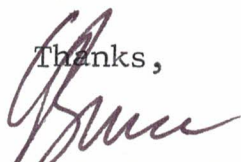
Dear Mike,

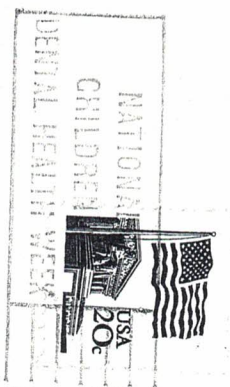

WIRING OF THE EAST ROOM

The wiring of the East Room is a long involved ongoing 2 year project which has been approved by the Ushers office, Secret Service, John Rogers office and the Networks. \$250,000 has already been allocated by the networks to proceed with this project but it has been held up by this one important factor.

Where will the remote truck park for the live feeds?

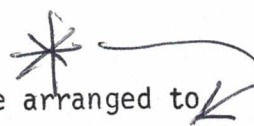
Essentially a terminal will be placed in an area where the remote trucks can plug into to avoid stringing cables and the usual mess involved in a live event. That's it ... one outlet. There has been confusion as to where this outlet would be placed in accordance to where the remote trucks would be parked.

As you know the remote trucks have been parked on the upper drive outside the East room for easy access in and out of the White House. It is my understanding that Rex Scouten and Mike Deaver do not want it parked there but on the lower level by the family theatre/library.

The Secret service does not want the truck parked in this area because it is a fire lane. The networks assure us that a fire truck can get around their small truck ... or if need be, they can unplug from the terminal and be out in one minute. A CBS truck is willing to demonstrate this to Mike Deaver at his convenience.

In essence this is the decision:

1. Is the terminal placed on the upper or lower level?

A meeting of Rex Scouten, Mike Deaver, Bobby D. and you should be arranged to finalize this one question. 

The point man from the networks is Paul Byer from CBS. They are very anxious to begin as soon as this decision has been made.

My dear Mike,

Many thanks for your letter of March 14, 1984 and I am happy to know that the President reacted favourably to my proposal and that he is infact already generally enthusiastic about the idea of making available to China much needed technology and equipment in the area of the people's health. Let us hope then that this will lead to the possibility of his making a positive symbolic gesture when he is in that country. For your information, I did make an indirect indication to the Shanghai authorities that I was suggesting to President Reagan to consider some help with the City's medical facilities.

During the Easter Holiday from April 20 to 24, I will be in Hawaii with my wife for a few days' relaxation. I know that the President and you will be passing through Honolulu then on your way to China. If possible, I would very much like to have a chance of seeing the President there. If this is unarrangeable, then I would of course like to see you. I am staying at the Kahala Hilton and you could perhaps ask Governor Ariyoshi to contact me.

During the period of the President's China visit, I will be in Nanjing (Nanking) on April 26 to preside over the annual board meeting of our shipping related joint venture company with China and will pass through Shanghai on 27th on my way back to Hong Kong, probably missing the President's visit there.

