Dear Bob:

As you may know, the people of Ventura County are eagerly looking forward to the 1984 Olympic Games to be held throughout Southern California. The Chief Administrative Office is currently concluding negotiations with the Los Angeles Olympic Organizing Committee for the rowing and canoeing events to be held at Lake Casitas, and I am particularly pleased that we have established such a good working relationship with the Committee.

We understand that President Reagan will be flying into Pt. Mugu several days before he attends the opening ceremonies of the XXIIIrd Olympiad in Los Angeles. When he arrives at Pt. Mugu, it would be especially nice if he could be met and greeted by the Ventura County people who are actively involved in the Games, and by the Royal High School Band of Simi Valley which recently won first place in its division in the "Olympic Band and Drill Team Championships".

The Olympic Committee has informed us that "Sam the Eagle", the official mascot of the 1984 Summer Olympics, could officially greet the President on behalf of the Olympic Committee if the Committee knew the date and time of the President's arrival at Pt. Mugu. In addition to the Royal High School Band and "Sam the Eagle", the Chief Administrative Office could arrange for Mr. Ron Hertel of Ventura and Mr. Tom Horton of Ojai, Co-Commissioners of Olympic Canoeing, to be on hand representing the Lake Casitas venue. Mr. Barry Berkus of Santa Barbara, Rowing Commissioner, could also be invited.

Once we hear from you, I will contact Admiral Wilkinson at Pt. Mugu to work out details. As you know, security has been a major concern of the Olympic Committee and the County, and the working relationship already established between the two organizations would greatly assist in the accreditation and security measures taken at Pt. Mugu.

To maximize the security at Pt. Mugu if the White House and Admiral Wilkinson agree to what is being proposed, there will be no public notice of these plans prior to the President's arrival. If necessary, even the band need not be told where it will be performing; for example, we can tell them that they are going to Channel Islands Harbor to meet with you and the Olympic representatives.

Please let me know if these arrangements would be acceptable to the White House and if so, the date and time of the President's arrival. If the White House needs to establish contact with County and Olympic Security Forces, I can give you the names of the people to contact.

Thank you for your letter urging the issuance of a stamp honoring Jay Norwood Darling in 1986.

As you know, the Citizen's Stamp Advisory Committee previously considered a stamp commemorating Mr. Darling but did not recommend its issuance. In light of your interest and others, I am advised that this proposal will again be placed on the agenda for reconsideration at the next meeting of the committee.

I have been assured by the Postal Service that particular attention will be given to your endorsement. I should caution, however, that they believe that the stamp which will be issued on July 2, 1984, honoring the 50th anniversary of the Migratory Bird Hunting and Conservation Stamp Act, will be an appropriate tribute to Mr. Darling. As you noted, that stamp will feature a reproduction of the first duck stamp, which he designed and, to further honor his accomplishments, it will be issued in Des Moines, Iowa, his place of residence during this period of his most notable work. In addition, all the information prepared in connection with this issue -- including the philatelic release, dedication speech and ceremony program -- will highlight Mr. Darling's work.

On behalf of President Reagan, I want to reiterate the United States Government's firm commitment to the complete success of the 1984 Summer Olympic Games to be held in Los Angeles. In full cooperation with the Los Angeles Olympic Organizing Committee and other relevant bodies, we intend to facilitate the full and equitable participation of all accredited members of the Olympic family in accordance with Olympic rules and applicable laws of the United States.

In this framework, I am pleased to inform you that the United States Government is agreeable to a reasonable number of Olympic-related charter flights by the Soviet airline "Aeroflot" and to the berthing of the Soviet passenger vessel "Gruzia" in Long Beach Harbor during the Games.

I am also enclosing with this letter our detailed comments on the numerous issues raised in the three documents attached to the "Summary of Protocol Accord" between the LAOOC and the USSR National Olympic Committee concluded in December 1983.

We are prepared to deal promptly with any further questions you may have on these matters.

Comments on
"Questions of the Soviet Olympic Committee with regard to
Transportation of the Soviet Olympic Team to Los Angeles
on Aeroflot Flights..."

The following is keyed to the numbered paragraphs of the referenced document.

