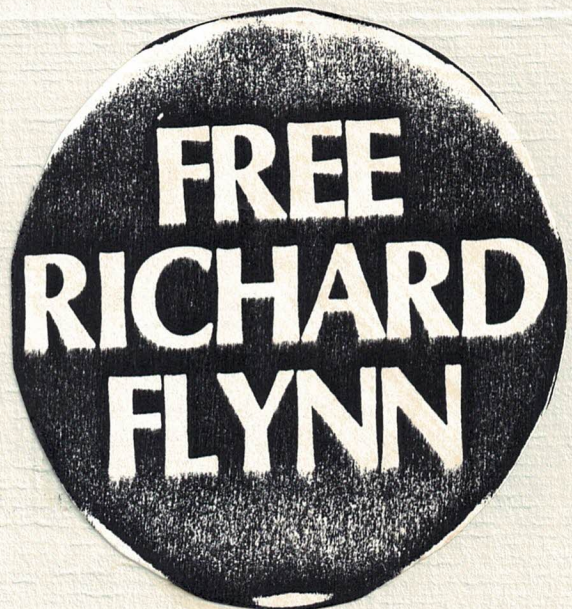

Family's plea to Mexico: Free our Dad

RICHARD J. FLYNN could not spend Father's Day with his family in Riverdale because he is a prisoner in Mexico City, where he has spent the last two years for a crime his lawyers in both countries maintain he did not commit.

The U.S. State Department has declined to move for Flynn's release, leaving his family with dimming hopes.

Flynn, 48, who has suffered three heart attacks since being jailed, was arrested in Mexico over a dispute between an Arlington Heights printing firm he represented and a company partly owned by the Mexican government.

Flynn, whose firm had failed to deliver \$1.5 million in products paid for by the Mexican company, was convicted of defrauding the Mexican government.

On Sunday, his family picketed the Mexican Consulate in Chicago in a plea for his release.

"It doesn't seem like a Father's Day at all," said Flynn's youngest daughter, Mary.

"This is the third Father's Day he's been gone," Mrs. Flynn said. "He's missed one wedding and three graduations."

MANY OF THOSE gathered at the consulate's office, 540 N. LaSalle St., wore "Free Richard Flynn" buttons. Mary, 18; Dennis, 25; Katy, 24; Richard, 22; and Ryan, 3, wore "Free My Dad" T-shirts.

"We're gonna wear it [the button] till he comes home," said A.J. O'Brien, a close friend of Flynn and his wife, Catherine.

O'Brien, who went to see Flynn after he was taken into custody, said she could not believe the U.S. Embassy's attitude.