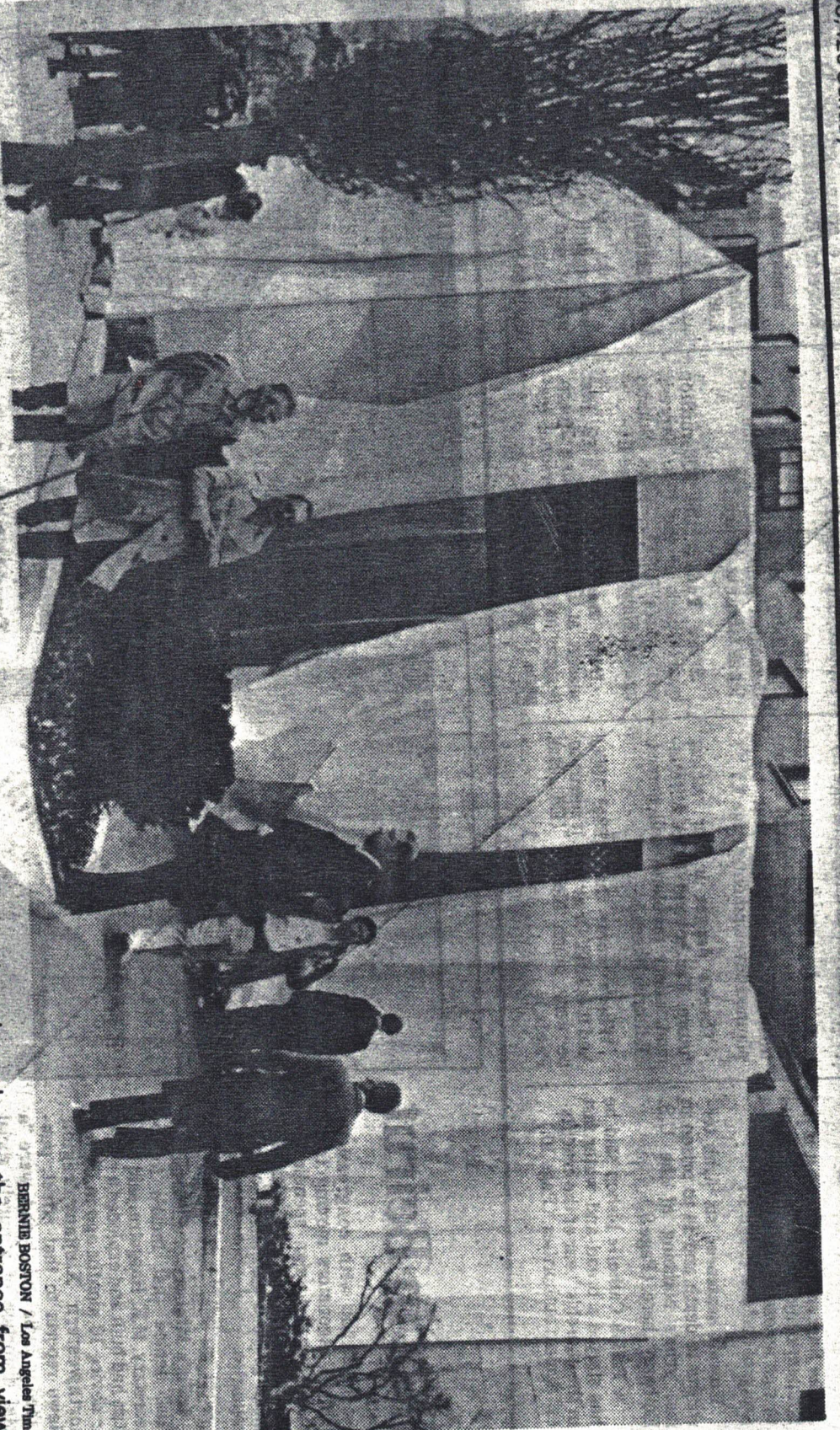

SUBJECT: Visit to Tornado Damaged Areas

I. Possible Events

1. Inspection of Damaged Areas - Since the tornado's path followed along the North Carolina/South Carolina state line, the President should probably inspect both areas. I suggest that he view one state's damaged area from a helicopter and then inspect the other state's damaged area from the ground.
2. Meeting with Homeless Residents and Clean-up Volunteers - Several centers have been set up to provide shelter for those who have lost their home as a result of the tornado. Although they are filled to capacity now, it is anticipated that by Monday many of the homeless will have relocated to the homes of friends and relatives. If the shelters are beginning to empty, we could expand the crowd to include the many volunteers who have been involved in the clean-up operations.

II. Suggested Cities:

South Carolina

1. Bennettsville, South Carolina (Population: 9,000) - According to the Emergency Management Office in Columbia, South Carolina, this was the hardest hit city. As the attached photo indicates, an entire shopping center was flattened.

There is presently an emergency shelter set up at the Shiloh Baptist Church which is housing approximately 100 people.

