Thatcher is given an Eagle

We had breakfast a few days ago with Louis G. Milione of Philadelphia, who is president of Invest-In-America's National Council.

The council's office is in the Architects Building at 17th and Sansom Streets. Over coffee in the Brasserie of the Warwick Hotel, we chatted about the council, which was established in 1949. The council's first president was the late Alexander Blodde of Bryn Mawr. Among the founders was stockbroker Edgar Scott, who lives in Villanova.

Last month, Mr. Milione flew to London to give the council's American Eagle award to Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher at No. 10 Downing Street. The presentation was made by Walter H. Annenberg of Wynnewood, who is a former U.S. ambassador to Britain.

"After the ceremony," said Louis Milione, "Mrs. Thatcher asked us to stay for a drink. We set around and talked. It was all very informal."

Two years ago, Invest-In-America gave its American Eagle award to President Reagan at a White House ceremony. The following year, the award was given to Marvin Stone to mark the golden anniversary of the magazine U.S. News & World Report. Said Mr. Milione: "The presentation to President Reagan was made to commemorate the bicentennial of the bald eagle as a symbol of the United States of America."

Mr. Milione, who was born in Philadelphia, grew up with eagles, so to speak. His father, Louis Milione Sr., was a world-renowned Philadelphia sculptor who was an expert in carving eagles.

Louis Milione Sr. died in 1935. Eleven years later, his son became president of the National Council of Invest-In-America. He doesn't use the junior.

About the council, Mr. Milione said, "Our organization, which was spawned in Philadelphia, has made its mark on education nationally." The council sponsors courses and seminars on economics and the free-enterprise system.

Last May, American Eagle Awards were presented to Walter Annenberg, Jeanne J. Kirkpatrick, U.S. am-