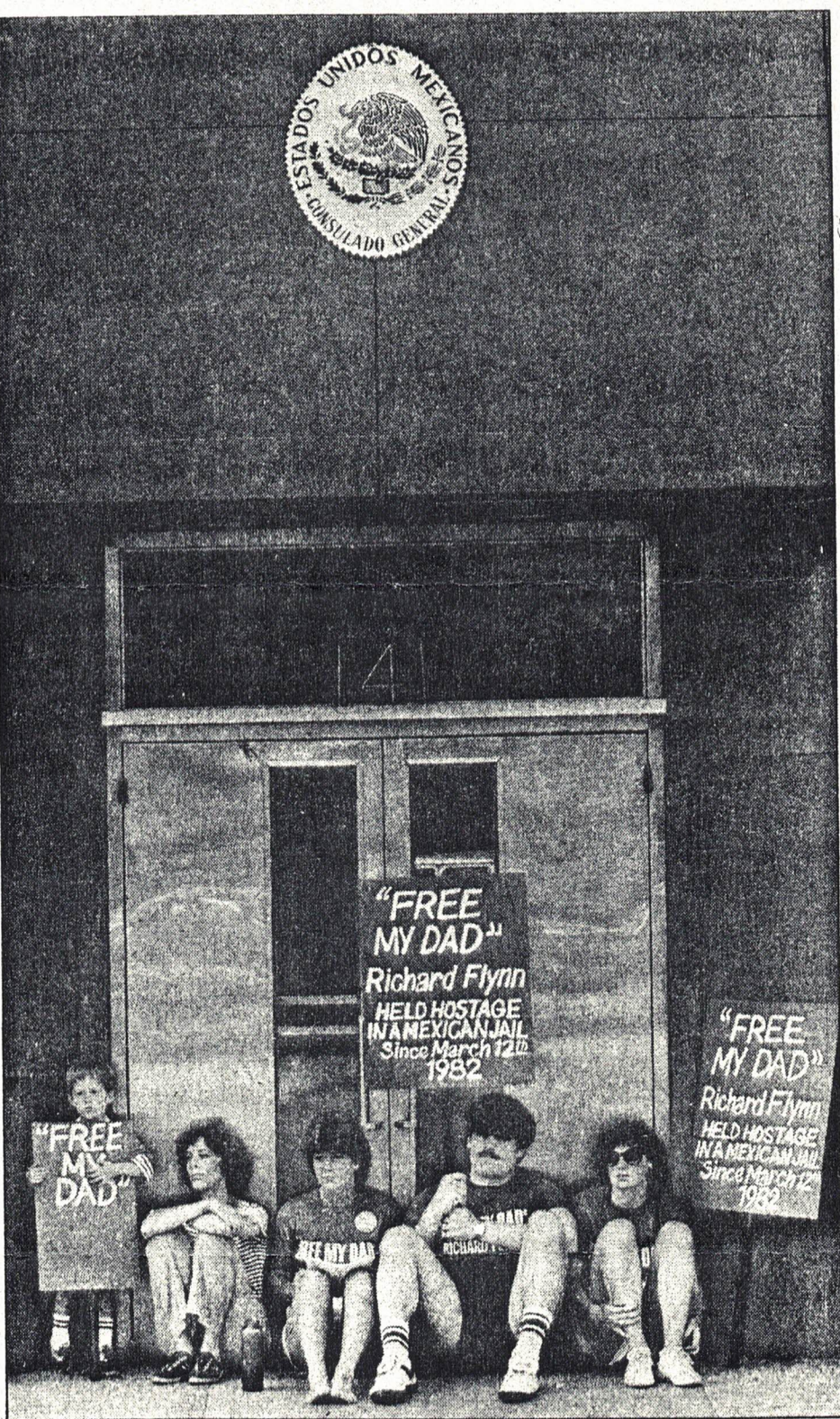
"We're just not going to get involved—he's just one person," O'Brien said they told her.

Richard Weeks, a press officer with the Bureau of Consular Affairs for the State Department, said in an interview, "There are limits to what the State Department and consulate office can do in such cases."

FLYNN, WHO suffered his third heart attack last week, was moved on Thursday to a hospital in Mexico City specializing in heart treatment.

In 1982, Flynn was working as a consultant to Bob Schwermer & Associates of Arlington Heights, which has since filed bankruptcy procedures.

The suburban firm, which had regular dealings with Mexican companies, agreed to send \$1.9 million worth of paper prod-

ucts to Tallares Graphics, a Mexican printing company.

Susan Keegan, Flynn's lawyer in the United States, said that Schwermer only sent Tallares about \$378,000 worth of paper products. Schwermer was suffering financial problems because of peso devaluations and the failure of its other Mexican clients to make payments.

FLYNN FLEW to Mexico City to try to negotiate a financial settlement with the Mexican firm, but he was taken into custody and eventually charged with

trying to defraud the government, Keegan said.

He was sentenced last January to six years in prison for defrauding the government. He was credited with two years service, plus he will receive one year off for every year served because of good time.

Keegan said Flynn probably would not finish his sentence before late 1986.

"There's no way I can stop," Mrs. Flynn said about future efforts on behalf of her husband. "I won't stop till he's home."

"My parents are gone, too, so I'm alone," Krug said. "I miss my parents. I miss my father. I miss everybody."

Dennis Flynn, 25, and his family spent the day picketing the Mexican Consulate, 540 N. La Salle. He carried a sign that demanded: "Free My Dad, Held Hostage in a Mexican Jail."