North Carolina

1. Red Springs, North Carolina (Population: 3,600) - According to the Emergency Office in Raleigh, North Carolina, this was the hardest hit city. By all accounts, the city has been "completely wiped out." There are approximately 250 people being housed in the National Guard Armory and local churches.

2. Mount Olive, North Carolina (Population: 5,100) - This severely damaged area has received a substantial amount of news coverage. According to the town clerk, there was a greater amount of damage to residential property than commercial property.

The National Guard Armory has been set up as a shelter for the homeless. At one point, there were 300 people staying there, but the number is beginning to drop. The Red Cross is planning on setting up a trailer camp for the 125 families who have lost their homes.

III. Airport

1. We have been informed that the Florence, South Carolina Airport is equiped to handle a 747. It is helicopter distance from all three cities.

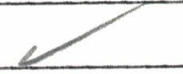

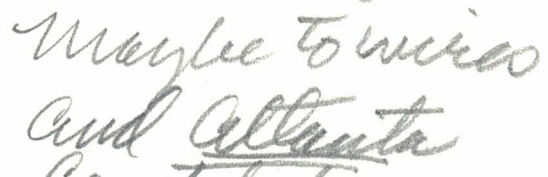

Benjamin Mays, Educator, Dies; Served as Inspiration to Dr. King

Dr. Benjamin E. Mays, a nationally known educator who was an early champion of the civil rights movement, died in an Atlanta hospital yesterday after a long illness. He was 89 years old.

The son of a South Carolina sharecropper, Benjamin Elijah Mays became dean of Howard University's School of Religion, spent 27 years as president of Atlanta's Morehouse College and then, at the age of 75, began a new career on the Atlanta Board of Education in one of the more volatile periods in the history of the American South.

Dr. Mays, who angered his father by "aiming too high" and leaving the farm for college in 1916, received his M.A. and doctorate from the University of Chicago and at least 45 honorary degrees from other colleges in law, divinity and the humanities. But his greatest honor, he often said, was having taught and inspired Martin Luther King Jr. at Morehouse.

Voice of Moderation

Dr. King once called Dr. Mays "my spiritual mentor and my intellectual father." Dr. Mays returned the compliment on the day of Dr. King's funeral on April 9, 1968 when he eulogized the slain civil rights leader as a son. "So close and so precious was he to me,"

Dr. Mays was a voice of moderation in the critical years of the civil rights movement. He attacked white liberals who paid only lip service to racial equality, but he criticized, too, black extremists such as the Black Panthers. His conciliatory stance irritated some militants. Reviewing Dr. Mays' autobiography, "Born to Rebel" in The New York Times in 1971, Ishmael Reed commented:

"Mays' generation strove for first-rate accommodations, services and the right to be addressed by their titles instead of 'boy' or 'Uncle,' or even 'nigger.' He contends that things have changed now because black dentists and doctors are permitted to play golf in Atlanta and blacks receive courteous service in the department stores. I would agree that some things have changed but would propose that many haven't."

College Student in Maine

Dr. Mays was born in Epworth, South Carolina, on August 1, 1894. After attending the high school of South Carolina State College, he went north to Bates College in Maine. Working summers as a Pullman porter to help pay his way, he graduated with honors in 1920. Two years later he was ordained a Baptist minister. He received his M.A. from the University of Chicago in 1925.

and his doctorate in Christian theology and ethics from the same university in 1935.

As dean of the Howard University Divinity School from 1934 to 1940, he gained an international reputation as an educator and lecturer. With his second wife, the former Sadie Gray, whom he met when both were students in Chicago, he traveled widely, attending church and Y.M.C.A. conferences in this country and abroad. His first wife, Ellen Harvin, died. Sadie Mays died in 1969. They had no children.

Dr. Mays was president of Morehouse College from 1940 to 1967. He fought for the integration of all-white colleges and universities but remained a champion of predominately black colleges such as Morehouse all his life.