1. The United States Government concurs in a reasonable number of charter flights by Aeroflot civil aircraft between the USSR and Los Angeles during the period July 1 to August 30, 1984, for the purpose of transporting members of the Soviet "Olympic Family" and equipment necessary for their participation in the Summer Olympic Games.
2. The United States Government has no objection to a flight itinerary for such Aeroflot aircraft that includes Havana.
3. The USSR National Olympic Committee should be advised that application for each contemplated Aeroflot charter flight should be submitted by the relevant Soviet authorities in the form of a Diplomatic Note to the U.S. Department of State, at least 30 days in advance of the flight. (Please also refer to section 6, below).
4. Servicing of Aeroflot charter flights, including the provision of jet fuel, is a matter to be arranged by Aeroflot representatives directly with commercial agents or airport authorities in the Los Angeles area.
5. The U.S. Government has no objection to the stationing of two Aeroflot specialists (a representative and an engineer, as requested) in the Los Angeles area for a reasonable period before and after the duration of Aeroflot operations. The individuals selected by Aeroflot for this purpose should submit visa applications in the normal manner to the United States Embassy in the country of their current residence. The U.S. Government assumes no obligation with respect to the availability or price of accommodations or other commercial services.
6. We anticipate that most charter flights operated by foreign air carriers transporting Olympic Family Members to the Summer Olympic Games will utilize either Los Angeles International Airport or Ontario International Airport.

The Federal Aviation Administration has held public hearings on a proposal to establish special air traffic control procedures to assure the safety of the vastly increased volume of air traffic in the southern California area during the Olympic Games. The proposed regulations will require a 30-day advance flight notification. Specific routing and alternate airfields to be utilized will be provided through the Department of State in the normal manner. Information on landing fees and other local requirements can be readily obtained from airport authorities in the Los Angeles area. It is the operator's responsibility to arrange for payment of landing fees and other services.

Escort crews for each Aeroflot flight will be provided in accordance with existing arrangements and procedures.

7. Visas for travel to the United States should be obtained for all Soviet citizens by application to the United States Embassy in their country of current residence. Special procedures have been agreed with the International Olympic Committee for issuance of U.S. visas to members of the Olympic Family bearing Olympic identity cards.

8. The United States (Civil Aeronautics Board) will authorize Aeroflot Charter flights transporting Soviet participants who possess Olympic identity cards, as well as accompanying members of their immediate families and other Soviet spectators en route to the Olympic Games who possess valid U.S. visas. The authorized destination in the United States for these charter flights will be Los Angeles (or Baltimore, Boston, or San Francisco in cases where the Olympic participants are destined for Olympic sites at Annapolis, Harvard, or Stanford University, respectively.) These aircraft will not be authorized to pick up or discharge passengers at other locations in the United States.

9. Since Aeroflot charter flights will be transporting Soviet participants and equipment directly to and from Olympic sites in the United States, we do not see any requirement for American flag air carriers to enter into interline agreements with Aeroflot regarding tickets and other documentation.

10. As noted in paragraph 8, the U.S. Civil Aeronautics Board will authorize Aeroflot charter flights only for Soviet Olympic participants in the categories recognized in the Rules of the International Olympic Committee, their immediate family members, and Soviet spectators en route to the Olympic Games.

11. Congress has passed and the President has signed legislation permitting the duty free entry into the United States of equipment and personal effects of participants in the Olympic Games. In addition, customs exemptions for necessary spare parts for Aeroflot charter aircraft will be considered favorably on a case by case basis upon application for specific shipments through established government channels.

12, 13, 14. Accommodations and transportation for Aeroflot crews, aircraft security, and local hiring are not matters within the jurisdiction of the federal government and should be arranged in Los Angeles by Aeroflot representatives. For the period of the Olympic Games, the Office of Foreign Missions of the Department of State will provide rental cars to all Soviet official personnel who would normally be prohibited from renting vehicles. (We understand transportation for members of the Soviet Olympic Family is a responsibility of the Los Angeles Olympic Organizing Committee.)

Attachment #2

Comments concerning the
"Memorandum on Discussions between the Los Angeles Olympic
Organizing Committee and representatives of the USSR
National Olympic Committee."

The following is keyed to the numbered paragraphs of the referenced document.

1. The United States Government concurs in the docking of the Soviet passenger ship "Gruzia" at Pier 2, Berth 53 in Long Beach Harbor from July 15 to the conclusion of the Summer Olympic Games on or about August 15, 1984. For the purpose of this visit, the "Gruzia" will be considered a commercial Soviet Special Interest Vessel and will be required to comply with all applicable laws and regulations of the United States.