His father, Richard Flynn, an executive with the Arlington Heights firm of Bob Schwermer & Associates, has been in Mexico City jails since Feb. 12, 1982. He is serving a six-year sentence for fraud.

But Richard Flynn's wife, Catherine, who also was picketing, says the Mexican government is holding her husband hostage to collect nearly \$1.9 million from Schwermer & Associates for non-delivery of printing paper.

"He was there [in Mexico] to settle an acknowledged—by both sides—breach of contract," she said. "He got caught in the middle."

Dennis said the Father's Day picketing was "our personal statement that we're behind him."

"If he was here, we'd be having a cookout or something," Dennis said.

Prompted by the picketing, an officer in the consulate, Horacio Chavez Balanzanio, offered to meet today with Mrs.

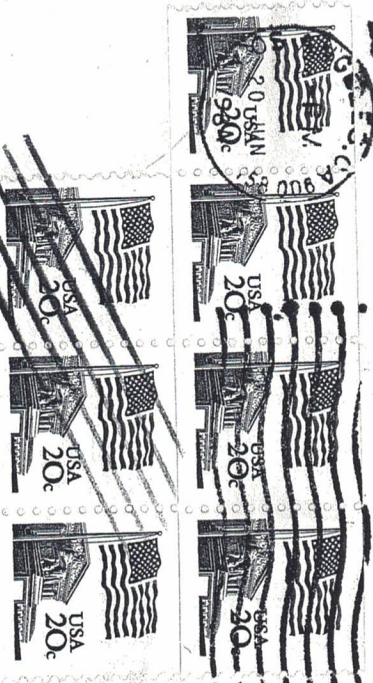

BARCLAY

Albany Will Miss Him

The taxpayers of this state, state government and the state Legislature itself, cannot afford to lose men of the caliber of State Sen. H. Douglas Barclay.

Barclay made it official this week: he is leaving the Senate at the end of his present term.

He insists that the decision is irrevocable. That's too bad, but it is understandable.

The senator has some very sensible reasons for his decision.

"There are some other things I'd like to do."

"The law firm is expanding."

"I've been here 20 years."

That about sums it up.

While the decision may shock some, it was not unexpected. Actually Barclay made up his mind to pack it in a month ago.

He was first elected to the Senate in 1964 and has been there ever since.

In the intervening years he has served his North Country constituency well.

But, most importantly, he has not been parochial. He has been extremely instrumental in enactment into law of many pieces of legislation — particularly in the legal arena — of statewide significance.

In recent years he has been Senate Judiciary Committee chairman, a position that is generally considered the second most-important and powerful job in the Senate. And, in that capacity, as in everything else, he performed well.

The senator was well-liked by his constituents and sometimes wasn't even opposed in an election. When he did have an opponent, Barclay won by landslide margins.

Many political and community leaders sought to get Barclay to change his mind about leaving the Senate.

And, it's the mark of the man and his importance in the Republican party, local, state and national, that even Vice President George Bush and President Ronald Reagan's chief of staff, James Baker, telephoned Barclay in recent days to urge him to stay on.

And, it says something for the type of man Doug Barclay really is that once he made his decision, he stuck with it.

There has been no taint of scandal or conflict of interest attached to the 20 years of service Doug Barclay has rendered in the Senate in Albany.

He has been extremely careful about the type of legislation he handled and completely open with reporters in decrying his positions on bills and the reasons he opposed or supported them.

In the main, Doug Barclay accomplished in Albany pretty much all of what he set out 20 years ago to do.

One aspiration was not fulfilled — he had hoped that one day he might become Senate majority leader. That goal was not to be.

That's too bad for him, because it would have been a fitting reward for his distinguished legislative service. And it's too bad for the Senate, because that staid institution would have benefited tremendously from his able leadership.

It's also too bad for the people of the state, because they would have benefited, too, in the form, of a more efficient, economical and productive state Senate.

Albany will miss Doug Barclay.

So will the hometown folks in Pulaski and the financial and legal community in Syracuse, where the senator practiced his profession.

Men like Doug Barclay are few and far between. Too few pass this way far too seldom.
