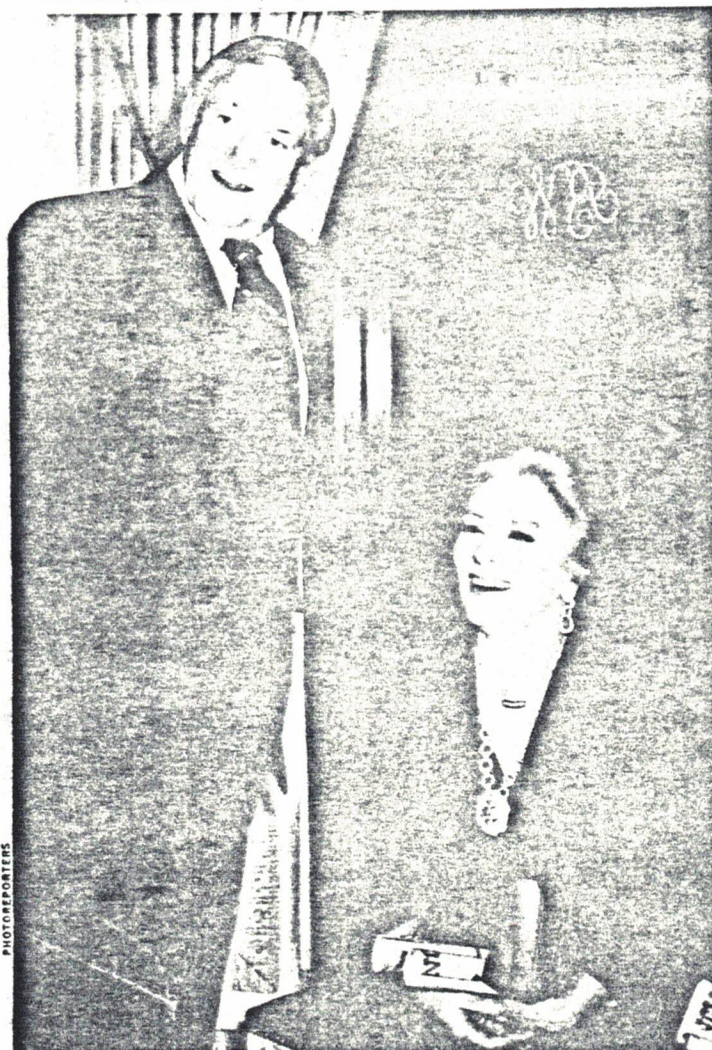
Frank has a wonderful sense of humor, which really helped me. At one point when I was carrying on about something, he said, "Well, you may have a new mouth but the same old rotten stuff is coming out of it." He knows how I feel—and how to help me—because he has had cancer of the bladder. When we first heard that, my immediate thought was, "That's it. He's a dead person." But he's not. It's been in remission for seven years. He has chemotherapy once a month. You learn that every family has had cancer at one time or another.

I go to the institute in Houston every six months for a checkup. The best thing I've learned is don't put off going to a doctor if you have a warning sign. I am a firm believer in those warning signs now, and if you don't know what they are, find your local American Cancer Society in the phone book and ask. The reason I tried to keep it all secret was because I didn't want anyone else to be bothered by it. I hadn't stopped to think that maybe by talking about it I could help someone else.

To those who get cancer, all I can say is to be very matter-of-fact about it. If you have a problem, then deal with it. Sure, it stinks. It's a bad deal. Fight back. People are still dying of cancer every day. But cancer is being cured every single day. I figure the "Big C" doesn't stand for cancer. It stands for cure. Cancer no longer has to be a death sentence. It certainly wasn't for me. □

Amanda Blake, television actress renowned for her role as Miss Kitty in "Gunsmoke," received the American Cancer Society's Courage Award from President Reagan in a White House ceremony today.

Joining Miss Blake in the Oval Office were actor Cliff Robertson, the 1984 ACS National Crusade Chairman, G. Robert Gadberry, chairman of the Society's National Board, and Dr. Gerald P. Murphy, president.

The Award plaque, signed by President Reagan, reads: "The American Cancer Society salutes Amanda Blake for her personal courage in her battle against cancer and for the hope and inspiration she gives all Americans in the fight for life and health."

In 1976 Miss Blake was diagnosed as having cancer of the mouth. After undergoing surgery, she is completely free of the disease today.

Advances in surgery and radiation treatment are increasing survival rates for oral cancer, the seventh leading form of cancer. This year, oral cancer will be detected in 27,000 Americans.

Today's award ceremony ushers in Cancer Control Month, the American Cancer Society's annual educational and fund-raising campaign. Every April, two million Society volunteers visit homes across the nation to distribute life-saving information about the early detection and treatment of cancer. This year, volunteers will deliver a pamphlet on risk assessment of certain common types of cancer.

When Amanda Blake discovered a mouth sore that did not heal, she recognized it as a warning sign of cancer. After some hesitation, she saw a doctor. Fortunately, her cancer was slow-growing, and she recovered with her voice intact.

Surgeons, however, had to reconstruct portions of her neck, mouth, and tongue from tissue taken from her leg. Consequently, Miss Blake had to undergo therapy to learn to talk again. She overcame this obstacle gallantly, and her speech has since returned to normal.

Today, Miss Blake stresses the importance of early detection, a lesson she learned from her own cancer experience. "I'm a firm believer in those early warning signs now; don't put off going to a doctor if you have one," she advises. "Remember, cancer is being cured every single day. To me, the 'Big C' doesn't stand for cancer. It stands for cure."

In the years since her surgery, the actress has assumed a real-life role as an active volunteer for the American Cancer Society. In 1979, she led the Society's National Crusade, and has testified frequently on behalf of the Society in congressional hearings on cigarette smoking. A former two-pack-a-day smoker for twenty years, Miss Blake quit cold turkey upon learning she had cancer.

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