In this connection, officials of United States Government agencies will need to conduct a thorough examination of the vessel upon its entry into port and on subsequent occasions as necessary.

2. Agencies of the Federal Government will assist in assuring the security of the vessel to the extent permitted by law.

3. All passengers and crew will need to possess appropriate visas for entry into the United States. Application for such visas may be made by Soviet citizens at the U.S. Embassy in the country of their current residence. In accordance with established procedures, a list of crew members and passengers must be presented to the U.S. Coast Guard representative in Los Angeles prior to arrival of the "Gruzia" in Long Beach. Procedures for entry to and egress from the "Gruzia" while it is moored in Long Beach Harbor should be arranged with U.S. Coast Guard officials in Long Beach. The categories of cargo described in the Memorandum may be loaded and unloaded without impediment and delivered to places of usage, subject to U.S. laws and regulations. Agencies of the Federal Government will assist in provisioning of the ship to the extent permitted by law.

4. Radio transmission from the "Gruzia" while berthed in Long Beach Harbor will not be permitted.

5. There is no objection to the presence of a Morflot representative in port.

With respect to the further examination of these and other questions arising from the berthing of the "Gruzia", representatives of the U.S. Coast Guard will work with the Port Authority of Long Beach, the Los Angeles Olympic Organizing Committee, and designated Soviet officials to assure that all arrangements for the vessel are made in conformity with the relevant laws and regulations of federal, state, and local governments. The senior U.S. Coast Guard representative for this purpose will be the Coast Guard Captain of the Port of Long Beach.

Attachment #3

Comments on the Memorandum
"Status of the Olympic Attache"

The United States Government concurs in having a Soviet Olympics Attache resident in the Los Angeles area during the period March-August 1984. Such an attache could either be accredited only to the LAOOC, with no diplomatic status or immunity, or a consular officer assigned to the Soviet Consulate General in San Francisco. Under the latter option, this official while serving in Los Angeles, would retain the immunity he normally enjoys while serving in his consular district, with the proviso that quotas imposing limits on numbers of Soviet personnel must continue to be observed and that any person not currently in the United States would be required to submit a visa application to the U.S. Embassy in the usual manner. The Department of State would entertain a request for assignment of an officer on temporary duty to the Soviet Consulate General in San Francisco to serve also as Olympics Attache.

The U.S. Government has established, on the basis of reciprocity, areas closed to travel by Soviets stationed in this country, including some in which Olympic sites are located. Nevertheless, we are prepared to alter these restrictions in the case of an Olympics Attache and establish a free-travel zone in the Los Angeles area, including all Olympic sites, the international airport (to deal with arriving and departing Soviet delegations) and the area in which a Soviet ship carrying Olympic cargo or passengers may be docked. For reasons of reciprocity and security, however, we will require prior notification before the Attache leaves the designated free travel zone, on the same basis as is required of other Soviet officials assigned in the United States. While requiring such notification, we do not anticipate any problem with timely registration of travel by the Attache to San Francisco and Washington, D.C.

We cannot authorize diplomatic license plates for the vehicles of anyone not stationed in the Washington area. We would have no objection, however, to the Attache using a Soviet-owned vehicle with Consular Corps license plates from the Consulate General in San Francisco. We would, alternatively, be prepared to arrange the rental of a vehicle with standard license plates through the Office of Foreign Missions of the Department of State.

Dear Mike:

These next months before the Second Inaugural will be politically volatile, to state the obvious. There will be many events, driven by re-election politics, which will result in staff and cabinet changes during the year and in the interregnum.

However the re-shuffling turns out for others, I think there is one imperative: that you become the Chief of Staff. Not only have you earned it by long service but you have learned it by being number two for all those years to Meese in Sacramento and to Baker here. There is no one, literally, who would have the breadth and depth of knowledge as well as rapport with the Reagans, who could succeed Jim Baker as well as you could.

As your gratuitous counselor though, I must point out a second imperative: that the President's constituency be represented by a high profile conservative with unquestionable ability to obtain access to the President.

The ideas of your being Chief of Staff and of Joe Coors being a Counsellor are not mutually exclusive. In fact they are complementary and necessary to assure a successful administration of White House affairs.