Dr. Mays served on the Atlanta Board of Education from 1969 until 1981. At the Hall of Fame ceremony in January, another of his Morehouse students, Georgia State Senator Julian Bond said of him: "I am kneeling at the feet of a giant. Making friends of enemies has been a lifelong mission of Benjamin Mays."

Dr. Homer Babbidge Jr., 58 Noted Connecticut Educator

Dr. Homer D. Babbidge Jr., president of the Hartford Graduate Center since 1976 and long a major figure in Connecticut higher education, died of cancer Tuesday at the University of Connecticut Health Center in Farmington. He was 58 years old and lived in Hartford.

Dr. Babbidge was president of the University of Connecticut from 1962 to 1972 and is credited with having changed the school profoundly. John A. DiBiaggio, now president, said yesterday, "The university really came of age under his leadership."

While Dr. Babbidge was president, salaries almost doubled, the library grew from 270,000 volumes to one million, two new schools were created—dental and medical—and construction began on an \$85 million complex that became the health center at Farmington.

He led the university through the turbulent 1960's, when the main campus at Storrs, like many across the country, was the scene of student unrest.

Youngest State University Head

Among his innovations was the appointment in 1969 of a race relations ombudsman, a black special assistant from the Connecticut Commission on Human Rights and Opportunities.

At the age of 37, he was the youngest president of a state university in the nation.

His resignation in 1972 evoked expressions of regret from the student body—they presented him with a petition bearing 7,000 signatures—as well as university officials and state political figures. During his term, he frequently fought with Gov. Thomas J. Meskill. Over Dr. Babbidge's objections, Mr. Meskill won legislative approval of a \$350 annual tuition fee for the traditionally tuition-free university.

From 1972 until 1976, Dr. Babbidge

was master of Timothy Dwight Center at Yale University, his alma mater and a Fellow of the Institution for Social and Policy Studies.

A Gubernatorial Candidate

The Hartford Center, originally branch of Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, awards master's degrees in engineering, computer science and management.

Dr. Babbidge entered the state Democratic gubernatorial contest in 1973, but stepped aside in deference to Ella Grasso, who was elected Governor.

Dr. Babbidge was a director, once chairman, of the Connecticut Public Television Corporation and wrote and narrated a film series called "Connecticut Heritage." In 1977, the series won a gold medal at the New York Film Festival and an award from the Corporation for Public Broadcasting.

Dr. Babbidge collected corkscrews and with a British physician, Bernard Watney, he wrote in 1981 what is considered the definitive work on the subject, "Corkscrews for Collectors."

He taught a course in the construction of stone walls while he was at Storrs.

'Shared His Gifts of Wisdom'

Eugene C. Dorsey, president of the Gamett Foundation, of which Dr. Babbidge had been a trustee since 1968 and a former vice president, said in a statement:

"Homer Babbidge brought to our foundation board an inquisitive, intellectual vigor, a glittering wit and a persistent compassion for the disadvantaged in our society. But our foundation was only one of the beneficiaries of these virtues. Homer shared his gifts of wisdom with his fellow Yankees and with all America. "Those of us who were fortunate to claim his friendship mourn his loss

Carmen Dragon, a Composer

SANTA MONICA, Calif., March 28 (AP) — The composer-conductor Carmen Dragon, who for four decades made music on film, radio, television and records, died of cancer today. He was 89 years old.

Mr. Dragon died at St. John's Hospital in Santa Monica, a spokesman, Michael Schneider, said.

Mr. Dragon, whose son Dayl Dragon is half of the popular music duo the Captain & Tennille, won an Academy Award with Morris Stoloff

el, Nelson Eddy, Mary Martin and others.

In 1942 he began working on films. He also conducted for such radio shows as the Fanny Brice "Baby Snooks" program, the "Railroad Hour" and the "Standard School Broadcast." His composition, "I'm an American," has become a standard with symphonies and bands.

Mr. Dragon, who lived in Malibu, is survived by his wife, the former Eloise Rawitzer, and 4