However much you are qualified, Mike, to be Chief of Staff (and you are), you simply do not have credibility with the President's

conservative supporters. But that lack is not beyond remedy. All of us fall short of the optimum in some ways. In order to succeed we emphasize strengths and shore up our weaknesses. Having Joe there would shore up your only weakness and enable you to play to your strengths. The result would be a far more successful term "the second time around" for the Reagans and a place in history for you as the one who made it happen.

Jim Baker, for all of his contributions to the administration thus far, is now seen as having overstayed his time. He has said, to several people recently, that all major White House matters are settled for this year; that it only remains to execute the re-elect plans and to look beyond November for any changes, when, he continues, "I will not be here". It is said on the street that Jim has been promised State, Defense, Treasury, or CIA. Fine, but it is a somewhat dangerous posture in a year such as this to be passive, reactive, and perhaps bored because greener pastures beckon. Perhaps you should consider making the change sooner rather than later.

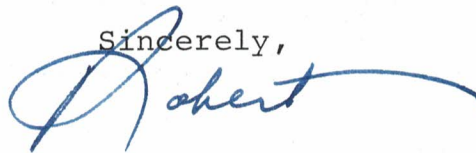

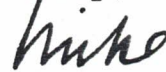

Here are my thoughts on whether the President should go in for Dick Armey who is running against Tom Vandergriff in the 27th Congressional District in Texas.

This district will be a top target race and we must win this seat. Tom Vandergriff won in 1982 by only a few hundred votes. Even though the district has been adjusted to be more favorable to Vandergriff, it is still a very heavily Republican seat. It is clear that the President will do well here and his coattails will be the key to victory.

On the other hand, it is also too early to tell whether Armey will be a strong enough candidate as Texas voters are often reluctant to throw out incumbents regardless of party affiliation. We will probably be able to give a better assessment in a couple of months.

Dick Armey is a sharp, bright articulate person, however.

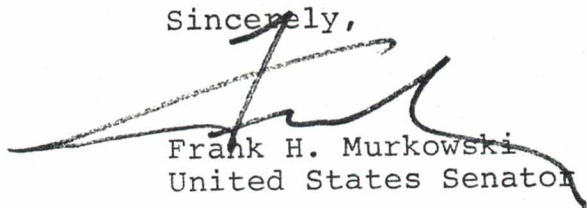
As you know, I am delighted that the President will be meeting with Pope John Paul II in my home town of Fairbanks.

Dear Mike:

I've tried to call you a couple of times, but gather you're out of town until tomorrow. Thus, I thought a note would suffice for the moment.

Late last week one of the ladies in Craig Fuller's office called my office to say we should forget about any trip to China. Since you and I had discussed the matter three or four weeks ago, it seemed appropriate to ask for further explanation.

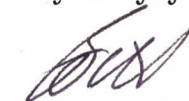
When the Chinese Prime Minister was here, he expressed a desire for an agreement on investments. Since his visit, we have made a good deal of progress on the subject, but some very contentious issues remain to be resolved.

The Chinese, like many others, have a standard negotiating tactic of dragging their heels hoping we will feel the time pressure more than they do. In order to counter those tactics, it was my thought that we should negotiate now and attempt to wrap it up during the President's trip - when the maximum pressure would be on them. Publicly, the trip itself is evidence of the President's success. An agreement will be, for us, icing on the cake, which we could sign only if it clearly was in our national interest. They, however, need it while he's there.

At any rate, the suggestion that I not go sounds like I'm being asked to cut a deal immediately and steal off into the dark of night. Obviously that isn't your intention, but it does put me in a bit of a bind in the sense that with this time sequence, all the pressure to settle will now be on me, not them. I thought I had better express my feelings clearly as soon as I got the message from Craig's office.

One final point, Mike. I need all this travel like a hole in the head. If I'm going to be moving around, I'd a whole lot rather spend time trying to gather up the political sheaves in Pittsburgh, Indianapolis, or Houston than in Seoul, Manila and Beijing. However, it did seem that the fact that I had to be over there fit fairly nicely with a reasonable negotiating opportunity. We may not be able to complete successfully a Bilateral Investment Agreement, so don't let me overstate the case. It will be tough under the best of circumstances, but it did appear to be a reasonable shot.
